Morton Will Check On Illinois Recount

On 22 precincts checked by the city board and three by the county board yesterday and Friday, the city board earlier in the week.

But Republican watchers claimed Nixon had a net gain of 163 votes in the 22 precincts.

The GOP watchers said they disregarded ballots that were spoiled or improperly marked but the other counties did not.

Kennedy, on the basis of reports from the state's 192 counties won the state's 27 electoral votes by a margin of 84,919 votes. But Gov. William G. Major Richard J. Daley of Chicago, Mayor of the National Republican and Fair Elections Committee, had been set up to check on every suspicious state. Morton also heads up the group and it will dig into what he called "sneaking irregularities and fraud."

But he conceded there was not much chance of overturning Kennedy's election.

Mayor Richard J. Daley of Chicago, the state's top Democrat, made this comment on GOP claims of fraud.

"It is a joint effort by Republican members of the North and South in the state to prevent the man elected by the people from taking office."

Stamps in the News

Sumnerfield Statistics

The Post Office Department sold 23,773,570 stamps during the fiscal year 1960, according to Postmaster General Sumnerfield.

The 1960 stamps were regular postage stamps in sheet form, and 7,211,000 were regular postage stamps in sheet form.

There were 2,492,757,000 commemorative stamps issued during the fiscal year.

Also distributed were 2,005,442,000 postage stamps, 1,773,000,000 domestic postal cards, and 30,820,000 air letter sheets.

The cost of printing adhesive stamps of all kinds, including postage dues, special delivery stamps, booklets and cancellations, was \$6,908,318.74. The combined selling value was \$1,086,234,801.00.

When the 4-cent sheet of Freedom's commemorative postage stamp was first placed on sale at Detroit, Mich., Oct. 25, there were 380,531 first day covers canceled and 589,000 stamps sold, with a value of \$34,438.78.

On Nov. 1, there were 32,944 first day covers canceled and 1,695,403 stamps sold with a face value of \$67,818.12.

To date in 1960, excluding the Manterheim and Garibaldi "Memorial" stamp of Liberty, the 4-cent American Carnegie "Famous American Stamp" issue have been 187,403 first day covers canceled thus far.

For the same period, and with the same October and November stamps unsupported, first day sales now total \$1,507,450.79.

When the 4-cent and 8-cent Ignacy Jan Paderewski "Champion of Liberty" stamps were first placed on sale Oct. 8 at Washington, D.C., there were 1,007,438 first day covers canceled. A total of 921,916 of the 4-cent and 801,110 of the 8-cent denomination stamps were sold in Washington that day, with a value of \$90,965.44.

There were 438,908 first day covers canceled in New York, Oct. 18, when the 4-cent Boyz Club of America commemorative stamp was issued. In all 1,720,493 stamps were sold in New York that day, with a value of \$68,819.72.

The Postmaster at Portland, Ore., reports that 16,878 "Great Fire red" embossed airmail envelopes were sold on October 4, 1960, and that 196,851 first day cancellations were applied.

There were 312,116 first day covers canceled at Cincinnati, Oct. 10, when the 4-cent Robert A. Taft Memorial stamp was first placed on sale. In all, there were 68,187 stamps and a value of \$30,327.48.

When the 4-cent Francis Scott Key Credo stamp was first placed on sale at Baltimore, Maryland, Sept. 14, there were 501,126 first day covers canceled and 1,076,000 stamps sold, with a value of \$47,000.00. A total of 2,250,000 stamps were sold in the launch post office set up at Fort McHenry for the day.

Sheinwold on Bridge

USE CUE LEADS TO STOP BID

The first step in using a language is to transmit information; the next step deals with information. Most of the time, it is in the ordinary affairs of life, but only a few are villainous enough to carry the lesson over into bridge.

The hand comes from Fred Kaplan's new book "Psychological Strategy in Contract Bridge," and illustrates a fib told by the author himself.

As soon as North raised diamonds, Kaplan knew that he wanted to get to game or slam in diamonds. Any good bridge player would come to the same conclusion.

Kaplan went one step further. He knew that he didn't want a club opening lead. He bid clubs to stop the lead.

See how the bidding unfolded to West. Apparently South was hoping for a slam in diamonds. He "showed" the ace of clubs by bidding four clubs, apparently hoping that this information would be enough to urge his partner on.

It seemed foolish to West to lead into declarer's strength. No body had bid spades, so West led that suit.

There was no problem after that opening bid. He could take his two aces but nothing else. If South had bid spades, telling the truth about his hand, West might have opened the queen of clubs. Then South would go down.

Some bridge players have such high moral principles that they would never dream of making a deceptive bid. Such players should stay away from Kaplan's new book; they might be tempted to change their minds.

Daily Question:

As dealer you hold: Spades—A 7 3; Hearts—K 9 8 5 3; Diamonds—3 2; Clubs—A 10 8. What do you say?

Answer: Bid one heart. You have only 11 points in high cards and 1 point for the distribution, but the hand is (just barely) worth an opening bid. You might pass if the spot cards in hearts and clubs were weaker.

Traffic Deaths Trend Upwards

Chicago, Dec. 2 (AP)—The national traffic toll is on an upward trend.

The National Safety Council reported yesterday that fatalities totaled 3,600 in October, the highest number for that month since 3,918 were recorded in October 1955.

October's deaths showed an increase of 1 per cent over the total for October of last year.

The toll for the first 10 months of this year rose to 31,120, a gain of 2 per cent over the corresponding period of 1959.

But the rate of fatalities in relation to miles traveled has increased at a record level of 5.3 that means 0.5 persons were killed for every 100 million miles of travel by motor vehicles.

Meet John N. Dempsey Lad from Tipperary Next State Governor

(Continued from Page One)

The boy from Cahir, in Ireland's county Tipperary, who came to this country with his parents when he was 10, virtually talked his way into politics when he was 21.

It was in Putnam, where Dempsey has lived since coming to America, that he made his political debut.

It was a street light, so the story goes, that led Dempsey into politics. The light had shone brightly in front of his home for a long time and then one day it was gone, darkened by order of the city council.

Dempsey went to protest and did such a good job that the order was rescinded. Dempsey was urged to run for the city council himself and he did.

Then he ran for mayor, and was elected in 1948. He became so popular that he was re-elected for six consecutive terms. Last year, the Republicans did not put up a candidate because they couldn't find anybody who wanted to run against him.

In 1949 he went on to the General Assembly as a representative from Putnam. He served three terms, one as minority leader, and then joined Ribicoff's staff as executive aide when the Governor took office in 1955.

He is a handsome, black-haired man, with an ingratiating manner. Even so, he will need all his charm to fill the shoes of his ex-boss, Ribicoff, who was the party's best vote-getter in the state.

Dempsey was educated in Ireland and in the public schools in Putnam. He attended Providence College in Providence, R. I. His wife is the former Mary P. Frey of Barrington, R. I. They have four children, all of school age.

Dempsey is a devout Catholic. One of his sons, Edward, is now studying for the priesthood at St. Thomas Seminary in Bloomfield.

After studying about his studies at Providence because of family problems, Dempsey himself worked at a variety of jobs in Putnam while holding his part-time political job. He was a mill hand, full personnel manager and later traffic manager for a trucking company and sales representative for an automobile company.

One of Dempsey's political heroes is the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt. He once told an interviewer, "was a great American. He did something for the working man."

It was Roosevelt, Dempsey said, who inspired him to end his own messages to his city council with the words "with the help of God."

As for politics itself, Dempsey once said: "There is no greater field than politics to be of real service to your fellow man."

Wanted by FBI

The name of John B. Everhart has been added to the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

He is being sought on the basis of a federal warrant, issued Aug. 27, 1958, in Athens, Ga., charging him with unlawfully being the State of Georgia to avoid confinement after conviction for murder.

Everhart was born on June 24, 1922, in Atlanta, Ga., and has spent most of his life in that area. Everhart has been employed as a truck driver, laborer, freight handler and cook.

He reportedly favors "southern style" cooking, and particularly likes roast beef, fried chicken, and fresh vegetables. He is also said to like movies and fishing.

Everhart stands 5 feet 6, weighs approximately 190 lbs., has a heavy build, black hair, brown eyes and a brown complexion. He has a small scar on the outer side of his left eye, as well as scars on the back of his left hand, his upper forearm and his right middle finger. He may be wearing a mustache.

Since Everhart has been convicted of murder, is known to have been in possession of a .38 caliber pistol and to have shot and wounded a police officer while resisting arrest, he should be considered armed and extremely dangerous.

Any person having or receiving any information concerning the whereabouts of John B. Everhart is requested to immediately notify the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which may be found on the first page of any telephone directory.

Lumumba was driven to Thysville, 100 miles west of the capital, during the night under a strong escort of soldiers with heavy, jeep-mounted machine guns.

The convoy left the improvised jail at the Army's Binza camp near Leopoldville with its sallyport prison shortly before midnight.

He was flown here yesterday after being captured at Port Francoeur, in remote Kasai Province. His capture interrupted a flight by car to Stanleyville where he apparently intended to make a new bid for power.

He arrived here debilitated and emaciated and was seized by on-lookers and cuffed by Congolese soldiers.

Taken to Thysville with him were his three male traveling companions who also were arrested at Port Francoeur.

Mobutu placed his prize prisoners in personal charge of Col. Leon Boboto, commander of the Thysville garrison, who at one time was widely mentioned as a possible successor to head the Congo's military regime.

Mobutu told newspapermen Lumumba would be tried "in due course" for inciting rebellion in the army and the common law crimes of treason and murder.

The strongman was the husband of Gen. Joseph Kasavubu, supreme commander of the U.N. mission's major policy decisions.

An aide to Von Horn said Mobutu had come "voluntarily to the law."

The Soviet delegation at the United Nations New York demanded Friday night that Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold make an immediate report on steps being taken by the Security Council to ensure the safety of Lumumba.

Witness Fails To Identify Man Held as Killer

Bridgeport, Dec. 3 (AP)—A bartender has testified in Superior Court that he could not identify the man who robbed him just before a Stamford policeman was shot to death.

The bartender, John J. Yates, said the holiday that preceded the fatal shooting of Patrolman David Troy was staged by a man disguised with surgical tape.

Yates told the first-degree murder trial of Joseph Desiato yesterday during the second day of testimony that the bandit also had a cloth cap pulled down over his head, and wore dark glasses.

The trial was held in the courtroom of the Superior Court in Bridgeport.

Yates looked, and saw a 2-inch gun barrel protruding from a rolled-up newspaper. He said he saw surgical tape stretched across the man's forehead and then heard him say, "Hey, Mack, look at that."

Give me the money in the till and don't make any false moves," the bartender quoted the man as saying.

Thomas Tamburri, son of the owner of the restaurant, told the judge he was playing cards when he saw the man enter the building as Yates alerted him to the robbery.

Tamburri said he and two other men ran after the bandit and saw him climb down a fire escape. Troy and another patrolman joined the chase.

George Beatty, who lived near the scene of the shooting, testified that he saw the man enter the building and run through the alley with the money.

The fleeing man climbed up on a roof, Beatty said, and then shot the man out of the police car on a catwalk grabbed his chest and fell to the ground. It was Troy, Beatty said, and the officer died.

Gov. Ribicoff, Flemming Set Job Talk Date

Hartford, Dec. 3 (AP)—Gov. Abraham Ribicoff will meet in Washington Tuesday with Arthur S. Flemming, the man he will succeed as secretary of health, education and welfare in the administration of President-elect Kennedy.

The meeting was arranged during a phone call between the two men yesterday. Ribicoff called Flemming from here after receiving a telegram from the outgoing Secretary.

The Governor said Flemming "very graciously" offered to help in any way possible to make the coming transition as easy as possible.

The luncheon date is set for 12:30 p.m. Ribicoff said that after the meeting he will remain in the nation's capital for another couple of days. He said he plans to hold preliminary discussions "with others" on the organization of the department of 62,000 employees.

Flemming's telegram read: "Heartiest congratulations on your designation to head what I regard as the most exciting department in the executive branch of our government."

He said that as a result of your training, experience and interests you will obtain great satisfaction out of working with the dedicated and competent staff of the department.

I am prepared to do everything I can to help you become acquainted with the department's operations. Very best wishes.

Ribicoff again declined to discuss how any plans he may have for the future operation of the department.

He said that the formulation of policies and programs in all areas of the department will be the responsibility of the program by President-elect John F. Kennedy.

When the basic policies are determined, it will do everything to carry them out.

The Governor, talking to newspapermen after the meeting, said that his philosophy in the general field of education, health, education and welfare is "to do it all for the people."

2 Brothers Caught but Flee Police

The Soviet delegations has made overtures to get the Asian-African bloc to make certain key changes in its resolution, which merely calls for immediate steps to get the colonial powers to grant freedom to their dependent territories.

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Fighting Roaring Gasoline Fire

Firemen work from a safe distance with hoses at Santa Fe Springs, Calif.—near Los Angeles—last night as they fought a roaring gasoline fire at the Rothschill Oil Co. tank farm. The huge tanks, containing 100,000 gallons of high-octane gasoline, endangered a cracking plant adjacent to the storage area. Firemen said the blaze apparently was started by static electricity during loading of a tank truck.

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Sen. Byrd Hits 'Purge' Plan, Bowles' Planks

Washington, Dec. 3 (AP)—Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., today called for a purge of the Senate by the House of Representatives.

Byrd made public a letter to Sen. James H. Eastland, D-Miss., in which he wrote: "You have been quoted in newspapers as saying you are leading a movement in the Senate to deny membership to those who are not Democrats."

Byrd said that he was "convinced that a purge of the Senate is necessary to restore the honor and dignity of the office of Senator."

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Integration Foes Defy Federal Court Orders

New Orleans, Dec. 3 (AP)—New Orleans ended 10 days of token school integration today with the Legislature offering new defiance to a federal court which has ordered a merger of both public and private schools.

The weekend holiday offered a respite from pickets who have harassed at one school where a boycott by white pupils showed signs of weakening.

A complete boycott of white pupils was held through the week at McDonogh No. 19 Elementary School, attended by three Negro girls in the first grade.

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Russians Fail In Recovering Dogs Satellite

Moscow, Dec. 3 (AP)—Russia's space mission failed today in an attempt to recover a satellite dog from the orbit of Earth.

The dog, named "Lekko," was launched on a mission to orbit Earth and return to the ground.

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Death Toll at 45 In Wave of Fires

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. A wave of fires in homes around the nation has taken a toll of at least 45 lives during the past two days, most of them children.

The fires were reported in California, Texas, Louisiana, and other states.

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Pope, Archbishop Near Threshold of Problems

Vatican City, Dec. 3 (AP)—Pope John XXIII said today his historic meeting with the Archbishop of Canterbury "was only as far as the threshold of great problems," but left hope for their eventual solution.

The Pope said that the meeting was "a step forward" and that he was "convinced that a solution will be found."
