Experts Give Mike Reason for Thanks

Someday when Mike kicks a place which he wore day and winning field goal, he may have more reason to be thankful than most of his teammates.

Mike, here placed in position on an X-ray table by Mrs. Eugene Dunphy, 607 N. Main St., X-ray technician, will soon shed a leg brace and acquire a new home with adoptive parents—all with the help of Children's Services of Connecticut, Manchester district branch. (Herald Photo by Salerni.)

The Manchester office of Children's Services of Connecticut was contacted by the doctor who delivered Mike, a 6-pound infant, on Oct. 15, 1959. The baby left the hospital when he was five days old after Christmas last year, and was immediately placed in a foster family in about 95 per cent, and later home.

Mike seemed fearful and filled with anxieties; the muscles in his little legs were tight and didn't flex easily. Two months later, a malformation of his left hip socket was detected. It was discovered that his hip did not rotate normally. Doctors agreed this could have been a permanent serious handicap if not discovered and treated early.

The infant's foster mother was instructed how to maneuver Mike's legs in rotating exercises. Mike wore a bar fastened to his upper legs forcing his weak leg into an outward position. He could not sit up because of this restraining apparatus.

Children's Services, which is currently conducting its annual fund drive, provides for leg appliances, board, clothing and paid medical bills for pediatric and orthopedic specialists at an estimated cost of \$1,116.50, apart from the services of professional and office staff at the Children's Services agency.

With physical handicap now almost corrected, Mike's emotions are all and security needs are also placed for adoption soon.

Washington, Nov. 23 (AP)—Living costs rose four-tenths last month in October to 1.4 per cent higher than a year ago.

### Soviet, China Dispute Could Spark 3rd War

By WILLIAM L. RYAN (AP News Analyst)

Here is an ominous aspect of the Soviet-China quarrel: It could result in World War III, and Moscow seems to be preparing for the possibility.

Soviet propaganda makes much of the term peace, but at the same time it seems to be actively conditioning the minds of people in Red-ruled lands for the possibility of a preventive war against the United States.

Some western experts express belief the Kremlin is engaged in a psychological buildup to justify a preventive attack should that, to the Kremlin's way of thinking, become necessary.

In Munich, Germany, experts of the Institute for Study of the USSR say they detect such a trend. Hammering propaganda for six months has been aimed at all anti-Communist, to hatred and distrust of Americans, in picturing the United States and West Germany, in that order, as real and present enemies to the Soviet population.

One method of psychological buildup, says the institute, is an attempt to reproduce in Russia the mood of World War II through glorification of the armed forces and constant appeal for vigilance and defense readiness.

"Even if the Kremlin is not preparing for an armed conflict with the West in the near future," the institute says, "it is nonetheless feverishly preparing for the possibility of such a conflict."

Red China insists upon the letter of Leninist dogma: That war between the two world camps is inevitable, regardless of risks to the United States and West Germany, in that order, as real and present enemies to the Soviet population.

Manifestly, this worries Khrushchev, who has contended that while communism would win, there would be little left after nuclear war on either side.

Khrushchev could lose the argument and be toppled in favor of a group more receptive to the Chinese line. Desperation could lead to that, if an entrenched hierarchy should see in the developing argument a real threat to its continued sway over the Soviet

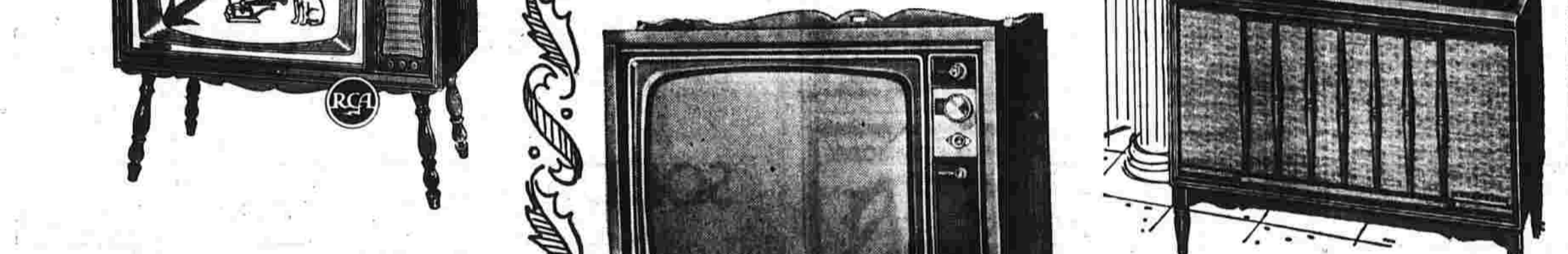

### Not Replayable

One of the strongest gambles we have taken in the cold war—that for an all or nothing allegiance of the little kingdom of Laos to the West—is now in its most critical phase.

When the agreement of Geneva ended the Indo-Chinese crisis in 1954, the agreement provided that Laos should hold a neutralist position, and that as part of the settlement, the French, who had been there all the time, could maintain a military mission there.

Laos began functioning in such a neutralist role, and as part of such a role, the neutral government agreed to give representation to a Communist-dominated political faction which was strong in some areas of the country.

Then the United States came along. It provided lavish economic aid. It took over the training of the army, putting its own officers in civilian clothes for the job. It persuaded the government to renounce its promise of representation to Communist-affiliated political elements.

We were pulling Laos out of the neutralism which had been assigned to it, and pulling it all the way toward the West. Or we were hoping that there was not many months ago a great air about a Communist-supported invasion of Laos and some agitation for direct United States intervention. This was a civil war which kept reporting fierce battles commanders on the scene could not recall, once correspondence reached them.

### Have And Have-Nots Again

Even from behind the closed doors of the conference of some 85 Communist parties in Moscow there comes speculation, some of it apparently informed speculation, on the continuing depth and importance of the schism between the Russian and the Chinese Communist party positions. One of the more interesting speculations is that the Chinese Communist party is so far from being united that it is possible to identify those Communist party leaders in the world who are supposedly proving most receptive to the Chinese Communist theory that peaceful co-existence is the only realistic alternative to the historical necessity.

The Chinese position is reported to have picked up some sympathy and support from among the Communist parties of South America, and from the Communist leadership of East Germany, while Khrushchev, in his position, is reported to be rather solid support from the Communist leadership in the rest of Europe.

The division seems to come out as one between the have and the have-nots of the Communist world, between those parties which have a certain amount of permanence and security and stability, and those which feel they still have their way to make in the world. And those parties which still lack their own status and security have a nervous feeling about Khrushchev's coexistence. It is that they might possibly be sacrificed to it.

The Communist leadership in East Germany, for instance, has a very tangible reason for wanting Russian policy to be tough. Such a policy would be the best guarantee that East Germany will continue to be a Communist East Germany, and not be yielded up to some united Germany in a world of coexistence. Similarly, China itself, feeling its revolutionary era and also feeling all of ancient imperial China's yearning for ancient borders, is not ready to relax a cause that might mean giving up some of its ambitions.

Khrushchev feels able to push a policy of coexistence from a position of Russian certainty and strength. Other Communist leaderships are less secure, and less satisfied. Even the Communist world, it seems, is divided into the have and have-nots, with the latter, as in any world, constituting the prime source of unrest and danger.

**Final Decisions Count**  
President Eisenhower has tried to have a staff system type of functioning, in which capable and energetic subordinates function between national problems and himself, distilling the problems for him, and then forwarding them to him on his own executive initiative. # Rockville-Vernon Bonds Sold, Town to Seek More Borrowing Authority

The Harris Trust and Savings Bank of New York City will buy \$400,000 worth of Town of Vernon bonds Dec. 16, the money to be used by the town to facilitate the change to the uniform fiscal year July 1.

Before the money is actually available for use, voters will be asked in a special town meeting to authorize the town to borrow \$200,000 from the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co. to supplement the money from the bond sale.

A special town meeting has been called for Dec. 13 by the Board of Selectmen. A revised reworking budget, as well as a borrowing authority, will be requested.

William F. Luddecke, chairman of the Board of Finance, said the additional borrowing authority will actuate the town, money rather than place it in the financial burden on it.

He said the \$400,000 bond sale is the largest bond sale in the town's history. The bonds are payable for a term of six years, due Dec. 15 each year beginning in 1961. Interest payments are due twice a year in December.

He said the \$200,000 loan was approved by the Board of Selectmen over two other offers of \$100,000 and \$100,000. The Selectmen, Luddecke, and town treasurer Stuart C. Powell, will sign the bond on Dec. 16 for the signing of the \$400,000 bond.

He protested the expulsions. The order was suspended the next day after the Vatican news agency L'Osservatore Romano warned that Haitian officials could incur excommunication, or denial of the sacraments.

Police with clubs also invaded Port au Prince Cathedral and scattered worshippers who apparently were silently protesting the expulsions.

Bardot charged that Archbishop Poirier and certain French priests were supporting Duvalier's opposition to the revolution.

"There are some French priests who refuse to recognize the fact that this country liberated itself from French rule many years ago," he said.

Duvalier, a country doctor who is a Roman Catholic as well as an authority on vodoo witchcraft, was sworn in as Haiti's 34th president three years ago for a five-year term. His inauguration came after 11 months of turmoil in which Haiti had six government uprisings following the ouster of President Paul Magloire.

He was regarded as the champion of Haiti's deep blacks, against a group of light-skinned Creoles. His tough rule, bolstered by several periods of states of siege, has survived several plots.

Duvalier told his partisans yesterday he was not the chief of a clan but of a nation.

### Speech Therapy Class New MAHRC Service

It's a tough job for a child to learn to communicate with his parents, and if the child has a handicap, the job is doubly difficult.

The process can be a problem for the parents as well. A young child who is unable to express his needs is a source of frustration for his parents.

Of the more than 50,000 mentally retarded persons in Connecticut, only a little more than 4,000 are cared for in some degree in overcrowded, under-staffed state institutions. The rest, about 90 per cent, are being cared for and helped by citywide associations such as the Manchesterville Association to help Retarded Children.

In Manchesterville, parents of mentally retarded and others in the community are donating their time, energy and money to make their program for mentally retarded at Bunce Center successful. Since its beginning in 1952, the Center at Olcott St. has grown

from a handful of interested people to more than 90 families.

During those eight years, Bunce Center has expanded its facilities to include a variety of training programs and activities for all retarded persons in the Manchesterville area. Among its most important training programs is a new speech therapy class conducted by Donald Fairley. Classes in speech therapy are conducted every Wednesday evening. Fairley says the major obstacle a retarded child must overcome is the difficult task of communication. He says if a child cannot make his basic needs known to the people around him, there is little hope the child will overcome his handicap. Fairley explained that in his speech program he hopes to teach his charges to communicate these needs.

The young mother added that the speech therapy class is important to her because she felt if her child could speak and learn some of the things he is interested in, joining and working to make it reach his future goals.

Another way Manchesterville residents can aid Bunce Center, is to take an active part in its functions. Members and friends of the center extend a warm welcome to anyone who is interested in joining and working to make it reach its future goals.

The program of the work is extremely large, dealing as it does with the Revelation of St. John concerning the book sealed with seven seals. While the music is not as tremendous as the writing which inspired it, there are moments when it is genuinely apocalyptic, both in conception and execution.

Mr. Nystedt, who was present, received a rousing ovation from the audience for his work, which the audience as well as myself definitely felt was of much more than passing value.

The program opened with the six excerpts from Handel's "Water Music" which Hamilton Hartly has arranged in the suite by which this music is generally known today. Here there was some unevenness of performance but the suite was, in general, extremely well played.
