Life Prepared Boone For Role of Paladin

Richard Boone, who portrays at once the sartorially elegant gentleman and the fierce, persistent, head-riding gunfighter Paladin in the "Have Gun-Will Travel" series (Saturday evenings, 9:30-10:00 EST, CBS TV) has been most thoroughly prepared for the role.

Boone pointed out that Paladin is a complex man who gets into complex situations.

"Anyone who watches the program must know that it demands a wide range of acting ability—comedy, pathos, tragedy—just about everything that can be asked of an actor. It's a demanding role,

one that keeps my acting equipment from getting rusty."

With a lofty disdain like that of Paladin for a bartender who would water his imported champagne, Richard Boone scorns those who think an actor doesn't have to act when he plays in a western. Boone has the credentials for expounding the subject. In addition to starring as Paladin in "Have Gun-Will Travel" which, incidentally, is in its fourth season, Boone has appeared in such demanding starring roles as those offered by "Playhouse 90," "The U.S. Steel Hour" and Broadway, where he played Abraham Lincoln in "The Rivalry". Recently, he was host with his son, Peter, on a special television showing of "The Wizard of Oz."

"Of course you have to act if you're in a western," Boone says, "if you're an actor. If you're an opportunist, you might be able to get by for a while, but not for long."

"I put into my work on 'Have Gun-Will Travel' as much integrity, and I meet the demands made on me on the same level, as I do on Broadway. No matter what medium an actor is working in, he has a responsibility. If he accepts a job, he must do the best he can in that job."

Before "Paladin," Richard Boone's real life experiences ran the gamut from roughneck in an oil field to a clerk in an office. He was at one time an unsuccessful painter as he was in his attempts as a writer. He held the amateur light-heavyweight championship at college and was a part-time bartender.

At the time he was unsuccessfully attempting to try his hand at art for a living, World War II started. Boone immediately enlisted in the Navy. He spent four years in the Pacific as an aviation ordnance man, acting as aerial gunner in a torpedo squadron. He considers himself lucky to be alive after being torpedoed on the carrier Intrepid, bombed on the Enterprise, and kamikazed on the Hancock.

Happily married now, he wasn't so lucky on two previous attempts. Boone described his first marriage to Jane Hopper, a painter, in 1967 as "a three-year pitched battle up and down the Pacific Coast." His second marriage lasted only one year. The present Mrs. Boone is the former Claire McAloon. Fortunately, Claire has exerted a calming influence on his rebellious nature.

"I must say, except for small problems that arise, we have never fought in the home as I did in my previous marriages," Boone smiled. "But I must admit that this fighting nature of mine still crops up outside the house occasionally."

"There's no question that my real life experiences helped me immeasurably in portraying Paladin," Boone says. "How else would I ever be able to take the punishment I do in almost every episode. When you see me wallowing in the mud wrestling with some desperado, dirtied from head to toe, it's really me. At the same time, my portrayal would certainly be affected when I dress in the high fashions of the 1870s, the Prince Alberts with ruffled cuffs and frilly shirts, if I wasn't always personally interested in dressing properly at all times."

"Such outfits may not be regarded as wholly masculine by modern standards," Boone admits, "but I'm sure that they provided the man who wore them with a psychological lift."

If the man of today seems to prefer a less elegant wardrobe, the reasons may well include considerations of finance, as well as taste.

"The average cost of those gaudy models I wear in 'Have Gun-Will Travel' is about \$1,000 an outfit, mainly because of the tailoring detail that goes into each one," Boone points out.

Walter Brennan

Work Is His Life

Hollywood—(NEA)—The "tension" of doing nothing—that's what keeps Walter Brennan going.

An alarm clock set for 6:30 a.m. every weekday for the last three and a half years seldom catches

Grandpa McCoy asleep. He's awake by 6:15 and breakfast at 7. At 7:45, he picks up a metal lunch box in the kitchen and goes out the back door to a driveway where his station wagon and chauffeur are waiting for him.

He settles down in the back seat and opens his script to learn his day's lines during the 45-minute drive to the studio. The wagon stops in front of Stage 15 and Grandpa goes through the door, saying: "Mornin'" to the assembling cast and crew.

He changes expensive tweed for overalls in his dressing room and then pours himself a cup of coffee from a big milk can. There's a sign over it reading:

"It Is Nice to Be Important but More Important to Be Nice."

Walter Brennan installed the sign himself.

He walks across the big stage to the set to rehearse the day's first scene. Along the way he starts limping the way Grandpa does and with the "character" limp comes Grandpa's high voice—several levels above his own.

Within a few minutes after his arrival, the camera starts rolling. "The Real McCoy's" is in its fourth year on television and in the first-10 most popular shows.

"He's as strong as a bull," a member of the production staff says about Brennan, the three-time Oscar winner who will be 67 next July.

At 67, Brennan could be taking life easy. He has 12 grandchildren. He owns a 12,000-acre ranch in Oregon where he breeds fancy white face cattle. "His blessings," as he calls them, include all the money he'll ever need and a good wife to whom he has been married for 40 years.

He says, "I'm a lucky guy."

But when members of his family talk about Brennan retiring he's like a bull, too; stubborn.

Five years ago he went 10 weeks without working.

"And it almost killed me," he says.

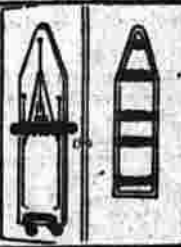
