From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Every housewife looks for ways to economize on the food budget every week, but especially in this time of the year when the expense of the recent holiday season is still fresh in her mind.

Mrs. Catherine T. Daley, wife of the minister of the United Methodist Church of Bolton, has a main dish recipe which is economical, simple to prepare, tasty and attractive. Her recipe for Hamburg Pinwheels was published in the WSCS cookbook of United Methodist Church, called "Treasure of Personal Recipes". She obtained this recipe from her mother, Mrs. R. C. Burdick, Stoneham, Mass.

Hamburg Pinwheels
 1 lb. hamburger
 2 cup onions, chopped fine
 2 tablespoons green pepper
 2 cup celery, cut fine
 5 teaspoon salt, pepper
 2 teaspoon onion powder
 2 egg whites, beaten
 vegetable shortening until golden brown; add two tablespoons of butter. Mix thoroughly, then add one-half cup water, beef broth or soup. Cook until thick. Cool. Spread on biscuit dough which has been rolled thin enough to handle for rolling up. Roll up as for jelly roll, and cut one-inch thick slices. Place on a cookie sheet which has been well greased, and bake 20 minutes at 425 degrees. This can also be made with ground-up ham and served with a cheese sauce.

Mrs. Daley usually serves Hamburg Pinwheels with lima beans or corn and a tossed salad.

Radioactivity High Around Pair Killed By N-Reactor Blast

In the history of this country's atomic energy program, the blast occurred on the Atomic Energy Commission's experimental, half-million watt National Reactor Testing Station in western Idaho, about 40 miles west of this city, 34,000 AEC officials advised the public that radiation was confined to the building area and warned the public that radiation was contained in the building area and warned the public that radiation was contained in the building area.

Before the experts could find out precisely what happened, they had to find a way of plugging the holes in the reactor's heavy sheathing—leaks that permitted the deadly radiation to pour in to the building surrounding the core.

The AEC said all four victims' bodies showed the effects of severe radiation, including the fact they were killed by the blast rather than by the radiation which poured in to the building surrounding the core.

Two of the dead were Army non-commissioned officers, Sgt. James E. Byrnes, 27, and Sgt. 4 Richard L. McKinley, 22, both living in Idaho Falls with their wives. The third was Navy electrician L. C. Richard C. Legg, 26, Roscommon, Mich. Byrnes and McKinley were working on the reactor's control rods, getting ready to start up after a 10-day shutdown.

Such rods are used to control the nuclear chain reaction that takes place inside a reactor. If a reactor should get out of control—over-heat—it could generate enough heat to melt down its nuclear fuel. If some molten metal should come in contact with boiling water within the reactor, it could precipitate an explosion.

Poles Publish Paper Disputing Eichmann

By GEORGE SYVERTSEN

Warsaw, Jan. 5 (UP)—A Polish commission today made public documents contradicting a 4,001-page report that he tried to bring about an exchange of one million Hungarian Jews during World War II for 10,000 Allied army troops.

The commission investigating Nazi war crimes in Poland said the documents were captured after the war. It was believed they would be forwarded to Israel where Eichmann is awaiting trial on charges he directed the extermination of six million Jews during World War II.

Butter reportedly favored the trade of Jews for trucks, but SS Chief Heinrich Himmler opposed it. One of the published documents was identified as a telegram sent from Budapest to Berlin on Oct. 25, 1944, outlining Eichmann's plan to exchange 10,000 Jews for 100,000 trucks.

The Hungarian Jews under consideration are, without exception, biologically valuable material, many of them old Zionists' whom emigration to Palestine would be undesirable on all accounts," the message said.

"He (Eichmann) intends, in connection with the decision taken by the Führer (Hitler) and of which he has been informed to report to the reichsfuehrer (Himmler) and, if necessary, to the Fuehrer to reconsider."

Translated Hailed

The message went on to say that if Berlin would accept assumption of the transfer of Jews from Budapest to Polish death camps—half of which the negotiations were in progress—the transfers to Poland would be accelerated "as long as the formalities are worked out."

The document said that even if the trade was agreed upon, Eichmann was considering a plan to intercept yugoslavian armloads of Jewish refugees en route to Palestine. Other documents published by the commission purport to be teletypes from Eichmann to local Gestapo headquarters in specific cities ordering the execution of local Jews.

Eichmann has claimed he was in charge only of the transportation of Jews and had nothing to do with their execution. But the commission also published excerpts from the testimony of Rudolf Hoes, former commandant of the Auschwitz Camp, who was tried and executed by the Poles in 1947.

Asked about his duties at the extermination, Hoes said: "I had only Eichmann's orders. Directives concerning the extermination of Jews did not come from my orders were as follows: Basically, all who came to Eichmann's program could not be exterminated, no matter how long they stayed in the camp's inability to keep up the pace."

Gottlingen, Germany, Jan. 5 (UP)—The Cologne Tagblatt reported today that Rudolf Hoes, a Nazi camp commandant, had made three recent suicide attempts in West Berlin's Spandau War Crimes Prison, where he is serving a life sentence.

The independent newspaper said Hoes' latest attempt was a failed one and that he had been hospitalized and that in the third and most recent attempt he had succeeded in wounding himself in his chest, but was stopped by a guard.

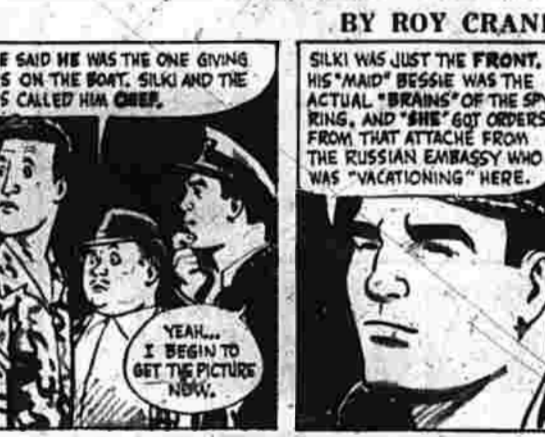

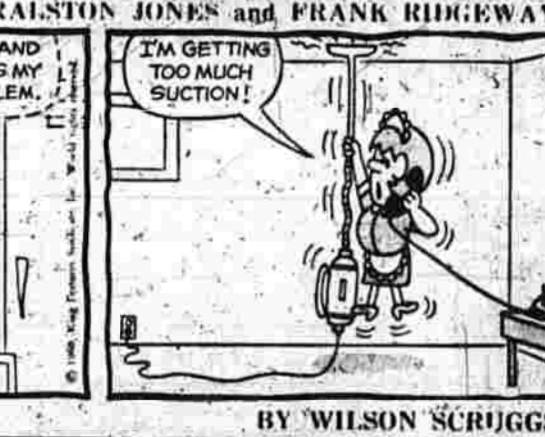

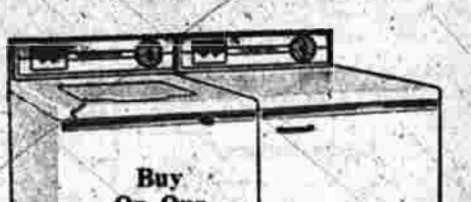
