Idle Claims Rise 10.8% in Week

Claims for unemployment in Manchester increased 10.8 per cent last week from 1,871 to 2,072. The rise marks a reversal trend from the previous week when state unemployment claims declined by 496 during the same period ended April 29 from 68,905 (previous week) to 64,009, according to a State Labor Department report released today.

Manchester ranked 11th in the state, had 936 claims from women, 89 more than the previous week and 46 per cent of the total claims load here.

ERROR ON ITALIAN STAMP

It was just one of those things. The three stamps issued by Italy April 3 to commemorate the South American visit of President Gronchi were withdrawn from sale April 4 when postal officials were alerted to an error in the design of one of the stamps.

The error concerned Argentina, Uruguay and Peru, and was already well-known. So the Italian design team was asked to re-design the stamps to correct the error. The stamps were issued on May 4. They feature a map of the three countries and the 200 lire, red, feature Peru.

After the stamps appeared, Peru's ambassador, Ricardo Garcia, complained to the Italian foreign ministry that the Peru stamp showed Peru's frontiers without a border region which neighboring Ecuador shares. Withdrawal of the stamp followed.

Sheinwold on Bridge

DESTITUTE OPPONENTS, EXPERT ADVICES

"Don't trust your opponent," warns Edwin Kantar, young Los Angeles bridge star. The fact that an opponent fails to ruff doesn't prove that he can't do it. And he cites this hand to prove his point.

West leads the queen of hearts, and you win with the ace. You lead a diamond to the king, return a low trump to the ace, and lead another diamond to dummy's ace.

The next step is to ruff a diamond with the jack of clubs. West discards the seven of clubs. What next?

If you are a trusting soul, you come to the conclusion that West has the queen of spades. Perhaps you lead a club to the ace to take the trump finesse. A successful finesse is all you need for the contract.

As you can see, however, the finesse loses. The opponent can then take two hearts and a club, defeating the contract.

Play Safe

You can play safe for the contract after you have ruffed the third round of diamonds. Just ruff a low trump.

To be sure, nobody can take the queen of spades and two heart trumps, but that trick is worth only 30 points—the value of one trick. As the cards lie, the safe play is necessary, and the trick you save is worth about 500 points.

Bolton Chief Massolini Re-elected For 14th Year by Firemen

Fire Chief Peter Massolini has been re-elected for his 14th consecutive term by the Bolton Volunteer Fire Department.

All other officers were also returned to office by the annual meeting of the department. They include: Paul Masagna, assistant chief; Julius Strong, president; Stuart Wells vice president; William Clifford, secretary; and Alfred Barrett, treasurer. Anthony Ogino was elected treasurer for a three-year term.

In his annual report, Massolini said the department answered 41 alarms during the year to May 3, 1961. Of these, 13 were grass and brush fires; three structure fires; four chimney; 4 vehicles; 2 accidents; 1 washing machine; 8 search parties; 2 restaurant calls; 1 short line; 1 oven; 1 dump fire; 1 flooded oil burner; 3 resuscitator; and 2 falls alarms.

The department was on a stand-by basis during hurricane Donna on Sept. 12. Assistance was given to 12 assistance calls for a total of six mutual aid calls to Hebron, North Coventry, Rockville and South Coventry, the Vernon, North and North Coventry departments. The department was also called during the Red Ember restaurant fire, Andover and North Coventry, in a trailer, and a truck fire on Rt. 6.

Bill Would Limit Young Drivers

Hartford, May 5 (AP)—A bill that would give all drivers under 21 provisional licenses and which would set stiff penalties for traffic violators in the same age group has been approved by the legislature's transportation committee.

Provisional licenses are now issued to drivers 16 to 18 years old. The State Motor Vehicle Commission has the authority to suspend provisional licenses for any length of time he sees fit.

The measure approved yesterday provides for a mandatory minimum suspension of one year for drunken driving or ending responsibility, for persons holding provisional licenses.

For other moving violations the bill sets up a minimum suspension of 30 days for the first offense, 60 days for the second and one year for the remainder of the license term, whichever is greater for the third.

The measure is apparently a compromise on a variety of bills submitted to the legislature this year dealing with youthful drivers.

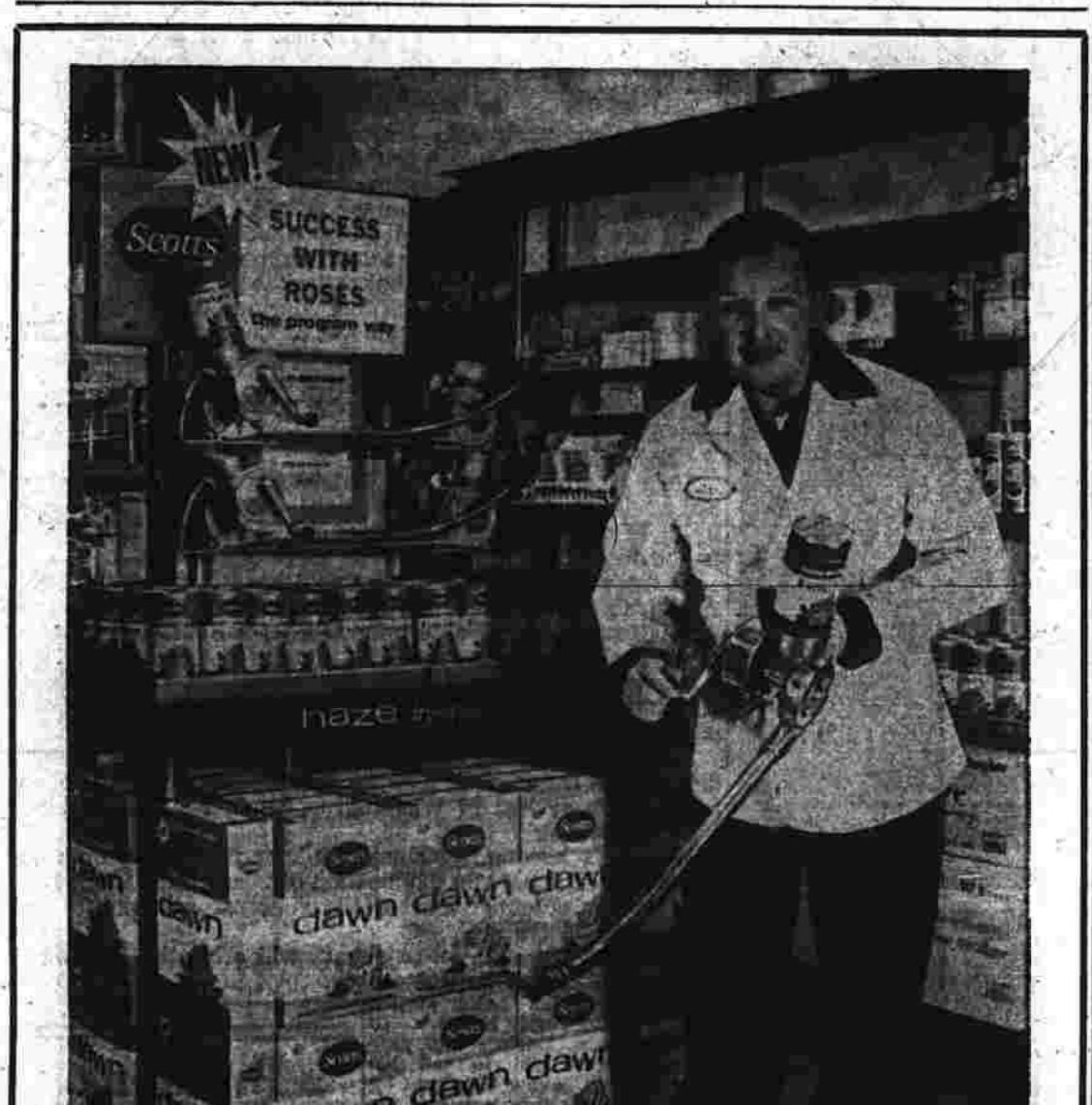

Johnson Predicts Peak Red Drive

New York, May 5 (AP)—Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson says he expects the Communist world offensive to reach its peak during the next 12 to 18 months.

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The means and methods of the red offensive, Johnson said, "may well depend upon the Communist conclusions about the resolution of the free world—and especially of the United States."

Warning that we are in "a long hard battle," Johnson said the United States must have flexibility and freedom of action which could come only from bipartisan support.

Johnson, chairman of the new space council, pledged the eventual superiority of the U.S. in space technology.

"I must tell you that the way will not be easy, the road will not be short, and the cost will not be cheap," Johnson said, adding, "There is no doubt we have the capacity to lead and we shall bring that capacity to bear."

After his dinner speech, Johnson returned to Washington.

Launching Missile Complicated Job

Chape Canaveral, Fla., May 5 (AP)—What is a countdown? And why does it take so long to complete before a missile can be fired? Launching a missile is a complicated procedure, especially when it rockets a capsule bearing a man into space.

There are thousands of electrical devices and systems in the rockets. The capsule, adapted to keep a man alive in space, contains many instruments, including power and oxygen systems, radio equipment and many recording devices.

The countdown is a step-by-step procedure of getting the rocket ready to fire and making certain all the control and recording equipment is working properly. It includes such steps as testing the rocket and, in this case, putting a man in the capsule.

The countdown to the firing of the Redstone missile and the Mercury capsule it thrusts aloft is so long and detailed that it is divided into a two-day period. The first day is preliminary countdown lasting several hours. The second day is countdown before the actual firing is 3 1/2 hours.

Sometimes the preparations are held up to make repairs or adjustments. The counting is stopped and these periods are known as "holds."

Home Gardener's Handbook Reap More Fruitful Garden Harvest

By ALLAN SWENSON (Written for NEA Service)

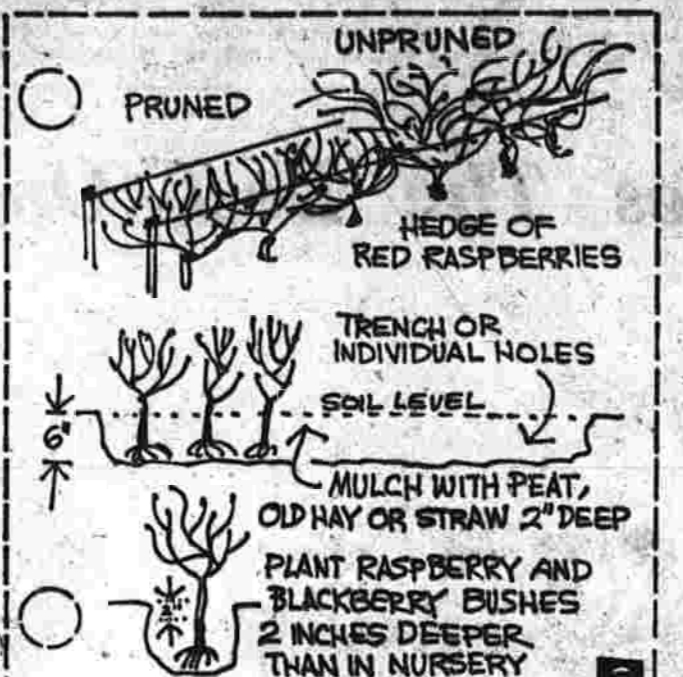
Your garden can reward you well with taste treats all season long. Plan now to harvest the fruits of your garden labors.

Bush fruits, raspberries, blackberries, dewberries, gooseberries and currants are suitable for almost every garden. Let your taste decide what you want to plant.

Some of these fruits even may be added to your landscape plan. Raspberries can provide an ornamental hedge. Currant and gooseberry hedges will in the shrub border. When you use bush fruits this way, be sure they will have adequate moisture, proper soil and sufficient sunlight to produce well.

Calculate the number of plants you'll need to provide your family with an ample supply of fruit. Each original raspberry, blackberry or dewberry bush will yield about two to three quarts. As berry plantings develop, yields will increase. About 25 plants should adequately supply a family of five.

Bush fruits may be grown easily on a wide range of soil types. They'll do better if an organic matter is fairly high and ample moisture readily available. Consult your local nurseryman or extension agent to control insects and disease common in your area.



needs of most bush fruits. Soil varies, so take a soil test. Apply plant foods needed to produce best quality and size fruit.

A permanent mulch around bush fruits saves cultivation, prevents weeds and conserves moisture. Salt hay, peat moss, corn cobs, straw or other organic materials make excellent mulches.

To produce unblemished fruit, you'll want to follow a sound pest control program. Your local garden supplier or county agricultural agent can recommend the best materials to control insects and disease common in your area.

Retirement: Happy Times

By MARIE DAHER

Training for Other Work Is Key to Jobs for Aged

Retraining, shifting, in the opinion of Edwin Clague, commissioner of labor statistics for the Department of Labor, those are important keys to job success for older workers.

In general, many workers in our economy, both men and women, are in occupations and jobs which will require substantial retraining when the workers are about age 65, Clague told the National Council on the Aging.

"The type of work in which they are successful in their younger years won't be available to them after they have reached their physical peak."

Clague is critical in determining the future work potential of older people. These workers may need to take training, retraining or further education and make other adjustments to enable them to hold down a new job or occupation.

How about the worker over 65? In Clague's opinion, the fact that he is no longer doing it doesn't mean he can't work successfully.

But the fact remains that his declining capacities are always narrowing the field in which he can work.

"One of the pressures for early retirement of older people comes from the fact that their work has stayed too long in a job which is fading out from under them," Clague said. "He is doing what he always did but doing it less well."

He finally reaches the point where he is no longer worth his wage or pension.

The story might have been different had he switched to a job which he could fulfill adequately at his age. To do this means periodic shifting of one's job and a type of turnover which is resisted both by workers and employers.

"Management tend to retain the older worker in his job until retirement rather than experiment in periodic readjustments, since it is so much easier to experiment with younger workers."

Clague pointed out that sometimes you become "obsolescent" in a job very early in life.

The average babyboomer who is through with his occupation at age 40 has a life expectancy of 35 more years. He has to develop a new job for his second working life.

By contrast, a doctor, or some one else in a profession that takes preparation, would scarcely be started in his career at age 30.

Q—I will be 65 on Sept. 12, 1961. How soon may I make application for social security benefits?—W. D. McL.

A—Three months before your 65th birthday.

Q—My husband died recently. I will be 62 in April. I have been working under social security. Will I receive both widow's and worker's benefits at this time?—Mrs. C. B.

A—No, you will receive the widow's benefit or the benefit based on your own earnings, whichever is the larger.

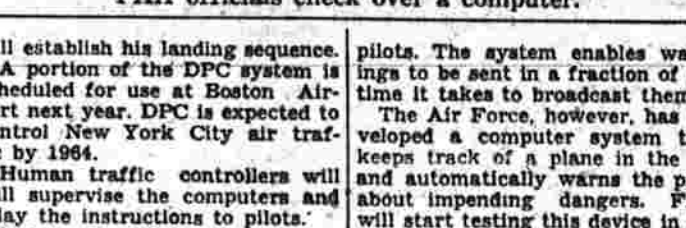
