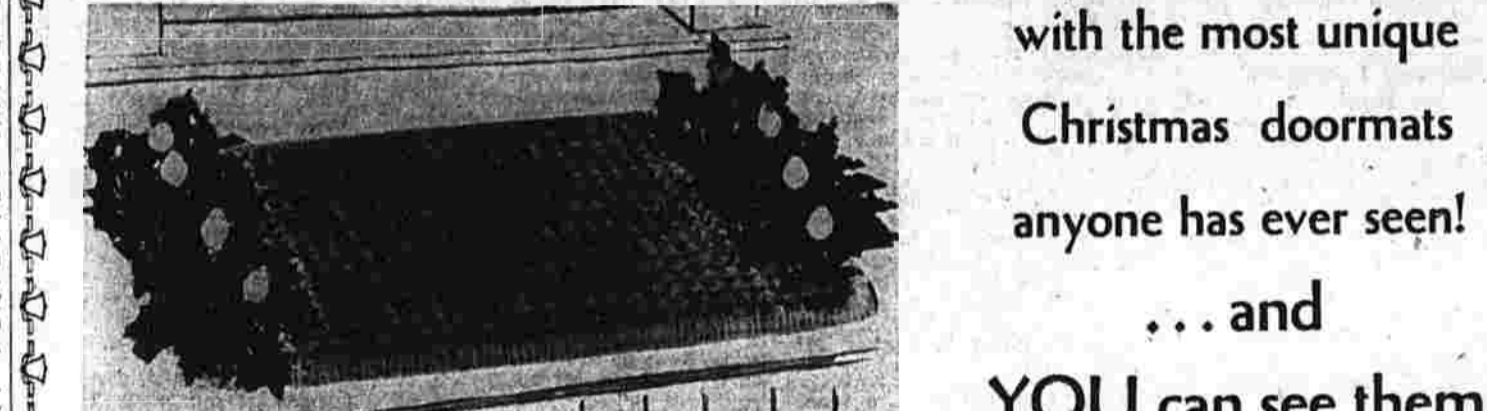

Kingdom of Bhutan Getting First Road

By HENRY BRADSHAW

Phuncholing, Bhutan (AP)—It's a 24-day mule ride from this tiny kingdom to the edge of the Indian plains to Paro, the main center of mountainous western Bhutan.

But by next May, all that goes will be an eight-hour jeep ride.

And Bhutan, after centuries of voluntary isolation in the eastern Himalayas, will never be the same once its first road is completed.

A lot of landlides, steep hills and a 120-mile road between Phuncholing and Paro before the road is finished. But the Bhutanese are determined that it will be built. India is helping.

The decision to build the road came as an abrupt about-face from Bhutan's past policy of keeping the world out and refusing to have anything better than mule trails.

In the late 1950s, Communist intrigues the British in India wanted to trade with Tibet through Paro. The Bhutanese, content to earn what little profit there was on sporadic through trade, wanted none of a British road.

Since 1947 independent India has urged Bhutan to permit roads. In February 1959, Bhutan put off another such suggestion. The next month the Chinese Communists crushed the Tibetan uprising and the Bhutanese Communist thought.

The nearest route from Paro to India had been westward across the Chumbi Valley of southern Tibet to roads in Sikkim, an Indian protectorate. The Chinese began interfering with Bhutanese government messengers. Rather than accept worthless Chinese paper money and expose her people to Communist indoctrination, Bhutan halted her Tibetan trade.

Better communications with India became a necessity, with the Druk Gyalpo (King) Jigme Dorji Wangchuk personally behind it. The 1959 National Assembly decided in October 1959 to accept Indian offers to help build a road.

The predominantly farm population hopes a road will permit economic transportation of its surplus grain to Indian markets. The few imports needed by Bhutan's primitive and almost self-sufficient economy, such as matches and soap, will cost less.

The people seem unconcerned about possible social effects of cheap transportation and imports. In fact, imported machine-made cloth might disrupt the system of home weaving that provides a living for many farm wives.

What does concern the people is providing labor for the road. Bhutan is a poor nation, and the hardships of approaching cars and trucks. There is no pool of surplus labor.

The Bhutanese do not want to import labor into their closed society. The government has overtones of the ancient system of forced labor for the government exist in the arrangement for road workers. Each family or unit of six persons is ordered to provide one worker for 25 days on the road. If no replacement is available, he keeps working another 25 days.

"How can they refuse to work?" a Bhutanese government official asked. "They are working for their own government."

The road workers live in temporary bamboo huts they build themselves. The government pays them two rupees (42 cents) a day while actually on the job and sells them food at subsidized rates.

The road is engineered and supervised by experts from India, which made a grant of 150,000,000 rupees (\$31,600,000) to Bhutan for it. The Principal Engineering Officer, Om Prakash Mathur, who has built other tough Himalayan roads, has about 40 Indians under him.

Work began Jan. 13 with about 3,000 laborers. They had built 15 1/2 miles of road by the end of May when they went home to reap their winter wheat and plant summer rice. Work will resume in October.

The road will be only 12 feet wide and graded at first. Widening and hard-surfacing will come sometime later. Two major bridges probably will be built of logs until steel ones can be erected.

The main objective now is to open up the country in a hurry. Bhutan will not be wide open, however. The king says the traditional ban on all foreigners will be relaxed only slightly even though the decline of mule travel might lure more people to this beautiful mountain land.

Hoffa, Bridges Declare War On Labor Law

Oakland, Calif., Dec. 18 (AP)—Two powerful independent labor leaders—James Hoffa of the Teamsters and Harry Bridges of the West Coast longshoremen—declared war last night on what they called government attempts to plague organized labor.

They trained their verbal guns on the Landrum-Griffin labor law and the U.S. Senate rackets committee. At a joint meeting of their unions' membership in civic auditorium.

Hoffa, who addressed the crowd and called for a "bridge" between the McClellan, Kennedy, politicians and employees. "We've got to fight."

Hoffa, who addressed the crowd of about 4,000 by telephone from Washington, D. C., declared, "We're in for the fight of our lives. If we don't progress at the bargaining table, our demands for increased share in the standard of living are not met, we'll go to court."

Hoffa, under subpoena to appear before the rackets committee in Washington, has called cancellation of tomorrow's hearing to enable him to fly here for the joint meeting. A postponement to Jan. 10 was ordered but too late for Hoffa to make the trip across the continent.

Of the rackets committee, Bridges declared, "We've gone from McClellan's guilt by association to Hoffa's accusation." He referred to the late Sen. Joseph McCarthy, R-Wis.

Bridges is head of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union.

In his words at the Landrum-Griffin law, Bridges declared: "They can't stop us from working our ships."

He continued: "The laws of this country end at the border, and if we get into trouble here and need more strength, we have a few pals overseas." He did not elaborate.

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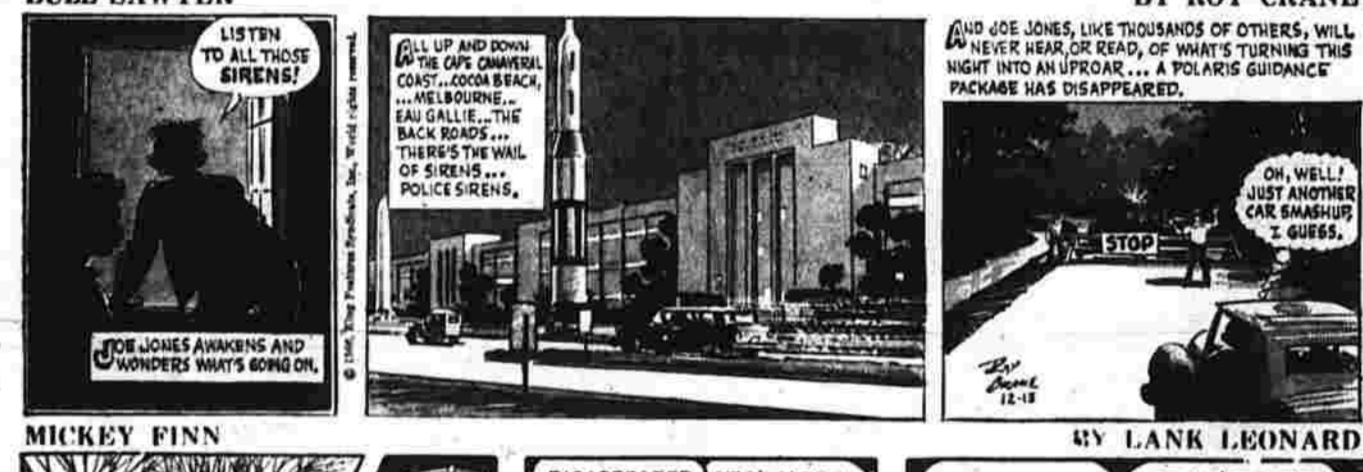

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Senate Investigators to Hear Palermo, Liston

Washington, Dec. 13 (AP)—Senate investigators called Frank (Blinky) Palermo and Sonny Liston, top contender for the heavyweight championship, for quizzing today in hearings on mobster influence on boxing.

Palermo, a Philadelphia racketeer, gets a chance to answer testimony by former light-weight champion Willie Williams that Palermo had relayed offers totaling more than \$150,000 to Williams to fight Liston.

The Senate Antitrust and Monopoly subcommittee, conducting the inquiry, has heard testimony that mobsters grab off a lion's share of Liston's earnings. The subcommittee indicated in advance its members would be on hand to grill Liston knowing anything about this.

Liston's manager, Joseph (Peep) Baron of Allentown, Pa., is expected to testify. The investigators also will hear testimony from the attorney who testified that 52 per cent of Liston's ring earnings go to New York lawyer Bernard S. Lasker, who testified to the fifth amendment plea-dealing between Lasker, Willie Williams, and Liston.

Liston launched his ring career in 1945, when he was serving a term for armed robbery. Williams, who won 23 fights when he held the 132-pound division from 1945-51, testified Palermo reported that Liston had not identified the other party to the deal. Williams said he had fought with Jimmy Carter, Kid Gavilan, Freddie Dawson and Juan Fustina.

Palermo, he said, recommended against accepting the bribe but Liston refused.
