

# New Pact Ends Tieup on Rails

New York, Jan. 23 (AP)—A 2-week-old harbor strike that had caused a paralyzing railroad tieup throughout much of the East was ended today by tentative agreement on a new work pact.

The pact, which was negotiated by Arthur J. Goldberg, president of the United Brotherhood of Carriers and Employed Employees, and the city's mayor, John Lindsay, was announced in a 14-hour session that ended with the announcement of a settlement at 6:18 a.m.

The strike of railroad tug and ferry boat workers against 11 New York City railroads had crippled the city's commuter transportation, forcing 100,000 persons to look for other means of getting to and from work.

The unions have called a ratification meeting for later in the day at the Seafarers International Union headquarters in Brooklyn. Both sides were expected to approve the pact.

The settlement was announced by Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller at his Midtown Manhattan office. Goldberg called the settlement "fair, decent and honorable."

Both Mayor Robert F. Wagner and Rockefeller, who had urged Goldberg to attend the sessions, praised the new labor accord for its contribution to the city's recovery after their long seasons of struggle.

# Court Orders Film Censored Prior to Show

Washington, Jan. 23 (AP)—The Supreme Court today upheld censorship of motion pictures before their public showing.

The court's 4-3 decision, Justice Clark delivered, was the result of an appeal by Times Film Corp. distributors of a movie called "Don Juan."

The court's decision was a surprise to many observers because the film had been shown in several theaters without incident.

In today's High Court decision, Chief Justice Warren and Justice Douglas wrote dissenting opinions.

The Saratoga was launched at the Bethlehem Steel Corp. yard in Sparrows Point, Pa., in 1955, and completed April 14, 1956.

# Kennedy Reviewing U.S. Security Plans

Washington, Jan. 23 (AP)—President Kennedy is reviewing the use of normal diplomatic channels rather than summit meetings in his handling of major foreign policy problems.

State Department press officer Lincoln White, who issued the statement, told newsmen that "in general terms" the president is emphasizing the idea of trying to solve international problems through diplomatic channels.

White did not rule out summit level and other diplomatic advances. He said that the president is reviewing the national security program.

Seeking a safeguarded peace with the Communists, Kennedy began talks with key aides at mid-morning and arranged to resume the discussions after a recess for lunch.

**Karp Blasts Treatment of Mentally Ill**

Connecticut's lack of a special facility for care and rehabilitation of the potentially dangerous mentally ill was deplored by Judge Karp, former town judge, at a recent meeting of the Manchester PTA Council at the Bowers School.

A state law passed in 1957 provided for a state security treatment center for such cases, Judge Karp said, but "not one building has yet been constructed and no land has as yet been purchased for such a building."

The PTA Council authorized its executive board to select and purchase films dealing with the problem of molestation to be shown to all Manchester school children. William Curtis, new superintendent of schools, urged that the committee select the newest editions of available films.

Three films on molestation of school children were previewed and discussed at the meeting.

They showed places and circumstances in which children may encounter dangerous strangers and they set forth simple sensible rules of safety for every school child.

Judge Karp in his address recommended strong measures of prevention and follow-through on sex offenders by local authorities. He also opposed release from prison of sex offenders for whom permanent cure cannot be guaranteed by medical authorities.

Mrs. William Malkenson, past president of the PTA Council, presented a gift from the Council to retired School Superintendent Arthur Hilling and praised his work in the Manchester school system.

Police Chief James Reardon made a plea for help from all PTA units in organizing support for two bills soon to come before the state legislature. The first would outlaw quarter-mile racing, in the state and the second would restrict 16 and 17 year old drivers to the daylight hours. He urged strong support for both proposals.

Earl Robinson, Hartford County YMCA representative, spoke about the new father-son "Y-Indian Guides" program now being organized in the greater Hartford area, and leaflets were distributed describing activities of these clubs.
