

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Stories About Caroline Are Popular Abroad

Part of the reason a correspondent in Washington (NEA)—Caroline Kennedy, the President's lovable little bundle of three-year-old dynamite, is fast becoming an American overseas as she is in the U.S.

Not since Shirley Temple zoomed into international fame a quarter century ago has an American child received so much international coverage in so short a time.

And Caroline is doing it all on her own — no publicity agent!

"We assume that Caroline is warm enough and human enough to export herself," gravely says the U.S. Information Agency, which promotes America overseas.

USA says it has written practically nothing about Caroline.

A Newspaper Enterprise survey of foreign correspondents and embassy press attaches shows that the USA has guessed right.

The chance that the local press corps could have missed an impromptu performance by Caroline is not surprising.

Without any warning, Caroline may tricycle her way into a presidential conference with congressmen, scamper around looking for a lost pet or tell a reporter that her daddy is "just sitting up there with his shoes off doing nothing."

President Kennedy once credited that one of his biggest problems was keeping his daughter from holding press conferences.

Relatively impressed with Caroline's antics, however, is the Washington bureau of TASS, the Soviet news agency.

TASS has filed only three Caroline stories since Kennedy's inauguration. One concerned the alleged Cuban kidnap plot which a TASS reporter says she did not take seriously.

The Soviet reporter agrees that Caroline is a pretty child. But there are pretty children everywhere, he says.

An embassy spokesman explains that Malaysians are "fascinated" by Caroline and enjoy any stories about children. The spokesman believes that news about Caroline reflects her father as being a considerate family man.

Other diplomats also believe that Caroline helps her father's image abroad.


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Under the Shade of the Bowers Tree

The Men Behind Our Men in Space

By RAY CROMLEY, Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Washington (UPI)—The two key men who eventually put a U.S. astronaut into orbit around the earth and the moon are as different as night and day. They differ in man-in-space task force director Robert R. Gilruth would rather tinker with a sticky valve or a balky wiring setup in the engineering shop than administer from an office desk. Rugged, beefy, one-track-minded chief of operations Walter Williams is about, with his short spade and out of his short spade. But when he is at the spot, he sees that the job gets done, who tied together the 100,000 pieces and problems and people. Project Mercury were led by Gilruth and Williams. He works at top speed for days on end without running out of steam and with little visible wearing effect. Until the Shepard flight, he'd had two days off in two years and used one of them to move. Williams likes the direct approach. He's sort of like a bull in a China shop. Over 200 pounds, with close-cropped gray hair, he's the nervous type, always moving around. He dominates almost a conversation he's in. He speaks softly and slowly, but there's never any doubt about where he stands. He makes up his mind quickly, he's very decisive. Williams is single-minded, cool, impersonal. He speaks in plain language. The joke is going around that one Mercury scientist said to another: "With Williams, you always know where you stand." Said the other: "No you never do; he only sees where he's going." Williams is forceful. His idea is to get the job done. He lets nothing stand in his way. He sees what he has to do and goes ahead and does it. He pushes into details, sometimes tends to run every detailed job himself, keeps a lot of things in his mind. He's been on Mercury since mid-1959. Before that he was in charge of the X15 operation. He had been on X15, X23, X24 and X25. He is a top man on that planet. Now he's found the man who says at any one hour and on any one day, whether the Mercury with a man goes up. "That will be a first-flight research rocket," in possibly by the end of 1961, sends a man three times around the world in space and brings him back.



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
