One of the best acted comedies of the season is the production of "Pygmalion" at the Oval Theater in Farmington, with a cast headed by the effervescent Joanna Warwick and the polished Bruno Ulmer.

The two make excellent foils for one another, and spark the rest of the cast to their best performance. Director Elizabeth Kimball has enough individuality in her direction so that the audience reacted to the play almost completely as though it were not one from which "My Fair Lady" was adapted.

The board of education hired three new teachers Monday night after interviewing candidates during a week at the Bolton Education Office, for a period of three days.

USE ONE SUIT TO REAP GREATER

How do you plan to use the first suit? Try to use the first suit, to help the second. If there's only one way to do so, your choice is made for you.

Declaring trumps the first club in dummy and draws two rounds of trumps, and must then decide whether to tackle hearts or diamonds first.

If dummy has five hearts in hand and five diamonds, the choice would be easy. South would tackle hearts because he could eventually discard two diamonds, on the fourth and fifth hearts. Since dummy has only four hearts, the big diamonds even if the heart finesse should succeed.

If South foolishly tries the heart finesse first, he goes down. East wins with the king of hearts and carries a heart. Later East will discard a heart and South will be left with a diamond and a heart. East carries the king of diamonds and leads a low diamond. If West declares with a low diamond, declarer would finesse dummy's jack. South wins with the king of diamonds, and declarer puts up dummy's ace of diamonds and gives East the queen of diamonds.

The idea is to let East win with the queen of diamonds (if he has it) at a point when he has no other high cards. If West has East must return a heart or a club.

Either return gives South the help he needs to avoid the loss of a heart trick. South will eventually discard a heart, on dummy's fourth and fifth hearts. If West return takes care of South's other heart loser, that is a heart return, South will be left with a diamond and a club return. South will discard a heart with dummy's trump.

Q: Dealer, you hold: Spades A K J 8 5, Hearts 10 9 8 7, Diamonds K 8 7 2, Clubs A. The dummy has: Spades 10 9 8 7, Hearts A K Q J, Diamonds A K Q J, Clubs 10 9 8 7. What do you say?

A: Spades. But you should have a reasonable, but borderline, opening bid if your singleton king is not 3 points more valuable than a singleton queen.

wavy hair, wearing a white shirt and dark trousers. He was seen entering an office model 2-toned heavy type car with a dark brown body and a tan top, before he sped away.

Although police have been working on the murder theory since the body was found by one of the victim's roommates, no official report from the pathologist who performed the autopsy has been received other than "death was consistent with drowning."

Chief Paul B. Beckett said that from an oral report to Det. Sgt. Thomas J. Daly, the autopsy revealed that marks appeared on the victim's chest, a slight discoloration to the right eye and lacera-tions on the inside of her upper lip. Miss Smith had a history of fainting spells since suffering a concussion as a child and at first it was believed that while preparing for a bath she suffered a blackout spell and fell into the tub. She also had a scald mark on the left side of her face.

"A book and eyes" that was on the rear screen door was forced and the girl's wallet is still missing. A wallet was found along with her watch, but it was later learned that she had another watch containing identification and a driver's license that has not been recovered.

Also the autopsy revealed that she died at 9:30 p.m. and not when it was first believed to have been at 11 p.m.

Reconstructing the crime, police said that the victim was alone in the bathroom when she was first seen by Miss Smith shortly before 9:30 p.m. This was first believed to have been made at 10:30 p.m.

She then went to the bedroom and undressed in preparation to taking a bath. A bath powder that was known to be in the bathroom was found spilled in the corridor leading to the bathroom.

"It was believed it was then that she was attacked from behind with the assailant placing his hands around her neck, rendering her unconscious.

It was believed she was then placed in the tub on her back with the hot water running and her face placed under the faucet which would have accounted for the scald marks. It was also determined that the victim had been bitten.

War Declared On Litterbugs
 Wethersfield, Aug. 9 (AP)—The state police, motor vehicle and highway departments joined forces today for an intensified campaign against litterbugs. The commissioners of the three departments announced after a meeting, they will coordinate their efforts to keep Connecticut's highways clean.

Three steps were agreed upon by Police Commissioner Leo J. Mulcahy, Highway Commissioner Howard S. Ives and Motor Vehicle Commissioner John J. Ryan to step up the anti-litter campaign.

Special state police attached to the highway department will begin immediately to make spot checks and report violations of the anti-litter ordinance.

Regular state troopers, in cooperation with the highway department's special police, will maintain a 24-hour vigilance and arrest any violators. Convicted litterbugs will be fined \$50.

In addition to the fine, convicted litterbugs will be penalized by a one-point demerit on their driver's license.

"Some progress has been made in reducing litter on the highways," Ives said, "and many individuals, groups, organizations and establishments have united solidly behind us in this campaign to keep Connecticut safe and beautiful but the goal is to reduce litter on the road both day and night, there has been an increase in accidents lately."

High Pay For Noting
 What might have been the interesting experimental phase of the Kennedy administration's proposed farm bill has been sliced out of it by Congress. That would have been the system under which the farmers themselves, with the Secretary of Agriculture, would have been given a chance to set up their own crop control and price support programs, subject only to veto action by the Congress. This might have been interesting on the theory that the farmers themselves might possibly have more common sense than some of their own professional political lobbyists, and might head toward some voluntary discipline in their own bulging farm industry more swiftly than Congress itself ever will.

With that proposal gone out of the bill, what remains, and what has passed, sets up a different, and somewhat less hopeful, kind of experiment.

This, as exemplified in the bill's provisions for the particular crop of wheat, will be to pay the farmers even more handsomely than ever before not to grow wheat.

Under the bill's provisions, farmers who agree to reduce their own wheat acreage by 10 per cent will be rewarded by a subsidy payment 20 cents a bushel higher than the wheat they do produce. In addition, they will get payment from the government for the 10 per cent of their wheat land they have taken out of production. This payment will be at the rate of 45 cents a bushel of the crop which would have grown if they had planted it.

If it seems rather a handsome proposition to get, in addition to an extra 20 cents a bushel for the wheat you do grow, a 45 per cent increase from the land you do not even plant, the new bill has a further enticement even more generous. If the wheat farmer will agree not to plant another 30 per cent of his acreage, the government will pay him 60 per cent of the income he would have taken in from planting it. In other words, if you make \$100 an acre by planting wheat, you can make \$90 by not planting it.

These handsome rates of subsidy for the wheat produced, and of pay for the wheat not produced, are supposed to pay off in lower production, which will keep new acres of wheat from expanding in government storage, and at least, therefore, save the government the immense storage expense. If this is the result, perhaps the net increased cost to the taxpayers of shutting down on the production of wheat will not be too great.

But, so long as money, one way or another, does the talking and the making, one will have to wait to see whether wheat production actually does go down. In the past, the farmers have repeatedly shown a capacity to take some land, always their poorest, out of production, and then, by using more fertilizer on the remaining good land, produce more crop than ever before.

They are already reported to be doing something like this this year with corn. After soil banking some of their land, they have introduced a new practice of plowing their rows of corn closer together, which, together with the additional fertilizer that would be required, may wind up giving the nation the biggest corn crop on record on the least land.

Sooner or later there may come an end to the process of producing more crop on less land. Until it does come, however, or until the various voluntary devices to push store-brand equivalents ahead of the big name brands, it is hard to see how the average approach to crop control is likely to reduce themselves. And when the cost of average control gets so high that the government is paying 60

Schmidt claimed several hundred had already switched jobs. But hundreds of others have made another decision and joined the westward flow of refugees.

A private western intelligence agency reported that 28 people had been sentenced to prison in the past 10 days for inciting or helping refugees. They were accused of "luring away the labor force" and "organized head-hunting."

The hunt by strengthened Red police patrols for refugees went on, many were detained and turned back before they could reach the West Berlin sector, which is being held by the British.

Information Bureau West said that 115 people were stopped Monday at the control point at Schoenberger, where rail and road routes from East Germany enter East Berlin. Their identity cards were confiscated. They were given provisional papers stamped "invited for Berlin" and sent back to their homes.

The flight of an East German high court judge, Horst Heister, was reported today. The League of Free Jurists, a West Berlin group documenting legal affairs in the East, said he arrived with his wife, children and several relatives — a party of 10 in all. The league said the judge explained he could no longer be responsible for the level of justice in East Germany, especially divorces granted without regard to the innocent party and the children.

\$20,000 Tobacco Fire
Windsor, Aug. 9 (AP)—A fire of undetermined origin caused an estimated \$20,000 in damages yesterday at the Huntington Brothers Tobacco Farm in the Pogonoch section of town.

About six acres of main tenting and the wrapper tobacco growing under it were destroyed. Fire Chief Edward Huntington, one of the owners, estimated the damage at \$20,000.

Quick work by farm hands and volunteer firemen prevented spread of the fire. Swinging machetes cut away the tenting in advance of the flames and saved about 20 acres of tenting, growing tobacco and a tobacco shed on the same property.

Huntington said about 12 acres of tenting were lost in a similar fire in the same field in 1958.

Med School Backed
Hartford, Aug. 9 (AP)—Gov. John N. Dempsey has called for approval of a bill that would authorize federal aid to states for the construction of medical-dental schools.

The bill is presently before the Congressional Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce.

In a letter sent yesterday to the committee co-chairmen, Sen. Lester Hill, D-Ala., and Rep. Owen Harris, D-Ark., Dempsey pointed out that the Connecticut General Assembly appropriated \$2 million this year to start a medical-dental school.

Such a school, the Governor wrote, is " sorely needed in the New England area and any aid from the federal government would be most helpful.

The Governor also sent messages to the Connecticut congressional delegation asking them to support the aid bill.

Sanctions as Weapon
Washington, Aug. 9 (AP)—A Connecticut congressman has suggested that United States explore sanctions to the Berlin crisis other than military ones.

The present military build-up should not be allowed to "limit our thinking" about answers to the crisis, Rep. Frank Kowalski, D-Conn., said in a statement yesterday.

Kowalski, a former Army colonel and a member of the House Armed Services Committee, said, "We have an arsenal of powerful economic weapons which have not received enough public attention."

The lawmaker from Meriden said that if Soviet Russia turns over control of access routes to West Berlin to Communist East Germany and the East Germans harness Allied traffic to Berlin, "we can put a great deal of pressure on East Germany through economic sanctions."

"This is no puny weapon," Kowalski said. "The West German supply 1120 million in steel, iron and heavy machinery to East Germany under an agreement which guarantees annual exchange of \$200 million in trade... therefore, West Germany holds an economic weapon against East Germany."

This technique proved successful last year, Kowalski said, when East Germans applied restrictions on travel to East Berlin but dropped them on threat of cancellation of trade with West Germany.

Refutes Criticism
Westport, Aug. 9 (AP)—A producer has claimed that the reception given the New York Repertory Theater in Latin America refutes the criticism by several senators that the group's productions paint a poor picture of American life.

The senators who criticized the plays put their foot in their mouths and now they realize it, Laurence Feldman, a group's producer said at a news conference yesterday.

In the company's repertory are "Sunset Boulevard" by Tennessee Williams, "Zoo Story" by Edward Albee, "Miss Julie" by August Strindberg and "I Am a Camera" by John van Druten.

Before the group left last month, Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., Prescott Bush, R-Conn., and Frank Lausche, D-Ohio, criticized the plays as likely to create an unfavorable image of the United States.

Feldman, who said he interrupted his tour with the company "to give my own side of the story," described the Latin Americans as sophisticated and cultured people who want to be treated as part of the world.

"They are getting very tired of getting second-rate American movies," he said.

The tour is being made without government sponsorship.

Feldman said he is considering another tour next year.

"I'm not taking second rate plays any more," he said.

The featured players in the repertory group are Rita Gam, Ben Linden, Ben Piazza, William Daniels, Betty Fields, Morgan Soren and Sylvia Westman.

Sister Mary Emmanuel
West Hartford, Aug. 9 (AP)—Sister Mary Emmanuel of the Sisters of St. Joseph died last night at the convent of St. Mary Immaculate after a long illness.

She was the sister of Dan Parker, sports editor for the New York Daily Mirror. Born in Waterbury as Margaret Parker, she was a member of the order for nearly 50 years.

Her last assignments were as a teacher at St. Francis Xavier School in Waterbury and as nurses' librarian at St. Mary's Hospital in Waterbury.

She is also survived by two sisters. A requiem high Mass will be celebrated at the convent Friday.

Rockville-Vernon Riskey Says Town Should Get Two-Thirds of Road Funds

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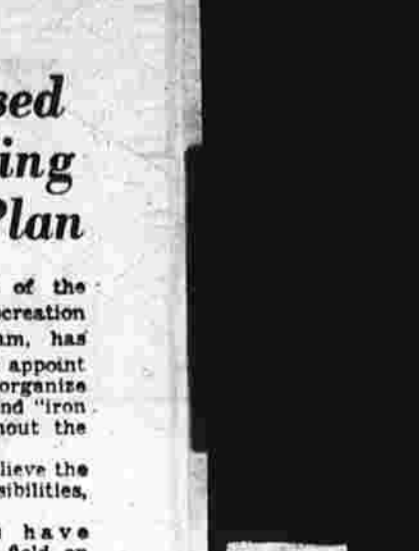

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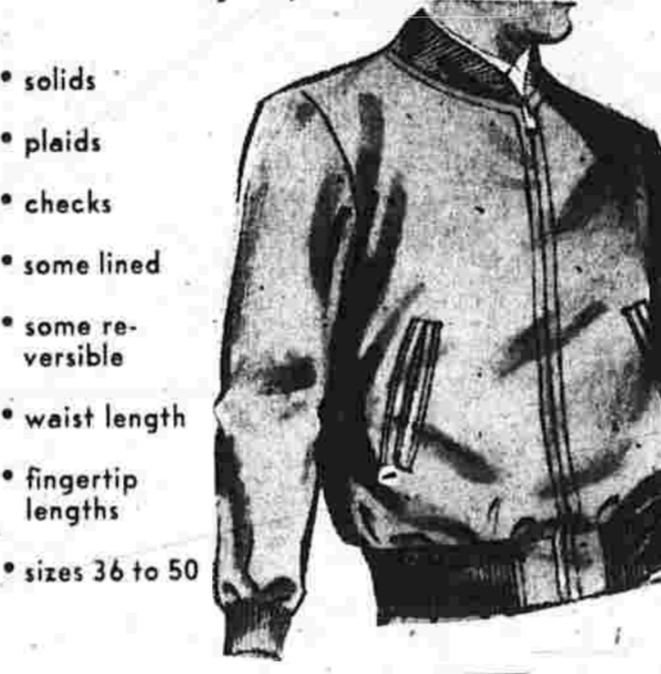
