You Should Know ... Gordon Taylor Neddow

Although he has been a member of the Manchester Police Department for only nine years, Gordon Taylor Neddow, of 187 Woodbridge St., is the youngest sergeant, has been interested in one phase of police work—rescuing trapped motorists.

He was born in Springfield, Vt., on July 25, 1929, the son of Lyle T. and Violet V. Neddow, both of whom now make their home at 18 Bank St.

While living in Claremont, N.H., Neddow was given his first gun, a .22-caliber rifle. To have a place to store it, his father built a gun rack in the attic of their home.

Neddow doesn't remember what neighbors in nearby houses thought when he was given his first gun, but he turned this hobby to a selling point.

At a policeman, Neddow has completed a correspondence course in law and government at the University of New Hampshire.

For the next three and a half years he was a member of the New Hampshire State Police.

During this period he worked at odd jobs around Manchester, mostly as a truck driver.

He was married on Jan. 22, 1949. The Neddow household now includes Deborah, 11 and Gordon, Jr., 8, and Paul, 4.

His interest in firearms led him to join the Manchester Pistol Club where he was elected president for four straight years. His highest honor was being named 1950 member of the National Rifle Association.

Tortellini Pot Roast
Brown 4 lb. chuck roast in hot fat. Add 1/2 cup hot water, 1/2 tsp ground ginger, crushed garlic clove, 1/2 cup soy sauce, 2 medium onions, sliced. Cover, simmer 2 1/2 hrs. or till tender. To thicken gravy, remove meat. To pan juices, add 1 tbsp cornstarch blended with a little cold water, cook, stirring constantly till thick. Serves 8.



\$7,589,705 Budget Town Tax Rate Set at 40 Mills

The Manchester board of directors last night adopted a \$7,589,705 general fund budget and raised the tax rate from 36.9 mills to 40 mills for 1961-62.

The board also adopted a \$364,812 fire district budget for Manchester residents, and raised the fire tax rate from 4.07 to 3 mills.

The general fund of \$7,589,705 which the directors adopted is \$432,994 less than the \$8,022,699 recommended by General Manager Richard Martin.

In terms of mills, the approved budget was 3.9 mills less than the 7 mills recommended by the general manager.

The education budget was the hardest hit by the reductions. Directors cut it to \$4,386,947 from the \$4,228,409 recommended by the general manager. The board of education's request had been \$4,452,459, or \$224,550 more than the directors finally allocated.

Another major cut was in the capital improvements budget recommended by the general manager for \$368,000. Directors cut the capital improvement to \$205,000 by reducing loan drains from \$140,000 to \$100,000; the highway garage construction from \$170,000 to \$105,000; and the purchase of a disposal area from the sewer department from \$30,000 to \$5,000. Ship Survivors Describe Disaster, Rescue at Sea

Tampa, Fla.—AP correspondent Jack Simms was the only news agency reporter aboard the rescue vessel Gran Rio before she docked. Simms exclusive quotes from the survivors of the brigantine Albatross.

Albatross Rescue Ship, Gran Rio of Tampa, Fla., May 4 (AP)—A "white squall," once believed by many sailors to be a myth of the sea, roared out of nowhere to drive the student cruise ship Albatross to the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico in one minute.

Survivors of the ill-fated brigantine told the Associated Press today, as they steamed toward Tampa on this rescue ship, how the squall tore into the rigging without any advance warning. The rescue sank so swiftly five were trapped below decks and one was lost overboard.

"It's the first time I ever saw a 'white squall,'" said Charles (Tad) Sahlter, 18, Pittsford, N. Y. "I never want to see another again."

Dictionary describe a white squall as a small whirlwind of the tropics, with no accompanying cloud cover except a white patch above the storm centers. Some naval officers call it "a popular myth."

But it came in Tuesday morning high in the surface of the water. Sahlter said, and hit the rigging. There had been lightning and some rain, but little surface wind and no buildup in the sea to warn of trouble.

"I thought she would hit herself," said David (Doc) Johnston, 17, Huntington, Conn., who was in the wheelhouse. "We thought she would come back up but she didn't."

Philip Le Boutillier, 17, Ferrisburgh, Ohio, rushed to Johnston's aid in the wheelhouse. He said "Doc grabbed me and pulled me out of the wheelhouse and up toward the railing."

The wind ripped the lifeboats free and 13 survivors managed to get into them. Ten were teen-age boys, most from healthy families.

"Twenty-four hours later, after a storm-tossed night, the black-hulled Gran Rio sighted the lifeboats. The freighter, flying the Surinam flag, was bound for Tampa from Kingston, Jamaica.

She picked up the survivors and sailed into quarantine next Tuesday shortly after dawn today.

The Gran Rio skipper, Capt. Frans Verger of Para Misco, Surinam, said that when he spotted the lifeboats, "they were waving their arms and everything."

"I thought they were salvaging then. I caught Cuban refugees the night I was very sick boy."

"We all feel sorry for the ship," (Sahlter) he lost his wife, but we have done all we could to take care of the survivors."
