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Arrests Low In January

For the Manchester Police Department, the month of January was one that was characterized with an all time low in arrests and an all time high in accidents.

On the other side of the ledger, there were only 25 arrests.

This was by far the lowest number of arrests in any one month in the department's history.

Of the total, 26 were arrested for non-motor vehicle offenses.

While 19 were arrested for motor vehicle offenses.

The previous low arrests for January were 28 in November 1959.

December 1960 ranks second lowest in motor vehicle arrests.

The largest number of non-motor vehicle arrests during January were for driving while intoxicated.

Charges were filed against 10 drivers.

Total complaints for the month dropped from 355 during December to 237 last month.

In December, 48 persons were arrested on non-motor vehicle charges.

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Time Extended On Negotiating Airlines Strike

Washington, Feb. 22 (AP)—Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg today told a 2-hour extension of time for an attempt to negotiate settlement of the flight engineers strike.

The agreement on more for flight engineers was announced by White House press secretary Pierre Salinger a few minutes before a previously agreed deadline.

All the airlines except Western, a Pacific Coast operator, had agreed to temporary settlement terms.

Western, however, had announced discharge of its 150 striking flight engineers and plans to rehire them with pilots.

Salinger said it was his understanding that the strike could be settled by the end of the week.

prisoners had been shipped from Leopoldville, Kasavubu's strong hold, to Albert Kalonji's mining state in South Kasai's Territory. The Indian politician said the new Congo Prime Minister Nehru told him that he would like to see the Indian troops to the Congo. But he would like to see further discussion of the U.N. Congo policy before committing India to supply troops.
Deputy Foreign Minister Lakshmi Sen said the Indian government had been asked to send a battalion of Indian combat troops. India replied that it would send a contingent of 1000 men. Sen said the U.N. Congo committee had decided on an effective action for the charter of six points to carry men and supplies for its force in the Congo.
The contract was canceled, the U.N. said, because another of the company's aircraft had been shot down. The U.N. said this was "military assistance or potential military assistance not sanctioned by or channeled through the United Nations."
News dispatches said the airline carried a French Foreign Minister's aide to the Katanga capital, Elisabethville, Thursday. The French delegation at the U.N. said there were reports that three such airplanes had been shot down in the Congo and denied France had authorized their export.
U.S. Chief Delegate Adlai E. Stevenson said the United States was investigating the involvement of the American-operated airline and had in mind "taking whatever legal action may be called for against those responsible." The airline has American executives, a spokesman said.

Sheinwold on Bridge

THIRDS RIFEN WITH RISK
By Alfred Sheinwold
It's important to grab a certain kind of trick before the mace gets at it. Trummy tricks are not, however, in this class. If you don't take them early, you get them later. And, like chess, a trump trick may ripen if you give it time.
West opens the jack of hearts and the defenders continue the suit for three rounds. South must lead the third heart with the jack of spades to have any chance at all for his contract.
You can see what happens if West is afraid of the mace. He leads the jack of hearts. This over-ruff costs West one trick — the setting trick.
No matter what West leads back, South can get to dummy for the jack of hearts and draw the two remaining trumps with the ace. He then claims the rest of the tricks, nodding gratefully at West.
Promotion
Now see what happens if West refuses to over-ruff at the third trick. After the jack of spades has been played, West's nine is promoted in rank. Instead of being the sixth highest trump it is the fifth highest. This is an important promotion.
South wins the third trick with the jack of spades and gets to dummy to try a trump finesse. No matter how he plays the trumps he must lose one trick to the queen and another to the king.
Even if South plays the trumps by leading out the ace and the seven from his own hand, he must still lose two trump tricks. Losing two hearts and two spades, South is done.
The moral is clear: Don't be in a hurry to over-ruff when you have a sure trump trick in any case. Discard instead, and perhaps you can score two tricks.

ing birth-control information and materials.
Both these questions are thorny. Pending before the U. S. Supreme Court is a case challenging the 1960-61 Connecticut law forbidding prescription and use of birth-control devices. About 30 states have kindred restrictions.
The question of whether this country should give birth-control aid to overpopulated lands first arose in late 1959. Former President Eisenhower indicated it was a problem for private agencies. But the council statement maintains the job is too big for them.
It notes that inter-church friction is not over birth control but over the manner used to achieve it, and adds that most Protestants approved both contraception and periodic self-restraint. Protestants believe, the statement continues, "that couples are free to use the gifts of science for conscientious family limitation... the general Protestant conviction is that motives, rather than methods, form the primary moral basis... The subject has stirred wide spread, often bitter, conflicts between Protestants and Roman Catholics."
The Catholic Church sanctions only the so-called rhythm method — avoiding intercourse during a woman's fertile period.
And that is condoned only for grave reasons, such as economic or health factors.
The National Council of Churches includes representatives of most major Protestant and Orthodox denominations — 24 of them with 40 million members.
In advance of the council's action, Orthodox churches held to their traditional view that marital abstinence is the only proper means for family limitation.
On another front, the council last night called for federal aid to public schools, but opposed such aid for parochial and other private schools. It also urged medical care for the aged through the Social Security System. Both moves parallel programs of President Kennedy's administration, with congressional acclaim now going on over them.
In contrast to the Catholic emphasis on the procreative purpose of marriage, the council statement

Thrall Asks For \$345,762

The Water Department is requesting \$1,800 less for 1961-62 than the \$345,762 it received for the current year.
One reason for the drop to \$343,962 is a drop of \$18,500 in the capital improvements allocation. Another reason is a \$1,049 drop in debt payments from \$94,460 this year of \$92,701 next year.
Capital improvements projects have been partially deleted from the budget request, said P. F. DeWitt, superintendent of the water and sewer department, because they will be listed separately at the direction of General Manager Richard Martin.
A program of water main construction submitted to the general manager amounts to \$50,000, said Thrall.
The water department has been paying off a debt of \$72,000 a year, plus interest which decreases each year. The debt is to be paid in 1963, said Thrall.
Part of the debt is for bonds issued in 1953, and renewal of some of them in 1964, to purchase the water utility from the South Manchester Water Co. for \$1 million.
The rest of the debt is payment on bonds issued for the purchase of Glove Hill reservoir.

Chairman Ted Cummings announced the executive committee would be made up of the officers of the town committee, the five district chairmen, and the chairmen of five standing committees.
In preparation for the district elective office in the town were also members of the committee. Cummings told the committee he was dropping the names of three town directors, whom he called executive members of the executive committee.
The chairman of the standing committee is Edward Tomiak, ways and means, Fred Maselli, Katherine Bours, publicity, Atty. Julia Karp, rules, Miss Barbara Coleman, secretary, and Charles F. Pomeroy, finance.
The idea of adding the district chairmen to analyze themselves was suggested by Steve Cavagnaro during a discussion on why the group was not attracting more young people to the committee.
Atty. Alan Thomas said the group was failing to attract talent. Cummings said the group had nothing to offer other than social activities.
Miss Barbara Coleman, secretary of the committee, said the graduates were let down by the group of government and politics after the stimulation of theories in college.
Atty. Irvin Aronson, former representative from Manchester to the state legislature, suggested having the Young Democrats study proposed legislation such as that for restricting the state seal and that for creating a Junior College.
Thomas agreed with the idea, as did several other members of the committee.

Town Director Francis Mahoney suggested the Young Democrats help in canvassing voters by district.
Chairman Cummings said he will meet with officers of the Young Democratic Club and ask them their ideas on the subject.

Byrd Sparks New Fight On Kennedy School Bill

Byrd's colleague, Sen. A. Willis Robertson, D-Va., told the Senate yesterday that Kennedy's proposals have raised the issue of government help to church schools.

Robertson said that Kennedy's exclusion of parochial elementary and secondary schools will be contrasted with the lack of any such limitation on college dormitory loan funds. He said the doctrine of separation of church and state is bound to be debated. Byrd, he said:

"The most practical way Congress can help education would be to reduce federal spending and cut taxes so local communities would have more money to spend on their school systems."

The children's aid program may be terminated in the process. The original version was to cost \$200 million. Members of the committee said they expect to send a bill to the House floor for action early next week.

Another measure high on President Kennedy's priority list, raising the minimum wage, faced delay in the Senate.

Republican opponents have listed 35 witnesses for hearings on the bill. Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said the GOP witnesses should be cut from 25 to 3 in view of "very extensive hearings already held on this subject."

The committee vote on the \$200 million measure was expected yesterday, but final action was put off while a new version of the bill was drafted.

The committee wanted a single bill to combine the extension of unemployment insurance benefits with the extension of welfare aid to children of unemployed parents.

The Federation's Economic Policy Committee, headed by Auto Workers Union President Walter Reuther, issued a study yesterday saying that President Kennedy's recovery program, even when put into effect, won't stop rising unemployment.

The study said that if Kennedy would adopt an AFL-CIO suggestion for a quick, temporary \$0 billion income tax cut along with the other proposals, the way could be clear for resumption of full employment.

The effect of many Kennedy programs would not be felt until 1962, it was pointed out. Therefore, the study said, if \$10 per week in workers' withholding taxes were forgiven for a 30 weeks period, the resulting \$100 extra spending power for each taxpayer could provide immediate stimulus.

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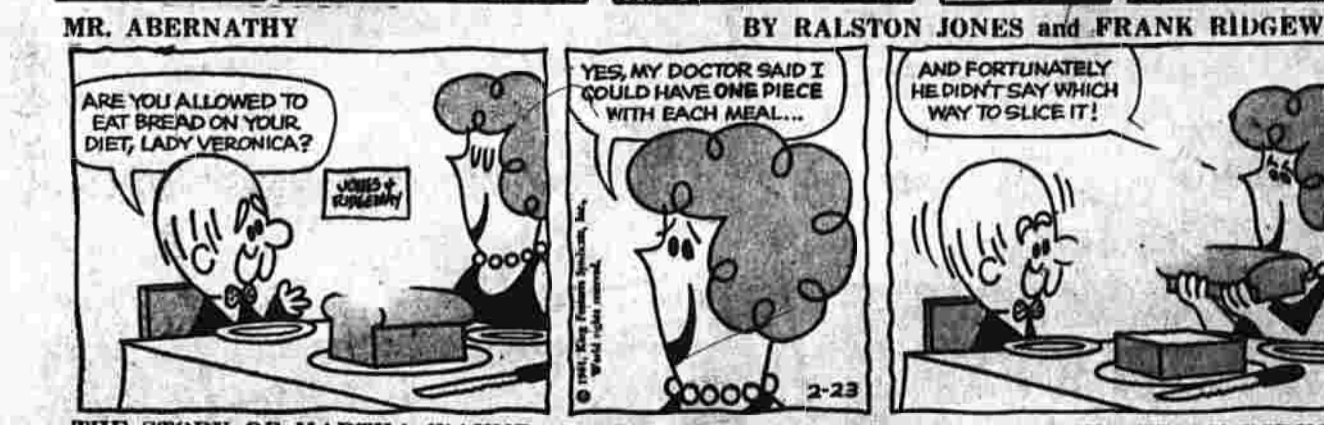
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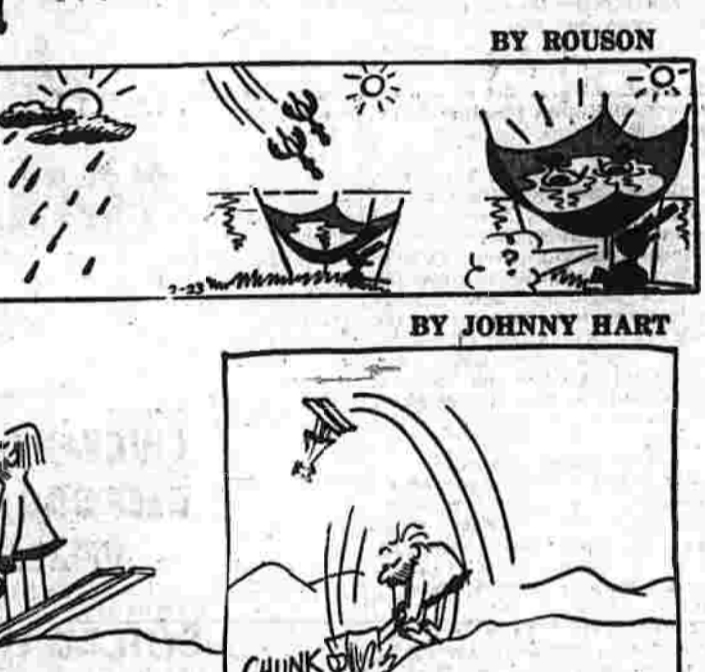
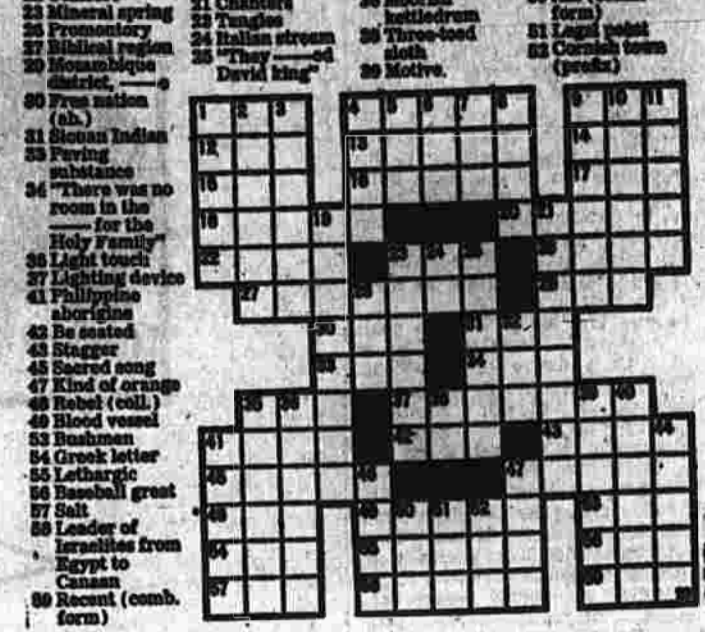
