We Win, For A Change
 When an election goes against us, in one of our overseas dependencies, everybody assumes that the main reason is our lack of leadership. It is true, but we are deficient in understanding the people whose territory we are governing. That is the real reason.

When we happen to win an election, therefore, something of an opposite kind of interpretation should seem equally permissible and valid.

We have just clearly won an election, for a change, in Okinawa. That Japanese territory was taken over by our forces after World War II, and which we intend to keep, despite the agitation of the Okinawans themselves and political forces back in Japan itself, as long as we consider our bases there to be militarily necessary for the defense of the island.

Most of the elections held in Okinawa during our presence there had embarrassing spots of demerol in the past. The Japanese, who were campaigning on the proposition that we should be driven out immediately.

Not even our best friends on the island dare advocate that we be privileged to stay there forever. But they do consider it our eventual departure can be a gradual process, and that it does not have to begin right now. And it was these friends of ours who seconded our victory and clear gains in Sunday's election to the island legislature. The left wing extremists against us had their wings clipped, for the first time.

So the analysts can be, and should be, satisfied with our position. In the meantime, developed something of a talent for getting along with our unwilling hosts in place of a talent for offending them. We apparently have been proving that we can be friends as well as occupiers.

The Cruellest Weapon

We are interested in seeing how Castro makes out in justifying his own existence if he finds it ever more difficult to reach for some American word or act or policy he can use as a tactic. We are interested in seeing what, if anything, this man is ever going to do, once he runs out of talk. We are interested in seeing where he gets his money, once he runs out of a handy target.

And we are interested, too, in seeing what our perspective on the Cuban problem would be here, in this country, if we managed, for a time, to stop abandoning our own political or ideological base on it. We began quarreling among ourselves over what Castro was even

Beef roasts top an extensive variety of weekend specials featured by supermarkets and neighborhood groceries for pre-Thanksgiving Day meals.

The traditional holiday turkey is making a strong appearance among the meat counter specials but, of course, the big demand won't get under way until Monday.

Rib, round and chuck roasts are the big items among the beef cuts. Other beef items getting favored treatment include steaks, veal chops and rib ends.

Pork also is getting a good play in the meat departments. Pork specials include ham, chops, ribs, hocks, hams, loins and sausage. Bargains in lamb are limited to leg and combinations as some Eastern cities.

Along the Eastern seaboard the fish specials include cod, flounder, snapper and shrimp.

Egg prices continue their climb. Housewives will have many varieties of newly arrived vegetables from far-flung growing areas available for the Thanksgiving table.

These include Florida celery, Maine sweet potatoes, California cucumbers, squash and pumpkins, Florida squash, North Carolina celery and cabbage, radishes and Alabama and Ohio watermelons.

Also new on the market are Arizona honeydew melons and Cuba and Florida larders.

Best buys among vegetables are asparagus, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, mushrooms, medium yellow onions.

ance of payments" which could reach four billion dollars.

The United States is selling abroad much more than it is buying there in commercial trade. But this balance is more than offset by heavy military and foreign aid expenditures in other countries and by private U.S. investments there. All these affect the balance of payments.

One purpose of the sweeping curbs is to maintain world confidence in the dollar, the president made clear. Another is to protect this country's \$18 billion gold reserve against further shrinkage.

All agencies and departments of the federal government with foreign operations, including the State Department, were told by the President to determine what they could do toward economizing on foreign costs by returning dependents and where possible retaining personnel. Their action plans together with those of the military service are to be Eisenhower's hands by Dec. 15.

New pressure was ordered to break down remaining barriers of foreign countries against imports of U.S. goods. The object of this is to increase income from trade as well as to curtail expenditures abroad.

The decision to bring home the thousands of dependents was the most dramatic of the president's orders. The Defense Department said that the largest number of dependents are in four countries: Germany, 193,218; France, 96,580; Britain, 58,147.

The rest of the 484,063 dependents now overseas are scattered in smaller groups in other countries. By services they include in total: Army 246,788; Air Force 197,438; and Navy 40,837.

Secretary of Defense Thomas S. Gates Jr. told reporters he supported the move to bring home dependents and he did not think it would hurt morale or decrease the combat effectiveness of the forces.

"Our people realize we are at war, a new kind of war," Gates said. "Our armed people are dedicated to the service of their country and will understand the need of this action."

The Defense Department estimated that overseas dependents spend an average of \$1,000 each per year. Bringing home 28,000 of them this would eventually cut \$284 million a year from spending of U.S. dollars abroad.

Treasury and State Department officials said the move is made effective should amount to a billion dollars or more in one year, and a \$500 million saving through foreign aid procurement of U.S. goods in the United States instead of abroad. The remaining \$170 million would be saved by various other provisions of Eisenhower's order.

Calling All Fundraisers

It is the trend, an all too common one, to blame the greatest example of our youth in the history of American politics.

The undeniable truth is that the GOP national, state and local campaigns were living examples of Darwin's theory. To anyone who has played the greatest game in the world, politics, they were so unimpressive that it did not take brains for the writer to win bets on the national outcome that Harvard would go Democratic by more than 30,000 and that Manchester was a loss.

If the trend had anything to do with the election why did John H. Chesebrough, who was running for the state judgeship, if Hartford had any kind of an organization, James Bent, who was running for the state judgeship, if the state central committee, led me personally that they were not going to get Patry DePaquale, a Republican, as state chairman, "a nickel". When I told Patry the GOP would lose Hartford by 30,000 he said: "Oh no. We have a great organization that will win the election just where the money was coming from he calmly replied: "Oh we're going to get money from the state central committee" to which I asked him if he was planning a campaign for 1962.

And if it's the trend, how is it that Margaret Chase Smith was overwhelmingly re-elected United States Senator in Maine when all of the so-called political pollsters were sure she was going to lose? Do you remember, Lucia Marie Cormier, was a nurse like the other candidates?

And why did Leverett Ballou win re-election as United States Senator from Massachusetts when the political prognosticators were sure he was going to lose? Do you remember, John Kennedy's candidate for President.

Admittedly, Ballou was a great governor of Massachusetts and has been an able United States senator. But, he has not been against all of the so-called socialist millionaires who have terrorized Kennedy's senate career.

The plain truth is that the United States of America is so confused with all of this talk about "Western Europe", "Africa", "Asia", "Latin America", "Catholicism and inflation" that nine tenths of the voters do not know what they are voting for or why.

We must have the background information to propose an inspection system as reliable and comprehensive as modern science and technology can devise. The institute will also have the background information from an economy which spends and saves on a world-wide basis.

The establishment of peace under a world-wide rule of law is the task of creating the respect for life which is necessary for nations to live together in peace. It is one which we can aid by means of our efforts to create a world order. The path of anyone who seeks to establish peace is a difficult one. The countries of the Soviet bloc have not indicated a willingness to strengthen the United Nations. Any working peace system must take into account the ideas and aspirations of new and emerging nations. We must be certain that our efforts to create rules of law do not lapse into mere defense of the status quo. We must seize the initiative in planning peace.

At each year passes the further advances in military technology make the task of disarmament more pressing. We cannot allow our failures of the past to recur. As a people, as a nation, as a government we must make clear our objective—the pursuit of world peace.

Pair Convicted Of Embezzlement At Seabee Base

Providence, R. I., Nov. 17 — A U. S. District Court jury of eight men and four women today convicted Vincent and Valentine Tirocchi, brothers of frequent visits, of embezzling \$1,000,000 worth of Navy surplus property embezzled from the Davetville, R. I., Seabee Base.

The prosecution charged that from 1955 to 1959 the brothers and their firm received and concealed \$41,007 in embezzled surplus property from the base and \$5,911 in fraudulent bid refunds.

Donald J. Boliver, former superior of surplus property disposal at Davetville, pleaded guilty to conspiracy and testified against his co-defendants.

Miami Beach, Fla., Nov. 17 — The legislative leader of the savings and loan business today called a program backed by commercial bank groups "a greedy, competitive program, contrary to the interests of a strong economy and a well-balanced nation."

Henry A. Bubb of Topoka, Kan., said in a speech prepared for delivery at the annual convention of the United States Savings and Loan League that the real purpose of the bankers' program to change the tax status of savings and loan institutions was "to penalize the small homeowner and stave their competition" from savings and loan associations.

Bubb, chairman of the league's legislative committee, said the banker-sponsored Mason Bill was "designed to drastically reduce our reserve allocations and/or tax portion of our dividends."

"We know the commercial banks don't want tax equality," he said. "That's what they have now. They want to reduce competition by forcing our dividends rates down and our lending rates up. They want to curtail our growth and limit our services to the American saver and home buyer."

"When one sees the earnings of commercial banks and the profits that have accrued to the stockholders of these banks, one wonders why they are not satisfied. The legislative leader of the savings and loan business today called a program backed by commercial bank groups "a greedy, competitive program, contrary to the interests of a strong economy and a well-balanced nation."

He said that since 1951 savings and loan associations have been taxed exactly like every other corporation, including banks.

"Except for the bad debt reserve that is necessary because 'we in-vest 50 per cent or more of our money in long-term real estate mortgages, and we both deduct the cost of money paid to savers, and we both deduct a bad debt allowance," he said.

"The tax load of banks and savings and loan associations is about equal," he added.

Dr. John H. Farley of New York, director of Air World Education for Trans World Airlines, said that within 20 years the world will either be entirely Communist-dominated or free.

"We're in the middle of World War III," he said. "It is a war of ideas. Atomic bombs may never be set off, but this war for millions of minds is the largest selling job the world has ever known."

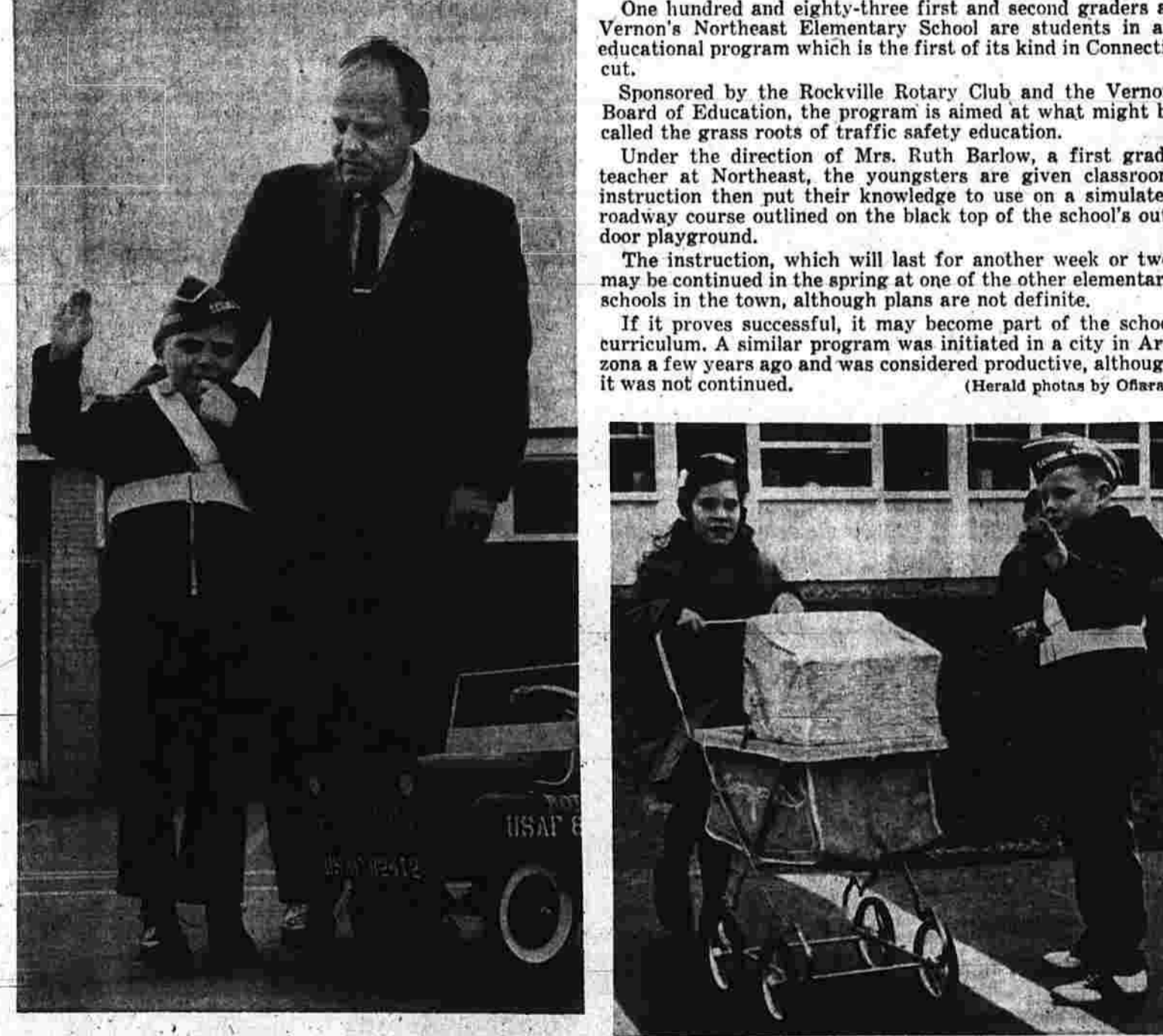

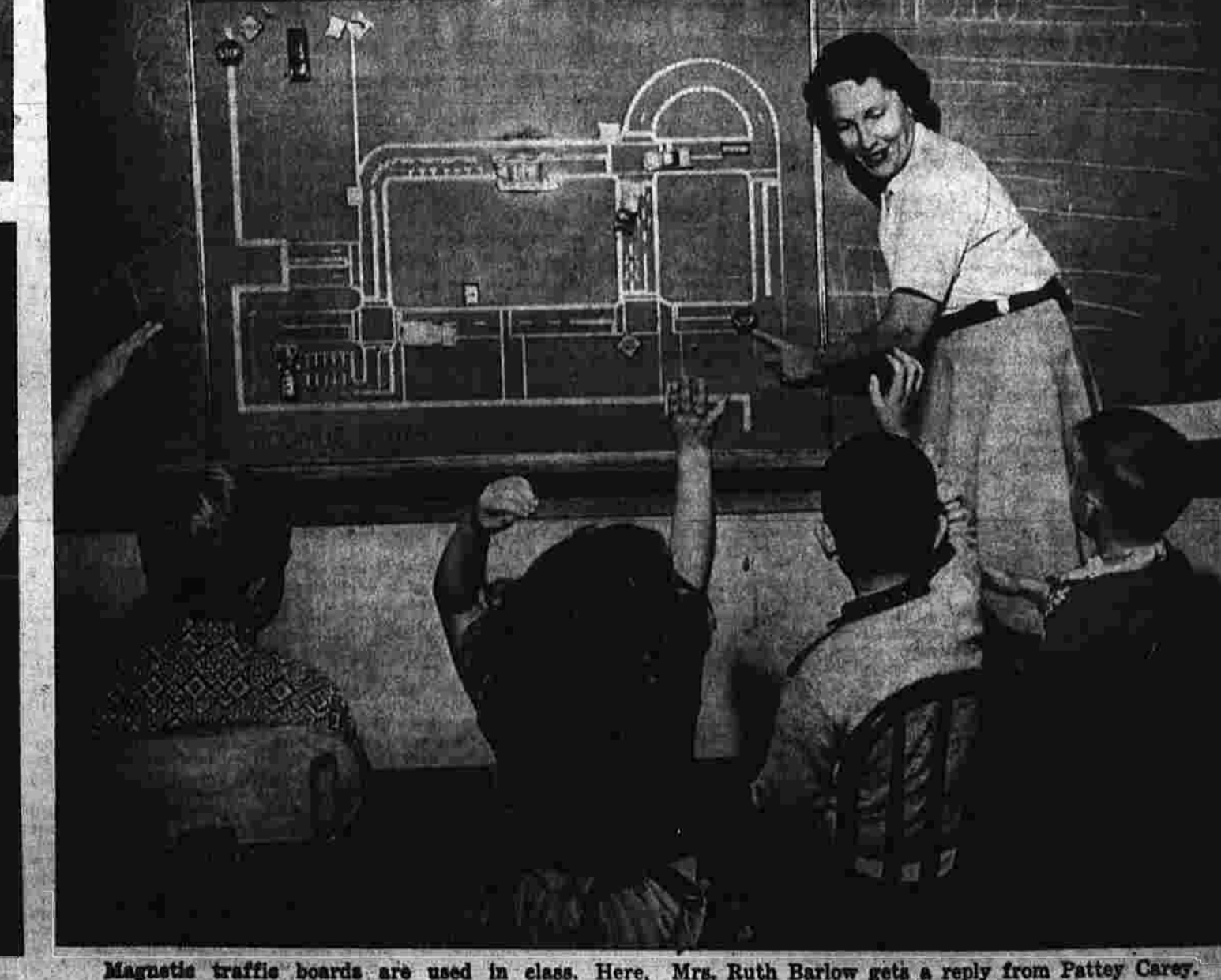

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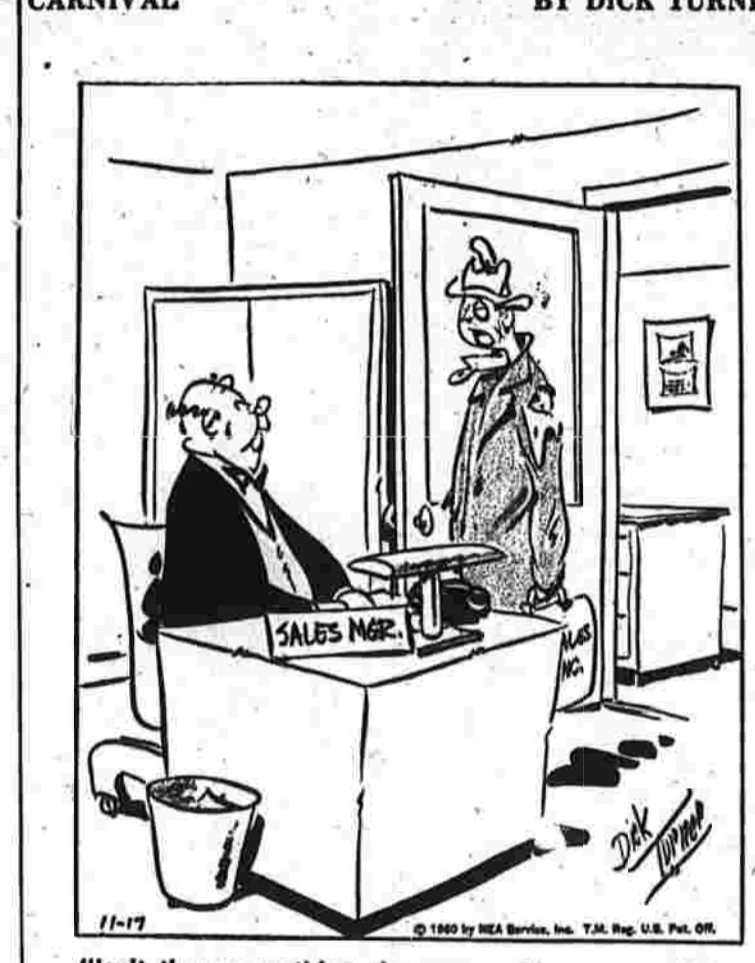
