Husband, 21, Denies Charge of Plotting His Wife's Murder

Bristol, June 20 (AP)—A 21-year-old husband of 26 months today pleaded innocent to a charge of conspiracy in an alleged plot to kill his wife.

The husband, Alfred Furari, made the plea before Judge John C. Cohen in Circuit Court.

Deep Discord Perils Plan for Laos Coalition

Geneva, June 20 (AP)—The United States today announced it will take its military advisers out of Laos. Communist advisers also would have to pull out under the American plan for turning the divided Southeast Asian kingdom into a neutral nation.

The U.S. offer was made to the 14-nation conference on Geneva, Switzerland, June 20.

Zurich, Switzerland, June 20 (AP)—The three Laotian princes interrupted their conference today because one of them was ill, but their chief aides met in an effort to iron out some of the differences between the warring factions.

A spokesman said Prince Norodom Sihanouk, who had been expelled from Laos, had a "slight indisposition" but was expected to be recovered by tomorrow.

The working committee that met here today was made up of Quinlan, Phnom Penh, Phnom Vongvichit, of the pro-Communist Pathet Lao rebels.

Pro-western Laotians expressed doubt that the conference would be able to agree on a coalition government for their lifeless nation.

The disagreement is very deep, said a spokesman from the Vietnamese group. "I don't have much hope of success if the talks break down, war will start again in Laos."

The working committee discussed a 5-point program including formation of a neutral government, disengagement of the 14-nation conference on Laos in Geneva.

Other points on the agenda were new elections for the national assembly in Laos, the withdrawal of the cease-fire, questions connected with economic aid and freedom for political prisoners.

The program was submitted to the U.S. Supreme Court today.

Six Teenagers Fined for 'Fun' Bomb Incident

Middlebury, June 20 (AP)—Six Thomaston teenagers have been fined for igniting a pipe section filled with explosives on the lawn of their departing teacher.

The teenagers, told Circuit Court Judge Michael A. Ciano yesterday, the entire incident was thought up in the spirit of good fun.

One was injured when the pipe section exploded June 7 outside of the Thomaston High School. Several days had passed before the teenagers announced their intentions of resigning for a new teacher.

The six youths, all seniors at the school, were fined for possession of illegal transportation of explosives and use of explosives.

They were Thomas Dalley, fined \$20; Robert Young, \$20; John Rodick, \$20; Charles Desjardins, \$10; John Saugter, \$10; and Thomas W. Ciano, \$10.

John Ciano said the difference in fines represented the degree each youth played in the incident.

Eichmann on Stand, Airs Kidnap Charge

Denies He Could Cut Slaughter

Jerusalem, June 20 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann swore under oath today he never realized why the Nazi party intended to do to the Jews when he joined it in 1932.

By the time the extermination plan unfolded, Eichmann said, he was powerless to influence it.

The former Gestapo officer, accused of a key role in the Nazi extermination of six million Jews during World War II, took the stand in his own defense today morning after hearing 10 weeks of prosecution evidence against him.

Eichmann, now 55 and wearing horn-rimmed glasses, appeared nervous as he testified. He said he was not a Jew and that he was not a member of the Nazi party.

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Study Credit Policy Sought For Teachers

Refusal to reclassify two teachers in the education pay scale because of the broad nature of their advanced studies last night led the board of education to ask the credit evaluation committee to set up more definite rules for reclassification.

Board member William E. Buckley reviewed the requests by the teachers to the committee that they be reclassified on the pay scale because they had completed studies in several courses since receiving college degrees.

The board approved two other requests by Mark Kristoff and George Dougherty for reclassification. The two, the board decided, should be placed in the same grade as their teaching posts.

Buckley said in the past the committee "varied to a certain extent" its qualifications for reclassification and had "driven any hard and fast rules."

He said requirements had not been "fixed to a certain field as long as a definite connection to the teaching assignment was maintained."

Buckley added that the committee had approved advanced work, including travel and employment related to the teaching assignment, and had "driven any hard and fast rules."

Their suits contended the Connecticut law deprived them of constitutional freedoms essential to their lives and well-being.

Three of the four dissenters—Justice John M. Harlan, Hugo L. Black and William O. Douglas—said they thought the laws were unconstitutional and should be passed upon.

Chief Justice Earl Warren and Justice Tom Clark and Charles E. Whittaker concurred in Frankfurter's opinion.

Justice William Brennan, who provided the fifth vote for the majority, said in a separate opinion that the laws were unconstitutional and should be passed upon.

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Connecticut Yankee

At eight minutes before midnight, the night of June 5, in the procedure of the House of Representatives, the redoubtable lobby...

They say that, because we have not had a chance to go ahead of us, we should not be surprised if the Russians are not so well ahead of the Russians.

We find this kind of argument shallow and insignificant, which is why we find it so amusing.

In addition to warning the President against giving the Russians a chance to catch up to us, the Times also warns him that we might as well be handing Russia, if we were the ones to resume testing.

That makes more sense and carries more weight. But the main question is one which is factually moral. We bound ourselves to the atom, with thoughts of guilt at Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The other Connecticut decision of the day was a decision not to rule on the constitutionality of the Connecticut birth control statute.

Down in New York City not long ago, one couple entertained another at dinner. They had been friendly for 10 years, and when the hostess went out into the kitchen to carve the turkey, the guests went with her, and sat down at the kitchen table where the carving was being done.

In any case, the hostess defendant argues, it is well settled in New York that a woman in a mere licensee who must take the premises as he finds them and to whom the host owes only the duty to avoid the maintenance of traps or dangerous defects known to the host and not likely to be discovered by the guest.

All these niceties of the law and of etiquette will be expounded more fully when and where the negligence action comes to trial.

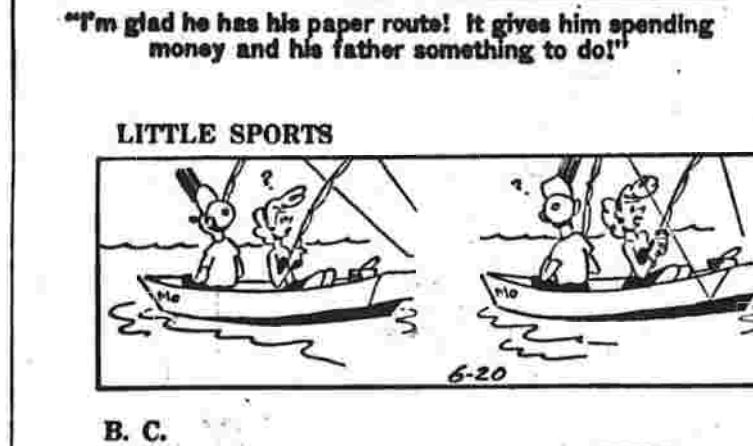
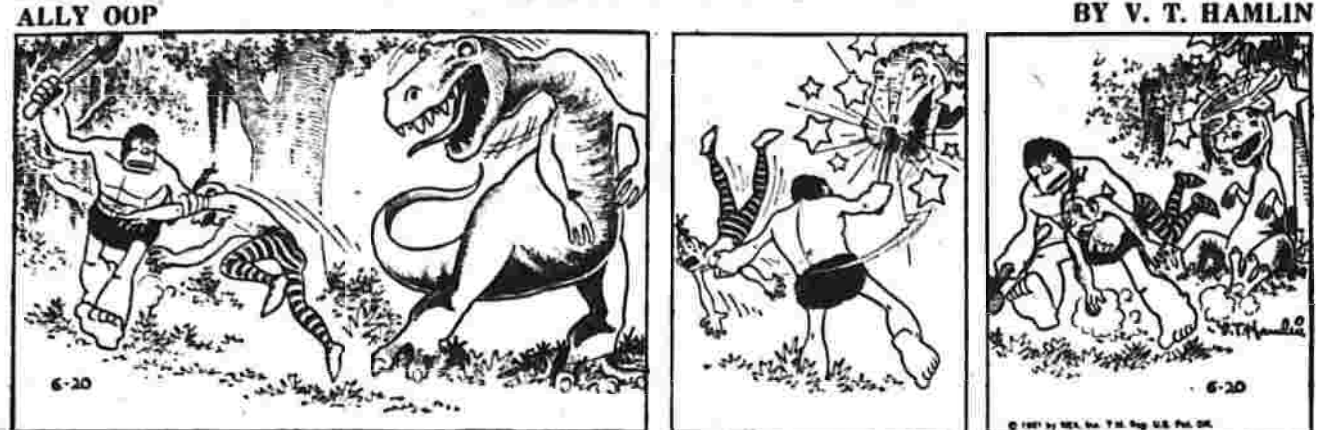

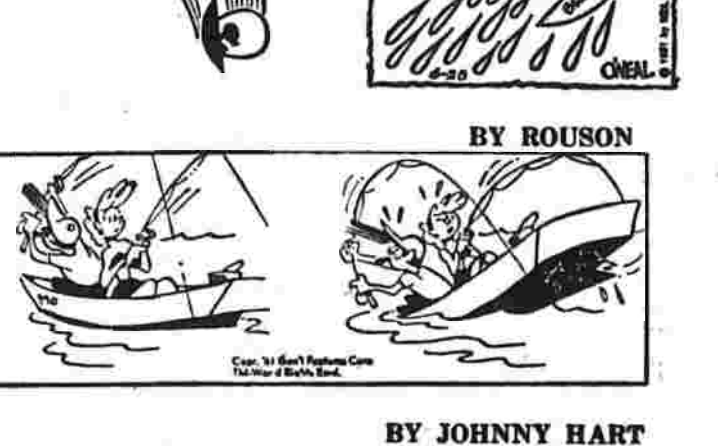

Baseball Bonus System Plain 'Suicide'

Quinn Knocks Big Payments To Youngsters

Philadelphia, June 20 (AP)—General Manager John Quinn of the Philadelphia Phillies says major league baseball is committing "suicide" by paying huge bonuses to youngsters fresh out of high school. As a solution, he suggests a free agent draft.

Quinn indicated the Phillies might sponsor legislation for such a draft when the major league hold their annual meetings late this month.

"The whole situation has gotten out of hand," Quinn said yesterday in an interview. "We have been solving the problem with the rule that made any first-year player not brought up to the big league club eligible for the draft after the first season. But that obviously hasn't had any appreciable effect."

"The quicker we get around to adopting a draft such as pro football uses, the better it will be for baseball. The draft idea is nothing new. It's been proposed for baseball before, but it's never been adopted."

Under the draft system, names of all the outstanding in the league prospects graduating from high school and program up a hopper and clubs would take turns selecting with the last place club on each league getting first pick. The other clubs would follow in order of standing in the league at the time of the draft. Individual negotiations or a set figure would determine the bonus each prospect would get.

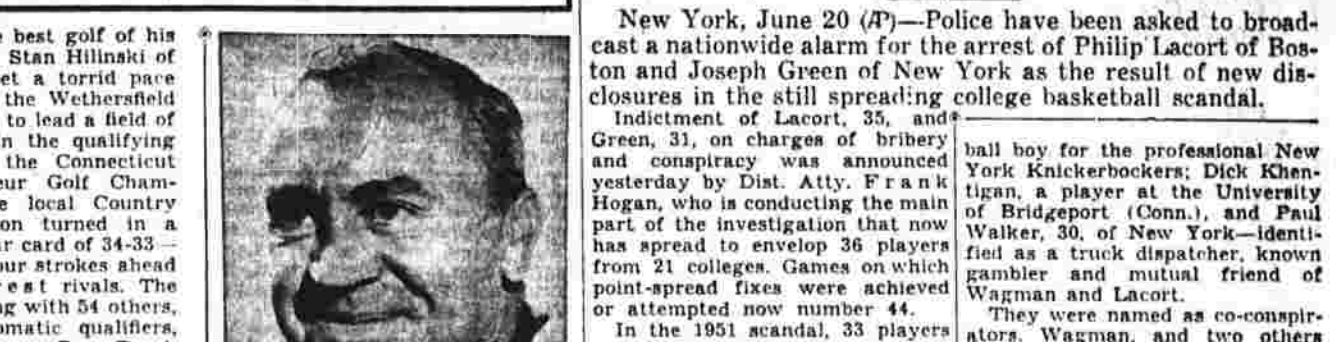
