7th Polaris Sub to Join Fleet Today

Portsmouth, N. H., March 11 (AP)—The Navy today prepared to commission a \$200 million Polaris missile submarine—one of the most powerful fighting machines ever built—as a pacifist group threatened to board her in a campaign for total disarmament.

This afternoon's colorful and traditional ceremonies, turning the U.S.S. Abraham Lincoln over to her crew, were limited to 2,000 select spectators at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

Even though the general public was not admitted to the base, Navy and civilian police kept a close watch on municipally owned Pierce Island, just across the water from the berth where the Lincoln was tied up. Pacifist groups in recent months have tried boarding expeditions from canoes and rowboats in other places.

The New England Committee for Non-Violent Action, a pacifist organization, told officials it planned acts of "civil disobedience," including an attempted boarding of the intermediate missile-firing undersea craft.

The committee also announced its intention to begin, immediately after the commissioning, a 340-mile, 3-week "walk for peace" from Portsmouth to United Nations headquarters in New York.

One source of possible friction was apparently eliminated yesterday when a church youth group from nearby Somersworth canceled plans to picket the pacifist. A spokesman said they acted on police advice.

Spokesman for CNVA said the group planned to hold a public rally to "help dispel public apathy about the arms race" and "mobilize our plea that any and all nations should initiate disarmament immediately."

Mayor Patrick J. Greene of neighboring Dover, where some pacifists congregated two weeks ago, said they are part of a movement that "slowly but surely cuts the jugular vein maintaining the American way of life."

Congo Leaders Fail to Agree On Federation

Tananarive, Malagasy Republic, March 11 (AP)—Congolese political leaders meeting here have been unable to agree on the makeup of states within a new Congo format, sources said today.

Rather than let the conference bog down on these details, the delegates agreed to bring the question to the next round of talks coming up soon in Elisabethville, capital of Katanga.

The present talks, aimed at settling the Congo's political embroilments, were likely to end today. Presidents Moise Tshombe of Katanga Province and Albert Kalonji of the mining state in South Kasai Province told reporters they plan to fly back to Elisabethville tomorrow.

Antoine Gizenga, head of the Stanleyville leftist regime supported by the Soviet bloc and some African neutrals, is the only top Congo leader missing from the roundtable conference.

According to a spokesman, Tshombe has emerged as the dominant force in the conference. He was to propose today that the Congo be called in future "The Community of the Associated States of the Congo" or "The Confederation of States of the Congo" with Joseph Kasavubu of the Leopoldville government as president.

Katanga delegates said the others were waiting for Tshombe's cue on this matter and are certain to accept his proposals.

The sixth session of the conference opened in the Madagascar presidential palace under Kasavubu's chairmanship today. Delegates discussed the states' issue until late last night.

Delegates explained they want to decide on a new legal name for the Congo so that the constituent states could press for recognition by the rest of the world.

Jacksonville, Fla., March 11 (AP)—The prospect of milder winds will lighten the chore of search parties today as they probe the waters of a north Florida lake for five Navy aircraft still missing in the crash of their patrol bomber.

Divers recovered the bodies of three of the eight crewmen yesterday. Their F2V Neptune bomber was in formation on a practice bombing run on Lake George, 75 miles south of Jacksonville, when it plunged into the water Thursday night.

Death Sentence Denied Castro Court Holds Verdict on Morgan

Havana, March 11 (AP)—Military authorities said today no verdict has been reached in the military trial of American adventurer William A. Morgan and 13 others accused of conspiring against the Castro government. A military tribunal was reported last night to have sentenced him to death.

But defense attorney Jorge Luis Carro said this morning he had been advised the tribunal had not yet returned its verdict in the trial, which ended yesterday. Carro announced last night Morgan and his aide, Maj. Jesus Carreras, had been sentenced to be shot and the same information appeared in all government papers this morning.

Nevertheless, military authorities said no decision had been reached but that one might be announced later today.

The earlier accounts said Morgan, a 31-year-old soldier of fortune, had been convicted of treason. These accounts continued:

Morgan's Cuban defense lawyer said he "hopes" he is not lost and that he expects "good results." But military appeal courts rarely overrule sen-

Not Candidate, Bars Draft

Nixon Closes Door On California Race

Sacramento, Calif., March 11 (AP)—Richard M. Nixon said last night he will not run for the job of governor of California next year.

He urged California Republicans today to launch a talent search for new faces in the 1962 election campaign.

"I am confident that we can win a sweeping victory in California," he told the Republican State Central Committee.

"But I have a word of warning. We cannot win by assuming that the present governor will inevitably fall on his face and be a push-over."

The governor of California is Edmund G. Brown, a Democrat.

The former vice president, in his first political speech since he lost the presidential election last November, outlined a program of action designed to restore the one-dominant GOP to power in the state.

Nixon offered to provide leadership to his home state party. But he did so only at the risk of his own possible candidacy for governor.

He authorized a group of legislators to confer with him last night to quote him as saying: "I am not a candidate. I have no intention to be a candidate or to run for a draft."

Assemblyman Joseph C. Shell, R-Los Angeles, said, however, Nixon can't be counted out entirely. It may be, Shell said, that the party won't be able to come up with anyone else strong enough to win.

Nixon, in prepared excerpts of his speech, said a Los Angeles law firm will announce his affiliation on Monday. He declined to identify the firm until then.

On Republican prospects ahead, Nixon said the key to victory in 1964 lies in the elections of 1962.

New Haven, March 11 (AP)—The program for the Yale University Theater production of "The Rivals" lists Crispin Maguire as the actor portraying blutery old Sir Anthony Absolute.

When the curtain falls on tonight's final performance of Sheridan's comedy, Crispin Maguire can resume his real identity—the Rev. Vincent Maguire, 33, a Franciscan priest.

Father Maguire, a member of the Order of Friars Minor is a student at the Yale Drama School, seeking his doctorate before resuming a teaching career at St. Bonaventure University.

"The theater is always trying to state something for universal man," he said. "It is a recreation of controlled events which man can watch, and laugh at himself, and know himself."

UAC Notes 50% Cut in Net Income

East Hartford, March 11 (AP)—A sharp decrease in net income—more than 50 percent—is reported by United Aircraft Corp. for 1960.

The company's annual report yesterday said the 1960 net income was \$13,886,996 as compared with \$28,638,353 the previous year. The 1960 income was equivalent to \$1.95 a share of common stock outstanding, down from \$4.25 a share in 1959. Sales also decreased in 1960 to \$987,879,119 from \$1,080,980,785 in 1959.

The report said research and development programs were primarily responsible for the net income decrease.

'New Norwalk'

Norwalk, March 11 (AP)—Local and federal officials will turn out Monday to watch a wrecking ball signal the start of the "New Norwalk" by tearing down of some of the old.

With the start of clearance work on the city's Wall-Main renewal project, Norwalk will at last have something to show for an urban renewal program that has long been bogged in the usual mire of paperwork, mostly federal.

Three different parties have been in power since the city decided on a partial face-lifting several years ago. Redevelopment has been a major issue in elections for several years, with the "ins" saying reasonable progress was being made and the "outs" charging that the program was going nowhere.

One impatient land owner scrawled the inscription "Redevelopment—Born Oct. 1955, died Oct. 1955" on the wall of a building in the Wall-Main project area.

It is expected to vanish before the wrecking ball in the near future.

Members of the Norwalk Redevelopment Agency are confident that the last year will be in demand. The agency has received inquiries from several developers, including a standing offer from one to take over the whole project.

New Firm in Danbury

Danbury, March 11 (AP)—Diograph Products, Inc., manufacturer of acousticon hearing aids and other electronic and electrical devices, will move its main plant and national headquarters to Danbury from Jamaica, L. I.

The 59-year-old electronics firm will make its new home on Shelton Rock Lane in a modern 500,000-square foot plant erected six years ago by Manning, Maxwell and Moore, Inc.

In order to make the move, Diograph is acquiring all the outstanding stock of Evom Electronics, Inc., which bought the former MAM plant in November for \$425,000.

Walter J. Carlson, Diograph president, said the company is starting initial operations immediately and plans to employ 350 eventually.

In addition to the Acousticon hearing aids, diograph manufactures internal communications equipment, fire alarm systems for home and industry and electronic and electrical equipment for the government.

The Danbury site will serve as the hub operation for other diograph plants in Providence, R. I., Red Bank, N. J., Toronto, Canada, and Crawley, Sussex, England, as well as headquarters for its hearing aid service and repair centers in major cities throughout the United States.

Reds Sentence 3 to Death for Mass Slayings

Tallin, Estonia, March 11 (AP)—A Soviet court sentenced three wartime police officials to death today for the mass murders of thousands of Jews, gypsies and Soviet citizens during World War II.

"The sentence may not be appealed," Judge Robert Simson declared after reading the sentence. Two of the condemned men, Ralf Gerretz, 55, and Jan Vijk, 44, were present at the trial. The third, Ain Ervin Mere, 57, now lives in England and was tried in absentia by the Soviet government, which has ruled Estonia since the war.

The court at the end of a 6-day trial found all three guilty of shooting to death many thousand prisoners and concentration camp victims during 1942, 1943 and 1944.

There were 37 concentration camps in Estonia, and the Soviet police authorities say at least 125,000 persons were killed in them. The court said all three had

Canvas Bag in the Street Jobless Father Returns \$240,000 in Cold Cash

Los Angeles, March 11 (AP)—A canvas bag containing \$240,000 in cold, beautiful cash fell out of a Brink's, Inc. armored truck into a street. A father out hunting a job found it and called the FBI.

"I thought if I kept that money I'd never be able to look my three kids in the face again," said Douglas Johnson, 50, a janitor.

When he works, which has been about half the time in the last six months, the neatly dressed, 50-year-old Negro maintenance man washes windows and hauls away rubbish. He averages, when working, about \$100 a week.

Yesterday, with his wife, Helen, 38, he drove to an apartment in the city when Johnson telephoned the FBI.

"I've got something here you folks might be looking for," Mrs. Johnson told a reporter what had happened.

"We saw this bag laying in the street. My husband picked it up and threw it in the back of our station wagon. We drove about a block.

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Show New Strength, Threaten Peace Plan

Vientiane, Laos, March 11 (AP)—Leftist Pathet Lao forces, showing a new strength that threatens peace plans, sent government troops fleeing in two directions today from a showdown battle for the Sala Phou Kou road junction.

The rebel assaults drove government defenders eight miles north to the high ground of neighboring Sala Phou Keng. Other royal troops abandoned the strategic road completely near Muong Kassy, 22 miles south.

The junction controls the north-south highway in central Laos and lies less than 100 miles north of Vientiane and only 40 miles south of the royal seat of Luang Prabang.

The Pathet Lao guerrilla action apparently stalls the government's intended invasion drive into the Plaine des Jarres, the rebel stronghold lying eastward along Queen Astrid Highway.

Loss of a big stretch of the road from the administrative capital of Vientiane to Luang Prabang is the government's biggest military setback since January. By systematic destruction by government troops made the route useless to the advancing rebels.

The government said the northern sector around Sala Phou Keng was holding firm, with royal artillery in command. The fighting near Muong Kassy was said to be guerrilla style, with no heavy losses on either side.

Vientiane remained quiet, though rumors flew through the capital. There was no public announcement of the setback. Royal military sources said the outcome would be doubtful for a few days.

Heavy rains, which turned the road into a virtual swamp in the last two days, also halted government airlifts in the area.

The strong rebel offensive came after leaders from two rival Laotian factions met in Cambodia and put forward a program for stabilizing Laos. Observers said the two former neutralist Premier Prince Souvanna Phouma and the government strongman, Gen. Phoumi Nosavan—were drawn into their talks by mutual fear the Communists would take over the country.

Souvanna, who is recognized by the Communist bloc as the legal premier of Laos, was reported to have been shocked by the magnitude of the arms buildup he saw during a quickie visit to the rebel-held areas from his exile in Cambodia.

At Phnom Penh, Souvanna said today he wants to replace Malaya with India on a proposed 3-nation commission to end both the fighting and foreign intervention in Laos.

The exiled prince said he plans to meet tomorrow with Cambodia's Prince Norodom Sihanouk who earlier turned down the idea of serving on the neutralist commission proposed by Laotian King Savang Vatthana. Burma also rejected taking part, and Malaya was the only nation to accept.

The commission was one item in a 6-point peace plan Souvanna and Gen. Phoumi agreed on yesterday. Informed sources said India was considered here as "absolutely neutral" and Malaya as basically pro-western.

The substitution of India for Malaya presumably would make the commission more acceptable to the Pathet Lao, who flatly rejected the king's peace solution.

The neutralist program said another part of the peace plan—a 14-nation conference—is absolutely essential. He suggested the 3-nation commission be formed because of lack of foreign intervention and halt foreign intervention and

Bill Also to Aid Children

House Votes Emergency Unemployment Benefits

Washington, March 11 (AP)—The House has completed action on President Kennedy's emergency unemployment benefits program. The Senate has barely begun work on it.

A voice vote yesterday sent to the Senate the final piece of the 2-bill package—a measure that would make children of the unemployed eligible for the same benefits now received by children without parents, or whose parents are disabled.

The House last week passed the companion measure which would provide up to 13 weeks additional unemployment benefits to jobless who have exhausted their present rights.

This measure has been stalled in the Senate Finance Committee, which will open closed door meetings Tuesday to consider possible amendments.

As passed by the House, the extra jobless benefits would cost an estimated \$990 million to \$1 billion. Like the child aid measure, it would expire June 30, 1962.

If all 50 states chose to take part in the child aid program—

Chiang Troops Capture Laos Border Town

Rangoon, Burma, March 11 (AP)—Chinese Nationalist irregulars rampaging the Lashio District near the Laos-Burma border have captured the town of Mang Sang, The Nation reported today.

The English language daily newspaper said a police outpost was completely routed by more than 200 guerrillas Thursday. Rebellious Burmese Shan tribesmen reportedly joined the Chinese in their attack.

The Nation said border towns already occupied by these guerrillas were now being straddled by Burmese Air Force fighter planes. The Chinese are remnants of Chiang Kai-shek forces who stayed behind when he fled to Formosa.

The ministers of Burma's five autonomous states attended a special cabinet meeting last night.

KILLED IN SCUFFLE
New Orleans, March 11 (AP)—W. Ray Scheuring, managing director of the Municipal Auditorium and onetime assistant athletic director at West Point, was shot to death early today during a scuffle involving an off duty policeman on a New Orleans expressway. Washington, March 11 (AP)—Democratic National Chairman John M. Bailey of Connecticut says he intends to make more use of the party's executive committee than his predecessor did. "It will meet with them occasionally to provide a conduit of ideas from the national level back to the local organizations," Bailey told newsmen before his first meeting with the group today since he became chairman. Eight of the 12 executive committee members were to meet in closed session with the chairman to discuss fund-raising to erase a 1960 campaign deficit of \$2.8 million, and ways to strengthen party organizations.

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
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


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Actor Blasts U.S. Cuisine

If you run across a guy eating seeds, or adding powdered skim milk to his drink, or eating an orange-skin and all—don't call the man in the white coat. It's just Bob Cummings.
The star of ABC-TV's "Love That Bob" Starring Bob Cummings is just trying to correct a situation he is very concerned about. "Do you know that a primitive Masai warrior in Tanganyika can look forward to a healthier, longer life than a carefully pampered American tycoon?" Cummings exclaims. "We are undoubtedly the most overfed and under-nourished nation in the world. We are just eating too much food that doesn't do us any good or do anything for us."
This explains his seemingly peculiar interest in off-beat foods—like sesame and sunflower seeds. "Don't get me wrong," Cummings explains. "I just eat them between meals." His personal secrets of good eating also include adding wheat germ and Brewer's yeast to suitable dishes and drinks, and eating liver (calves, beef or chicken) at least three times a week.
Unlike most Americans, Cummings is trying to do something about correcting this unhealthy situation. He has written a book entitled "Stay Young and Vital," which Prantice-Hall is servicing to book stores.
In it, he explains why at 50 he looks and feels younger than many members of Hollywood's new generation of leading men.
