

Rusk Tells NATO U.S. to Remain In West Berlin

Oslu, Norway, May 8 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk declared today the United States intends to maintain its presence in West Berlin even if the Russians sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany.

He told a conference of NATO foreign ministers that Premier Khrushchev should be left in no doubt on this point.

His statement was made at a closed meeting with the gist of his remarks given later to newsmen.

The American Secretary of State said he anticipated that Khrushchev would put the Berlin and German problem out of the bag soon.

Rusk said one step is essential if the Soviet government threatens to sign a separate peace treaty with Communist East Germany. That Moscow should be left in no doubt the interested western powers consider such a pact a violation of the legal situation in Berlin.

Then if the Russians permit, the western powers should insist on their access rights—their right to go back and forth from West Berlin over the 110 miles of East German which separates the city from West Germany. The United States is determined to continue to exercise these rights, Rusk said.

The American, British and French governments still maintain formations totaling about 10,000 troops in West Berlin 14 years after conclusion of the war in Europe. The western powers insist they have war-win rights to keep their troops there to prevent West Berlin from being swamped by the Communists.

Behind closed doors, the American Secretary of State elaborated on a prediction voiced earlier in the formal opening session by Dirk

West-3 Charts Strategy for Peace in Laos

Oslu Norway, May 8 (AP)—Senior U.S., British and French diplomats charted political and tactical plans today for 14-nation peace talks on Laos due to open in Geneva Tuesday.

The western working group acted on a directive from their foreign ministers. Secretary of State Dean Rusk, British Foreign Secretary Lord Home and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville agreed on these broad arrangements:

1. All plan to be in Geneva Thursday. But they remain reserved not to take part in the conference unless they receive a prior confirmation from the Indian-Canadian-Polish truce commission that the Laotian cease-fire is being respected.
2. They plan a joint move to insure that Cambodia Prince Norodom Ranariddh can join them.

Thousands Join in Tribute President, Congress Salute America's First Astronaut

Washington, May 8 (AP)—President Kennedy and Congress proudly saluted America's first Space traveler today with the nation's greatest ranging from a daily high of 71 to a low of 45. Rainfall during the period will total on the average one half inch or more occurring as showers Tuesday and again about Friday.

Spaceman Alan B. Shepard Jr. began a day of triumph when he was honored in the White House when Kennedy decorated him. Then he rode through cheering crowds to the capitol for a reception by Congress. Police estimated the throng at 200,000.

At the first opportunity, and then repeatedly, Shepard declared he wanted to share the tributes with the six other astronauts and the aviation-space specialists who worked with them.

On his arrival at the newly refurbished east portico of the capitol, Shepard and his fellow astronauts alighted in the middle of another throng while police lines and red ropes held back more thousands massed in the capitol plaza.

Led by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, the party climbed the broad steps to meet House Speaker Sam Rayburn, House Majority Leader John W. McCormack, D-Mass., and other dignitaries.

Shepard expressed "sincere appreciation for such a wonderful welcome" by the lawmakers and said he would have more to say later — at his afternoon news conference, obviously.

Kennedy honored the 37-year-old Navy commander in a White House ceremony that combined pride, happiness and a bit of humor. For one thing, the President first dropped the medal, then forgot to pin it on until Mrs. Shepard reminded him. That brought a laugh from all.

Kennedy took care to mention that when Shepard soared into Space last Friday off Cape Canaveral, Fla., the whole world knew of the attempt.

In contrast, when the Russians orbit a man about the world, nothing was known until he returned, and nothing is yet known as to possible earlier attempts that may have failed.

Kennedy remarked that with every body looking on, America was making a man about the world.

Present for the White House ceremony were most of the members of the cabinet and a long list of other dignitaries, including the chairman and ranking Republican

Kennedy Urges Congress Push Anti-Bias Laws

Washington, May 8 (AP)—The Kennedy administration asks Congress today for legislation to hasten desegregation of all racially segregated public schools.

Every school board operating a racially segregated public school would be required to adopt a desegregation plan within six months and file it with the secretary of welfare.

The school desegregation proposal was among six civil rights bills ready for introduction by Sen. Joseph S. Clark, D-La., and Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y. The 6-point program is geared to carrying out the civil rights pledges of the 1960 Democratic platform.

Last September, President Kennedy had proposed a "first-step compliance" plan, not later than the start of the 1963-4 school year. They also would have to spell out the time and manner in which desegregation would be achieved.

Under the plan, the Kennedy administration would require school boards to file a plan with the secretary of welfare within six months of the start of the school year. If a school board failed to file a plan, the secretary would file a plan on its behalf.

Says He Controlled Capsule on Re-entry

Washington, May 8 (AP)—Cmdr. Alan B. Shepard said today the flight which made him America's first Spaceman will encourage him and his associates to press on with the program of exploration.

"All in all, we were very much pleased with the flight, very much encouraged, and we intend to press ahead with the program," he told his first news conference.

Shepard began his talk to the assembled newsmen by introducing his wife and parents, who were in the audience. He also introduced "My sister Polly," Mrs. Gordon Sherman, who responded with a fighter's over-the-head handshake. Shepard also presented his wife's parents.

He said he considers there are several significant things about the flight last Friday from Cape Canaveral.

"We feel very strongly that this particular flight was one that was certainly accomplished in the open," he said. "We had very few secrets about our plans. Launch date was classified, but very few other things were. This was a little annoying at times, but I think we rationalized it by considering that the free society that made possible this flight and Project Mercury certainly had a right to be informed."

He said the possibility of "speeding this up because of other events"—possibly a reference to the Soviet man in space accomplishment—was considered but not all the speed-up was adopted.

Shepard said he was surprised that the lift-off for the flight was as smooth as it was.

"I had expected more noise and more vibration. It was a very pleasant lift-off."

He noted that he actually controlled the vehicle at times. He said that he had controlled the re-entry into the Earth's atmosphere.

"We are very much pleased with the flight," he said, and added that all the astronauts are forward to the future of Project Mercury and its completion.

Shepard said he made the remark "Oh what a beautiful view" after he first took hold of the controls and was able to look through the periscope.

He said he had been pretty well briefed about what to expect. But when he actually looked through the periscope, he said he could not get his breath away. It was a beautiful sight.

"What was the worst part of your flight?" a questioner asked.

"I don't think we had any bad moments at all," Shepard replied, getting a laugh from the assemblage.

He was asked next about "unexpected sensations" he said he had felt, including some turbulence that had not been forecast.

"What I was referring to," he said, "were two specific points in the flight plan which we had judged to be of special stress, one the trans-sonic period at Mach 1.1. Another, he said, involved pressure."

"We didn't know how we would react," he said. "Fortunately we reacted pretty well."

He used the word "we" frequently in the news conference with the obvious intent to let the

members of the Senate and House Space Committees.

Among those on hand when Kennedy talked later in his office with Shepard and the other astronauts were Vice President Johnson, Sens. Robert Kerr, D-Okla., and Styles Bridges, R-N.H., and Reps. Overton Brooks, D-La., and Joseph W. Martin, R-Mass.

In a last minute change of plans, Kennedy invited Shepard and his wife to accompany him to the Sheraton-Park Hotel so he could introduce them at the annual convention of the National Association of Broadcasters where Kennedy was making a speech.

The crew-cut, brisk Shepard seemed in excellent physical shape, as doctors had found him before after his 5,100-mile-an-hour flight last Friday.

He pleaded a measure of nervousness today, however, and said he was able to sleep less last night of the attempt.

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25 Known Dead, 100 Injured Tornadoes, Wild Floods Rip Midcontinent Area

Tornadoes and sudden floods brewed from violent thunderstorms hit a broad midcontinent area tonight, causing injury and property damage during the weekend.

The twister menace persisted, with Plano, Tex., hit today by a small tornado which added to millions of dollars in the destruction toll, but caused no injuries. Several buildings in the town of 3,700 about 15 miles north of Dallas, were damaged.

Hundreds of persons were left homeless in eight states by the twin-pronged weather scourge.

The flash floods and severe weather, including tornadoes, gusty winds, heavy rain and hail, were blamed for at least 29 deaths. Nearly 100 persons were injured.

The American Red Cross in St. Louis said arrangements were made to provide food, clothing, medical care and emergency shelter for an estimated 1,000 families in north central Arkansas, southern Missouri, northeast Oklahoma, southern Illinois and Kansas. (Severe thunderstorms continued during the morning in many areas from Oklahoma and Kansas north-eastward through the middle and upper Mississippi Valley into the Great Lakes region.)

Tornadoes struck six communities in Arkansas yesterday, killing four persons. Three others drowned in swollen streams in the state.

Involving two persons who lost their lives in a flash flood in Harrison, one of the hardest hit towns in the storm belt.

The twisters in Arkansas hit Midway, Whiteville, Clarkridge, Pindall, Summit and Oil Trough.

Three persons were killed at Summit, near Yellville, and one person in Midway. About 40 homes were destroyed in a 20-mile area between Pindall and Yellville. Nineteen persons were hurt.

National Guardsmen were sent into Harrison, a community of 8,500, after Gov. Orval E. Faubus declared martial law. Crooked Creek overflowed and sent a wall of water 14 feet high through the streets of the northwest Arkansas town. Two men drowned and an elderly couple was missing in Harrison. Damage was estimated by Mayor Dene O. Hester at \$5 to \$10 million. A youth drowned in flooded Sugar Creek near Springdale, the seventh storm-related death in Arkansas.

Tornadoes also pounded South Fork, Mo., about 60 miles northeast of the severe storm area in Arkansas, injuring eight persons. A dozen persons were hurt in a tornado which hit an area near Kansas City. Tornado winds lashed areas near Stamford, west-central Texas, northern Oklahoma and in Madisonville, Ky. Many rivers and streams, fed by heavy spring rains, overflowed across sections of Kansas, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Oklahoma and Missouri. The Missouri River was near flood stage at several points in Missouri.

The death toll in the tornado which swept Howe and Reichart, Okla., Friday, mounted to 15 yesterday with two persons dying of injuries suffered in the storm. About 60 persons were injured.

Truce Group May Spur Laotian Armistice Talk

Vientiane, Laos, May 8 (AP)—Twenty-one representatives of the 3-nation Laotian Truce Commission arrived in Vientiane today with hopes of spurring lagging negotiations between the western-backed royal government and pro-Communist rebels.

A spokesman said they were anxious to establish immediate contact with the appropriate parties to certify the cease-fire in Laos.

A Stratrolair carried the group from India, Canada and Poland here from Saigon, South Vietnam. A similar group proceeded to Kieng Khouang, headquarters of the Red Pathet Lao and Neutralist Prince Souvanna Phoum, the premier the Communists contend is the rightful head of government.

Semar Sen of India, chairman of the International Control Commission for Laos, said in an airport statement:

The international commission for Laos are anxious to establish contact with the appropriate parties in Laos, South Vietnam and the commission are sending one group to proceed to Vientiane and another to Kieng Khouang. It is the hope of the commission that the parties will cooperate fully with them and that the immediate task of the commission will be carried out smoothly and satisfactorily."

A government military delegation flew north again today to reopen the stalled negotiations, on a cease-fire agreement.

So far the opposing factions have not even been able to agree on a site for military and political talks, whether they should be handled separately. Both the government and the rebels proclaimed a cease-fire last Wednesday, but three meetings between military representatives since then have failed to work out detailed conditions of the armistice.

Despite this lack of agreement, no new reports of cease-fire violations have reached Vientiane. Areas where rebel attacks had been started last week were calm.

Kasavubu Aide Reports Tshombe Faces Trial For Lumumba's Death

Conquihaville, Congo, May 8 (AP)—President Joseph Kasavubu's government says it will prosecute Katanga President Moise Tshombe for treason and will try to bring him back to the Congo for trial.

Foreign Minister Justin Bomboko, told a news conference the imprisoned Tshombe would be tried for a series of crimes including the assassination of former Premier Patrice Lumumba. Kasavubu himself has ordered Lumumba's body to be handed over to Tshombe to prevent his escaping custody and regaining control of the government.

Tshombe was arrested April 26 after he walked out of a meeting of Congolese leaders called to try to work out a new form of government for the strife-torn nation. The Katanga president accused Kasavubu of "selling out" to the United Nations.

Bomboko said that Leopoldville government would use force if necessary to restore its control over Katanga, the Congo's rich mining provinces which seceded from the republic soon after independence last summer.

Bomboko declined to specify just how Kasavubu's government would go about taking over Katanga, but he announced that all Belgian advisers would be expelled from the province.

Katanga has the best disciplined and most effective army in the Congo, presumably loyal to Tshombe and commanded by hired white officers, many of them Belgian. The Katanga cabinet appeared solidly behind Tshombe's earlier

defiance of repeated U.N. demands that he get rid of all foreign military and political personnel. But following his arrest, the provincial cabinet last week took a more conciliatory tone toward the Leopoldville government and promised to discuss the U.N. demands for ouster of the foreigners.

Bomboko charged Tshombe with four main crimes:

1. Assassination of political prisoners and massacre of the Baluba tribesmen in Katanga.
2. Rebellion against Kasavubu's government under direction from foreign elements.
3. Theft of planes, ammunition and monetary reserves belonging to the Leopoldville government. This referred to goods confiscated by Tshombe when he declared Katanga independent last July.
4. Counterfeiting. Bomboko said the Central government considers that Tshombe committed an illegal act by issuing his own currency.

"These are crimes of high treason," said Bomboko, "and Tshombe will be prosecuted as a rebel."

Bomboko refused to say whether Tshombe will be placed on public trial or when he will be moved from the villa in Coquilhaville where he has been imprisoned for the past 10 days.

RED SECRECY HIT
Washington, May 8 (AP)—Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., today introduced legislation to strip the mark of secrecy from details of their spacemen's achievement. McClellan heads a Senate committee investigating assertions that strikes and work slowdowns have hampered the United States space program. He contrasted the Russian secrecy with the golden bowl publicity surrounding the successful space probe of American Astronaut Alan B. Shepard.

CONGO OUSTS U.S. AIDE
Stanleyville, Congo (AP)—A (Delayed) Stanleyville regime announced today a political officer at the U.S. embassy in Leopoldville, Frank Caprice, is undesirable and accused of being a subversive activities while in Stanleyville. Press Secretary Antoine Maudouze said Interior Minister Christopher Gbenyo declared Caprice's presence a national disgrace after receiving a report from the security bureau. Maudouze said the report showed Caprice had contacts in Stanleyville which tend toward "division of the country." He did not elaborate.

IRAN BREAKDOWN SEEN
Tehran, Iran, May 8 (AP)—Premier-Designate AH Amir-Allah says complete economic breakdown threatens Iran because resources have been wasted and government officials have been greedy. The government's financial structures "are in their last breath." Dr. Amir said in a nationwide broadcast yesterday. He asked Iranians to help revive the economy by increasing production and by cutting needless expenditures.

EICHMANN POWER BARED
Jerusalem, May 8 (AP)—Jews in Western Europe were doomed within months after France fell and Adolf Eichmann "the man who directed and commanded the extermination action," by the prosecution charged today. By documents and testimony, the prosecution pictured the former Gestapo officer as a powerful figure in the Nazi campaign of mass slaughter that took the lives of six million Jews in Europe in World War II. One letter introduced showed Eichmann even blocked an attempt by axis partner Italy to save the Jewish wife of an Italian officer from a death camp.

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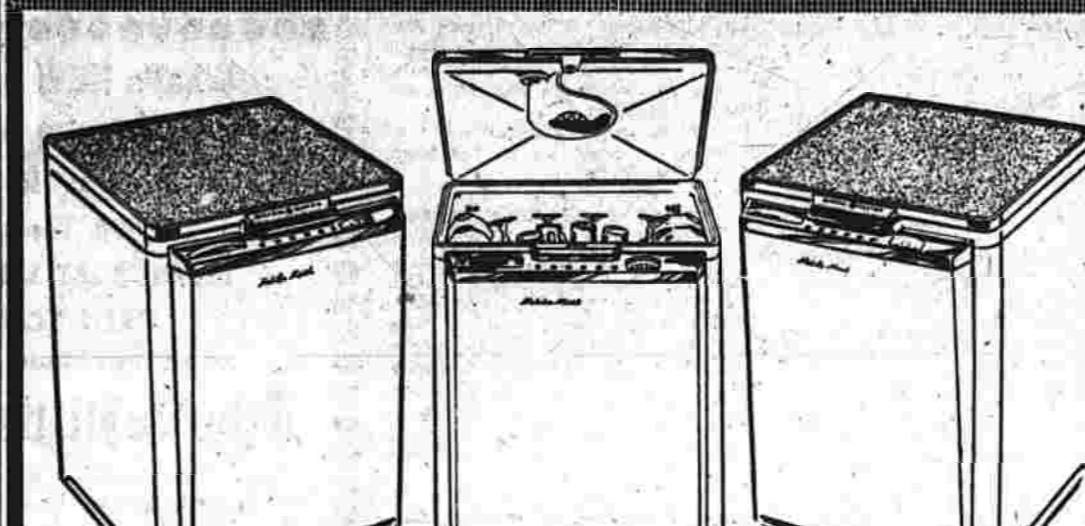
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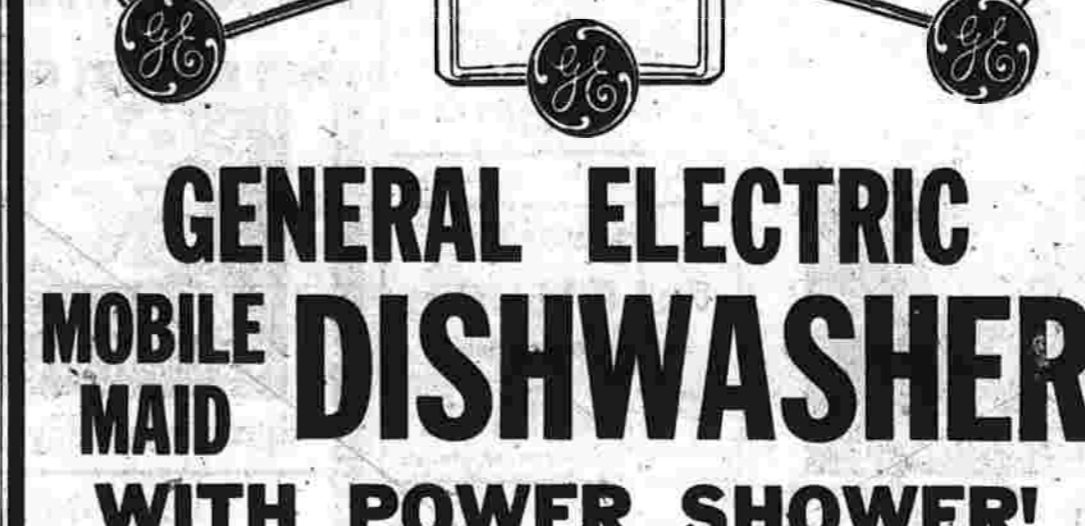

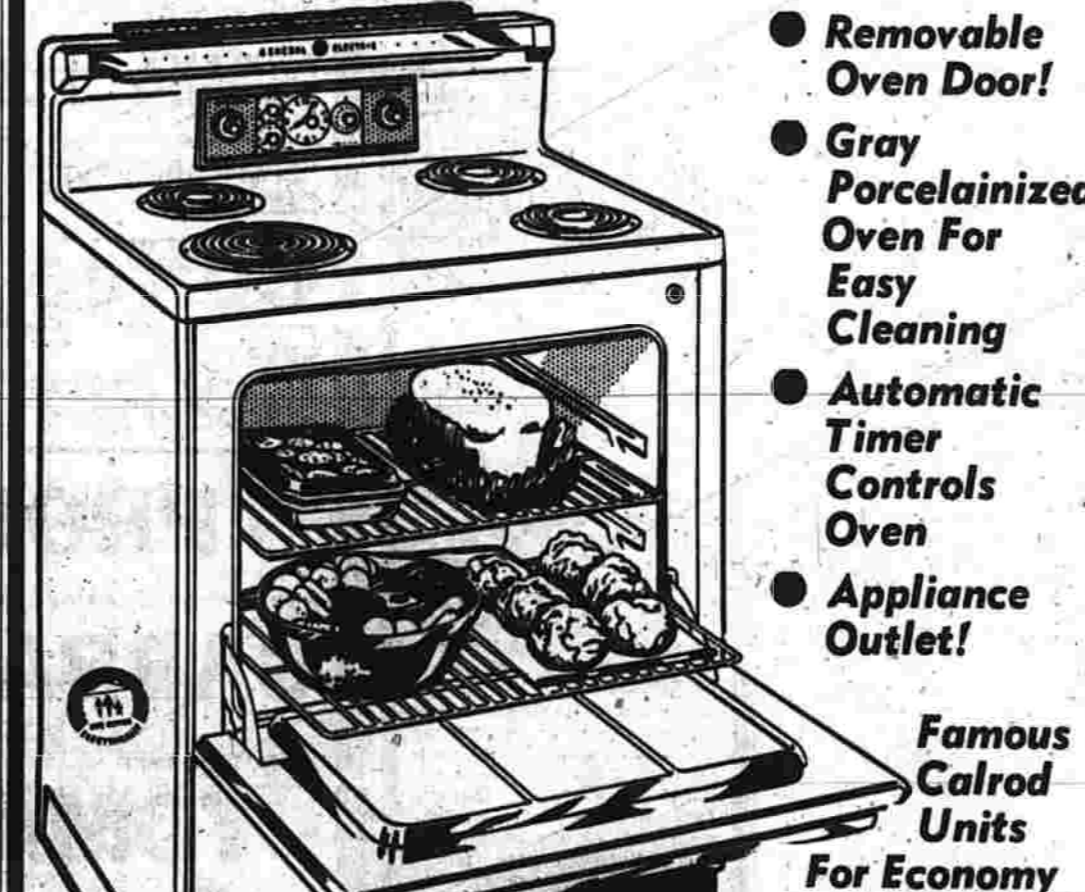

Kennedy May Stall Rights Bills to Win Curb on Filibusters

Washington, May 9 (AP)—The Kennedy administration appears ready to postpone action on major civil rights bills in exchange for a rules revision in this session making it easier to curb Senate filibusters.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said today efforts to revise the rule requiring approval of two-thirds of those voting to limit Senate debate will proceed under an administration package of Civil Rights introduced yesterday.

Clark said he will ask for Senate action on some of his bills. But he conceded he isn't very hopeful of getting it.

Clark succeeded in getting two of his measures assigned to the Senate Labor Committee. Those included a bill requiring "first step compliance" in school desegregation and another to set up a Fair Employment Practices Commission (FEPC).

Washington, May 9 (AP)—Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson took off for Southeast Asia today voicing U.S. concern over "the threat of armed aggression there."

Johnson carried personal letters from President Kennedy to U.S. support to Red-pressed Allies in the Philippines, Formosa, Thailand, India and Pakistan.

Johnson's first stop will be at Hawaii where he gives a speech to the United States is vitally concerned with the peace, security, and independence of the free peoples in Asia.

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NATO Bids Portugal Revise Angola Policy

Olo, Norway, May 9 (AP)—Some of Portugal's NATO allies urged her today to revise her African colonial policy, one of the major sticking points of the alliance.

Portuguese Foreign Minister Henrique Galvão said today that he would not accept the demand to revise her African colonial policy.

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Executed in Bahamas Two Americans Hanged For Death on High Seas

Nassau, Bahamas, May 9 (AP)—Two Americans died on the gallows of Nassau prison today for the murder of a Florida charter boat captain, Alvin Taylor Jr., and Billy Wayne Sees were the first Americans ever executed in the Bahamas.

Taylor, 25, mounted the scaffold at Nassau Prison at 11 a.m. and an hour later, his partner in crime, Sees, 22, was put to death for the slaying of the charter boat captain on the high seas more than a year ago.

Within three minutes after the hangings, each man was pronounced dead. They were to be buried later in the day in a public burial ground.

Each went to the gallows quietly. Taylor and Sees were identified as slaying Capt. Angus Boatwright, 55, Islamorada, Fla., on April 24, 1960, at Elbow Key in the Bahamas.
