Eichmann Denies He's Linked To Mass Executions of Jews

Less read a letter signed by Eichmann, dated Aug. 8, 1941, regarding "art treasures owned by Jews."

The letter said Nazi agents throughout Europe should give detailed reports on such works of art, the names of the artist, the value, and the present and previous owners.

It said this information was needed for "a very important purpose."

Eichmann, discussing the letter with Less, noted that Hermann Goering, No. 2 in the Nazi hierarchy, had been buying up all articles of value.

Less said to Eichmann, "Now this was not a question of transportation."

Less also asked Eichmann about a proposal to evacuate some Jews from Hungary to Switzerland, ultimately to be sent to Palestine.

Eichmann replied to this proposal.

"As far as I know, the reichsfuehrer did not agree under any circumstances to the emigration of the Hungarian Jews to Palestine."

The Jews referred to were, without exception, biologically valuable material whose emigration to Palestine would be most undesirable."

Less questioned Eichmann about his dealings with clergymen who were arrested for intervening on behalf of the Jews.

"I arrested a clergyman called once," Eichmann said.

He told Less a bishop called him, along with the elders of the church. He said he didn't remember the bishop's name.

"I invited him three times," and warned him that the clergy were not permitted to help the Jews.

"I will have to take you into protective custody if there is another complaint," Eichmann said.

He told Less that he was not permitted to help the Jews.

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Insurgents Declare Reds Armed Castro

(Continued from Page One) The Havana broadcast said the rebels reported they were now in Puerto Cabezas in Nicaragua where they have the American military transport. Guatemala and Nicaragua denied officially they had anything to do with the operation.

Havana said all captured weapons were "North American arms and include five Sherman tanks, machine guns, rifles, anti-aircraft guns, and trucks. Havana once more charged that U.S. type warplanes supported the landings. The rebel invaders earlier had landed they were met on the beaches by Russian-made tanks and were attacked by Soviet-made M4 tanks.

Prime Minister Fidel Castro personally led the fight against the rebels. His absence from Cuban airwaves had led to speculation he may have been assassinated or shunted aside by the Communists.

The Castro regime claimed that the only survivors of the invasion surrendered yesterday after being promised that they would be treated as prisoners of war.

The government said they would be shown to the rebels that they were not to be treated as prisoners of war. All the prisoners are being held in the mountains.

Teachers, students, workers, peasants and housewives are joining the guerrillas in the mountains. Predictions of a Communist takeover of the Caribbean's "unhappy island" in the words of President Kennedy came from both pro-Castro and anti-Castro camps.

The Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda told its readers that the Cubans have no intention of leaving Cuba. The Cubans reported quiet and tense as a result of the invasion after a spattering of noisy victory celebrations in Havana.

Yugoslav correspondents who toured the beach area said they looked like a World War II battlefield. They saw tanks, trucks and armored cars on fire. They also saw a wrecked Sherman tank and a wrecked ship used for disembarking.

The Yugoslav report said about 300 wounded government soldiers are in temporary hospitals set up in the area. The general quiet in Havana last night amid the government claims of victory was attributed by this observer to heavy casualties suffered by Castro forces in the fighting.

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51 Formed Council Of K of C in Town

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Policing Golden Gate Bridge Bigger Job Than Building It

San Francisco (AP)—As far as the Golden Gate Bridge is concerned, the only thing that's been tougher than building it was making the job of keeping people from killing themselves on or around it.

Kennedy Sidesteps Questions On U.S. Arms to Cuba Rebels

ground briefings from some of the rebels on the situation. This comment came when a newsman asked the United States had been taking a "propaganda line" over the world and it was hard to understand why the President would not discuss the situation more.

At one point Kennedy was asked whether he could shed any light on reports that Castro had been incapacitated since the start of the rebel operations. "No, I cannot," Kennedy said. "I saw some reference on the news that Castro was being held in a prison, but I do not know whether we will have a better idea of that later on."

While Kennedy did not want to discuss Cuba in detail, and said he had no more information on the case, he did express a number of views on the general subject of Communist tyranny. He said it will be a major problem for a decade ahead, and that the United States must attend to all our energy and all our attention.

On the question of the United States vs. Russia in space efforts, Kennedy said this was the next 10 years he is sending every effort to become first to the moon.

Kennedy said his administration would carefully consider returning into new space projects to determine whether a real breakthrough has been achieved or whether we are so far behind that we are going to be second in this decade.

Kennedy said the Saturn vehicle, the Nova and Rover projects are being studied with additional funds and that the government will spend about \$1 billion on space next year.

But he said the Saturn would not get us to the moon and he did not have to consider whether there is any program now regarded as the best way to get to the moon and to bring back a project.

Return to the U. S. project of building a more powerful rocket. Kennedy said the Saturn is a project to build a nuclear rocket.

These other matters came up in the meeting with newsman who were fighting Communism. Kennedy said he hoped that everyone strongly concerned about Communist advances would direct them.
