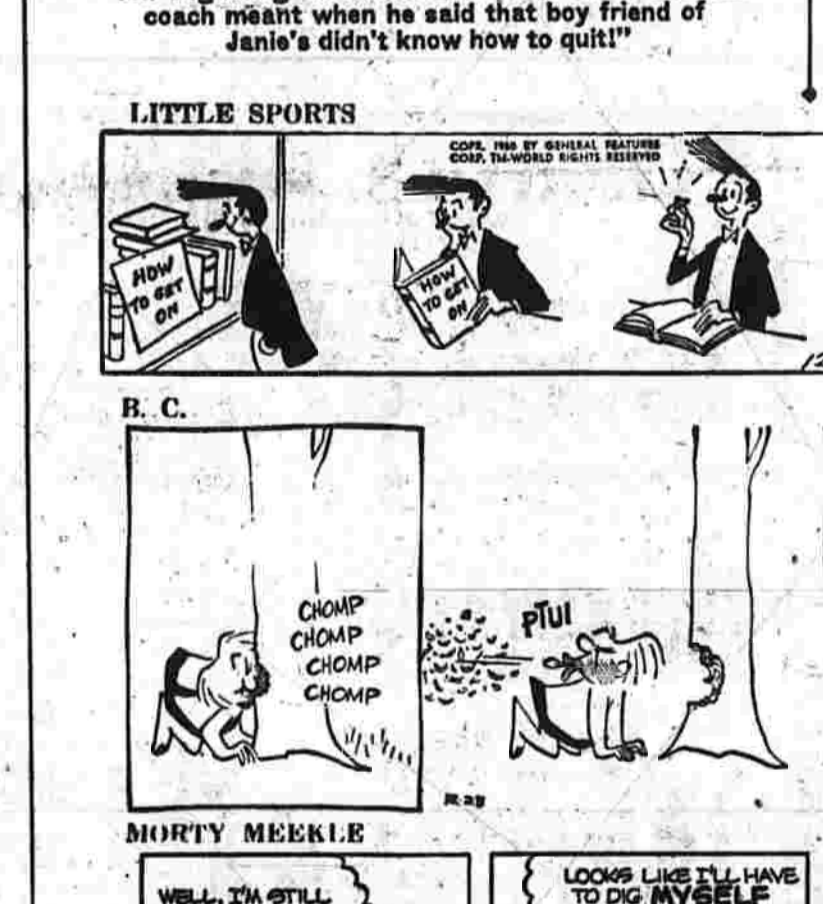
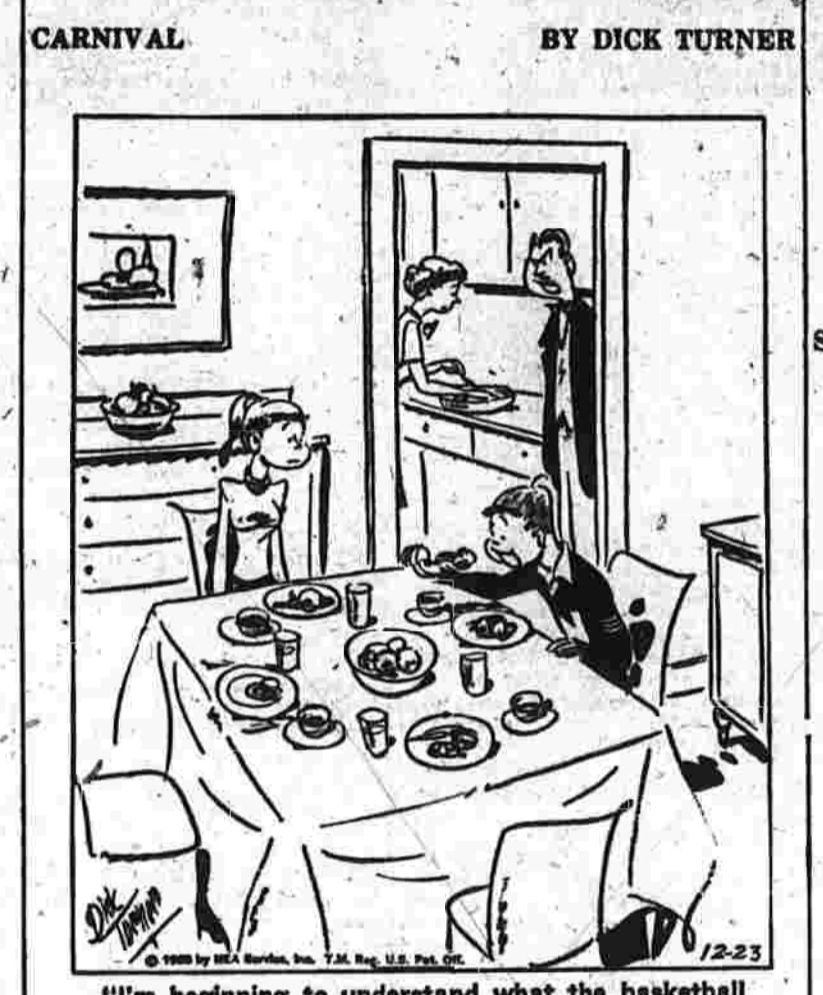

No Room in Any Inn Thousands of Pilgrims Converge on Bethlehem

Bethlehem, Dec. 24 (AP)—Pilgrims from all over the world converged today in this hallowed hillside town to celebrate Christmas where Christ was born in any inn where a number of visitors straggling into bustling Bethlehem—tourists, soldiers, shepherds, diplomats, priests, politicians and possibly a few wise men.

All came to witness the joy and pomp which mark the retelling here of the story of the Nativity. Travelers filled all the hotels in nearby Jerusalem and spread out into Ramallah and Jericho. They overtook into convents, monasteries and private homes.

The influx was quickened by the arrival of 2,000 Christian Arabs who crossed the forbidden border from Israel yesterday. Each year Israel and Jordan—though technically still at war—agree to let Israel Arabs through Jerusalem's Mandelbaum Gate to visit relatives and to worship at the holy places.

Other pilgrims came from distant places, from America to Afghanistan.

Bethlehem's friendly mayor, Ayoub Musallam, said he expected more than 10,000 here by tonight. "It should be different and even better than before," he said. "First of all we have more visitors. Second, they will be well contained and quietest."

Bethlehem itself looked not at all like the Christmas card scene of peaceful northern snow. Built on a hillside 2 1/2 miles from Jerusalem, it was primped for the celebration.

In Manager Square in front of the massive Church of the Nativity, a 30-foot-tall tree was lit up. One limb hung an orange sign proclaiming "Merry Christmas to the World."

107 ESCAPE INQUIRY

London, Dec. 24 (AP)—A Boeing 707 jet airliner carrying 107 persons spun off a runway into muddy grasslands today after touching down in London Airport from Chicago. All 93 passengers and 12 crew members escaped unhurt.

The giant plane, owned by British Overseas Airways Corp., was badly damaged.

Passengers, occupied by sliding doors, escaped by clutched on the port side. The Boeing had come from Chicago via Detroit, Montreal and Frankfurt Airport in Scotland.
