## Plus \$110,000 Fine

# Goldfine Gets Year and Day

Boston, June 5 (AP)—Industrials Bernard Goldfine was ordered to prison for a year and a day and fined \$110,000 today on charges of income tax evasion.

U.S. District Court Judge George C. Sweeney also placed him on probation for five years.

The judge put Miss Mildred Paperman, Goldfine's secretary on probation for three years on a similar charge.

As a term of their probation, Judge Sweeney ordered Goldfine and Miss Paperman to disclose "all information of whatever character" on cash transactions of Goldfine's Strathmore Woolen Co. and his other textile firms.

He said more than \$600,000 was taken in cash or checks written to cash from Goldfine's firms "and it is the intent of this court to compel disclosure of where this money is and where it went."

Goldfine was indicted for evasion of nearly \$800,000 in personal and corporate income taxes. He pleaded guilty May 15. The judge today refused to allow withdrawal of that plea and to order a new sanity hearing.

Miss Paperman had pleaded guilty to evasion of \$340,000 in corporate income taxes, as chief accounting officer of Strathmore Woolen. She already was fined \$12,500 for evading personal income taxes.

Goldfine, 70, and Miss Paperman, 43, both were ordered to pay all taxes, penalties and interest owed the government.

Goldfine's troubles began in 1958 congressional hearings which revealed his extensive gifts to high government officials.

Miss Paperman was sentenced first. Judge Sweeney gave her an 18-month sentence.

In Power Capability  
New U.S. Rocket Tops Best Shown by Soviet

The term is difficult to define, but there is a rule of thumb which says something like this: "If a rocket is traveling at 360 miles-an-hour, each pound of thrust it produces adds about one horsepower to its strength. How this horsepower affects its range and velocity depends upon the size and weight of the projectile.

But 21 million pounds of thrust, the goal of experimenters here, or even the two million pounds they talk about as being available soon seemingly outclasses anything the Russians have.

There are no reliable figures from behind the Iron Curtain, but engineers at Aerojet General Corp., which produced the new segmented missile, have calculated that the Soviet which put Maj. Yuri Gagarin into orbit may have been an assembly of six rocket motors developing a total thrust of about 1.8 million pounds.

The test rocket differs from that country's biggest rockets in that it uses solid rather than liquid fuel. And solid fuel rockets have one particular disadvantage. They cannot be turned off and on like liquid fuel rockets. But their power can be varied by using fuels that burn at different speeds in a given rocket.

An advantage over liquid fuel assemblies is that their solid fuel, mainly polyurethane plus some secret additives, is cheap (about \$1 a pound) and safe for handling. Another advantage is that they will be made in cylindrical shapes, which will be put into space.

## Dillon Pledges U.S. to Benefit In Aid Projects

Washington, June 5 (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury C. Douglas Dillon promised today that 80 per cent of the economic portion of President Kennedy's \$4.8 billion foreign aid program next year will be spent for U.S. goods and services.

Instead of the program having an adverse impact on the United States balance of payments situation, Dillon told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, this policy will have "an increasingly favorable effect" on it.

Dillon gave full backing to Kennedy's \$5.8 billion program for economic loans abroad as an "essential tool" of American foreign policy. He strongly championed its financing by borrowings from the Treasury.

The Development Loan Program is a key feature of the foreign aid bill. Kennedy is asking authority to

## Smith Act Also Upheld High Court Orders Red Party Register

Washington, June 5 (AP)—The Supreme Court today upheld the government's long effort to compel the Communist party to register as an arm of the Soviet Union.

Such registration was ordered under the Subversive Activities Control Act of 1950, but the case has been tied up for almost 10 years in the courts. The High Tribunal heard arguments on two separate occasions, totaling six hours of legal debate, before today's ruling.

Under the registration law the party can be compelled to divulge its membership lists and finances and label its literature as Communist propaganda.

Justice Frankfurter's majority opinion ran 112 printed pages.

# Kennedy to Give TV-Radio Report on European Talks

## Soviet Chief Holds Hard To Policies

Vienna, June 5 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev stuck to the hard lines of his anti-western policies during his talks here with President Kennedy. But U.S. officials hope that as a result of the Vienna conference, the Soviet leader may yet modify his course.

Kennedy is reported to have told the Soviet leader emphatically that if he forces a showdown over West Berlin, the Allied Powers will defend the city. He warned Khrushchev against miscalculating western intentions.

More broadly Kennedy sought to get across to the Soviet leader that in spite of the recent setbacks in Laos and Cuba, the United States intends to fulfill its defense commitments to other nations around the world. The President left Vienna last night nourishing the hope that Khrushchev will weigh his words carefully.

Khrushchev left Vienna this morning by plane for Moscow, saying as he departed he hoped his talks with Kennedy would help achieve a peaceful settlement of the Cold War through understanding and cooperation.

"The Soviet Union," said Khrushchev in an airport statement, "has always striven to secure lasting peace for the people, to solve disarmament problems as soon as possible and positively, to achieve a peaceful settlement of all international arguments on the basis of negotiations, as well as to establish good relations with all countries."

"But you can only arrive at this through understanding and through cooperation in the interests of removing remnants of conflicts from international life as well as from the life of the world."

"We would like to hope that these talks and meetings which we have had here with President Kennedy of the United States will be the final settlement of the creation of a lasting peace among the states."

Khrushchev rushed home to welcome President Sukarno of Indonesia. The Soviet leader has contracted for more than \$300 million worth of Soviet military aid.

The breakup of the informal summit stands alone as the most significant news item of the week. What kind of an impact did the 44-year-old Kennedy, a newcomer to the White House, make on the Soviet Union's 66-year-old Khrushchev?

## U.S. Plea Stresses Right to Education

Washington, June 5 (AP)—The Justice Department today contended that the right of all American children to have an education is directly related to their subsequent rights as adults to vote.

In a novel court brief, the department asserted that if the necessary schooling is withheld in the formative years, the child may later be unable to meet voting tests laid down by the states.

On these grounds, the department filed a federal district court suit at Baton Rouge, La., that a shut-down of public education in St. Helena Parish (county) would be unconstitutional.

The department said the states have a constitutional duty to operate public schools and cannot abandon the system to avoid racial desegregation.

The brief said Louisiana in common with 18 other states maintains a literacy test for voting, and that such tests have been held valid by the Supreme Court.

"We believe that the imposition of such a requirement as a condition to the exercise of citizenship may well impose a corresponding burden upon the state of Louisiana to furnish its citizens with the means by which the condition can be met," the brief said.

The St. Helena case originated in 1962 on petitions by Negro parents seeking to have their children admitted to the public schools of that parish. The district court early last year ordered the admissions and this was affirmed by the court of appeals at New Orleans. A few days later, the Louisiana legis-

lature passed a law authorizing local school boards to close their schools if a majority of the local electorate approved that course.

The three-judge court is now sitting to determine the validity of that state law. It asked the Justice Department and the attorneys general of all the 50 states as well as the Negro plaintiffs and the St. Helena school board to submit their views.

With the filing of the department brief, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said in a statement: "In America of the 60's, education for all is an absolute necessity."

"The loss of an education to a child in his formative years is an irreparable loss of his dignity as an individual as well as to the resources of the nation. It is a... stunting of a child's growth that should be rectified. It will affect his opportunity for jobs, his access to a better life and even his right to vote."

"To deprive a child of this is to deny him his rights in the most fundamental sense."

## Law Tightens Ban on Bias in Housing, Rents

Hartford, June 5 (AP)—Gov. John N. Dempsey today signed into law a bill tightening provisions of the statute that prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, creed, or color in the sale and rental of housing.

As passed by the 1959 General Assembly, the law was applicable only in instances where a landlord or seller was offering for rent or sale at least five contiguous units of housing. This was reduced to three contiguous units by the bill.

The bill also defines building lots as housing accommodations, thus closing a loophole used by some developers who denied that they were violating the law. They argued that the sale of a lot, even though it was understood a house was to be built on it by the seller, was not covered by the 1959 law.

Another change used by a developer to hold title to a corporate unit, so that they could claim no group of five contiguous units was under single ownership and therefore not covered by the law.

## Macmillan Agrees on West Aims

London, June 5 (AP)—President Kennedy will make a television-radio report to the nation tomorrow night from Washington on his talks with Premier Khrushchev, President De Gaulle and Prime Minister Macmillan.

Pierre Salinger, White House press secretary, announced, Kennedy would go on the air at 7 p.m. (EDT).

The President will speak from his office at the White House. The address will be carried live by all three major television networks and also by radio via the Mutual Broadcasting System.

Kennedy and Macmillan today weighed western strategy in the wake of the Vienna conference, and announced they see eyes to eye in pursuing common policies throughout the world.

Today the President met for four hours with Macmillan, at lunch and in private conversation. This was the winding up of a sort of 4-power summit conference by stages. First Kennedy spent three days with President de Gaulle in Paris, then he was with Soviet Premier Khrushchev for two days of conversations in Vienna. That meeting ended last night with a statement ending hopes of peace in Laos but reporting little concrete progress in other areas.

A statement issued after the Kennedy-Macmillan conference said the two leaders noted with satisfaction the Vienna agreement for an effective cease-fire in Laos. They expressed belief this should lead to progress in the nation Geneva conference on Laos, but such progress was not evident in today's meeting at Geneva. Communist delegates there continued to brush aside any talk of delinquency violations by the Communist side.

DODD TO PROBE TV CRIME  
Washington, June 5 (AP)—A Senate inquiry into any relation between TV crime programs and juvenile delinquency was announced today by Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., chairman of the Senate subcommittee on delinquency, said network executives, producers, directors, writers, critics, pedagogues and others will testify at hearings Thursday and Friday. He said in a statement that since 1948 juvenile crime has increased 177 per cent and that in the same years there has been a corresponding increase in crime and violence-type television shows.

ADENAUER PESSIMISTIC  
Duesseldorf, Germany, June 5 (AP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer warned West Germans today to expect the Kennedy-Khrushchev summit meeting to produce more than "small beginnings of an improvement in international relations." However, he predicted the next four years will see universal controlled disarmament because of announced Soviet recognition of only peace efforts the means to continue the Soviet Union's internal buildup. Adenauer made the statements in an address before 500 members of this country's Roman Catholic Workers Organization.
