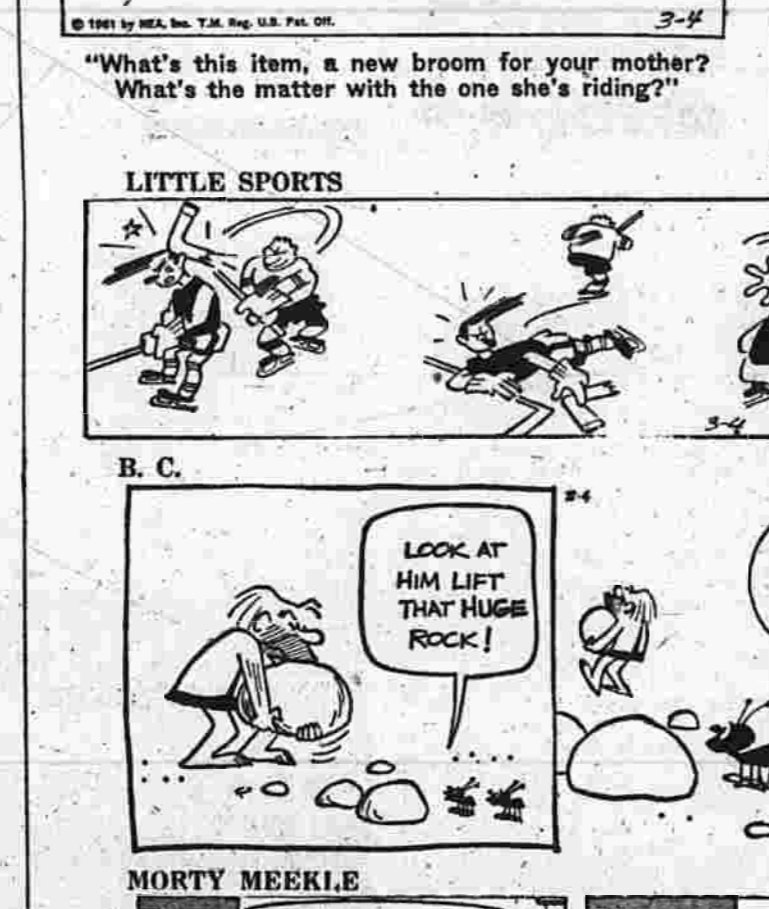
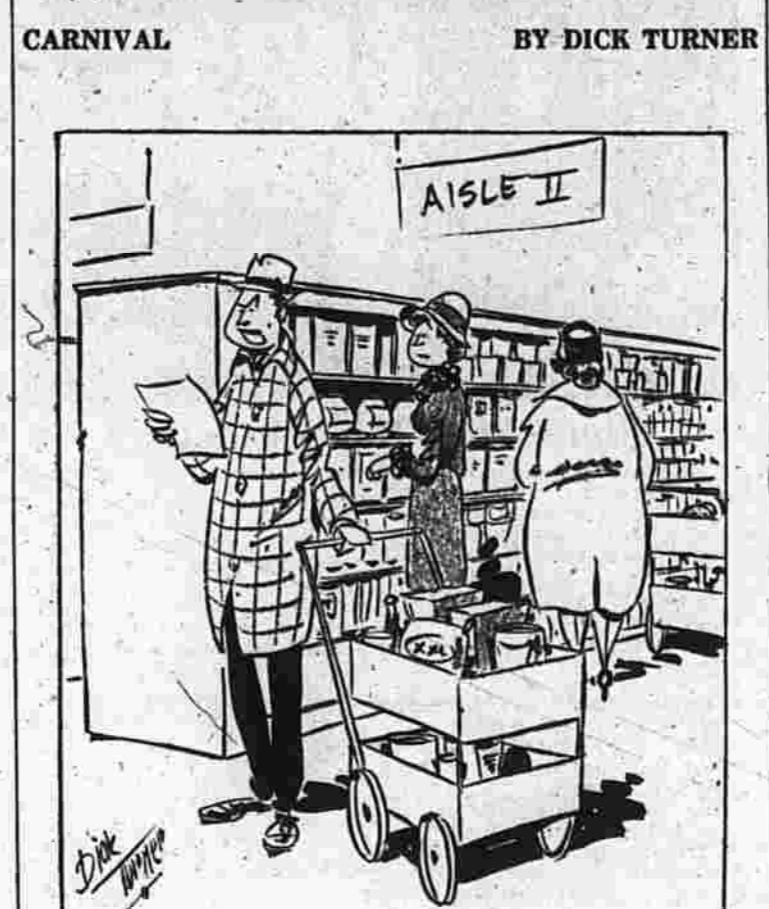

It is a streamlined version of William Inge's successful Broadway play right the moment the curtain goes up to display a most effective set and to introduce very credible sound effects, gathering momentum as each member steps aboard.

There are three important passengers in this vehicle, each a distinct personality and each ably played by LTM members. Jean Adams as Cherie the Chanteuse lapsing into swiftness and light. There are few moments when her effervescent bubbles over and her speech becomes indistinct.

# Imagination Is Key To Serling Series

During the summer of 1959 most television viewers were looking for a change in television fare. The era of "Westerns" seemed doomed. How wrong they were we know too well! Yet, it was during this period that network executives, producers, writers and agents were burning the midnight oil. In their frantic attempt to get on the bandwagon of what would be the new craze, a certain amount of desperation was in evidence. Would the trend be family comedy, situation comedy or fantasy?

The recent success of a new young writer, Rod Serling, made him a good bet for consideration. Serling, who already held Emmy awards for his memorable teleplays, "Patterns," "Requiem For A Heavyweight" and "The Comedian," convinced the network VIPs that the television viewer was fed up with dusty cowboys and the quick draw. Rod Serling promised to take viewers "on an excursion into a wondrous land of fantasy and fiction."

Although the winning of three Emmys was a feather in his cap, it was still slim foundation for the green light by television executives for a network series show. Except for the Emmys and a second prize award on the annual "Dr. Chris-

tian" competition, Serling had very little more to offer than a file full of rejected scripts, burning ambition and belief in himself.

But there were some desperate days in the network conference rooms. Imaginative steps had to be taken, and Rod Serling's "Journeys into Imagination" seemed to fit the bill.

"It was the big break I was looking for. I had no doubts that I had to deliver the goods to stay, but believe me, I had no doubt I could do it." Rod reminisced as he sat exalted in his high back office chair. "The only boundaries would be the limits of imagination, and believe me, I had to have plenty of imagination to have gotten this far," the new successful author-producer continued.

The Syracuse-born Army paratrooper had written 40 scripts before his first sale.

"Those were frustrating years, he now comments, "and there were times when I was ready to throw in the typewriter. But I kept

Imagination (Continued from Page One) at it until I finally came up with two scripts that were bought by the old "Grand Central Station" show on the CBS Radio Network. Soon after making these sales, he took a job as a staff writer at a Cincinnati radio station, while continuing to write on a free lance basis. The breakthrough finally came in 1951 when he sold a script to a major television series. He quickly wrote, and sold, ten more scripts to the same program. Serling estimates that to date he has written more than 200 television scripts. If there is any one single script that can be considered the major turning point in Serling's writing career, it would have to be "Patrons" in 1955. It brought him his first Emmy, the Sylvania Award and the Christopher Award. Other Serling teleplays were: "A Town Has Turned to Dust," "The Dark Side of the Earth," "Panic Button," "Bomber's Moon," "The Velvet Alley," "The Rank and File" and "In the Presence of Mine Enemies," all presented on Playhouse 90. For writing "Requiem for a Heavyweight," Serling not only won an Emmy, but also received the first George Foster Peabody Award ever bestowed on a writer in the history of the award. His faith in "The Twilight Zone" paid off with a fourth Emmy for the writing of various episodes in the series after its first season on television. To illustrate the imaginative depths of Serling's stories, one took place in a western frontier town in the 19th century and dealt with a magic potion; another took place on an asteroid where a man was condemned to a lifetime of solitary confinement; one was about a man making a trip back in time and meeting himself on a carousel on a summer night and still another, depicted the fate of a man with a phobia about dying who meets the devil. Serling is a compact, dark, articulate man. He looks and acts like an athlete, although his recreational activities are usually limited to a dip in the swimming pool of his rambling home in Pacific Palisades, Calif. The Serlings have two daughters: Jody, 9 and Nan, 6.
