blown in from Earth, but no more. The moon-expedition studies are making plans for three basic missions in this sequence:

A lunar landing and immediate return for three men, a 30-day stay on the moon for three men, and a permanent moon base which would accommodate 10 to 12 men.

For a brief stay, up to 30 days, a moon ship itself is likely to be the shelter.

Space more permanent quarters will be in huge inflatable, inflatable balloons set up in clusters on the moon.

The long burning moon days and nights might each equal 14 Earth days.

Underground sites are forecast for shelters, tunnelled at least 10 feet below the lunar surface, or in large natural caves with balloon clusters inside.

De Nike said lunar construction is being formulated for three extreme possibilities on the moon's surface: A soft dust layer a foot deep, a rock-strewn surface, or solid rock.

The early moon travelers will be selected persons screened long beforehand for emotional stability and trained over a long period in a program being called "Moon Project."

FIRST PLAY COSTS A TRICK

By Alfred Sheinwold In some situations the side that leads a suit first loses a trick in the process. Learn to recognize these cases so that you can force the opponents to make the fatal first move.

If South leads diamonds, he can get only the ace and king. If he leads an opponent to lead diamonds, South can get all three tricks in the suit. Hence South must plan the play from the very beginning to force a diamond lead by an opponent.

Declarer begins by finessing with dummy's queen of hearts. East wins the king and returns the ace of hearts to dummy's ace.

South ruffs a heart with a high trump, draws trumps with the ace and king, and returns the ace of hearts to dummy's ace.

Lt. Col. William J. Pettit, Easton, the commanding officer of the 103rd, said his squadron of 200 officers and men is at about 85 to 90 per cent of its full authorized strength in enlisted men and at more than 90 per cent in officer strength.

The squadron is trained to operate in a variety of environments. One section of the squadron is known as the Control and Reporting Post. It controls and spots aircraft within its heavy search radar.

The Target Direction Post, the other section of the squadron, uses radar to direct bombers to their targets, even instructing them when to let go their bombs.

During their recent summer assignment at Otis AFB on Cape Cod and Camp Dresser, the members of the squadron used their skill and equipment to guide planes of other units of the Air National Guard on practice missions, including the bombing of a target ship anchored in Massachusetts Bay.

BOON MAY CALL RESERVES Boon, Manchester, Aug. 2 (AP)—Defense Minister Frank B. Rowan said today that he expects to call up 20,000 reserves to active duty.

Returning from a 19-day visit to the United States, Rowan was asked at the Air Force airport to comment on reports of a reserve call up.

"We shall do our duty," Rowan said. "I expect to call up 20,000 reserves to active duty."

Management Criticized by PUC Silver Lane Allowed To Increase Rates

The State Public Utilities Commission has coupled criticisms of management practices with its grant of fare increases to the Silver Lane Bus Line, Inc.

The commission granted the following new fares: Single, 15 cents cash with no tokens, which had been 10 cents; four for 50 cents; two zones, 30 cents cash instead of 25 cents; cash or two tokens, 30 cents; four for 100 cents; 50 zone rides for \$2.50, an increase of 50 cents; and school tickets, 10 zone rides for \$1.25, an increase of 25 cents.

Edward M. Royce, president and treasurer of the Silver Lane Bus Line, Inc., said today the new rates will probably become effective Sunday, Aug. 13.

The PUC advised management of the bus company to cut back its administrative expenses and to use funds obtained through the economy to convert its accumulated deficit into a surplus.

Salary Hike Scolded

"In spite of an unfavorable financial condition, the company's president raised his salary from about \$12,000 in 1957 to \$14,500 in 1960. The president testified that this figure covers services of other members of his immediate family who work gratuitously for the company. Nevertheless, it is apparent that a company in this financial condition should not be increasing its administrative expenses. In the opinion of the commission, the increase in salary was not advisable and for rate-making purposes, was an allowable only for the former figure," the PUC finding and order stated.

The PUC also directed Royce to execute a "proper promissory note" at the going rate of interest for money borrowed from the company. The commission's findings also showed \$1,343 in outstanding interest and without a promissory note.

"This is not a commendable practice even for a company in the best financial condition. For a company operating on an slim margin, this is clearly a questionable. The mere fact that this company is closely held corporation is not justification for its president to borrow money without clear evidence of the debt. It is hardly proper for this company to provide its president with funds without interest while it borrows money at the going rate of interest to maintain its operations," the PUC noted.

Royce, when informed of the commission's action and recommendations, indicated he would comply with both the salary cut-back and signing a promissory note. He said his wife, Barbara Royce, is secretary of the company and performs bookkeeping, accounting and clerical work. She is assisted by her mother, Mrs. Martha Schledge, he added.

Wage Negotiations

Royce also reported wage negotiations will start Friday with the Street Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees, A.P.A. union. The company employs nine regular operators and three mechanics.

The PUC memo noted that a "primary reason for the fare increase is the additional wages paid to its operators." Wage cost is expected to further increase 10 cents per hour, effective Oct. 1, 1961, according to the commission.

Royce acquired the Silver Lane Bus Lines, Inc. in 1952. The PUC, in reviewing the company's financial record, noted that its best year since 1955 was 1960 in which

search laboratories 18 months much of the time on the diabetes program.

Several weeks ago State Jail Administrator Harold G. Hegstrom and his top aides toured the Pfizer Company and were told of the research programs. Permission subsequently was given for the company to recruit volunteers from among jail prisoners. The company sent a letter to each prisoner asking for cooperation in the research studies.

Dr. Rusecki said initial tolerance studies on the new diabetes drug were run at New London Jail and that now the project had advanced to the point where dosages of the oral medication could be increased.

Actually, the work which started this morning at 7 o'clock with prisoners having blood samples drawn and then gulping down pills had its beginning last night when the men missed supper. A period of fast is necessary before a testing run starts, Dr. Rusecki explained.

Each prisoner will have six samples of blood drawn over a period of six hours and the samples will be analyzed for quantity of sugar. When the drug reaches the point of "activity," Dr. Rusecki continued, the amount of sugar should decrease. The amount of decrease ultimately is to be compared with another Pfizer's diabetes drug, diabinol.

For each six blood samples drawn, a prisoner receives \$6 from Pfizer to associate with barnyard fowls.

Warden Hegstrom said while the testing program is new for the State Jail, similar research work has been going several years at the state's prison in Wethersfield and at the Federal Correction Institution, Danbury, the warden added.

"The work at the jail here is expected to continue several days, according to Dr. Rusecki. He said the program at New London had been hampered by a lack of interest. Sheriff William T. Hurst said the prisoners had responded to Pfizer's call "spontaneously," and declared that this followed inmate participation in blood donor programs where there is no pay.

Nursing Is Ideal Career
Training for Marriage

As you are a high school girl or the parent of one? If so you may be interested in a pamphlet entitled "Your Nursing Services Today and Tomorrow," which has been issued by the National League for Nursing and the Public Affairs Committee.

As the husband and father of registered nurses, I am sure a professional commentator. But it is my opinion that nursing is the ideal profession for the career girl and the best possible training for marriage, child bearing, and child rearing.

Perhaps this statement was not always valid. It was not so long ago that nurse's training was "like two or three year, hifing" to borrow a phrase.

Freshmen rarely had a day off. They were not allowed to engage in social conversation or to date in terms. Curfew was 9 or 10 p.m. and was an occasional midnight feast.

Between ward work and lessons, the girls put in a 12 to 14-hour day. They were exploited in the words of transportation. They were paid unprofitable, in the past few years, developed problems of its own which tend to make the railroad attractive again. ...more time to take over... says for instance.

"Communists have never held the power in any country... necessary through wars between countries... the working class can be realized without war."

The real pillar to Moscow's idea of what should be happening through will long be the doctrine of peaceful coexistence. That every country should be free to choose to take over whatever country they're in.

The program may vary but the central theme is revolution. In some cases it is a revolution to take a parliament and take over government.

The program sounds a little like the Communist Party's plan to conquer many places without violent revolution. It says Leninism means and historical evidence confirms that the ruling classes do not yield their power to the people.

Their's the pillar of saying: You'll have to fight for it. The program emphasizes that one cannot take over without a world war - although the exact method will vary from country to country.

The advice is given: "The success of the struggle which the working class wages for the victory of the revolution will depend on how well the working class and its party make the use of all forms of struggle—peaceful and non-peaceful, parliamentary and extra-parliamentary—and how well they are prepared to replace one form of struggle by another as quickly and unexpectedly as possible."

But the Russians are too practical to count on the use of force to do things right by themselves. So the program reserves them to the program reserves them to the Communist party of the Soviet Union.

If all this could be boiled down to one sentence it would be as follows: For unnumbered years a head Communist overrules around the world, with Russian help, will be trying to knock off one country after another - hoping all eventually will fall under the red banner.

And this is to go on while the Russians practice peaceful coexistence.

Soviet Program Seen Irritating Red China

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER
 Washington, Aug. 2 (P) - The proposed Soviet Communist Party program just published in Moscow is seen by authorities here as a possible new source of irritation and dispute between Russia and Red China.

Authorities who have studied the voluminous document say that its emphasis on a need for avoiding war and for Premier Khrushchev's policy of "peaceful coexistence" is sharply at variance with the more aggressive policy of the Communist Chinese leaders.

Furthermore, in the view of Washington authorities, the program sets up 20-year goals for Communist achievement, totally free education and child care supplied by the state—can only be achieved if there is no great war which diverts the resources of the Soviet Union to a huge scale to military purposes.

4. The avoidance of a thermo-nuclear conflict is described in the document as the first necessity of foreign relations and some evidence seems to reflect this sentiment that peace may in fact be preserved.

5. The central policy theme set forth is that of "peaceful coexistence" but, as has been stated in other Soviet political declarations on this subject, peaceful coexistence does not mean any lessening of the ideological struggle. The Communists are instructed to push their cause in every country but by means short of major war.

6. The document appears to reflect confidence that the triumph of Communism over the world is inevitable.

Throughout the program the Soviet Union is presented as the "Khrushchev Doctrine" and other Communist countries and Communists faithful to Moscow leadership are admonished to avoid the "dogmatism" of Red China and the "revisionism" of Yugoslavia. Yugoslavia is mentioned specifically but Red China is not. Yugoslavia broke with Moscow leadership in 1948 and under the leadership of President Tito has persisted in developing its own brand of communism. The Red Chinese came to power in 1949 on the Chinese mainland and their tendency to rival the Kremlin for leadership and their greater willingness to engage in war with the West have been at the heart of their frictions with the Kremlin.

The proposed program is to be formally presented to the 20th Communist Party Congress at Moscow in October. Authorities here assume that after some formalities it will be adopted as the party platform at that time.

Six owners of property adjacent to the proposed "Bryan Farm" subdivision near the Manchester-South Windsor town line won postponement of the subdivision approval after voicing objections to the Board of Directors last night.

He also asked the directors to publish maps or sketches of proposed developments, something more prominent than sketching legal notices in the newspapers.

Mrs. Ruth Hoves, 136 Denning St., protested that the town could not properly accept the 45-foot road leading into Baldwin Rd. because 50-foot road widths are required for new roads.

Atty. Jerome Walsh, representing the developer, said the developer does not own the two 40-foot roadways but they had been set aside as rights of way between Baldwin Rd. and the development.

Sherwood Bowers, 70 Denning St., suggested that the town state and the developer might cooperate to provide a bridge over the highway.

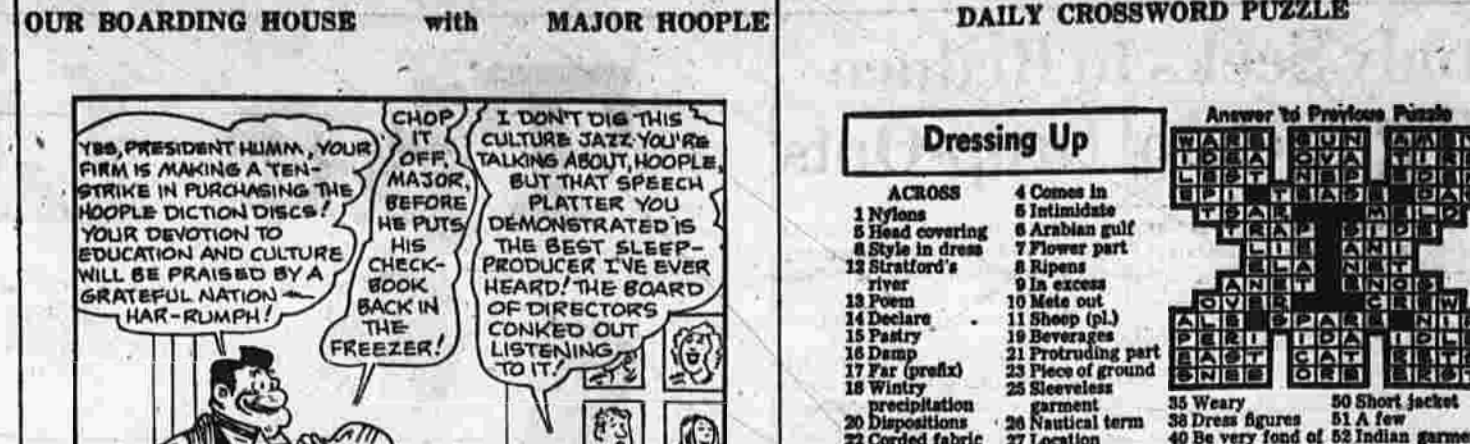

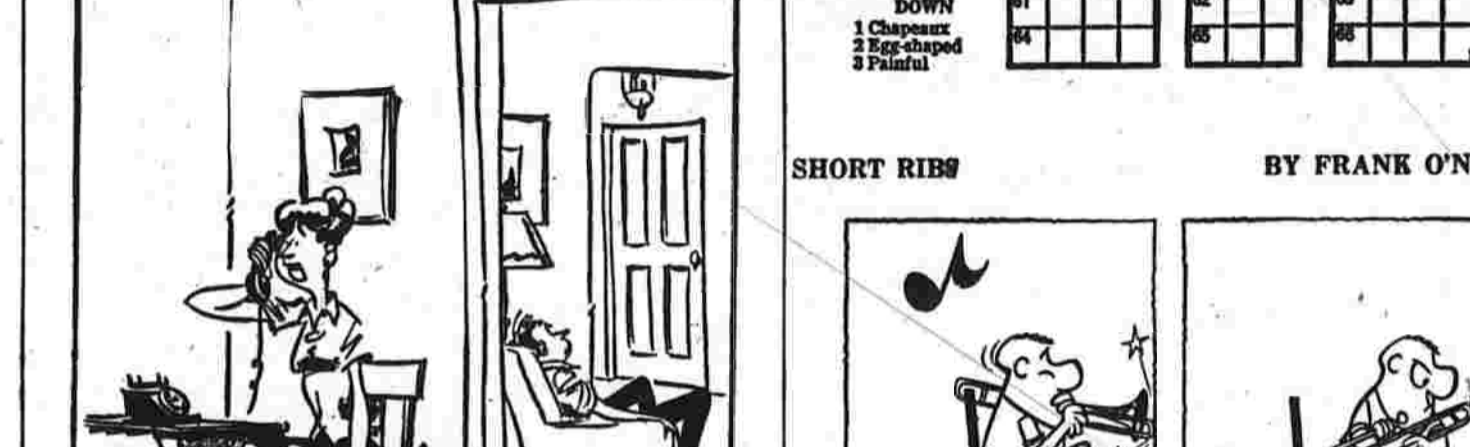

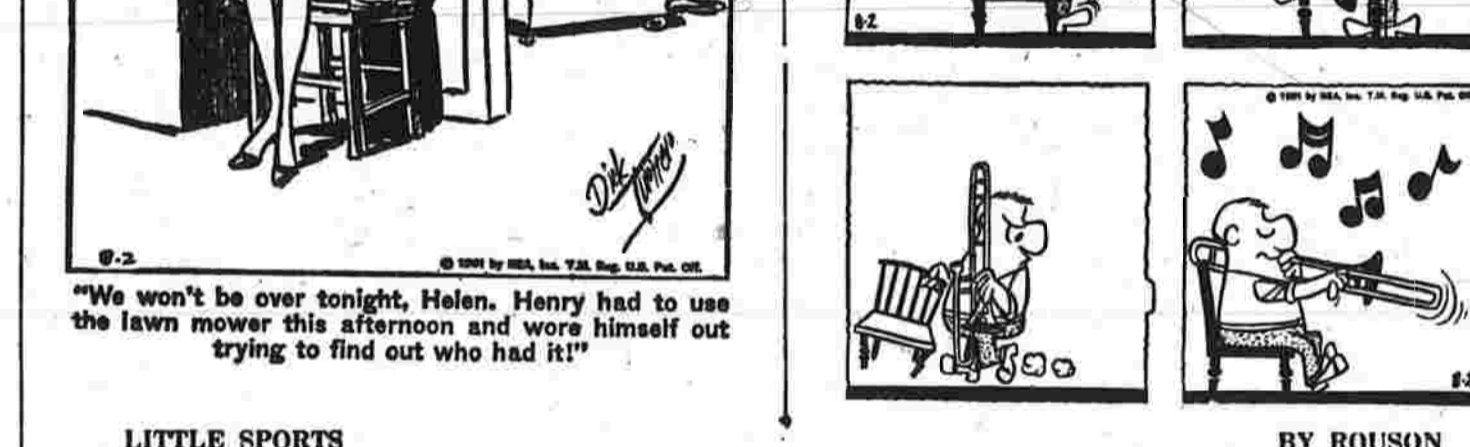
