De Gaulle At Bay

While we have been busy electing a new national leadership, President de Gaulle of France has been formulating his own last-ditch approach to the problem which called him to his national leadership.

But in what seemed to be the potentially significant phase of his speech, President de Gaulle returned to the more generous abridgments of his discussion of the Algerian problem, with conciliatory words for the rebels, criticism of his random phrase of an "Algerian Algeria" and straightforward denunciation of those rightist elements in France and in Algeria who may refuse to accede to his proposition that there can be peace with Algeria without recognition by France.

Apparently, he is considering proclaiming the relation between France and Algeria as a "de facto" partition of Algeria. In other words, de Gaulle may be getting ready to push a rather tricky partial solution at the precise moment when extremists on both sides are more intent than ever upon an all-or-nothing kind of solution.

That Vote In Arkansas... Among the footnotes to the election there is one which certainly shouldn't be lost. Out in Arkansas, the house of the Faithful, there was a question on the machines which offered the people of that state a chance to hand the representatives a legal reason by which the state could avoid its responsibility for maintaining public and eventually integrated schools.

Ataulfo Paulus for its governor, has to be interpreted for what it was, and no more. It was a clear reflection of an extreme segregationist policy. It was, therefore, primarily a negative victory, an avoidance of a mistake, rather than any kind of step forward.

Perhaps the same supposition about the segregation issue everywhere has to be that it was a step toward avoiding extreme steps backward, there will have to be eventual and gradual progress.

# Baylor Scores 71 Points record NBA High

New York, Nov. 16 (AP)—"Give it to Baylor. Give it to Baylor."

That's the cry 10,132 basketball fans took up in Madison Square Garden last night after Elgin Baylor of the Los Angeles Lakers scored his 50th point against the Boston Celtics.

There was still about six minutes left to play and the fans wanted Baylor to break the NBA record high of 64 points for one game that Baylor himself had set little over a year ago, Nov. 8, 1959, against the Boston Celtics.

Break it! The former Seattle All-American did. He finished with 71 points on 25 field goals on 48 attempts and 15 of 19 free throws.

When he was taken out with 28 seconds left he received an ovation that lasted a few minutes.

It was incidental that Los Angeles beat the Knicks, 122-108, in the feature of the Garden doubleheader after the Detroit Pistons had wiped out a 20-point deficit to beat the Boston Celtics, 115-114, in overtime.

Baylor's 71 points were the 44 points scored by Oscar Robertson in Cincinnati's victory over Philadelphia, the Warriors' second straight defeat after a nine-game winning streak.

"I got very nervous when they announced I had set a Garden record at 59 points," Baylor said in a post-game interview.

Securely tucked away in the dressing room, "They tried to start chanting that I asked the boys to let me make my own play."

Strangely, Baylor said he got a bigger thrill when he set the previous record with his 64 points a year ago.

"That was against Boston," he recalled. "And the reason it was such a big thrill is that it broke a 22-game losing streak for us against the Celtics. That happened at Minneapolis where the Lakers played before the franchise was shifted to Los Angeles this year."

Robertson's 44 points on 17 field goals and 10 free throws at Cincinnati was his best showing as a pro so far. He outscored Philadelphia's star, Bill Chamberlain, who finished with 36 points.

# Grid Deaths Decline

Los Angeles, Nov. 16 (AP)—Thirteen players have received fatal injuries as a direct result of 1960 football competition, compared with 18 at this time last season.

So says the annual mid-season report for the American Football Coaches Ass'n., committee on injuries and fatalities.

Dr. Eastwood said last night that one reason for the decline may be the delay his committee experiences in receiving reports of injuries sustained in sandlot games.

Five sandlot fatalities had occurred at this time last year, but only one has been reported so far in 1960.

The death of Howard Glenn, a player for the New York Titans of the American Football League, Oct. 9, marked the first pro fatality.
