May, Bailey Split Over Expansion of Superior Court

Hartford, June 2 (AP)—The two party chairmen are reported to be in disagreement over proposals to expand the superior court. Chief Justice Raymond E. Baldwin of the State Supreme Court of Errors, the administrator of the Connecticut judicial system, appealed to both chairmen yesterday to agree to an increase in Superior Court judgeships to meet the crowded court calendar.

Kennedy Ends Paris Talks; Khrushchev Enters Vienna

Vienna, June 2 (AP)—Through a gap in the Iron Curtain, Premier Khrushchev entered Austria today and came to Vienna for his week-end conference with President Kennedy, who arrives tomorrow.

U.S., Soviet Chiefs Talk Tomorrow

Vienna, June 2 (AP)—President Kennedy and Premier Khrushchev are expected to begin their talks tomorrow. The Soviet leader said he is here to establish personal contact with Kennedy and to exchange views on the main questions of concern between the Soviet Union and the United States of America.

De Gaulle In Accord On Berlin

Paris, June 2 (AP)—President De Gaulle today ended his 3-day talks with a communiqué confirming agreement on their obligations and responsibilities toward West Berlin. The joint statement issued on the eve of President Kennedy's departure for Vienna and a meeting with Premier Khrushchev, told of a basic agreement between the two world leaders.

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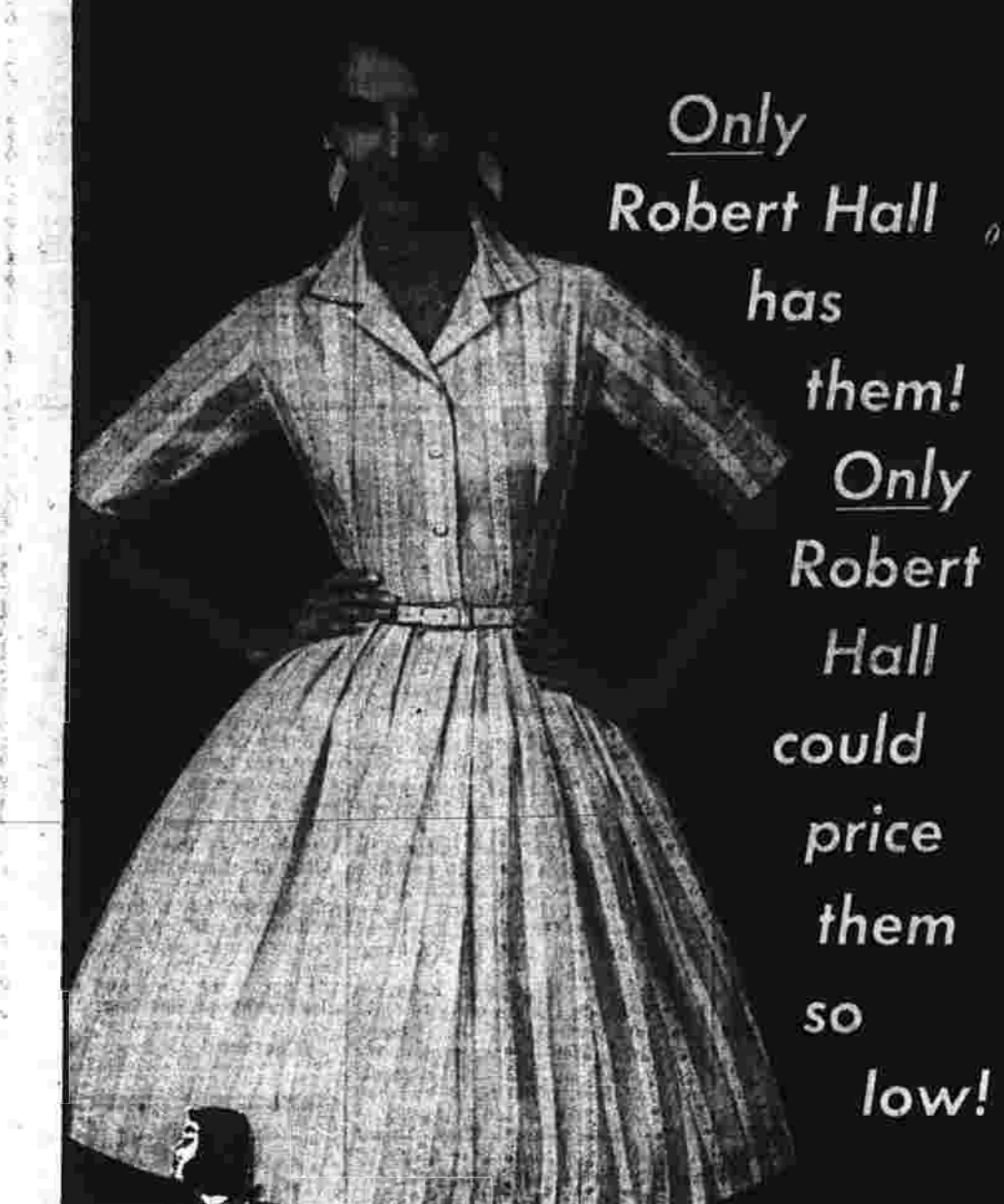

### April Car Deaths At Record 3,050

Chicago, June 2 (AP) — The nation's traffic deaths in April—3,050—was a record high for any April, says the National Safety Council.

The death toll compared to the previous high of 2,970 in April 1956, and was 3 per cent higher than the 2,960 highway deaths in April last year.

The council said traffic fatalities in the first four months this year totaled 10,700, an increase of 1 per cent over the corresponding period in 1960.

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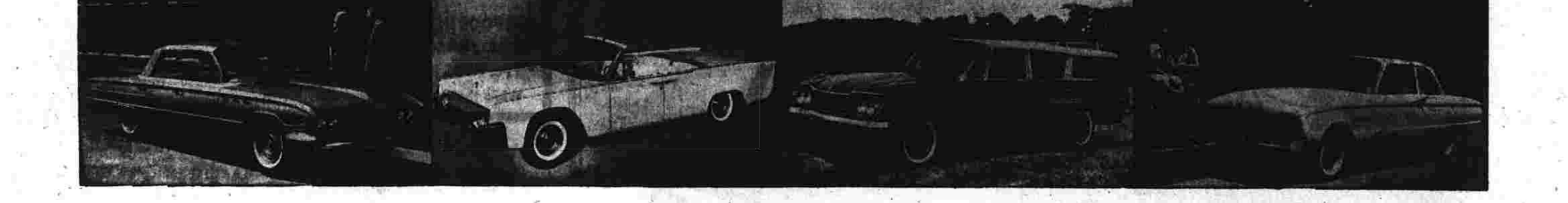

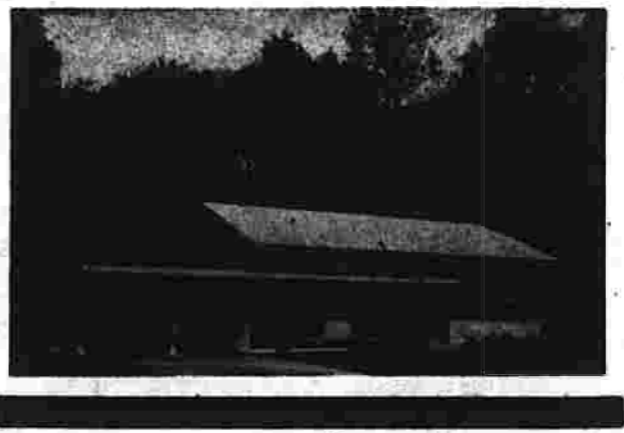

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# U.S., Soviet Chiefs Talk Tomorrow

(Continued from Page One)

with applause among several hundred spectators.

The Soviet leader returned to the country home of his embassy.

Khrushchev came here after talks with Antonin Novotny, Communist chief of Czechoslovakia.

Arriving from Czechoslovakia, Khrushchev's special train passed through a gate in a complex fence of barbed wire stretching along the Czech side of the frontier. The fence is arranged in several rows, with a total depth of about 12 feet. Its main purpose is to keep Czechs from making unauthorized trips.

A pilot train of three coaches, carrying security guards, preceded Khrushchev's train.

The entry was at Marchegg, Austrian police were posted along the 25-mile route to Vienna.

Representatives of President Schenzel were on the frontier, along with Soviet Ambassador Victor I. Arlov.

The Kennedy-Khrushchev talks begin tomorrow and continue Sunday. The Soviet camp seemed guardedly optimistic that some breakthrough might come from them—if Kennedy is prepared to accept, as he has, the Russian viewpoint on world affairs.

Khrushchev was smiling and joking when he arrived at Marchegg.

One member of the Austrian welcoming party, Security Chief Kurt Seidler, looking at the blue skies and said he hoped the weather was a good omen for the 3-man summit.

Khrushchev's train was not only cheering, but a bit reprehensible.

Talking to Russian officials in Vienna, the Soviet Communist party newspaper, which has accumulated during the course of the past year, obviously they had solved immediately, at one meeting.

Yet the peace-loving public hopes that during the course of the forthcoming meeting of the two leading statesmen, the open expression of each other's points of view will be possible, as well as the finding of points of agreement and the making of steps toward a rapprochement.

Unfortunately, "Pravda" continued, "from the other side of the ocean voices are heard which cannot be regarded either as sober or clever."

The Moscow Literary Gazette added that "the political blindness of certain U.S. circles is astounding."

"Without taking reference to reality," said the Literary Gazette, "one of Moscow's deep-thinkers says, 'they advise President Kennedy to continue from a position of strength.'"

It has been made clear in London, Paris, Bonn and elsewhere that the western Allies want Kennedy to be firm on Berlin and to impress on Khrushchev that the western alliance is united and strong. That spirit has been reflected in the talks in Paris between Kennedy and President Charles de Gaulle.

Kennedy arrives tomorrow morning by plane from Paris and the two leaders will meet for lunch at the American ambassador's residence. Their first talk will follow, until late afternoon.

The talks Sunday will be held in the Russian embassy, continuing until two hours before the resident takes off in the late afternoon for London.

But Kennedy indicated his chief purpose in meeting with Khrushchev is to try to avoid the danger of a miscalculation which could lead to war.

"My purpose," he said, "is to permit a much more precise judgment on matters involving the interests of the United States and its Allies and the interests of the Soviet Union and the various countries associated with it. . . .

"It is important that we understand his (Khrushchev's) viewpoint and the implications of it, and it is equally important that he understand ours."

Kennedy said a study of three years ago showed that miscalculation as one of the causes. He evidently regarded it as equally important that the United States, Kennedy declared, "is united in its determination to fulfill its commitments."

And he said his talks with de Gaulle have given him a feeling of confidence and hope.

Asked what he thought of the possibility of establishing normal relations between the West and Red China, he replied, "I think it takes two to make peace. We desire peace and to live in amity with all nations."

But he said Red China has conducted attacks on the United States that were "unmistakable, immediate and in many cases malignant," and he added that he saw no sign of change in this policy.

Kennedy made another appeal, as he has in other public appearances here, for an increased effort by the western European nations in combating poverty in the underdeveloped lands of Asia, Africa and Latin America. In those lands, he said, "liberty is under pressure."

He said he thought Europe should play a large role in Latin America because of long-standing economic and cultural ties.

He praised the policies of Britain and France in liberating their former colonial areas.

"In the last 15 years," he said, "country after country has been set free. This is an extraordinary record for the western world and one that is not met by the East."

In answer to a question, Kennedy said he hoped the Algerian peace talks at Evian-Jean-Beno had a successful outcome.

The Communist delegates at Geneva insist a cease-fire is in force and that the political future of the Southeast Asian kingdom should be discussed.

The talks in Laos are similarly deadlocked, with the Vietnamese government demanding creation of a military commission to assist in enforcing the cease-fire and the other side pressing for formation of a coalition regime.

The general hope on the western side at Geneva is that President Kennedy, at his meeting with Soviet Premier Khrushchev in Vienna this weekend, can get the Russians to modify their stand and that progress then can be made.

The chief negotiator of the nation Geneva conference, U.S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman, flew to Paris today to join the President for the Vienna trip.

His efforts materialized June 7, 1957, when delegates representing these clubs met in Chicago and formed the International Association of Lions Clubs.

In three years there were 133 Lions Clubs with 4,451 members and by 1959 there were 2,330 clubs with 78,863 members.

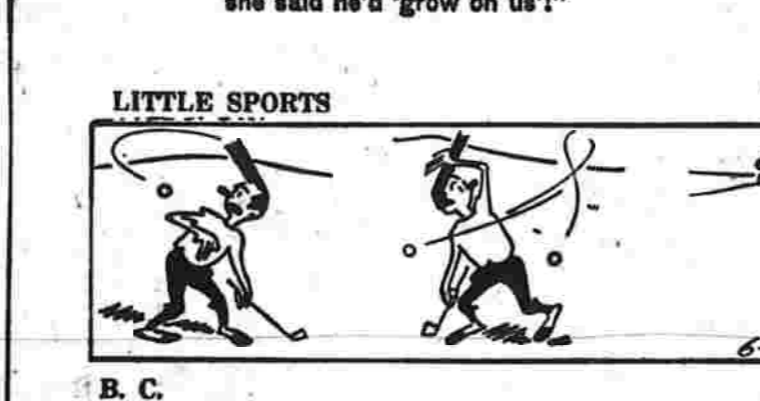

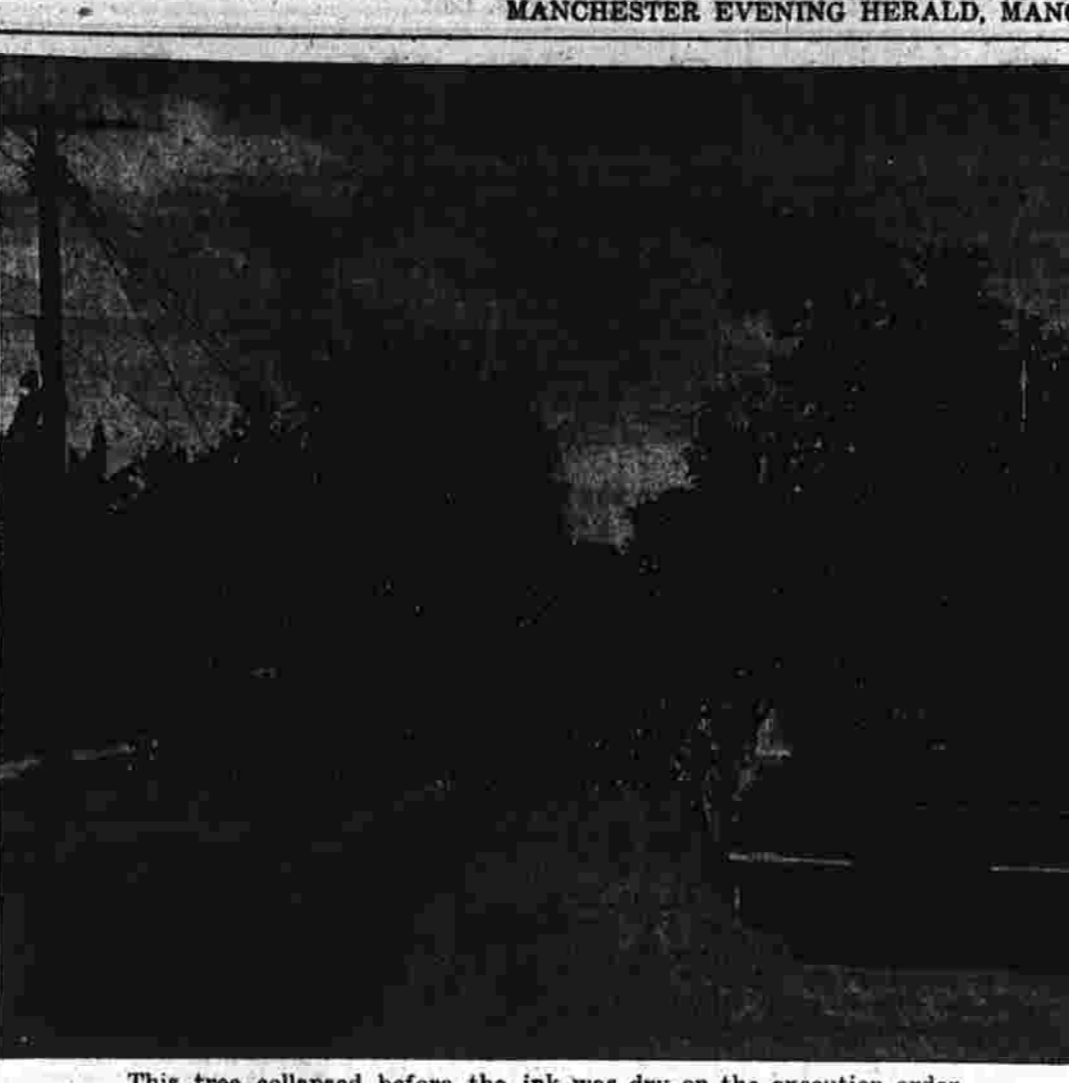

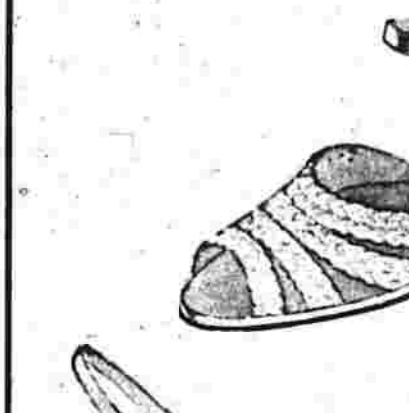
