Dam Bursts, Flood Rips Section of Middletown

Middletown, April 27 (AP)—A dam gave way at Crystal Lake at dawn today, sending a 4-foot wall of water rushing into an area of a dozen homes. No one was killed.

The water poured down a hill, scoured across a chicken farm, Millbrook Road and a half-mile from where it started, flooding an area of small houses.

Some residents dashed through the darkness to higher ground. Others moved to second floors. Nobody was seriously hurt, although three were treated for minor injuries.

Damage estimates ranged up to several thousand dollars. Police Chief John Pomfret said 10 homes were damaged.

The water broke trees, tossed boulders around like pebbles, dented cars and cracked porches from 400 yards, cracked porches from

foundations. In its 15-minute rampage, it also gutted the boiler room of the Russell Manufacturing Co., forcing the plant to close.

Behind it, the water left two to three inches of debris on top of a hill in the South Farms area of town.

Len Angi said he was awakened at 3:15 a.m. "What are we going to do," he said, watching the water well toward their home.

"Get out of here," he said. They grabbed their two daughters and fled to the home of Angi's brother-in-law, George Clegg, who lives on higher ground.

The water knocked down Mrs. Angi, who was carrying one of her children. Another fire smashed and half-crushed, half-dragged them to the other side, where they moved upstairs.

He said the water reached its crest in about 10 minutes and then began to recede.

Authorities said the base of the dam had been damaged some days ago and the Russell Company, which owns the water rights, had had divers working there for two days.

The dam is about 60 to 75 feet long and is located in Falcon Park on top of a hill in the South Farms area of town.

GOP Attacks Suspensions Of Speeders

Hartford, April 27 (AP)—Former Gov. Abraham Ribicoff's policy of automatic suspension of driving licenses for 30 days after a speeding conviction is the target of an attack from 38 Republican legislators.

The assault was sparked yesterday by Sen. Joseph P. Lippin, West. He appeared before the legislature's Transportation Committee at the State Capitol yesterday and gave the committee a petition signed by 38 members of the General Assembly, all Republicans, in favor of a measure sponsored by Lippin.

The Lippin bill would permit the State motor vehicles commissioner from suspending the license of a first offender unless the convicting court ordered such a suspension.

The crackdown started by Ribicoff as a safety measure in 1956, has been continued by Gov. John N. Dempsey, also a Democrat. The program has resulted in thousands of suspensions by the State Motor Vehicle Department.

Lippin charged that Ribicoff, now in President Kennedy's cabinet, had been "too lenient" in the separations of powers principle in the relationship of the motor vehicle department and the courts.

The Weston Senator said the penalty should be "tailored" to fit the individual case.

Thomas F. Burney, director of the Division of Motor Control, State Motor Vehicle Department, opposed the bill. He said it would be to normal and there was no need to quit any thing.

De Gaulle Men Ring Camp of French Legion

Algiers, April 27 (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle's tough French forces today surrounded the paratroop camp of Zeraida to split up a Foreign Legion regiment, one of two that furnished the military police in the Algerian insurrection.

Earlier reports had said three fugitive generals of the rebel junta had hidden out at the camp. The property they wanted included a car, a motorcycle and a rifle.

A government spokesman said authorities had a general idea of the whereabouts of the rebels but did not elaborate.

The three are Gen. Raoul Salan, Andre Zeller and Edmond Jourdan. The leader of the insurrection, Gen. Maurice Challe, surrendered yesterday and now is in a Paris prison.

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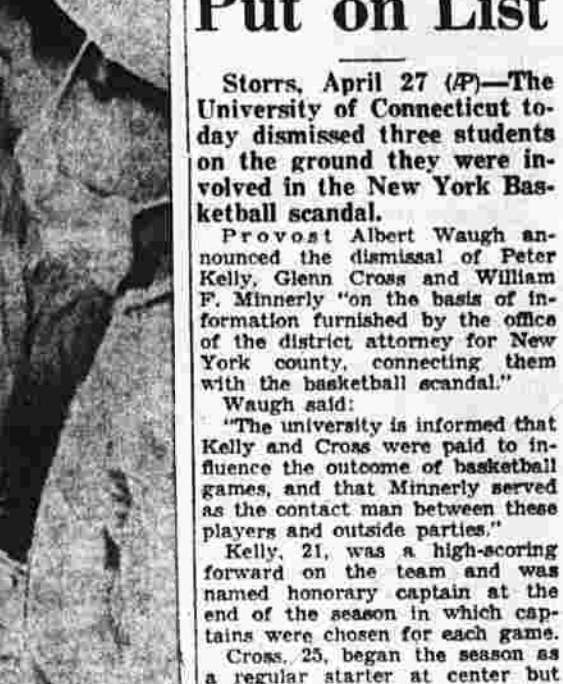

Five Survivors Of Cuba Scrap Arrive in U.S.

Corpus Christi, Tex., April 27 (AP)—Five survivors of the ill-fated invasion of Cuba reached U.S. shores today and the federal government immediately raised a wall of secrecy.

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Wants Office of Ethics

Kennedy for Curbing Conflict of Interest

Washington, April 27 (AP)—Kennedy called today for legislation laying down both broad guidelines and specific rules to govern the conduct of the people's business, with specific emphasis on the problem of conflict of interest.

The ultimate answer to ethical problems in government is honest people in a good ethical environment," Kennedy said, but added: "It is the responsibility of the executive branch to set up an office of ethics to coordinate activities in that field in the conduct of public business, and set a general ethical policy for the conduct of public business."

Stating his "firm confidence in the integrity and dedication of those who work for our government," Kennedy said few instances of impropriety have been uncovered and they "usually have not suggested any widespread departure from high standards of ethics and moral conduct."

But he added there have been enough instances to constitute a warning that the laws and regulations "are not adequate to the changed role of the federal government or to the changing conditions of our society."

Furthermore, the President went on, ethical problems themselves have grown so complex with the nation's economic and social development that they often "defy common sense solutions by men of good will."

Post Office Boosts Money Order Fees

Washington, April 27 (AP)—The Post Office Department plans to raise its fees for money orders and some special delivery services.

The increases, expected to bring in an extra \$1.5 million a year, were announced yesterday by postmaster General J. Edward Day.

They are part of a general rate increase designed to put the mail system's finances back in the black.

The Post Office deficit is running above \$100 million a year. Two weeks ago Day asked Congress for a 5-cent rate on surface letters, an 8-cent rate on airmail letters and still advances in other types of mail.

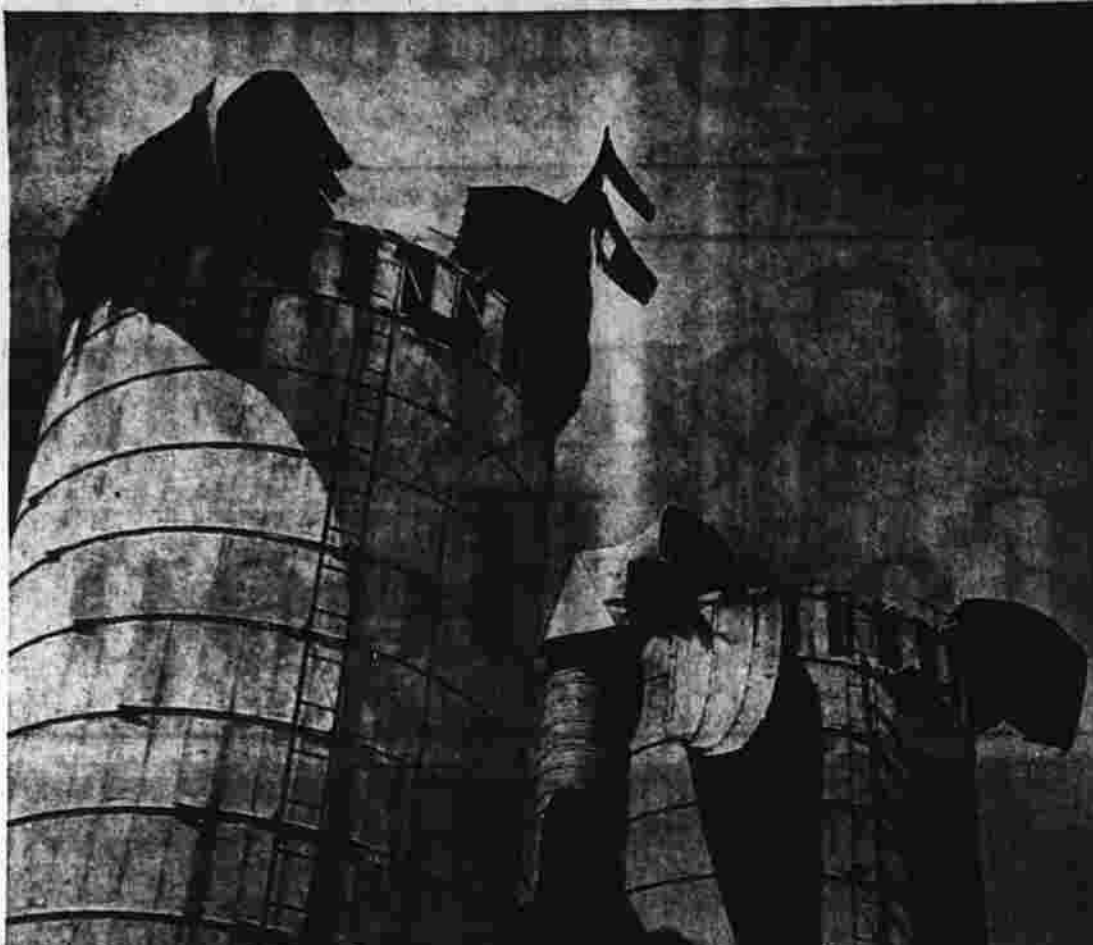

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Mercury Capsule Survives Last Test for Manned Hop

Wallops Island, Va., April 26 (AP)—The Mercury space capsule underwent its final and most strenuous unpowered test today with this verdict: A man aboard "unquestionably" could have survived.
