80 Sign Manifesto Nikita Prevails Over Chinese

Moscow, Dec. 6 (AP)—The world Communist movement publicly closed ranks today to support Soviet Premier Khrushchev's thesis that communism can triumph without nuclear war. Khrushchev thus won a victory at last month's Communist summit meeting.

Communist China joined 80 other Communist parties in issuing a manifesto that seemed to make clear Khrushchev and his line of peaceful coexistence retain control of world communism's direction—at least for the present.

"War is not fatally inevitable. The Communist parties regard the fight for peace as their prime task," said a declaration spread across 3 1/2 pages in Pravda.

This is what Khrushchev has insisted on since the 20th Soviet Communist Party Congress in 1956 which has won later endorsements from the Communist movement.

But this time he won a stamp of approval only after an embattled Communist summit meeting that opened in the Kremlin Nov. 9—the day after the U. S. elections—and continued for 21 days. The agreement that emerged, in public at least, took 20,000 words. But no one could tell how permanent was the ink in which it was written.

(Communist China has held that war with the Capitalist world is inevitable. This was the major difference with the Communist line in the larger question of how the Communists should advance their cause—by a belligerent posture toward the West and encouragement of violent revolution, or by negotiation with the capitalists)

22 Subpoenaed For Probe of County Crime

Hartford, Dec. 6 (AP)—State Referee Ernest A. Inglis today opened his one-man grand jury investigation of vice conditions in Hartford County by asking news and television photographers not to jeopardize its success by photographing witnesses.

The former Chief Justice of the state did not put this into the form of an order. Photographers, however, acceded to his wishes and contented themselves with photographing the Chief Justice and State Atty. John D. LaBelle entering the grand jury room and similar things.

"Every grand jury proceeding is secret," Inglis said. "The reason is that the state's case should not be divulged to people who may be accused of crime in advance of the time they are arrested."

Of course, also, if there is nothing more than a mere suspicion that a person may have committed a crime, it isn't proper to ruin this reputation by spreading about the fact that such a suspicion exists.

Inglis went on to say that the investigation has a 2-fold purpose:

1. To give the state an opportunity to question witnesses under oath, a more effective procedure than merely listening to their question them unsworn.
2. To give the presiding judge an opportunity to determine if enough evidence exists as to the commission of crime to warrant prosecution.

Twenty-two witnesses were subpoenaed to the Hartford County building for the opening session. All but four were told to return on other specified days.

Assertion Follows 3 Hour Talk

Washington, Dec. 6 (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy and President Eisenhower joined in a declaration today that the United States will "continue to seek peace with justice in freedom for all peoples" as its world objective.

The Republican President and Democratic President-elect said in a joint statement that they had discussed "major problems of peace, security and freedom throughout the world" in a White House conference lasting more than three hours today.

The two men, who had complimentary things to say about each other's policies in the presidential campaign, had what Kennedy personally described as a "cordial" meeting.

Kennedy was greeted by a military display and was met by Eisenhower at the door when he arrived at the White House at 9 a.m. for a historic conference on the problems involved in the forthcoming change of national administration.

For about one hour and 30 minutes the two men talked alone in Eisenhower's office of the many problems that face the United States in the world today.

Then they went to the cabinet room for an hour and 15 minutes of discussion with Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, Secretary of the Treasury Robert B. Anderson, and Secretary of Defense Thomas S. Gates Jr.

After the meeting was over, James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, and Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press secretary, issued a statement in which they said that much of the discussion had centered on problems in the international arena.

Britain Hopes For New Talks By East, West

Tentative hopes were expressed in Britain today that the declaration of Communist policy coming from Moscow's Red summit may ease the way for new East-West negotiations to relax Cold War tensions.

Europe's Communists cited the Moscow statement as confounding western predictions of a major split between the Soviet Union and Red China, which have differed on Soviet Premier Khrushchev's policy of peaceful coexistence with the Capitalist world.

Evening newspapers published the declaration on front pages without attempts at any special Chinese interpretation.

Emphasizing the international aspects of the story, Communist papers in western Europe got the first break on the story, even before the Soviet Communist paper Pravda.

Kaman Workers Get Wage Boost
Bloomfield, Dec. 6 (AP)—The Kaman Aircraft Corp. today announced a one-cent per hour cost-of-living wage increase for all its employees.

The company said the increase was granted under its policy of reviewing the cost-of-living index each quarter. The boost follows a general wage increase announced by the company last month.

The cost-of-living adjustment program went into effect in 1952. Since that time hourly wages have been adjusted upward 33 cents an hour. Thirty-two cents of that amount has been frozen into the wage schedule.

Not Candidate
Hartford, Dec. 6 (AP)—Democratic State Senator Glenn Schaffer of Woodbridge today spoke rumors that she is a candidate for the post of president pro tempore of the upper chamber.

Emphasizing that she is not a candidate for the office, Mrs. Schaffer said she plans to vote for the reelection of Senator Anthony J. Armentano of Hartford to the honorary post.

Senator Armentano's reelection as president pro tempore would put him in line for lieutenant governor after Governor Ribicoff resigns next month and Lt. Governor John N. Dempsey takes over as chief executive.

Empty Car Mangled
Waterford, Conn., Dec. 6 (AP)—An unoccupied sports car was mangled by two trains after dropping 20 feet from an overpass, early today.

The car, allegedly stolen from a crewman assigned to the Submarine Tender Fulton docked at New London, was demolished after it was struck by an eastbound passenger train, knocked over onto another track and struck again by a westbound freight about 12:50 a.m.

Parts of the car were scattered over a quarter of a mile on the tracks.

Police and firemen combed the area for several hours early this morning looking for clues indicating whether the car was occupied.

The accident caused some delay in train schedules. Slight damage was reported to the trains.

UConn Branch Endowed
Torrington, Dec. 6 (AP)—Provision for the perpetuation and maintenance of a branch of the University of Connecticut in Torrington was included in the will of Mrs. Julia Brooker Thompson, who died Dec. 1 at her home here.

The will, filed for probate today, provides that property at Litchfield and Albert Sts. be used for the university branch or that money realized in the sale of the property be used to maintain a branch elsewhere in Torrington.

Mrs. Thompson, the widow of Dr. Austin Thompson, a dentist, also left property to the city of Torrington.

Reds Call UN Council Discuss Congo Tonight

United Nations, N. Y., Dec. 6 (AP)—Soviet Delegate Valerian A. Zorin failed today in his efforts to call an emergency night session of the Security Council on the Congo. Angry Western delegates denounced the move.

Zorin, the council president, said the Congo situation is "arbitrary."

United Nations, N. Y., Dec. 6 (AP)—Soviet Delegate Valerian A. Zorin, president of the U.N. Security Council, today called an urgent night session on the Congo problem.

The request for the 8:30 p.m. session was handed to Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld late this morning by Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin.

The Russians want a full airing of the arrest and detention of deposed Congo Premier Patrice Lumumba.

Zorin, current president of the 11-nation council, also circulated a U.N. headquarters declaration demanding the immediate release of Lumumba, the disarming of the army directed by strongman Col. Joseph Mobutu and the expulsion of all Belgian civilian and military personnel in the Congo.

Guinea and the United Arab Republic became the third member of the U.N. Congo Conciliation Commission to withdraw amid growing doubt that the Asian-African group would ever get to Leopoldville.

In another development, the United Nations published two cables from Guinea's President Sekou Toure to Hammarskjöld criticizing the U.N. attitude on the arrest and detention of Lumumba.

One of the cables protested against what it called the "unpardonable indifference of the U.N. representative. The other said Guinea reserved all rights to support the Congolese people "within a purely African framework."

The Soviet declaration blamed the United States, Belgium, Britain and France for the Congo situation. It called these countries "Knights of the Money Bags."

"The plundering of the Congo riches—that is what is underlying the violence and crimes perpetrated now by the colonialists and their stooges in the Congo," the statement said.

De Gaulle Gets \$1.2 Billion for Atomic Force

Paris, Dec. 6 (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle's controversial \$1.2 billion atomic striking force bill finally was passed today by a reluctant National Assembly.

The bill became law after being twice rejected by the Senate and three times approved indirectly in the assembly because it was coupled with censure motions against the government, which failed.

This time the opposition raised 215 votes. A 277 absolute majority was needed to overthrow the government. On two previous readings the votes against the government were 207 and 214 respectively.

Under Fifth Republic procedure, if the opposition seeks to censure the government over a bill, that piece of legislation is considered adopted when the censure fails.

Chief argument against the measure was that France could not afford it without crippling commitments to the Atlantic Alliance. But De Gaulle wants his own nuclear striking force of planes and missiles for prestige and other reasons.

The bill emerges with the distinction of being the first law ever passed as a result of three negative votes.

Today's final ballot was almost an anti-climax. Many opposition deputies, who fought the striking force plan bitterly on its previous appearances before the House, gave up.

Debate lasted barely half an hour. There were only three speakers—one of them a Gaullist defending the bill. Then Premier Michel Debre briefly replied and the roll-call vote began.

Voting for the censure were mainly Socialists and Radicals, along with some Christian Democrats, some Conservatives and the Republican Unity (Algerian) party.

Autumn Trend Continues Over 5 Million Jobless Seen by Mid-January

Washington, Dec. 6 (AP)—The Labor Department said today a survey shows most employers expect a net decrease in job levels by mid-January.

The survey shows the increased unemployment in the autumn months is expected to continue on into the winter, Christmas season hiring may slow the downward trend temporarily.

Officials have indicated that the idle total for November, to be announced later this week, probably reached four million, highest figure for the month in two decades. They expect the total to climb to more than five million by January.

The survey made by the Labor Department's Employment Security Bureau is a regular one covering 150 major production and employment centers. The November figures show nine more such areas were added to the official list, those having over 6 per cent unemployment.

This showed the number of such areas to 51 as compared with a total of 32 in November 1959 and 33 in November 1958, during the recession.

The new job data are sure to receive attention from the 11-member committee, named by President-elect John F. Kennedy Sunday to map a program of aid to areas of chronic unemployment.

Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., chairman, called his group together for its first meeting today.

Colorful Clouds Due at 5:10 p.m. If Sky Is Clear

Washington, Dec. 6 (AP)—The government plans to fire rockets into the sky late today, spreading huge orange-yellow clouds which may be visible from Maine to Florida.

The tests, scheduled to begin at Wilton Island, Va., at 5:10 p.m. EST, could mean a field day for amateur photographers.

The rockets won't be fired unless the skies are clear.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration is studying wind velocity, density, and diffusion of the upper atmosphere at high altitudes.

The huge, colorful clouds will be made of sodium vapor released by the rockets.

2 QUAKES JOLT CHILE
Santiago, Chile, Dec. 6 (AP)—A series of earthquakes shook an area 500 miles long in northern Chile today but caused no damage or casualties, the Seismological Institute said. The shocks were reported from Arica near the border with Peru southward to Antofagasta, hard hit by disastrous quakes last spring. The sharpest shocks were recorded at Antofagasta, Chuquibambuta and Calama—grade 6 on a scale with a maximum of 12, the Institute said. The shocks were felt about 5 a.m.

U. S. ACCUSED IN LAOS
Vientiane, Laos, Dec. 6 (AP)—Soviet Ambassador Alexander Abramov today accused the United States of inciting a civil war in this strategic southeast Asian kingdom and interfering in its affairs. Speaking at ceremonies marking a Russian airlift of gasoline and other petroleum products to Laos, Abramov contrasted this alleged U.S. role with what he called the disinterested policy of the Soviet Union. Meanwhile, reports from the front lines indicated the army of Laos' Neutralist government has recaptured the initiative in one of the most crucial battles of the Laotian civil war.

RACKETEER IN BOXING
Washington, Dec. 6 (AP)—Bill Rosenblum, who promoted the first Floyd Patterson-Johansson heavyweight title bout, told Senate investigators today a reputed New York racketeer, "Fat Tony" Solerino, was his silent partner in the venture. Rosenblum said he had little choice between taking in Solerino or losing the right to stage the fight. He told his story as a witness before the Senate Anti-trust and Monopoly Subcommittee, in the second day of a hearing on underworld influence on professional boxing.

AGAINST ANGLO-U.S. UNION
London, Dec. 6 (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan pictured himself today as the victim of a misunderstanding and said he opposes merging of Britain with the United States in a binding union change in the House of Commons. Macmillan said such a "compact would mean leaving out not only the commonwealth but Europe as well." Macmillan found himself in hot water on this subject following an off-the-record discussion he had with a selected group of American correspondents, a couple of weeks ago.

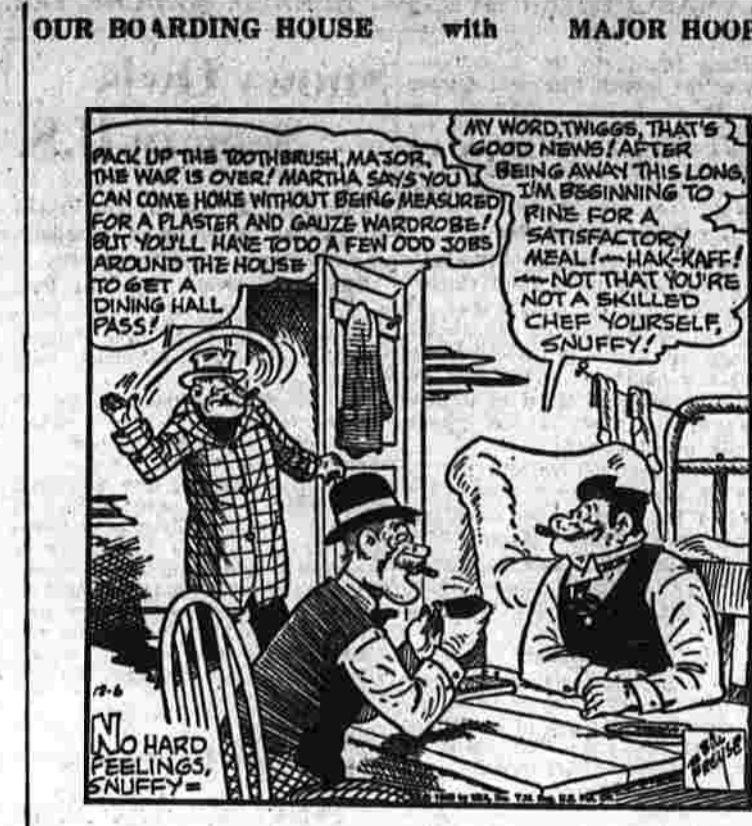

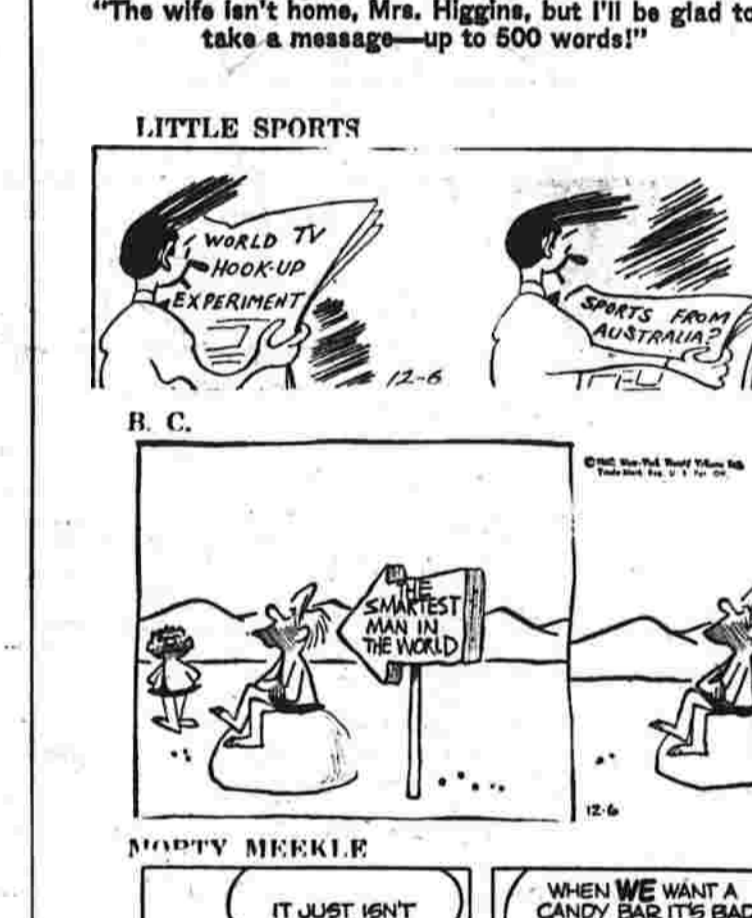

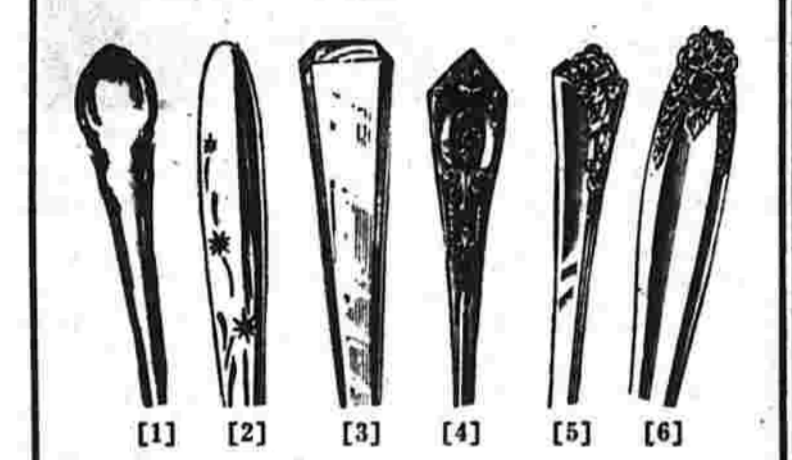

Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—President James H. Hoffa of the Teamsters Union was indicted by a federal grand jury at Orlando, Fla., today on mail fraud charges involving alleged misuse of union funds.

Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers, who announced the indictments, said it also names Henry Lower, former president of a Detroit Teamsters local, and Robert E. McCarthy Jr., one-time branch manager of the Bank of Commonwealth, Detroit.

Rogers said the indictment charges the three of using more than a half million dollars and obtaining in return the services of a Detroit attorney, today alleged misuse of union funds.

The 12-count indictment charges use of the mails to defraud on eight occasions, and the use of interstate telephone or telegraph services for the same purpose on four other occasions.

The grand jury indicted Hoffa, Lower and McCarthy on charges of using the mails to defraud on eight occasions, and the use of interstate telephone or telegraph services for the same purpose on four other occasions.

6 Killed as Train Hits Truck of Bottled Gas

Nashua, N. H., Dec. 7 (AP)—A bottled-gas truck and a Boston & Maine Railroad self-propelled Diesel passenger car collided today at a grade crossing. In the terrific collision and fire that followed six persons died—four of them an entire family.

Thirty persons were taken to hospitals. There were 50 passengers in the car.

Five of the dead were killed outright. The sixth, Vaughan Tallbot, Wilmington, Mass., conducted on the one-car train died more than four hours later in a hospital.

Engineer Rudolph Aubel, 46, Nashua, said his car was traveling at about 70 miles an hour—"our regular speed."

The crossing is used privately by a nearby industrial plant. There are no flashing signals or gates although about 15 yards from the site is a sign "Railroad Crossing." Approaching trains are under orders to sound a whistle.

Aubel said he sounded his whistle as he approached a bottled-gas train. The whistle was not heard by the car.

One of the injured was Peter Woodbury, chief judge of the United States District Court of Appeals in Boston. He was treated at a hospital for minor injuries and released soon afterward to continue on to Boston.

Reds, West in UN Row On Arrest of Lumumba

United Nations, N. Y., Dec. 7 (AP)—The Soviet Union and the Western powers today laid before the U.N. Security Council proposals dealing with the arrest and detention of Congolese Premier Patrice Lumumba and other Congolese leaders.

The two resolutions were handed in as the 11-nation council wrangled over the wording of its proposals.

The council also heard a demand by U.S. Delegate James H. Duff that the Soviet Union should be able to present before the council evidence of the charges against Lumumba and other Congolese leaders.

The Soviet Union rejected the demand. He denied that the Soviet Union had any direct connection with the arrest of Lumumba.

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Trio Lived 16 Days, Perished In Sunken Ship

New Bedford, Mass., Dec. 7 (AP)—On the 16th anniversary of Pearl Harbor, the New Bedford Standard-Times today published the report of Navy records showing there was life aboard the sunken battleship West Virginia for 16 to 17 days.

The newspaper said the information had been kept under wraps as "confidential" for more than 18 years until it was declassified for Donald R. Larrabee of the Standard-Times.

Larrabee's story quoted the report of Navy records showing that the three bodies in the report were found on Dec. 7, to Dec. 23, 1941, inclusive.

Three bodies were found on the lower shaft of the ship's stern, which was open to a fresh water pump room—presumably the battle station assigned to those men, the newspaper said.

The emergency ration at this station had been consumed and a manhole to the freshwater tank below the pump had been removed, the newspaper quoted.

There was no identification of the three bodies in the report. Two officers and 103 enlisted men lost their lives when the West Virginia was hit by two bombs and six aerial torpedoes which sent her to the bottom of the Pacific Ocean during the attack by 100 Japanese planes on Dec. 7, 1941.

Quoting from the report of salvage officers, the Standard-Times said 60 bodies were recovered from the West Virginia. These were found widely scattered throughout the ship, in most cases they were in an advanced state of decomposition, and considerably dismembered.
