**HOPE FOR BEST PREPARE FOR WORST**

The first law of advanced play is: If a thing can possibly go wrong, it will. Keep this in mind when you're considering a squeeze. Wait until the rest of the hearts, and you wonder whether or not to break the jack. Apply the first law, and you'll stop wondering.

If you play dummy's cards in hearts, he'll cover with the queen. One of your high hearts is knocked out there on at the next trick. West gains the lead with one ace and sets up the rest of his hearts. He gains the lead with his other ace and defeats you with the rest of the hearts.

Mind you, there would be no trouble if West had the queen of hearts on his foot; the ace would be split. The trouble is that everything goes wrong.

See how things work out if you postulate the finest chance. Play low from the dummy at the first trick, and win in your hand with the ace of hearts.

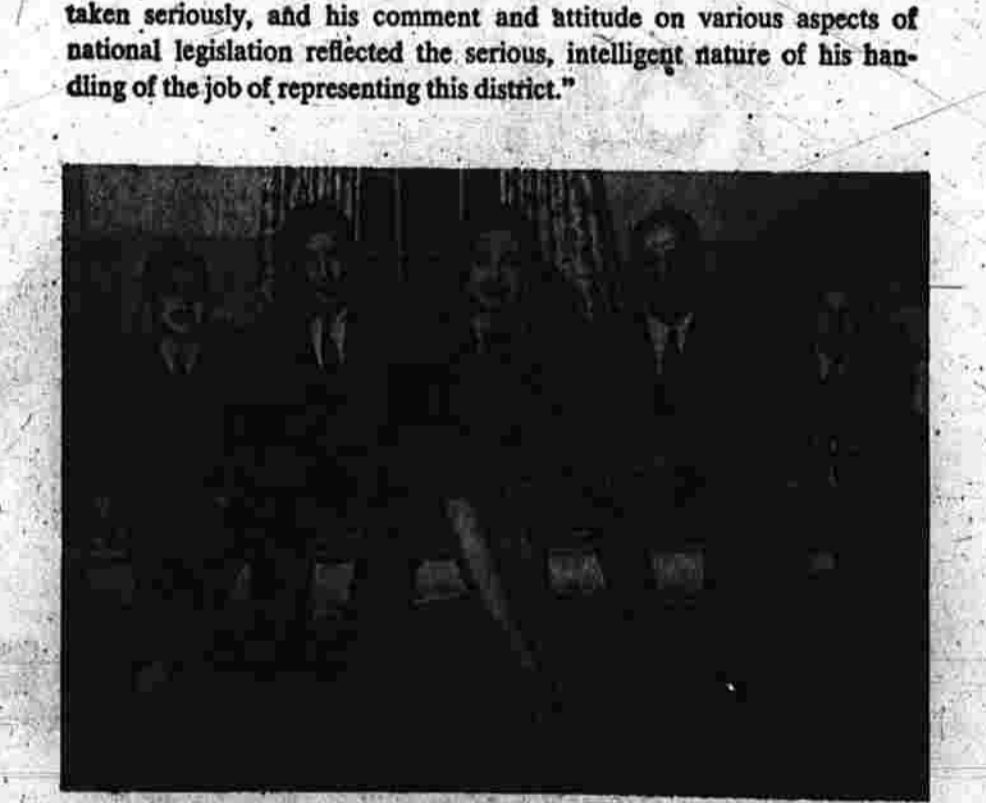

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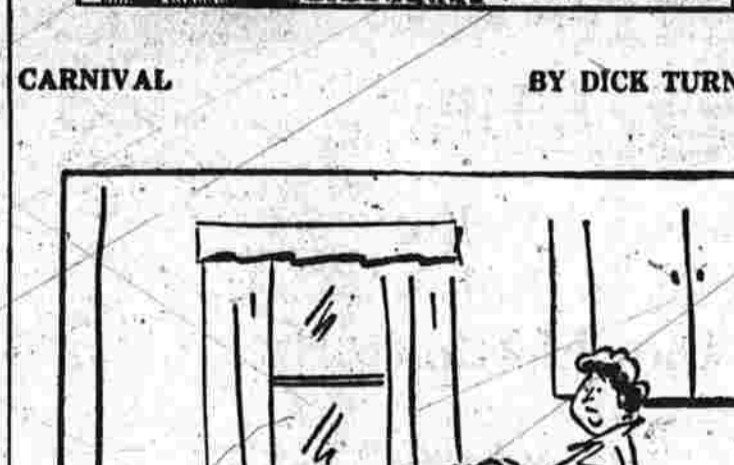
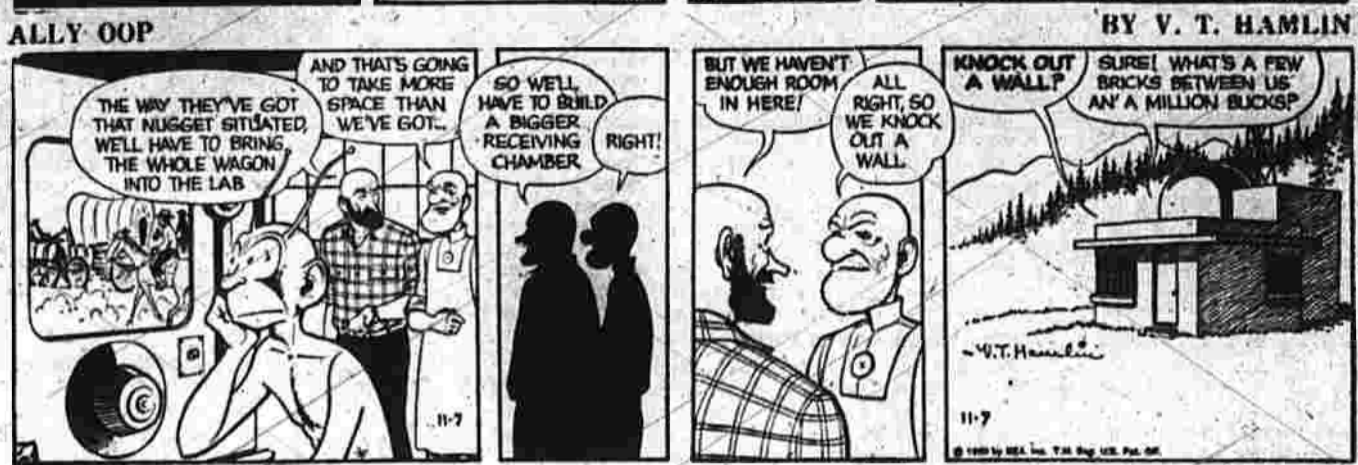

Spot Check Shows Long Lines Wait

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By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS American voters were out early and in big numbers today making their choice between Richard M. Nixon and John F. Kennedy for the next president.

A frenzied spot survey by Associated Press newspapers and bureaus across the country brought reports of long waiting lines at thousands of precincts. Advance predictions were for a record total of perhaps 67 million ballots.

First trickling reports of how the voting was going quickened the pace in the hour before the polls opened in New Hampshire and Kansas.

On the other hand, Democrat Kennedy scored in the first straw poll in Virginia, North Carolina and Minnesota.

In the spot check around the country, Nixon was favored in 55 of 56 of the state's 2,961 precincts.

Republican candidate Nixon got 2,820 votes in 1,551 precincts, while Democrat Kennedy in a tally of 56 of the state's 2,961 precincts.

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
