TAKE YOUR TIME IN DRAWING TRUMPS

It's sometimes necessary to make haste slowly in drawing trumps.

West's best defense is to remove dummy's trumps to stop declarer from ruffing a heart. But West should not begin by leading the ace of trumps.

See what happens if West has to lead out the ace of trumps and then another trump. South wins and gives up a heart trick to the ace. East cannot return a trump, so South manages to ruff a heart in dummy. This assures him four trump tricks in his own hand, one heart ruff in dummy, one heart trick, and the four top cards in diamonds and clubs. The sure tricks, and a fine play for an eleven trick unless East is brilliant enough to refuse the first heart trick.

West gets a better chance to defeat the contract if he opens one of his low trumps. South wins and leads a heart to the ace. This East in position to lead another trump and West can clear all of the trumps out of the dummy by winning the ace of trumps and leading a third trump.

Partner opens with one trump (10 to 12 points) and the next simple play is to lead the King of Spades. You hold: Spades: K 10 9 7; Hearts: K 8 7 3; Diamonds: 6 5 4 3 2; Clubs: K 6. What do you say?

Answer: Bid two clubs - the opening bid in the Stayman convention. This asks partner to show a major suit if he has bid two diamonds, and you will then bid your spades. If partner shows a major suit you will jump to game in that suit.

Begin with the ace of trumps, however, if it is vital to get two rounds of trumps out at an early stage. If you partner has a major suit he will bid two diamonds, and you will then bid your spades. If partner shows a major suit you will jump to game in that suit.

If you have a sure ruff in dummy, if West had the ace of hearts in this hand he could not begin to begin with the ace of trumps.

### \$217,008 Paid Out To Unemployed

Benefit checks paid out to Manchester's unemployed during February amounted to \$217,008, it was announced today by John J. Loomis, manager of the unemployment compensation office.

Unemployment checks disbursed compensated 5,646 weeks of unemployment with an average weekly check of \$38.17 (also including 5,768 weeks under the Extended Duration Program). Payments by check are made directly to claimants in the Manchester office.

The weekly claims ratio during the last week of the month to the number covered by the Unemployment Compensation Law for insured unemployment was 15.4 per cent as compared with 8.7 for the State. In February, the Manchester office area ratio was 14.8, and 8.9 a year ago.

The United States and Russia must look like a couple of busy-bodies. Yes, the Laotians have to depend on someone. The country earns only a fraction of its expenses.

In 1950 its exports totaled \$15 million while its national deficit was \$33 million, or about 20 times its export figure. Since 1954 this country has lost \$110 million to Laos, most of it for the military forces.

Yes, the Associated Press reports even the combatants are devout Buddhists who don't like to kill and have to be coaxed into fighting by their big-power backers.

The Laotians don't even think as a nation. Many of them are split into tribes. One official said as many as 100 different dialects are spoken in Laos. Just another family fight.

Yet, Russia wants the Communist-led rebels to win. A Red Laos would be a foothold for a takeover in the rest of Southeast Asia. For that reason the United States is determined to block them.

So the Laotians are caught in the middle.

If there is peace in Laos—and it probably will be, since the Reds don't usually yield any ground—both sides will have to work to win support.

Since both the West and Communism will propagandize the people in their area, in due time maybe the Laotians on both sides will learn to get angry enough at each other to fight in earnest, or something.

All this sounds a little reminiscent—although the cases are not identical—of Indo-China, half of which the French lost to Communism in 1954.

**How to Report Your Income**

At this time of the year, when we are all thinking in terms of income taxes, many questions normally arise in regard to the federal income tax. One of the problems that arise most frequently is the question of what is taxable income and what forms of revenue are not taxable.

Federal law requires that all income, in whatever form received, with certain exceptions, must be declared in your tax return. In some cases, a particular type of income is specifically exempt from taxation, it is taxable and must be reported in the return.

The most common type of income is compensation for services, salaries, bonuses, and commissions. Generally, any payment from an employer to an employee is presumed to be compensation, unless it is shown to be a gift or a loan. When reporting your federal income tax, it is important that you seek proper advice for any questions you might have. If you are at all doubtful as to whether a particular item of income is taxable, you would be wise to seek competent counsel in advance.

Business income is another form of taxable income which must be reported. This does not mean gross receipts from a business, but rather your total sales less the cost of the goods sold, plus any other incidental income. Other expenses such as selling expenses are deducted from the total sales to determine net income.

If you receive interest on money which you have lent, or on savings bonds, or on your savings account in a bank, this income is taxable. You must also report money received from stock dividends.

**New Foreign Aid Outlook**

In his proposals for a reawakening of our foreign aid program, President Kennedy has outlined several common sense objectives, not all of which will have instant popularity with the public. From whom they require votes or cooperation action.

One aim of the aid advisers has set up is that our money abroad should be used more for long-range and fundamental projects, rather than for potentially more glamorous shots-in-the-arm.

One thing necessary to make that kind of program possible would be constant and appropriate action from Congress to set up long-term financing, as compared to the present year to year appropriation system. This is something Congress refused to yield to President Eisenhower, when he also wanted it.

Another necessity for such a system would be initiative on the part of the various recipient nations to set up fundamental, long-range programs for themselves.

Finally, President Kennedy wants other nations of the northern, developed half of the world to join in such a foreign aid program, with a fixed percentage of their national income, to match a similar percentage from us. For the benefit of the undeveloped, southern half of the world. Not all these other nations, some of whom American aid has, in the post-war years, helped to their economic feet, will be leaping at the chance to share some of the same kind of burden for the rest of humanity.

But, in tentative propositional fashion, President Kennedy has outlined foreign aid aims which take a healthy and sensible and ultimate direction. In some of his planning, he does not, in our opinion, go far enough. He would, at the outset, limit his league of northern giving to the new Economic Cooperation Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, which represents Western Europe plus the United States and Canada. He thus once more shies away from the United Nations, as our policy has done all too consistently, and thus avoids, for now, any effort to visualize a world in which both we and Russia might be allies, fighting the same war against hunger and backwardness. At the same time, however, he does make a definite effort to take our economic aid programs at least part way out of any cold war context, and make it clear that what we are fighting is not Communism, but poverty. It is up to Congress, our allies, and the potential aid recipients to see to it that all these good intentions do not, for lack of support and zeal and enterprise, slip back into the old and unsatisfactory routines.

Sometimes we have the feeling that if we newspapers were to shut down, and the air waves also go silent, that crisis would also go out of human living.

What suggests this to us is the way, in the world as it does operate, the emergence of one crisis in our headlines tends to smuff out another.

Where, for instance, has the crisis in the Congo been in the last few days? A week or so ago, it was our chief crisis, the story that every newspaper and every broadcast. Nowadays, at most, it gets a casual mention.

In the situation in the Congo suddenly completely different? Have revolutions and light suddenly descended there? It all resolved? Need we never hear more of the Congo and its troubles?

These are all loaded questions. The only thing different about the Congo is that we have Laos to think and write and talk about. If we didn't have Laos, there would still be daily drama coming to us from the Congo. Nothing has happened to the fundamental issues in the still chaotic Congo, except the fact that we are no longer putting the microscope on them. But perhaps that in itself is a real event, a real development. Perhaps each crisis consists of one part part and another part whipping up. There have, for that matter, been a number of past crises in Laos. After each one of them, there has come a sort of muzzling of the actual facts involved, and these were always much less sensational than the reports which had been headlined during each crisis.

The current crisis in Laos is the bottom of all, but some of the heat may, afterwards, prove to have been something added by impetuous report and interpretation.

It all suggests the old question about the tree falling in the forest. Does it make a resounding crash if there is nobody there to hear it? Can a crisis exist unreported, or achieve drama without headlines? If we forgot about the Congo completely for a year, what would be the result?

These are fascinating questions, and, fortunately, will not be put to the test. If things go quiet in Laos, we will all head back toward the Congo and, in a day or two, have that all heated up again. Or if the Congo proves obstinately cool, we can focus on Cuba. There is nobody there to hear it. Can a crisis exist unreported, or achieve drama without headlines? ### Kennedy Asks Loans For Housing Repairs

The 25-year loan would carry a maximum interest rate of 6 percent and could total up to \$10,000 per family living unit. By contrast, present improvement loans insured by the Federal Housing Administration run for only five years, carry a rate of 8.4 percent and are subject to \$3,500 ceiling. The 9.4 percent interest rate represents the effective rate during the life of a \$3,500 loan. On some smaller loans, the rate goes as high as 12 percent.

To entice private lenders into the program, FHA would have authority to pay off defaulted loans in cash. FHA normally pays off in debentures carrying low rates of interest and these must often be sold at less than face value if the lender wants his cash in a hurry.

Other items in the bill would be advanced in the form of first or second mortgages or other types of loans and would be available in all areas. Some advantages would be granted to projects in urban renewal sections, although basic terms would be the same everywhere. Officials are hopeful that if Congress approves the program will become the major weapon in attacking urban blight without any subsidy.

Housing Administrator Robert C. Weaver, in a memo to Kennedy, says he sorely lacks today the financing devices that are needed to support and encourage the use of direct housing loans for the elderly. He says that the present program of direct housing loans for the elderly from \$50 million to \$100 million, at 30 percent, instead of 20 percent, of urban renewal grants must be used in areas which are not predominantly residential.

FHA-insured mortgages for units in cooperative apartments and for experimental housing units are new materials, techniques or designs. Kennedy's special message puts no price tag on the total housing program. Weaver said that \$1.05 billion would be spent by June 30, 1965, and \$311 million would be spent by the end of 1963 fiscal year which began July 1.

All these outlays would be in addition to those already authorized. The amount previously authorized for fiscal 1962 is \$728 million. The biggest new item would be \$2.5 billion in authority to commit federal funds for urban renewal projects. The commitments would extend over four years but actual spending would continue for two years or longer.
