Devotees of The Herald's Hebron column have been suffering from familiar restlessness.

"Just ahead of her accident, Miss Pendleton sent in a news column with one of her frequent 'interesting' items. This one showed her reaction to the rigorous weather we had been having and the one-mile round trip to the post office.

"I'm afraid this letter will not be mailed today," she wrote. "Though I'll try for it. I walked to the post office too many times lately."

Miss Pendleton has managed over the years to convey something of herself, her strength of character and her remarkably youthful appearance to a degree that everyone seems to be admiring and envying without ever having met her in person.

One of her trials recently has been the trip to Hebron post office since it was moved. The new location added a mile to the usual walk. At times this writer, the shorter trip to the center of town was bad enough.

On one of those days, she wrote, "I went to the post office this morning and nearly perished. Snow, slippery walks, gusts of wind and cold air at me. I just wished Harry Truman was around. I hear he likes to walk."

A former neighbor of Miss Pendleton, Mrs. Stanley Nygren, reports that Miss Susan may return to her home at Hebron center with a few weeks.

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E. Center St. Residents Split On Residence C Zone Change

Manchester citizens living on E. Center St. last night voted their

pro and con to two Town Planning Commission (TPC) proposals for zone changes along the north side of the street.

The request for a zone change from Residence Zone A to Residence Zone B involves eleven parcels of land fronting on E. Center St. between Walker and Parker Sts.

FINESSES AREN'T ALWAYS FOLIA

By Alfred Sheinwold "Things equal to the same thing are equal to each other. Euclid wrote, more than two thousand years ago. Does this mean that three finesses, each with a 50 per cent chance of success, are equal to each other? Not at all; the fact is that Euclid was not a bridge player."

How should you play to make six hearts? You have finesses in each of the three suits. Which should you try? ...

Consider spades. If you lose the spade finesse back will come a spade, and you'll be no better off than when you started.

Think of diamonds next. If you lose the diamond finesse back will come a spade or a club, and you won't know whether to take a second finesse or play for a good break in diamonds. This is better than the spade situation, but there may be something better still.

What if the club finesse loses you will still develop a sure trick in clubs. That's better than the diamond trick that you may get in diamonds.

This is your guide to the beginning of the play. Draw two trumps and try the club finesse. West wins with the king of clubs and returns a club.

Now you can discard either a spade or a diamond on dummy's jack of clubs. Which? You still don't know whether the spade or the diamond finesse is better to work.

Take the ace and king of diamonds and then discard a diamond on the jack of clubs. Run a third round of diamonds.

If the queen of diamonds has appeared by this time dummy's jack will be good for the twelfth trick.

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Rockville-Vernon Bolton Pupils Question Sent to School Board

The Vernon Board of Education will consider tonight a request from the Bolton Board of Education that Bolton accommodate 70 and even more, Bolton students beginning in the fall of 1962.

The request was mailed to School Superintendent Raymond E. Hamdell last week by Howard J. French, chairman of the facilities committee of Bolton's school board.

Prompted by existing and impending overflows of students, Bolton is asking if Vernon can take between 70 and 75 grade 8 students in the 1962-63 school year.

Further, Bolton is asking if Vernon can accommodate anywhere up to 232 students from grades 7, 8 and 9 in the 1963-64 school year and in subsequent years as well.

On Feb. 20, about 75 per cent of the Bolton electorate turned down by a six to four margin a proposal to draw plans for a new Junior High school.

This, coupled with Manchester's phasing out of its Bolton grade 8 students beginning in 1963, has spurred the request.

Also, Bolton's elementary school is already crowded and the town is utilizing four non-school rooms for the overflow.

George Grant, superintendent of rural education, said classes there are averaging 30 or more students each, more than is considered satisfactory.

The net enrollment in Bolton this year is 811 students. The estimate for next year is 860.

Bolton's school system takes children through grade 8 in 17 standard classrooms in the elementary school, plus two basement rooms in the school building and in two rooms outside the school.

The latter, for kindergarten classes, are in the Bolton Congregational and Methodist Churches.

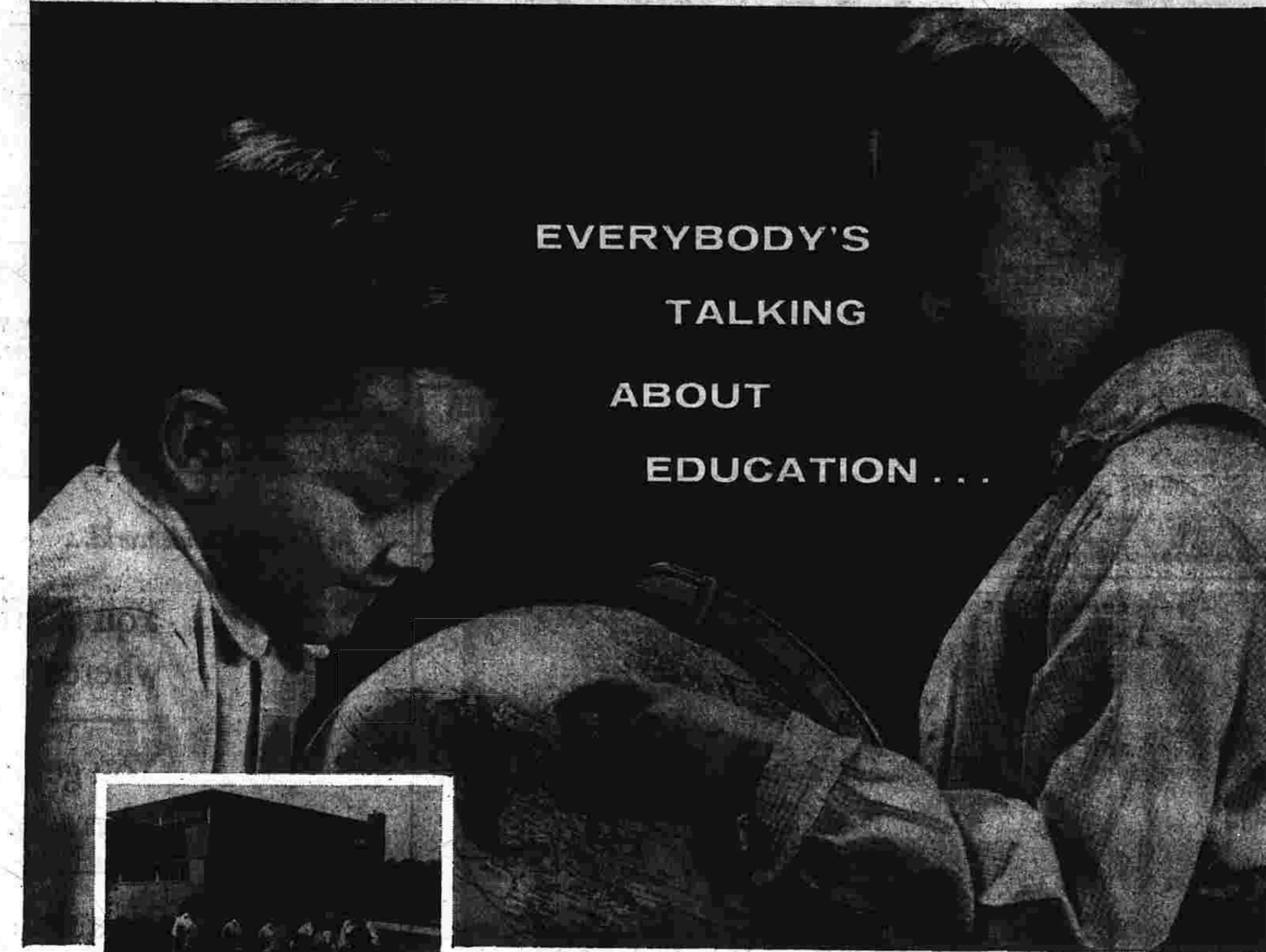

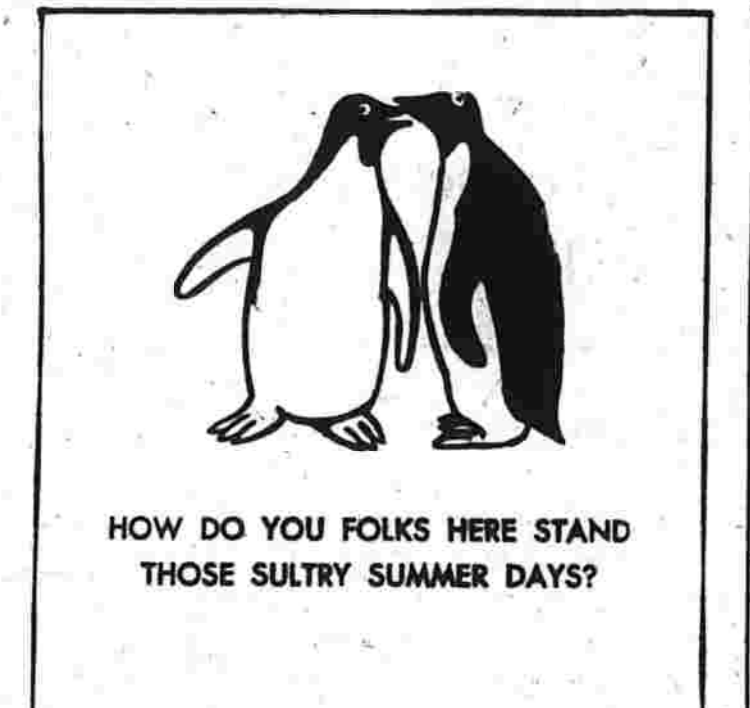

Shea Says Dual Role Blinds Cummings' View

Republican Town Chairman John F. Shea Jr. said this morning that Ted Cummings, Democratic Town Chairman who will become a member of the board of education in November, might bring to that body a disturbing element of partisan politics.

Chairman Shea, in replying to accusations made yesterday by Cummings on the subject of the board of education, said Cummings' position as a newly elected member of the board of education has affected his analysis of the GOP budget.

"One of the elements that has made our school system prosper locally has been the absence of partisan politics on the board of education. I sincerely hope that Cummings' attempt to serve in a dual capacity as chairman and as a member of the board of education will not adversely affect the school system."

In answer to a question Shea said he would not pressure Cummings to resign from the board of education.

"I think that's a question for his own conscience. I think it could be caught in the middle. But I certainly wouldn't take it upon myself to advise him one way or the other."

Cummings yesterday accused the GOP of paying for highway garage and storm drains in 1961-62 with \$200,000 additional money that the state may pay Manchester in 1962-63 to serve as a school bus depot.

Shea said Cummings, "in his desire to serve as spokesman for the board of education he has evidently overlooked the fact that the GOP budget has provided more than \$200,000 for the board of education than last year, to operate the same physical plant with fewer pupils."

Shea said, "No existing services have been cut. No existing services have been added. No existing services have been considered in the budget of the property owner's ability to pay."

Cummings said yesterday the GOP could have provided the same pupil-teacher ratio with the same \$200,000 additional state grant, rather than using the storm drains and the highway garage.

Heading "Dead Horse" Shea replied that the Democratic Party stopped beating the "dead horse" in regard to bonding for storm sewers. Under the Republican plan, more than \$200,000 worth of storm sewers will be in the ground and paid for during the coming year. At this rate, the entire program for which the Democrats wanted to bond a five-year bond issue will be completed and paid for within a couple of years.

"The Republican plan, all interest charges and costs of bonding will be avoided."

This should be positive proof that the Republican Party's policy can and is working."
