Bowles Bid To Meeting Tomorrow

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)-President-elect John F. Kennedy arranged to confer today with Dean Acheson, who was secretary of state in the Truman administration.

And Kennedy will confer tomor-row with Chester Bowles, who served as one of his foreign policy advisers during the presidential campaign. Bowles has been mentioned among those who might be named secretary of state in the Kennedy regime.

Kennedy's press secretary, Pierre Salinger, announced the planned meetings at a news conference against the background of the President-elect's continuing conerences with various advisers regarding the filling of cabinet posts and other high-level positions in the new administration

In connection with the an-nouncement that Kennedy would onfer late this afternoon with Acheson and tomorrow morning with Bowles, Salinger was asked about the possible significance of these appointments.

The press secretary replied that Acheson "is a man who has had considerable experience, and I think the Senator (Kennedy) wants to seek out his advice and counsel." Salinger then was asked whether the appointment with Bowles means that the former Governor of Connecticut and retiring member of the House of Representa-tives may be named secretary of
