The Hungarian government resisted Nazi efforts to follow the pattern of action against the 800,000 Hungarian Jews.

The Nazis had believed they could win the war. Soviet armies had advanced to the Carpathian Mountains and there was need for great haste if the extermination of the Jews was to be completed in time.

Eichmann's boss, Heinrich Himmler, ordered him to stop sending the death trains from Hungary to the east. But Hausner said that was not done.

He said there were instances when infants were torn apart by the hands of the guards. "Molotov went mad," he cried. Then came the ghastly column of figures of the dead.

### Rebel Forces Claim Advance on Havana

The loyalty of Castro's 400,000 troops and militia members.  
The Cuban Revolutionary Council in New York claimed there are no signs of a mass uprising, and predicted a mass uprising against the Castro regime by the day is out.  
Fighting was reported—but not confirmed—in four of Cuba's 14 provinces. The heaviest fighting occurred in Havana where forces that landed at Las Villas were reported to have reached the Colon area 20 miles from the capital and toward the island.  
The invasion landed before dawn yesterday brought worldwide repercussions.  
The U.S. government declared its sympathy for the forces trying to overthrow Castro, but denied Cuban charges that Washington had financed and organized the invasion.  
The Soviet government in an official statement pledged "all necessary aid" to Castro if armed intervention is charged to the United States did not stop.  
Mrs. Kennedy also appealed for U.S. action, and observers at the U.N. believed the Russians were joining the Castro delegation in a demand for U.N. condemnation of the United States as the aggressor in Cuba.  
All communications with western newsmen in Cuba were cut off and rumors flew wild throughout the western hemisphere on what was happening inside the island.  
After reporting the initial landings yesterday, Castro's government remained silent for hours until the midnight communique was broadcast.  
The spokesman said it was possible a third landing had taken

## place in Pinar del Rio, the western province.

Anti-Castro sources in Mexico City claimed the late of Pinar, the island converted into a prison off the south coast of Cuba. This report—which could not be confirmed—said 10,000 political prisoners were freed and joined the revolt.  
Another unconfirmed report from Mexico claimed that Castro's "entire military guard" had been killed by instructors working in the field of arms and other issues like Las, that this might have adverse effects.

## Martin Favors Same Pay Scale For Town and School Workers

One step could be added to the present maximum of \$3,840, making the new maximum \$3,850. Municipal employees formally requested a pay raise April 1 through Atty. John D. LaBelle at a public hearing on the budget.  
Atty. LaBelle proposed a program of increases which would cost the town \$38,000 in addition to normal increments to the education budget.
