Manila, June 28 (AP)—Gen. Emilio Aguinaldo, 92 and ailing, probably will not be able to attend the 15th anniversary celebration of Philippine independence July 4.

Members of his family said today it is highly unlikely that the old guerrilla, who fought Spain and the United States for Philippine independence at the turn of the century, will be permitted to attend.

Aguinaldo has been confined to a wheelchair since a recent heart attack. He is also partially blind. His condition kept him from the celebration June 12 of the 33rd anniversary of the proclamation of independence from Spain.

ManArthur PLANS CUT
Manila, June 28 (AP)—A plan to have Gen. Douglas MacArthur address a joint session of the Philippine Congress during his visit here next week has been canceled.

An official in the office of President Carlos P. Garcia said today a message had been sent to MacArthur in New York advising him of the change in plans. The general will be a special guest at the celebration July 4 of the 15th anniversary of the Philippine independence.

There was no official explanation for the cancellation of the speech, but questions have been raised because the privilege of addressing a joint congressional session is usually reserved for chiefs of state.

Another possible factor is that Congress is not meeting, and a special session would have had to be called in the midst of the campaign for the November election.

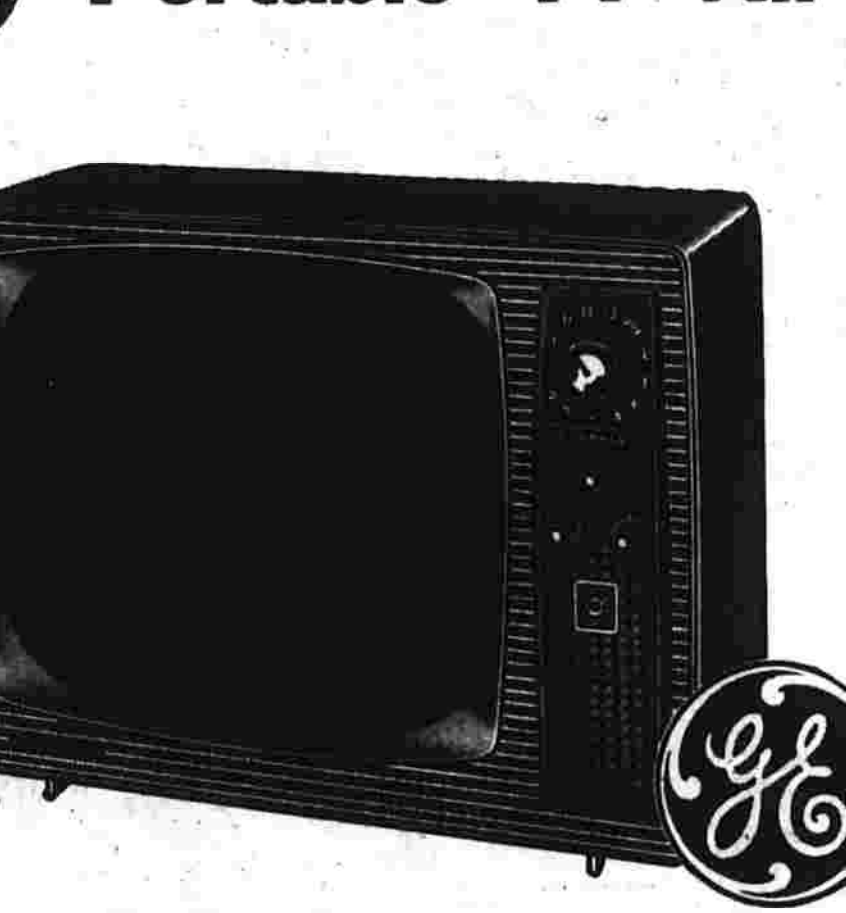

Division Leaving Algeria De Gaulle to Bolster NATO Defense Line

(Continued from Page One)

De Gaulle said that he will continue to insist on future association between an independent Algeria and France, including French retention of key military bases and guarantees for the French minority in the North African territory. Otherwise, he said, France will regroup the European and Maltese populations and paralyze Algeria.

France would concentrate the five million French in the main coastal cities—Algiers, Constantine, Bône and Oran—and leave the vast interior for the nine million Moslems to manage themselves. The rebel National Liberation Front (FLN) bitterly opposed this, knowing the hinterland is not without the Algerians and the agricultural coastlands.

De Gaulle said an Algerian settlement and "the day when there will no longer be a risk of conflict" would bring an end to the near-constant power struggles which since the abortive army mutiny in Algiers two months ago.

There will no longer even be any need for De Gaulle," he added. The president scheduled a cabinet meeting today to approve a special statement on Algeria to be read this afternoon to the national assembly and senate.

De Gaulle himself was to leave this afternoon for eastern France and his 12th grand tour speaking tour since his return to power in 1960. On the tour he was expected to announce the withdrawal of French troops from Algeria, particularly the threat to West's military aid to the FLN, and to sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany at the end of the year.

In Cairo, a spokesman for the rebel government in exile said he did not believe there would be any impact on the Algerian war.

"It is a tactical move," the spokesman said, "that the division was one of those dispatched to West's army to quell the French officers' uprising against De Gaulle and is now returning after it has served its purpose."

Arab Leaders Joining Kuwait Against Iraqis

The Cairo newspaper A. Akbar said Nasser is sending a mission to Kuwait to congratulate the sheikh on his country's new independence. One of Nasser's ministers heading the mission will carry a personal message from the UAR president to the sheikh, it added.

Saudi Arabia's Radio Mecca broadcast a declaration by King Saud that "any mission that befalls Kuwait affects Saudi Arabia and vice versa." Officials in Kuwait were reportedly told Saudi Arabia is "subjected to any military action."

King Hussein of Jordan told the sheikh that "Jordan will always work for the good of her sister states and the Arab nation at large."

Baghdad Radio meanwhile blared forth claims that "all Iraqis commanders and public organizations in the country are behind the sheikh and will support him against the Iraqis."

The state-controlled radio referred to the Connecticut-United States district of Kuwait.

Diplomatic sources in Cairo said the Arab League may call an emergency meeting by the weekend. Sources in Beirut said the league might speed up approval of Kuwait's application for membership, filed after it attained independence last week from Britain.

A league spokesman said, however, that the league would use his good offices to try to settle the dispute.

In Kuwait, Sheikh Sir Abdullah proclaimed a state of emergency, a modified form of martial law, and put his small army on a state of alert. Informed sources said, however, that the sheikh's army, led by his brother, Sheikh Abdullah Mubarak, the deputy ruler and heir apparent, had cut short a visit to Lebanon and returned home.

Kuwait's 2,400-man garrison is bolstered by British troops who withdrew after Kuwait gained independence last week but was canceled following Iraq's move. Four British frigates lie in the Persian Gulf.

So far, the border between Kuwait and Iraq was reported quiet. Travelers said road and rail transport between the two neighbors continued to operate. There were no reports of any Iraqi being arrested in Kuwait.

The Cairo newspaper Al-Ghazal reported that Kuwait authorities have arrested a number of Iraqi settlers in the sheikhdom for subversive activities and had expelled several other Iraqis on similar charges. Cairo papers said violent demonstrations were continuing in Kuwait calling for Nasser's support.

Britain announced it would honor its pledge of military support if requested by its former protectorate. A spokesman for the Foreign Office in London said "British views have been made very clear" to the Iraqi Foreign Ministry.

The State Department also announced U.S. recognition of Kuwait as a sovereign state. British and American oil interests operate the oil industry of Kuwait, which made fourth in world production after the United States, Venezuela and the Soviet Union. The sheikhdom's oil royalties total \$3 million a day and give its 200,000 people the highest standard of education and health in the Middle East.

Arab leaders in Cairo were mystified by Nasser's move. No one appeared to believe he would go so far as an attempt to seize Kuwait by force, but diplomats who know the premier say he is becoming increasingly unpredictable. There have been reports in London that Nasser is in a slightly nervous state, easily aroused and subject to emotional outbursts.

Jerusalem, June 29 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann, denying for the eighth day on the witness stand all responsibility for the Nazi mass slaughter of Jews, today repudiated a Red Cross report that called him a powerful man in the past.

"I had no role. I had no authority," testified the former Gestapo lieutenant, colonel in charge of "Jewish Affairs" in the Third Reich.

Kennedy Assures Finish Of Interstate Highways

The House today passed a bill in slightly different form. A compromise was worked out in conference yesterday with these main provisions:

1—Men would be allowed to receive at 62, if they accept smaller benefits, 20 per cent smaller at the minimum wage. An estimated 90,000 persons are affected.

2—The minimum social security payment would be increased from \$33 to \$40 a month, affecting more than 2 million persons.

3—Employment requirements for social security coverage would be eased, admitting 100,000 more persons to the benefit rolls at a cost of \$45 million.

4—Benefits for widows would be increased from 75 per cent to 82 1/2 per cent of the husband's basic benefit.

5—There would be a minor easing of the restriction on the amount of money that can be earned while receiving benefits.

6—Effective Jan. 1, the social security tax would be increased 1/2 of 1 per cent on the first \$4,000 of annual earnings of persons in covered employment and a similar amount on their employers.

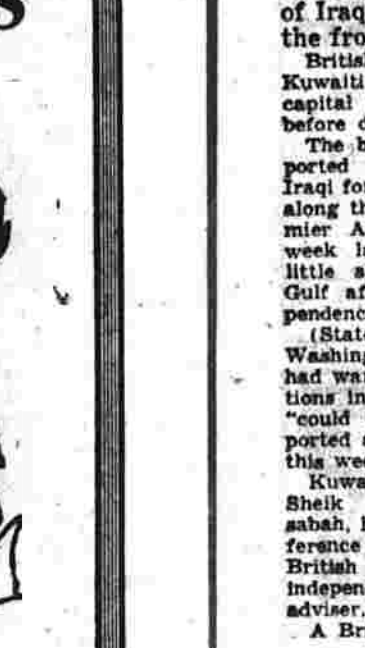
