The Building Of Crisis
We were not merely joking, the other day, when we played with the idea of a Look and Found ad...

There are two laws common to all such crises.
The first is that all have the underlying fundamental background of the existence of a world-wide war conflict...

These procedures, which statesmen and pressmen follow instinctively, can turn anything into a crisis—until, that is, something bigger and better comes along.

Once a crisis has been lighted by multiple oratory, the idea is to transfer it to the hands of a spokesman, no matter what it is, into some relationship to the new crisis. If he wears a crown, he is the crisis. If he makes a routine telephone call on a Sunday morning, it is crisis-continued.

For our part, we would prefer to have our Asian policy be capable of change, but honestly and openly. We have little to fear from the shadowy sovereignty of Outer Mongolia...

It is the first of these we encountered in "Play." It was a typographical error, and we read the word for "play." This occasioned the particular mental hardship since, as we shall shortly discuss, there is some degree of anonymity involved.

And both, "play" is a word, or rather a word used in a sense we aren't sure, and won't be sure until we have collected more examples, just which of the two words is a real opposition.

However, in almost every case, this natural ability had to be directed and painstakingly coached and trained before becoming acceptable for the higher standards of the motion picture and theater industry. Of course, there have been exceptions.

On the current entertainment scene, the meteoric rise of Diane McBain, co-star of "Surfside Six," successful private eye series, without any prior acting experience or training, has placed her among the few exceptions.

Although Diane can hardly be called a child star, she was just out of high school when she played the role of the granddaughter of Richard Burton and Robert Ryan in the dynamic film "Ice Palace."

Diane had attended a modeling school during her last high school year, fully intending to model in order to build a fund for a college education. It was on one of these modeling assignments that she was seen by a talent agent and, as a result, her college career was sidetracked.

Curvaceous, blonde and blue-eyed Diane almost missed the opportunity for her start in show business when director Vincent Sherman hesitated considering her for the part in "Ice Palace" because he sincerely believed that she could never have the acting ability he was looking for and still be so beautiful. Her first reading before Vincent Sherman was enough to convince him that she had both beauty and ability.

What is her secret for success? How does she account for this suc-

cess in acting without any formal training? It becomes understandable when she tries to explain in her own words: "Life is a better drama coach than any acting school. My ideas on my profession are, at least for me, quite simple, and very definite. Don't get me wrong; I do feel that training is important, but I also feel that an actor must draw from life. He or she must have lived or at least have been something of a witness to those things he is called upon to portray.

"My method — and for me that's just what it is — is to learn from wise, talented peoples. Talk to actors and actresses who have had a broad experience, both in life and in drama.

"Some time ago, when I was doing the film 'Ice Palace,' I met Richard Burton. Speaking with this man was just about the most rewarding experience of my life. You know, he has done just about everything, been nearly every place, is a magnificent actor and speaks with an amazing amount of insight. Honestly, we must have had about twenty 'talk sessions' — each three to four hours long.

"We discussed everything — conditions in the world, wealth, poverty, people's habits, religion, philosophies of life and, of course, acting. He told me what to look for in my travels, how to observe people, and how to gain the most from an experience even though the action involves me merely as a spectator. He gave me a wonderful insight into life and into acting."

Despite her belief in the value of true-life experience, Diane has no intention of giving up her formal education entirely. She plans to go to night school and major in languages. She believes that the contracting world boundaries make an understanding of other lands and people of increasing importance. Since her future plans include considerable world traveling, Diane is determined that no language barriers will interfere with her enjoyment of this.

In "Surfside Six," Diane plays Daphne DeWitt Dutton, friend and cohort of the series' other stars, Troy Donahue, Lee Patterson and Van Williams.

She likes TV work because she feels it is a continuing thing. It's not like the movies where you work a while and then are off for a long time. Also, Diane says: "My chances for continued success in movies can be assured just so long as I can keep in the eyes of the movie producers, and a TV

series does just that. Most of the younger stars in pictures today came right from the TV ranks."

Diane is fond of swimming, water skiing and horseback riding. She reads a great deal but has no favorite author. She is particularly fond of autobiographies.

Actually, Diane's prime ambition is to get married and raise a family.

"My husband doesn't have to be a millionaire, but he must have some money," Diane says with a smile. And very sound logic, we might add.

'Miller Time' Means 'Home' To Desmond

Thomas Wolfe once wrote a book titled "You Can't Go Home Again." Johnny Desmond says, "It just ain't so."

Johnny Desmond did go home again to the Glenn Miller Orchestra with which he sang during his Air Force Days. He is co-host and sings on the summer series.

Johnny was born in Detroit, Mich., the youngest of four children. His real name is Giovanni Alfredo de Simone. At the Northwestern High School in Detroit, he sang in the school's glee club. Further musical training was gained at the Detroit Conservatory where he studied piano and voice. John recalls that he was a soprano until "bang, one day I became a baritone."

It was in radio that Desmond got his first professional start. At 11, he sang on a children's program in Detroit. Later, in his teens, his voice was heard on "The Lone Ranger" and "The Green Hornet" serials. He then formed a vocal group which Bob Crosby signed and named "The Bob-O-Links." The featured vocalist of the group Ruth Keddington, soon became Mrs. Desmond. Today, the Desmonds reside in Manhasset, Long Island, N. Y., with their two children, daughters Dianne and Patti.

After his marriage, Johnny was soloist with the Gene Krupa band for a year and a half before he enlisted in the Army Air Force. As-

Bob Abernethy Edits 'Update'

"Update," a new weekly television news program designed especially for high school and junior high school students, will be presented on the NBC-TV Network Saturdays at noon NYT, starting Sept. 16.

Robert Abernethy, NBC News' Washington correspondent, will be on-the-air editor of the new half-hour program.

According to executive producer George A. Heinemann, the program will "accent the how and why of the week's news events in order to give the 20-25 million students of pre-college age a better understanding of national and world affairs."

Among the regular features will be a review of the week's headline-making events, an analysis of the week's most important news story, a student-reporter segment in which high school correspondents will interview prominent people of their own choice, a presentation of late news (making liberal use of visual aids), and a segment pointing out people, places and events to watch during the coming week.

Abernethy, who is temporarily correspondent on "11th Hour News" over WNBC-TV (NBC-TV's New York station), usually covers the U.S. Senate and Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson for NBC News. He is also a specialist in military and scientific news. The 33-year-old newsmen joined NBC in 1952 and the following year was assigned to its Washington bureau. In 1955 he was sent to London where he covered Eng-

Britain Nears New Austerity

London, July 24 (AP)—Prime Minister Macmillan's government today increased postal, telephone and telegraph charges in an opening move to get Britain's public and private economy on an even keel.

Postmaster General Reginald Evans told the House of Commons the new rates are designed to increase the revenue of the Post Office Department by 25 million pounds (\$70 million) a year.

His announcement came 24 hours before the scheduled presentation of a sweeping new austerity program to Parliament.

The cabinet this morning approved these belt-tightening measures, designed to combat inflation and protect the pound sterling.

The move also clears the way for this island nation to open negotiations for membership in the European Common Market.

The ministers today called the Prime Minister Macmillan.

The program to which they gave consent is expected to skim off up to 200 million pounds (\$60 million) a year in shoppers' spending power.

It will be presented to the House of Commons tomorrow by the treasury chief—Chancellor of the Exchequer Selwyn Lloyd.

Informants predicted Lloyd's new economic measures will include:

1. An increase—possibly as high as 10 per cent—in purchase (sales) tax and excise duties.

Blaze Kills 6 Persons In Lowell

Lowell, Mass., July 24 (AP)—A mother and five of her 10 children perished early today when fire broke out in a tenement building and destroyed the flimsy structure within minutes.

A sixth child, the Negro family was still missing hours later and was believed dead.

The mother, Mrs. Mattie Maryland, about 50, died when she raced back into the burning, 3-story building and fell two floors into the rubble as a stairway collapsed.

Two other Maryland children were hospitalized with burns but were not considered in dangerous condition. The other two children in the family escaped unhurt.

The father, John J. Maryland, was cut by glass and released from a hospital after treatment.

Fire officials said the general alarm blaze started on the third floor and in "a matter of minutes" it was too late to save the victims. The dead all were trapped in a third floor apartment.

Peter Routsis, a neighbor, said he saw the fire break out and helped rescue several persons.

"I went up a ladder and got an old man—he was about 75—and brought him down," Routsis said. "The flames were all around and I burned my arm a little. I saw this woman running down the stairs back into the building. I tried to

Cubans Preparing To Greet Gagarin

Gander, Nfld., July 24 (AP)—Soviet Cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin left for Cuba today after stopping on Canadian soil for a night's sleep.

The 4-engine Soviet turboprop carrying Gagarin and his escort of 15 took off at 9:31 a.m. (8:31 a.m. EDT) for Havana where he was expected to land about 2 p.m. EDT.

The 28-year-old space man arrived here exhausted last night, ran into some red tape, greeted a welcoming crowd with a minimum of fuss and hurried to bed without supper.

The short blond Air Force major had trouble getting off his plane because he lacked a vaccination card. Then, complaining of being tired, he shrugged off a planned dinner reception, RCMP mess reception and a tour of the town.

About 1,500 persons gathered from 100 miles around to greet the world-famous Russian, gave cheers and claps on the back but soon dispersed after he retired.

Gagarin, who flew to Moscow from Poland Saturday night, got only two hours' sleep before boarding the Byushin 18 for Keflavik, Iceland, en route here.

The health department nurses boarded the plane here. Gagarin and three others in the party were without vaccination cards, necessary before stepping on Canadian soil.

Washington, July 24 (AP)—Marine Lt. Col. John H. Glenn will make the next short sub-orbital U.S. space shot, it is here.

This was disclosed yesterday by James E. Webb, chief of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, in a radio-TV interview (ABC-News and Answers).

Webb said there has been no decision on whether this nation will try a third sub-orbital shot before its first round-the-world spacecraft, scheduled either late this year or early in 1962.

He said all seven U.S. astronauts are in the running for the first orbital flight.

Kowalski Hits Probe Delay at United Aircraft

Hartford, July 24 (AP)—Connecticut Congressman Frank Kowalski said today that he was "very unhappy" about the progress of the National Labor Relations Board in investigating unfair labor charges brought by the machinist union against United Aircraft Corporation.

His remarks were made after it was revealed here by a union official that the NLRB had informed Kowalski that the investigation into the charges, filed last November, had been stalled because of legal technicalities.

The charges were brought by International Association of Machinists Local 1746 (Pratt & Whitney Aircraft) and 700 (Hawthorn Standard) in an aftermath move following the 9-week strike last summer at UAC plants.

Lloyd's call for restraint could trigger bitter political and trade union disputes. School teachers, already promised salary increases, may be the first to test the hold-the-line measures.

The father, John J. Maryland, was cut by glass and released from a hospital after treatment.

Fire officials said the general alarm blaze started on the third floor and in "a matter of minutes" it was too late to save the victims. The dead all were trapped in a third floor apartment.

Peter Routsis, a neighbor, said he saw the fire break out and helped rescue several persons.

"I went up a ladder and got an old man—he was about 75—and brought him down," Routsis said. "The flames were all around and I burned my arm a little. I saw this woman running down the stairs back into the building. I tried to

President Works on TV Speech

Washington, July 24 (AP)—President Kennedy's major address to the nation tomorrow is taking a lot of rewriting to whip it into shape, the White House said today.

"It has quite a ways to go," press secretary Pierre Salinger told reporters.

Asked to explain, he said, "I think this thing has to go through several drafts."

Salinger said it's expected to be ready for distribution to newsmen about 4 p.m. EDT tomorrow.

Kennedy returned here today after another weekend on Cape Cod, where he worked over his address with the help of aides.

That speech, to be broadcast nationally on television and radio, will reveal what measures he has decided are necessary for the nation to face up to the Soviet threat to Berlin and world peace. He will tell Congress on Wednesday what action he hopes it will take to carry out his decisions.

The grave decision on how to back up Kennedy's notice to Moscow that Berlin will be defended at all cost was hammered out last Wednesday at a meeting on the national security council.

Kennedy went to his summer home at Hyannis Port, Mass., for the weekend to work over his speech revealing that decision.

But he got in some relaxation too on Cape Cod.

There was presidential jet at 9:15 a.m. EDT and arrived here at 10:15 a.m. A waiting helicopter sped him to the White House, landing on the lawn there at 11:30.

The President went directly to his office. He had no appointments scheduled and, aides said he

Words War over Bizerte UN Truce Broken, Paris, Tunis Claim

Tunis, July 24 (AP)—A war of words swelled between the French and Tunisians today in the wake of the battle of Bizerte. Each side charged the other was maneuvering for military advantage in defense of the U.N. cease-fire order.

The French admiralty declared Tunisian civilians were evacuating Bizerte's ancient Casbah to let troops and volunteers transform its narrow streets and a tuc c o dwellings into an armed bastion. Artillery emplacements there could fire on French ships traversing the 300-yard wide canal between the Mediterranean and Lake Bizerte.

Tunisia's information ministry said landing barges d e b a r k e d French troops at Cap Blanc, five miles north of Bizerte.

A Paris government spokesman commented that the Cap Blanc area lies within the French perimeter established during the Bizerte fighting and that there

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38 Aboard Electra on Tampa Hop

Miami, Fla., July 24 (AP)—An Eastern Air Lines prop-jet Electra was hijacked today and the pilot flew it to Cuba at gunpoint. A United States jet fighter accompanied the captive airliner to a point three miles from Cuba.

The plane, Flight 202, took off from Miami International Airport at 10:05 a.m. (EDT), bound for Tampa, New Orleans and Dallas with 33 passengers and five crewmen. It landed at Jose Marti Airport in Havana at 11:29 a.m.

In his last radio report, Capt. W. E. Buchanan, said: "I am proceeding to Havana at pistol point."

This call was picked up by Aeronautical Radio, Inc., in Key West, one station of a nationwide radio network supported by the airlines.

First indication that something was amiss, however, came when the \$3½ million plane went sharply off course on the radar scope.

A fighter from the Homestead Air Force Base near Miami tailed the airliner. There were reports that the fighter tried unsuccessfully to turn the big plane back.

The Electra carried 21 paying passengers, 12 pass-carrying EAL employees, and the crew members. An airline spokesman said the passenger list had been turned over to the border patrol and the U.S. Immigration Service.

The report on the fighter plane came from the North American Air Defense Command (NORAD) at Colorado Springs, Colo. NORAD headquarters is the nerve center for aerial defense of the United States and Canada.

In the last two years, nine passenger planes have been hijacked between Florida and Cuba. Seven were Cuban planes which were forced to land in Florida. Presently, one other American plane was forced to fly to Cuba.

The U.S. Government promptly asked the Castro regime to release the hijacked plane.

Bowles Starts Overseas Tour

Washington, July 24 (AP)—Undersecretary of State Chester Bowles left today on an 18-day mission to improve the American ambassadorial system abroad.

Bowles, accompanied by a score of aides, flew by Military Air Transport plane for visits to Lagos, Nigeria; Nicosia, Cyprus, and New Delhi, India. Regional meetings of U.S. ambassadors are scheduled at the three cities.

Bowles, a former ambassador to India, came back about Aug. 12.

Before leaving he made plain he expects to stay in the No. 2 State Department job despite published rumors that President Kennedy is seeking a replacement. Kennedy has publicly expressed confidence in Bowles but indicated he might be moved into another job if the department is reorganized.

Bowles told newsmen at the airport: "I expect to be with it (the State Department) for a long time. I hope and believe it. There is a lot to be done."

Bowles, a foreign affairs adviser to Kennedy during the 1960 election campaign, said he expects to see about 45 of the approximately 100 U. S. ambassadors during his current jaunt. Later in the year he is slated to attend similar regional ambassadorial gatherings in Latin America and the Far East.

While his main purpose is "organizational," Bowles said, he will also take advantage of his trip to talk to the prime ministers of in-

AID BILL APPROVED

Washington, July 24 (AP)—President Kennedy's \$4,325,500,000 Foreign Aid Bill was approved formally today by a 15-4 vote of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Some of those who voted to report the bill favorably—such as Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt.—did so with the reservation that they will oppose in the Senate Kennedy's proposal to finance long-range foreign economic development loans by treasury borrowings.

SAMOS SHOT POSSIBLE

Washington, July 24 (AP)—A usually reliable space magazine says the United States will launch this week a spy satellite capable of taking photographs of the Soviet Union for as long as a year. But an Air Force spokesman says the launching of Samos III, scheduled for this summer, is not on this week's list of shots at the Point Arguello, Calif., missile site. It's possible, he added, that it may be added.

NEW CANADIAN BANK HEAD

Ottawa, July 24 (AP)—Louis Rasminsky, 55, has been appointed Governor of the Bank of Canada to succeed James E. Coyne, who resigned in a dispute with Prime Minister John Diefenbaker's government. The Central Bank Board of Governors announced the appointment today. The announcement said the choice of Rasminsky, an authority on international finance and foreign exchange matters who has been a deputy governor of the bank for 6½ years, was approved by the federal cabinet.

FARE BOOST NOT ANSWER

Hartford, July 24 (AP)—Connecticut Railway and Lighting Company President Paul A. Rusk testified before a hearing of the Public Utilities Commission today that a "fare increase is not the answer to our problems but is only a relief. Rusk went on to state that there is "no alternative." He attributed the CR&L request for a fare increase from 20 cents to 25½ cents, single some fare, to a decline in passenger revenue over the past four years and increasing competition from other bus lines.

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
