### Rockville-Vernon Second Consolidation Defeat Generates Strong Reaction

Reaction was strong in Vernon today in the wake of consolidation's second defeat in the space of a year yesterday.

Proponents of the charter and consolidation measure said largely they were highly discouraged at the results and expect increased tension and dismay in the town.

The charter was defeated in the Vernon Fire District by a vote of 766 to 671, as about 40 per cent of the district voters turned out.

Meanwhile, voters in the city of Rockville approved consolidation by a supporting majority of 1,246 votes as 1,433 voted in favor and 187 against it.

On a townwide basis, the majority favored consolidation 2,104 to 872.

Last year, consolidation was defeated in the district by a vote of 383 Rockville voters passed it 833 to 662.

Although officials of Vernon's three governments registered reactions ranging from disapproval and anger, the most articulate reaction came from Atty. Herbert Hamanbury, a fire district resident, who said he was "back at the same stand" immediately and will start a new push for consolidation.

Donald B. Lovrin, chairman of the city's official Charter Commission, said he was not disappointed in the result, but he said he did not feel that the consolidation measure was "a loss for the city."

### Senate Backs Increases in Social Security

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### Deaths Last Night

New York—Frederick F. Greenman, 68, national president of the American Jewish Committee and honorary president of the New York Federation of Reform Synagogues, died yesterday.

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Town Youth Bicycling to West Coast

By F. J. REINER Robert Donahue, 23 son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Donahue of 30 Cooper Hill St., is on a cross-country bicycle trip.

Donahue, a senior at the University of Vermont, is traveling from Burlington, Vt. to San Francisco, Calif. He left Friday, June 16, and expects to arrive in 30 to 60 days. He said he is making the trip for both the exercise and experience.

Dr. Wilhelm Raab, professor emeritus of experimental medicine at Vermont gave both electrocardiograms and checked their blood circulation. Raab wants them examined again after the trip.

Raab is seeking funds from the Vermont Heart Association to finance the trip. If he is successful the two will come back immediately. Donahue said otherwise they will work in San Francisco.

Donahue said he expects to average 100 to 150 miles a day. They will take a northern route through New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Wyoming, Utah, Nevada, and finally California.

President Warns Russians On Threats Against West

Washington, June 26 (AP)—President Kennedy today called the Berlin crisis Soviet manufactured. He told the Russians it would be a "grave mistake" to try to undermine western unity "by threats or fresh aggressive acts."

"There is peace in Germany and in Berlin," Kennedy said at a news conference. "It is disturbed only by a direct Soviet responsibility."

Kennedy spoke solemnly of "the gravity of this threat" by the Soviets against the integrity of West Berlin. He called on Russia to join with the western powers in discussion of what he termed the unfinished business of German problems.

"Discussion of German problems will be profitable if the Soviets will accept in Berlin—and indeed in Europe—self-determination, which they profess in other parts of the world, and if they will sincerely press for peace rather than an extension of power."

The President was asked if he would comment on reports that the administration was considering partial mobilization because of the Berlin crisis.

Kennedy replied that Dean Acheson, who was secretary of state under President Truman, had been named in April to consider the matter for a quick and to the point answer.

"We are going to discuss it this week, and we will be conferring with the German government and the British government," he said.

"But the proposals are still in the preliminary stages," he said. "We are not ready to make any commitments at this time."

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Not Afraid of West Nikita Warns On Mobilizing

By STANLEY JOHNSON Moscow, June 26 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev warned today that if any western country mobilizes because of tensions on Germany and Berlin "we shall take proper measures and, if necessary, measures to increase our combat might."

The Soviet leader was addressing Soviet North Vietnamese friendship rally in the Kremlin. Discussing Germany, he mentioned various measures which the Soviet Union has discussed with the East German government.

West Berlin air is handled by an air safety center including representatives from the United States, Soviet Russia, France and Great Britain.

The president set forth his views shortly after Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev offered in Moscow to negotiate on Berlin and Germany, but warned the West against attempting any military buildup in that area to strengthen its hand.

Kennedy said nothing Russia does can affect the West's rights in Berlin.

Tshombe Bars Katanga Tie to Rest of Congo
