State Ready To Move 14 Acres Junk

Southington, June 14 (P)—The state has evicted Joseph Francis from his junkyard so that they can remove 14 acres of junk. The junk, the state complained, has blocked the completion of Interstate Highway 84. Highway officials said they have had to construct the highway up to the edge of the junkyard, and continue construction on the other side. The state paid Francis \$93,700 for the property. Francis has refused to remove the junk for several reasons: He says moving is too expensive, the state should pay him for moving, he can't find a spot to relocate and the state did not pay him enough for the land they want. He has estimated it would cost him \$150,000 to move the junk. Francis, a junk dealer for 20 years, has an additional 21 acres adjoining the disputed property. But he says he cannot find any room there for the junk because the other lot is so full.

Heated Pads, Sound Tried on President

Washington, June 14 (P)—President Kennedy is getting a combination of old and new treatments for his back ailment—hot pads and ultrasounds. The ultrasounds—using high frequency sound waves—a method of applying heat to deep-seated tissues. It is the latest treatment in a regimen including rest and swimming prescribed by White House physician Dr. Janet Travell who reported yesterday that Kennedy "continued to improve." He's still using crutches. Today, the President underwent a busy schedule—a late afternoon conference with top advisers on the North Atlantic Treaty Alliance after visits from a Vietnamese official, a group of Guyanese parliamentarians and a Michigan delegation concerned with that state's economic problems. Reporters had a heated session.

Classic Thriller Plot

Blonde Polish Spy Lured Father of 4

By W. B. RAGDALE JR. Washington, June 14 (P)—Overtones of a classic spy thriller, cloak and dagger of an American foreign service officer charged with giving U.S. secrets to Communist Poland. A blonde Polish spy was reported to have lured Irvin Chambers Scarbeck, 41-year-old bespectacled father of four, into turning over classified information to Communist agents while he served in the U.S. embassy in Warsaw. Scarbeck was held in jail after the case was set at \$50,000. He was arrested yesterday by FBI agents on a Washington street. The complaint filed by the Justice Department yesterday before U.S. Commissioner Sam Wirtick said Scarbeck admitted communicating to Polish agents information that was classified "as affecting the security of the United States." The State Department, citing his "service, loyalty and devotion to duty," had given him a meritorious award in 1957 while supervising the de-Ban Franck exchange program in San Francisco offices. Sen. J. William Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, told reporters "I understand the root of the trouble was a woman. It was an infatuation. A Polish blonde seduced him and blackmailed him." Scarbeck, 34, had received \$2,000 marks (\$2,500) for supplying the East Germans with over 20,000 micro-photocopies of U.S. Army manuals. N-Testing Urged in Congress

Washington, June 14 (P)—The chairman of the Joint Congressional Atomic Committee said today the United States should get ready to resume underground nuclear testing while continuing negotiations with the Russians. Rep. Chet Holifield, D-Calif., said in a speech prepared for House delivery that Moscow's unyielding attitude on test ban controls demands a reappraisal of American policy and action based on the assumption that the Soviets "have tested, or will test, if they think they can get away with it." On the other side of the Capitol, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said in a speech to the Senate. "The moratorium was wrong because we were staking our security as a nation on the preparation of an agreement that an organization of conspirators and murderers and liars, which would be virtually every agreement into which it has entered, would for some strange reason respect its commitment to a reciprocal moratorium." Unofficial estimates set the damage to the hotel at \$150,000. The hotel, known as the South Norfolk Hotel, was owned by Dr. Travell's father, David Goodnow. It was believed to be unoccupied when the fire broke out.

Examiner Says PWA Illegal in Club 9 Pin Ban

Hartford, June 14 (P)—A trial examiner for the National Labor Relations Board held today that Pratt & Whitney Aircraft in East Hartford violated labor law when it prohibited the wearing of "Club Nine" pins by ex-strikers returning to their jobs last year. Examiner Robert E. Mullin found, then, that the United Aircraft Division also committed an unfair labor practice in suspending Bernard MacKay for refusing to take off such a pin. The AFL-CIO Machinists Union made the pins available for \$1 each to employees who refused to cross picket lines during a 9-month strike, from June 9 until Aug. 11, 1958. Mullin recommended that the board order Pratt & Whitney Aircraft to cease "intimidating... suspension for wearing Club Nine insignia while at work and to reimburse MacKay for any loss of earnings resulting from his "discriminatory" suspension last Oct. 28. Charges were brought against the company by Lodge 1748 of District Lodge 91 of the Machinists, representing some 17,000 employees at the East Hartford plant. Pratt & Whitney maintained its pin ban was a "reasonable exercise" of its managerial discretion in acting to "restrain reasonably anticipated violence or disruption" after the bitter strike. Mullin seemed to agree that the company's fear was warranted but concluded that under a board rule often explained, he had to rule against Pratt & Whitney.

Karlsruhe, Germany, June 14 (P)—A German employed in the U.S. Army Library at Frankfurt was sentenced today to three years in prison on charges of spying on U.S. forces for the East German Intelligence Service. The West German Federal Supreme Court found that Kurt Roshitz, 34, had received \$2,000 marks (\$2,500) for supplying the East Germans with over 20,000 micro-photocopies of U.S. Army manuals. Havana, June 14 (P)—U. S. Sen. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Walter P. Reuther and Dr. Milton Eisenhower today called for an exchange of prisoners for tractors. Santiago Reds Attack U.S. as Adlai Arrives

Santiago, Chile, June 14 (P)—Chilean Communists unleashed a bitter attack on the United States today as Adlai E. Stevenson commended high government officials for their support of the Latin American living standards. Following up the smashing of windows in the U.S. Information Agency by a handful of Leftist demonstrators, the Communist newspaper El Siglo called for more demonstrations and demanded that President Kennedy's special representative go home. El Siglo said Stevenson was one of the authors of the ill-fated April invasion of Cuba. It carried front page story and pictures of the Santiago demonstrators as well as the editorial attacking Stevenson. The most hostile incident was far of Stevenson's South American tour, about 20 demonstrators paraded through the streets of Santiago, chanting "Cuba Si, Yankee No" and other slogans. They also carried a banner that said "Stevenson, you are a traitor." The lone policeman on duty arrested one demonstrator, but the rest escaped, leaving behind a banner saying "Go Home Stevenson."

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Step Seen As Bar to N-Conflict

Washington, June 14 (P)—Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., suggested today establishment of an international-protected "Free City" of Berlin to avert an East-West nuclear clash. Mansfield said that if the world must live indefinitely with a divided Germany, peace itself requires that "Berlin—all Berlin—be held in peace and trust until the day of unification." He said that the way to peace cannot be found either in Soviet premier Khrushchev's proposal to turn only U.S.-supported West Berlin into a free city or in the West's insistence on a status quo in Berlin until Germany is reunited. "Berlin is the lever which may lean Europe towards a more durable security or push the western nations and the Soviet Union into a new variety of irrationality at whose center lies the graveyard of humanity," Mansfield said in an address before the Senate.

Prisoners-Tractors Power Failure Creates Chaos in Manhattan

New York, June 14 (P)—The second massive power failure here in less than two years threw three square miles of Midtown Manhattan into a 4 1/2-hour chaos involving millions yesterday. It was the hottest June 14 in the city's history. From skyscraper peak to subway station bottom and in-between, citizens of this always cramped metropolis were marled in the vivid example of electricity's value in modern man. 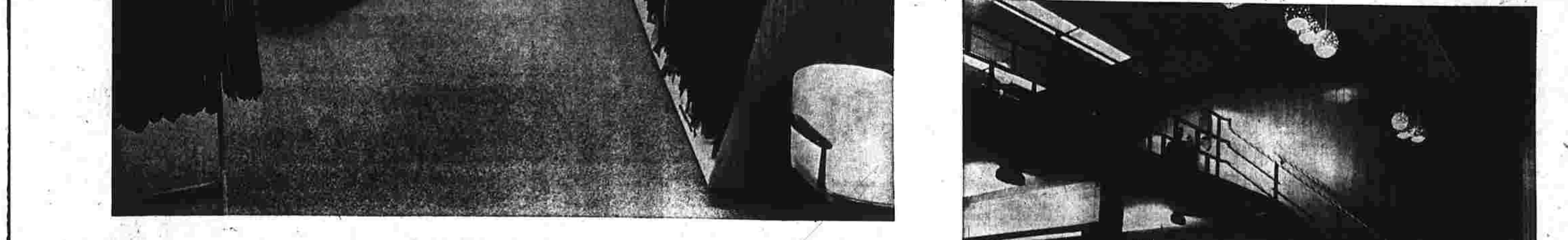

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The View: When you ventured out from beneath double blankets and went downstairs past the thermostat...

Before you had breakfast, you headed up and went outside to see if the car would start. You glanced at the outside thermometer. It would be registering 15 or 20 below zero.

You do not have to "initiate the action." If we do, that will be where the responsibility does lie. The only clear and sure way to put the responsibility upon the Russians is to let them make the first nuclear explosion.

When they originally announced their own unilateral cessation of testing, world opinion more or less compelled the United States to join that voluntary test ban.

There have been relatively few instances, throughout the cold war, when either the United States or Russia has been able to push the other around. In each of these instances, the one able to do some pushing has obtained its power by identifying itself with some proposition of common or principle which is demonstrably for the good of all humanity.

Let us ask ourselves, finally, what Russia seems to be hoping from its present conduct at Geneva. Is it not hoping that we will pack up and go home and set off a few blasts?

Let us continue, for our part, to show some decent respect for the health and hope of humanity, even when the Russians do tempt us to be the first to break the ban.

MacArthur—1945, 1950, 1961: For a second conspicuous time in his career, General Douglas MacArthur has pronounced the doom of the institution to which he has given his professional life.

On one of the decks of the Missouri, receiving the surrender of the Japanese Empire, he proclaimed that civilization, to survive, must rid itself of the illusion that there could be any such thing as a victory in the kind of war man had now learned to wage.

Five years later, he was again a commander in the field, as head of the UN forces in Korea, and himself became, with his search for a total victory over the Chinese, a victim of the illusion he himself had defined on the decks of the Missouri.

The other day, at commencement at Michigan State University, General MacArthur returned to his theme on the deck of the Missouri.

"It may take," he said, "another cataclysm of destruction to prove that further evolution of civilization cannot take place until global war is abolished. . . . No longer can it be a successful weapon of international adventure. If you lose, you are annihilated. If you win, you stand only in loss. No longer does it possess even the chance of a winner of the duel. It contains now only the germs of its own destruction."

This, the MacArthur of 1961, was essentially the MacArthur of 1945. But, once again, the MacArthur of 1961 was pronounced, reading his special vote. He went on, in this same speech, to lament the fact that he had not been allowed to press for his total victory in Korea.

And, as may be noted in the opening sentence we quoted, the MacArthur does something he did not do in 1945. On both occasions, he defied war as the inevitable, the "double outside," as something that may have to happen, once more, just to prove its own point.

Well, we are not seeking to impose upon General MacArthur a consistency greater than that of the rest of the world. Is not all of civilization agreed that new war would be mutual destruction and the end of civilization, and is it not, regardless, behaving as if it considered such war a practical possibility?

Katmandu, Nepal, June 14 (AP)—Sir Edmund Hillary is walking back to Katmandu, under doctor's orders never to return to the extreme Himalayan heights where he won fame.

Hillary is returning from a 8-month expedition in the area near Mt. Everest, the world's highest peak, which he and Tenzing Norgay conquered in 1953.

Hillary suffered a mild cerebral stroke last month while in camp at 19,000 feet on Mt. Makalu. Doctors with the party, which had tried unsuccessfully to climb the 27,900-foot peak, advised oxygen equipment sent Hillary to a lower elevation.

The report concludes with the statement that "there are no health benefits to be obtained by adding sea water to the diet."

Your Pocketbook

By FAYE HENLE

Understand Every Detail Before Signing Any Papers

You often have been warned never to sign anything that you do not completely understand.

Yet how can you and I as laymen completely understand the "fine print" in our wills or insurance policies?

In all this legalistic jargon necessary to protect your interests, it is all too easy to sign away your rights and money without understanding what you are doing.

Both lawyers who draw wills and men who write insurance policies are aware of this problem and make every effort to make sure that they are dealing with a more sophisticated client than was he or she when they were first asked to satisfy this client's needs.

Author and lecturer Earl S. MacNeill says definite attempts constantly are being made to overcome the barrier of legalese, to eliminate unnecessary provisions, to make forms more understandable. He admits that wills can be made simpler.

But when you get to that portion of the will dealing with legal powers, MacNeill says, it is for your own good that those powers be included in language more understandable. As examples, he cites:

Right statutes dealing with the handling of money for minors which unless specifically spelled out might involve the appointment of legal guardians causing expense and possible undue complexity.

Powers drawn to apply to money for the use of a beneficiary instead of for use by the beneficiary. The distinction is especially important in the event that the beneficiary might be too young, or too old, to handle his or her own funds.

The same aim: Protection for beneficiaries is cited by experts at the Institute of Living of Hartford as the reason for the verbosity in insurance policies.

I actually counted the words in two policies: 7,421 in the first, 7,710 in the second. One of these policies dealt with a retirement plan. The second involved the matter of college funds for very young children.

In either case, carrying out provisions of those policies could well fall into the hands of well-intentioned executors totally unknown to the person buying the policy and to the person who wrote the policies.

If we want 100 per cent certainty that those policies are going to fulfill the intended goal, there must be certainty there are no doubts in the minds of future administrators.

Every phrase in such contracts, I am assured, represents the best effort of trained legal experts who have studied court records, state rulings and related subjects to make certain the language will not run counter to regulations or be open to varying interpretation.

Because of complex tax rulings, because of the greater amount of work as an individual now controls, because of the many new uses for insurance contracts, it becomes very clear that we should not even try to interpret the documents we sign by ourselves. But understand them we must. Get your lawyer or your insurance agent in spell out exactly what it is you are asked to sign.
