ment was over the substantial cuts made in his general fund budget by the Republicans. At that time he said this might force a deficit in excess of \$20 million.

Meanwhile, the Governor has summoned members of his cabinet to a meeting Wednesday morning at 11 for a discussion of legislation enacted by the General Assembly affecting their departments.

He said that he intends to meet individually with the agency heads to discuss specific major legislation which will require big understandings by their departments.

For example, he explained that he plans to confer at length with Highway Commissioner Howard S. Ives about the road reclassification program approved by the legislature. This program involves the swapping of roads between the State Highway Department and the towns.

6 Held in Bombing
Middlebury, June 9 (AP)—The six Thomaston high school seniors said they "just wanted to score" the teacher they didn't like.

And the six seniors were charged yesterday with misconduct. Police said all six admitted hurling a makeshift lead pipe bomb into the yard of the English teacher's home.

The bomb exploded in Mrs. Benzy Davar's yard late Wednesday night. It bounced across the road, hitting the side of another home and causing minor damage. No one was hurt.

Police said the youths, all 17 years of age, told them they were "mad" at their teacher and wanted to frighten her. They were released in the custody of Thomaston High School officials pending a June 19 Circuit Court appearance.

Cadets on Cruise
New London, June 9 (AP)—The U.S. Coast Guard Academy's cadet practice squadron sailed today on a 10-week training cruise that will take it to France, Spain, Portugal and the Azores Islands. The cadets plan to spend 15

days in the ports of Bordeaux, France; Lisbon, Portugal; Cadiz, Spain; and Tenerife, Canary Islands.

The squadron consists of the 2-300-ton training barge *Agate*, the flagship; and two modern Coast Guard cutters, the 211-ton ocean station vessel *Cattle Rock* and *Rockaway*.

The trip will cover 8,164 miles in 83 days at sea. The first port of call will be Bordeaux June 29. The cadets are scheduled to return here Aug. 16.

Extended Forecast
Windsor Locks, June 9 (AP)—The Field issued this extended Conquest forecast today for Saturday, June 10, through Wednesday, June 14.

The inheritance tax bill went into effect immediately upon Dempsey's signature yesterday. The higher levy will apply to the estate of any person who dies from to-day through the end of 1961.

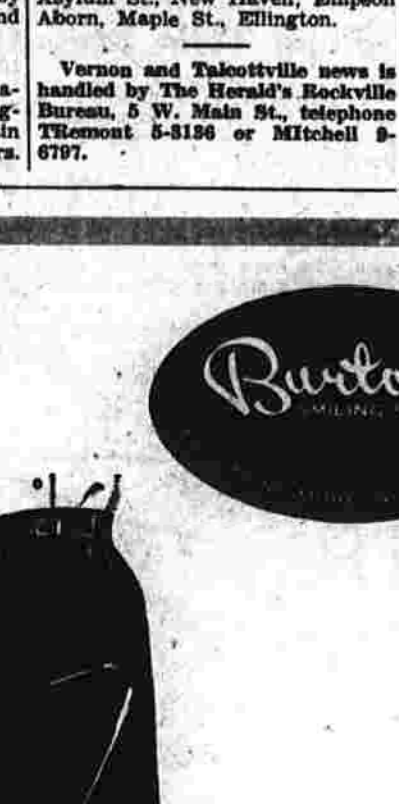

Fabiola Expecting, Pope Tells Press

Vatican City, June 9 (AP)—Pope John XXIII told British newsmen today that Queen Fabiola is expecting a baby.

The Pope gave a special audience for newsmen who came here with the Queen and King Baudouin, who are paying a state visit to the Vatican. The Pope received the royal couple in a state audience yesterday.

Fabiola, 32-year-old daughter of a noble Spanish family, married the 50-year-old Belgian king Dec. 16 in a brilliant ceremony in Brussels. Her pregnancy was first reported without confirmation by a Brussels weekly on May 24. A statement distributed by the Vatican press office said the Pontiff told the Belgian newsmen: "The Queen was very kind because she told us that she is expecting a child."

The Pope said it was traditional for Catholic monarchs to communicate to him "their happiness."

Baudouin and Fabiola are the world's only reigning Roman Catholic monarchs.

Fabiola is the second royal pregnancy of the spring. Princess Margaret of Britain announced on May 25 that she is expecting a baby in the fall.

Informal sources in Brussels said Fabiola's baby also is due in the fall, probably about October.

Kennedy Inherited Multiple Dilemmas

By JAMES MARLOW (AP News Analyst)

Washington, June 9 (AP)—The last half of this century is like living through a perpetual thunderstorm, waiting for the next lightning bolt.

And for President Kennedy, now nearly five months in office, there's been steady rain on the roof with few patches of sunlight.

He's gotten along well with Com-

gress. But he inherited multiple dilemmas overseas and he's solved none of them.

It is difficult now to point to a single achievement in his foreign affairs unless perhaps in establishing better relations with the European Allies.

Take a look:

1. He inherited the problem of Fidel Castro's Cuba—a constant trouble spot for the United States.
2. Kennedy approved the robot invasion against Castro. It ended in disaster. And, just because of it and because the United States lost prestige and is unlikely to try rough stuff again soon, Castro looks more solid than ever.
3. Kennedy inherited the dilemma of Laos where the Communist supported Pathet Lao forces were slowly taking over the country. They stepped up their pace since Kennedy took office and he has found no way to stop them.
4. He hoped through a conference of Laos where the Communist government is supported and supplied by the United States, Communist guerrillas from North Viet Nam are putting the southern government in increasing jeopardy by stepping up their warfare.
5. In South Viet Nam, where the government is supported and supplied by the United States, Communist guerrillas from North Viet Nam are putting the southern government in increasing jeopardy by stepping up their warfare.
6. In South Korea, where the United States supported and supplied the civilian government which it seemed to think was doing all right, Korean military leaders threw out the civilians and took over.
7. One of their main excuses: To wipe out "corruption." The net result, even though the new Korean military rules express friendship for the United States, is an end to democratic government.
8. In the Middle East, Iran right next door to Russia but helped by the United States, looks more wobbly than ever. Here, too, there was a government shake-up to end corruption.
9. Kennedy told congressional leaders that Khrushchev predicted to him that Khrushchev was led to the

Kennedy is 44 now. There is thunder on all his horizons. Communism is cocky, confident, pushing. There's no let-up in sight anywhere. Kennedy has a remarkable head of hair. There should be a lot of gray in it before his first term ends.

Bonn Labels Soviet Protests Artificial

Germany of causing tensions in the divided city.

The real reason for the Soviet protests, Eckhardt said, is to build up a record that will be used eventually to back up Khrushchev's claim that the 4-power status of Berlin has to end.

The comment of the British Foreign Office spokesman was: "Bundesrat committees and other federal parliamentary bodies have often met in Berlin in the past without protest from the Soviet Union." He then referred to an earlier British statement which said:

"Her Majesty's government has been scrupulous in its concern for the maintenance of the special status of Berlin, a status which they wish to note in connection with the 4-power status of the city. For their part, Her Majesty's government will continue to act in accordance with the principle of four power responsibility for Greater Berlin."

Allied officials here shrugged off the Russian charges as part of a continuous Soviet propaganda war against Berlin, but they did not deny that the Soviet Union is in the West.

Only last weekend, Premier Khrushchev told President Kennedy in Vienna that West Berlin is a bone that must come out of the Soviet throat. The President rejected the West Berlin threat to be in Berlin and intended to stay there.

The latest Soviet complaint was to notes handed the American, French and British embassies in Moscow. It was made public by the New York Agency.

Moscow Radio, in a companion broadcast, charged West Germany with the support of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, was trying to undermine the results of the Kennedy-Khrushchev meeting.

The Soviet Agency Ministry statement protested meetings now being held in West Berlin by committees of the West German Bundestag, the lower house of parliament, and also announced plans to hold a symbolic Bundestag session in the Allied-occupied half of the Communist-surrounded city.

The committees meeting this week in West Berlin are concerned with health, family, youth, internal affairs and rehabilitation of West victims.

Plans for a full session of the Bundestag in Berlin have been hanging in the air since last year. Such sessions formerly were held fairly regularly as a demonstration to the East Germans under Communist rule and a reminder that West Germany wanted Berlin as the capital of a reunited Germany.

But since the Russians have been putting pressure on the city, the Bonn legislators have hesitated to do anything that might stir up trouble.

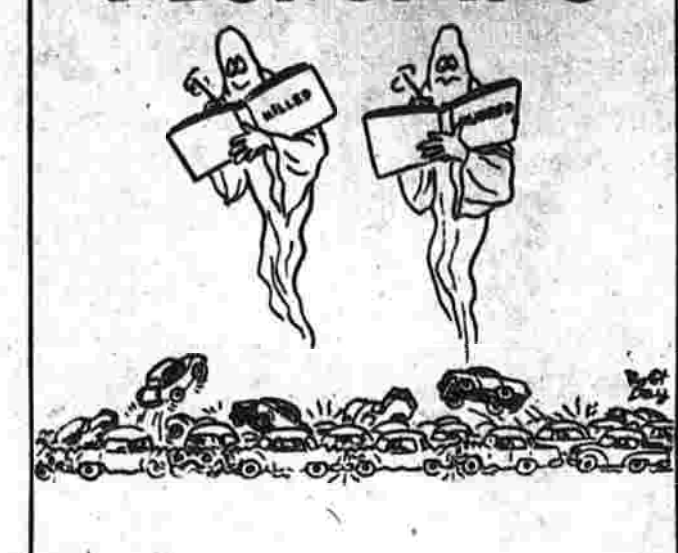

might indicate complacency on the city's part.

"It is inappropriate for us to set as if the difficulties in our situation do not exist," Brandt said. At the same time, he predicted those difficulties would be overcome, while describing them as "very, very hard, unusually hard."

The West Berlin mayor complimented President Kennedy for giving a sober picture of the situation.

"The American President," Brandt said, "has explained that he is prepared to defend western rights in Berlin at any risk. This clear resolve will, we all hope, deter the Soviet Union from false conclusions concerning all West German government in Berlin."

Brandt called "altogether astonishing" those divided-joint parliamentary meetings this month in the city. He said similar meetings had been held in the past without producing such a reaction on the part of the Russians.

Brandt declined to speculate on whether Khrushchev could carry through the threat he made at Vienna to conclude a separate peace treaty this year with East Germany.

At later news conference, West German government spokesman Walter von Rohdardt took issue with Brandt, saying Adenauer had not meant the measuring of views that might hurt the cause of the West.

Brandt had only meant to indicate that prospects might be better "in view of the very clear and realistic exchange of views that took place in Vienna."

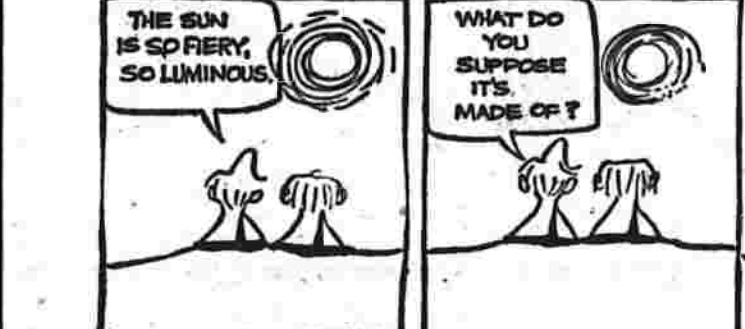

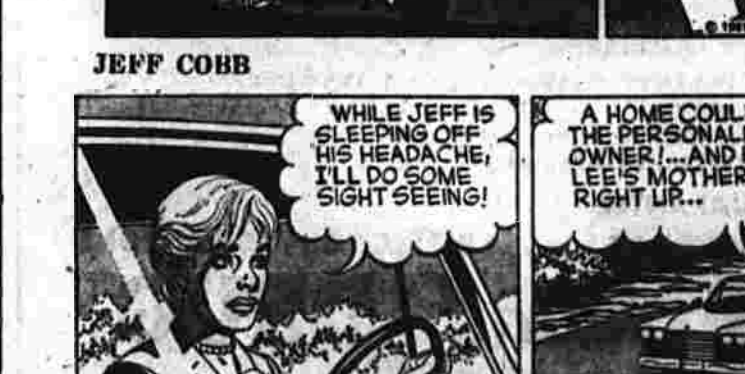
