Rt. 6 Five Years Away, Lobbyists Cut Priority

Where is the Rt. 6 relocation? Manchester residents have been hearing so much about it, and now Manchester officials have predicted so much of their plans for developing the south end of the town will take place under the relocation bill.

The answer, Manchester isn't going to have a Rt. 6 relocation for at least five years. The reason, lobbyists for the construction of Rt. 6 in the western part of the state brought so much pressure to bear on the recent legislative session that Rt. 6 was bumped from its priority position.

No money was allocated for Rt. 6 relocation in the \$150 million highway program which the legislature just approved. Twenty-five million was allocated to Rt. 6 and \$10 million was allocated to Rt. 9. It also received the preliminary approval of the state highway department.

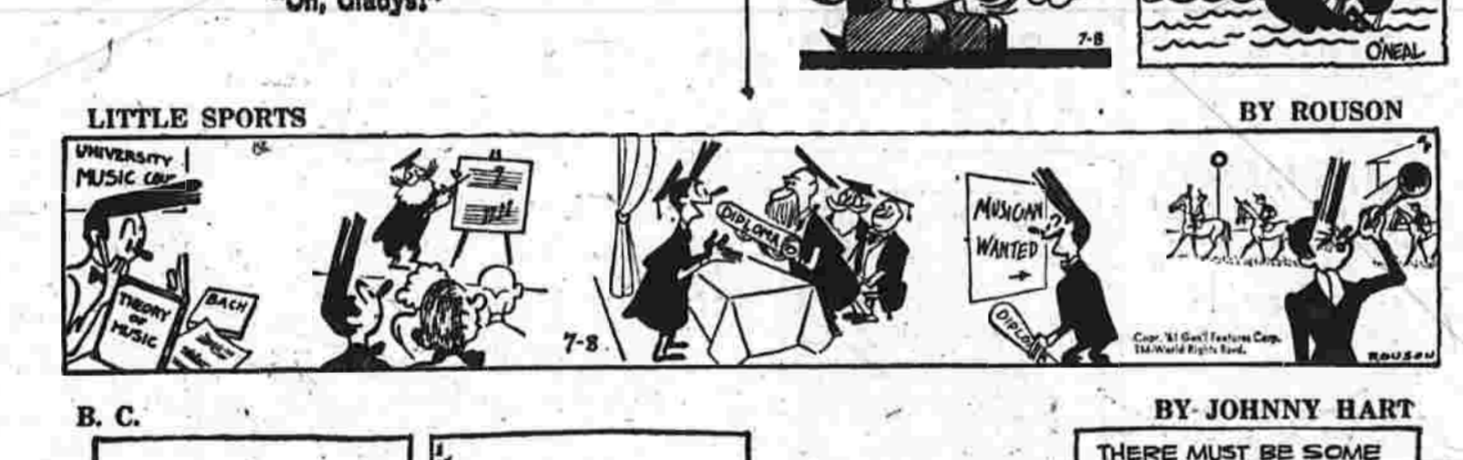
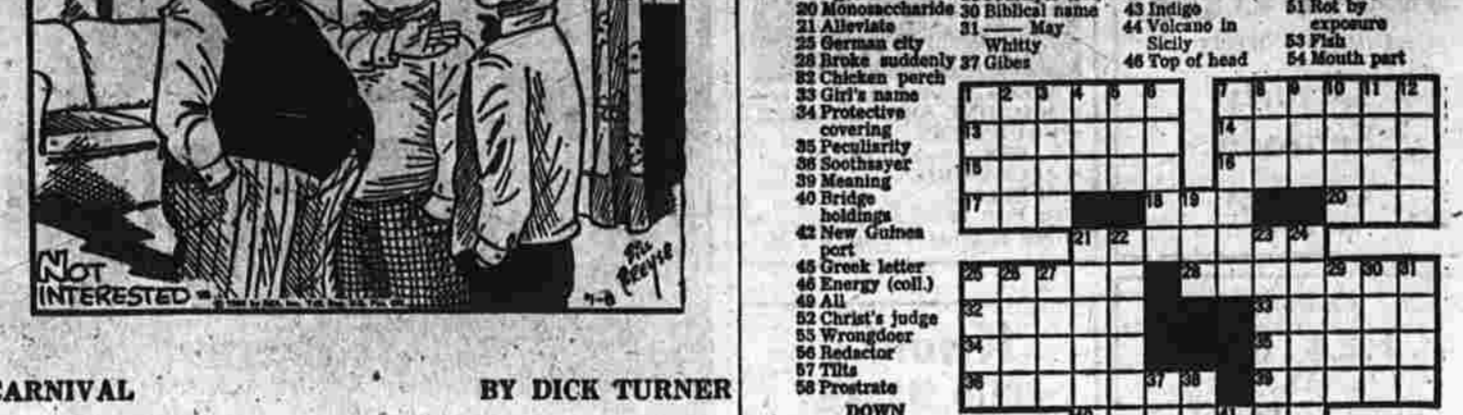
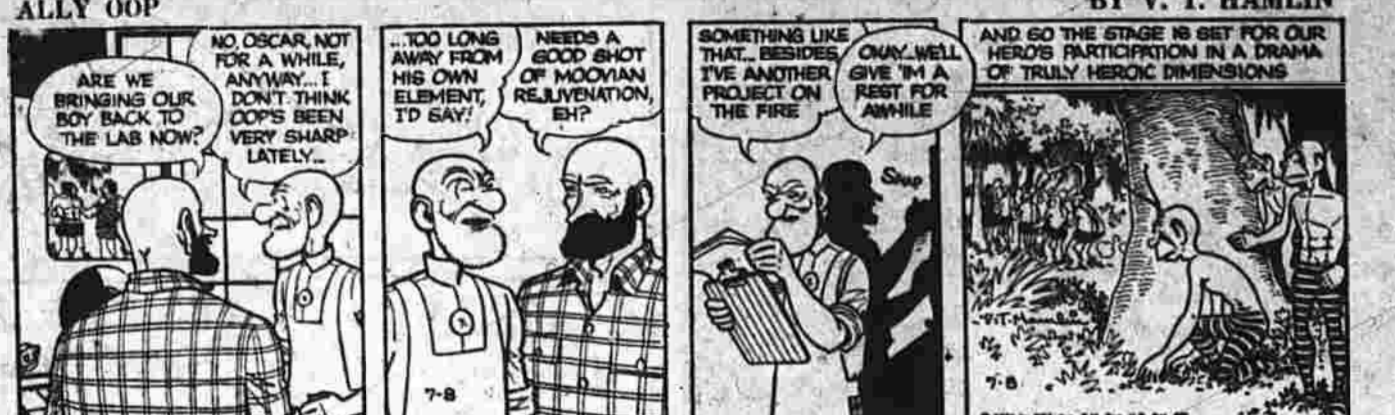

"I Love Lucy" series, Bill and Desi Arnaz got along very well except for one thing. They were continually fighting about one thing—money. Frawley wanted more, of course.

As it turned out, Frawley freely admits he did very well especially considering the royalty checks which keep rolling in for the reruns of "Lucy."

That bachelor Frawley is a "lovable old coot" is attested to by the many friends he made as a result of his role in "I Love Lucy."

Some time ago, he was approached by a male admirer who insisted that he had to buy Bill a drink because of the way he told off his wife, Ethel.

to the old movie days when they made quite a few Paramount films together.

Government Subject for TV Classroom

"Continental Classroom" will continue for its fourth year on the NBC Television Network next season with a new course in American Government.

Dr. Peter H. Odegard, one of the nation's most distinguished political scientists, now Professor of Political Science at the University of California at Berkeley, will teach the two-semester, college-level course, which will deal with the structure and function of the U.S. Government.

Robert W. Sarnoff, Chairman of the Board of NBC, announced the new plans for "Continental Classroom," the first countrywide educational TV project, at a press conference in New York City.

Announcement of the course in American Government was hailed by both President John F. Kennedy and Abraham A. Ribicoff, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

President Kennedy said "Now—when there is more demand than ever for a well-educated and informed citizenry—it is fortunate that the next 'Continental Classroom' course over the NBC Network will be on American Government. Such a course should do much to mobilize greater public interest in and understanding of national, state and local affairs. In addition, such a program can also do much to encourage more capable people to participate actively in their government."

Secretary Ribicoff said, "Because of the significance of national affairs in this fast-moving era, I am pleased that the National Broadcasting Co. has chosen to present a college-level television course in American Government. By making such an educational program available on a network basis, nearly everyone in the country will have an opportunity to more fully know and appreciate the structure and function of national, state and local government. This new 'Continental Classroom' offering will

make it possible for each person to obtain an understanding of the intricate workings involved in the formulation and execution of world policy—and thereby better appreciate what is happening on the political scene."

The course in American Government will be televised in color and carried by approximately 170 stations in every part of the country Monday through Friday from 6:30 to 7 a.m. local time, starting Sept. 25.

In addition to the new course, the past season's "Continental Classroom" course in Contemporary Mathematics will be repeated on color tape recordings in the half-hour period preceding American Government (6 to 6:30 a.m. local time) beginning Sept. 25.

Guest lecturers will be drawn from high levels of government here and abroad, from industry and from the arts and sciences.

More than 300 colleges and universities throughout the nation are expected to offer the course for full academic credit. A roster of these institutions will be announced in September. Each may utilize the network program at no cost and charge regular tuition fees for registration. Each will have local autonomy in implementing the TV program through seminars and examinations.

Cover Second Mercury Shot

Live on the spot coverage of the second Project Mercury man-in-space launching, scheduled to take place in mid-July at Cape Canaveral, Fla., will be broadcast on the CBS Television Network and also CBS Radio Network.

Once again, as in reporting the spectacularly successful flight through space of Cmdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr. on May 5, the three major television networks and radio networks, in cooperation with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), have combined their resources to provide live pooled coverage of the historic event. The pool is being coordinated at Cape Canaveral by CBS News.

One of the two Mercury Astronauts—Lt. Col. John H. Glenn or Capt. Virgil Grissom—will be chosen to follow Commander Shepard's lead in soaring into space. The second Astronaut will follow the same orbital flight procedure as Commander Shepard. He will be sealed inside a modified Mercury space capsule perched atop a Redstone missile and will be shot 290 miles downrange over the Atlantic, where he will be plucked out of the sea by a helicopter within an hour after the missile leaves its pad. He will have flown to a height of 115 miles. He will then be taken to a waiting aircraft carrier which will take him to Grand Bahama Island, where he will remain about 24 hours for a physical examination and flight check out before returning to Cape Canaveral for a news conference.

In addition, the networks have requested NASA permission to place live television cameras inside Mercury Control and inside the blockhouse, operational centers of the space-travel effort. An official request has also been made to transmit, live, the Mercury Astronaut's reports to the Cape from his capsule during the flight.
