

Adlai for UN 'Peace Force'

Berkeley, Calif., Aug. 15 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson today urged the building of a new world order through the United Nations "soon enough to save mankind."

The chief U.S. delegate to the U.N. in a speech prepared for delivery to the international assembly of a U.N. peace force "capable of deterring or subduing the strongest combinations which might be raised against it."

Stevenson asserted that disarmament can be accomplished with adequate inspection and verification. He said the United States has always been willing to grant inspection rights, adding "I devoutly hope that the Soviet Union may show an equally real desire for disarmament and peace."

About three-score Soviet scientists were registered for the meeting of the union, the first in three years. The last meeting was held in Moscow.

Stevenson, who brought President Kennedy's greetings to the union, told the scientists that deep conflicts of purpose and an even deeper mistrust had stood in the way of disarmament although "all agree that we must stop the race, reverse the process and disarm."

"But it can be done," he continued. "It involves principles which are familiar to you as scientists—freedom of investigation, freedom of inspection and freedom of verification."

"The acid test of sincerity is whether one agrees to fully adequate inspection and verification on a permanent basis, or to a temporary basis, or to no permanent basis at all."

Woman Found Under Car Died Of Asphyxiation

Southington, Aug. 15 (AP)—A medical examiner said today the death of Mrs. Barbara Shumsky, 32, whose body was found under her car in a ditch, was the result of asphyxiation.

An autopsy was performed by Dr. Eric Simmons, medical examiner for Southington. He added, however, further laboratory tests would be made.

The partially decomposed body of the Southington housewife was found yesterday by two boys under the family car in a ditch. Her husband, Robert, reported her missing July 31.

The medical examiner said the condition of the body indicated Mrs. Shumsky, mother of two children, had been dead for about two weeks.

He theorized that she had escaped from her car through the cracked door of Queen Street and tumbled 15 feet into a ravine filled with brush.

Mrs. Shumsky was thrown from the car, he continued, and she was trapped under the car while the motor was still running. State Police are continuing their investigation of the case.

4 Men Aboard Plane Missing On Water Hop

New London, Aug. 15 (AP)—A light plane carrying two men and a dog, missing since it was reported to have crashed in the sea, was found today by fishermen off the coast of New London.

The plane, a Cessna, was found about 10 miles from the shore. The two men, identified as Robert J. and Edward J. [names obscured], were found floating in the water. The dog, a small terrier, was also found.

East Reds Tighten Clamps Around West Berlin Area

West Plans To Penalize East Reich

Washington, Aug. 15 (AP)—The United States, Britain, France and West Germany were reported today to agree on plans to penalize East Germany for barricading the West Berlin escape routes for refugees from Communist rule.

Officials of the three West European Allies were scheduled to meet today with Assistant Secretary of State Paul D. Kohler to work out in detail retaliatory measures which would then be recommended to their governments for action.

"At a similar session at the State Department yesterday, participants said, the Allied representatives reached general agreement that counter measures should be taken. Secretary of State Dean Rusk declared in a statement Sunday that the Soviet-supported action by the East German regime to halt the flow of refugees violated East-West agreements providing for free circulation of people and goods in Berlin."

Officials were reported hopeful that the communist measures cutting off the flight of refugees would not produce an uprising in East Germany. Plane Incident Brings Martial Law in Bolivia

Washington, Aug. 15 (AP)—The State Department said today martial law has been declared in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, where a Brazilian aircraft was shot down by Bolivian fighter planes.

The department said Bolivian President Victor Paz Estenssoro decreed Santa Cruz a military zone, declaring a "situation of emergency" exists there as a result of the interception of a plane which had brought in a illicit cargo.

A Bolivian fighter pilot was killed in the crash of the plane just as the cargo plane landed, the department said.

Brazil Eases Blow At Castro's Regime

Punta del Este, Uruguay, Aug. 15 (AP)—Lad by Brazil, a bloc of American nations today apparently succeeded in yanking the political teeth out of a proclamation aimed at Fidel Castro's Cuban regime.

The behind-the-scenes feud took the spotlight of the main program of the Inter-American Economic Conference of whipping into shape the charter launching President Kennedy's giant aid program for Latin America.

West Plans To Penalize East Reich

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West Three File Protest With Soviet

Berlin, Aug. 15 (AP)—The Communists tightened the screws on West Berlin today and the West opened a campaign of pressure and protests against Russia and her East German satellite.

U.S. British and French military commanders sent sharp notes to Col. Andrei I. Solovjev, the Soviet commander at Karlshorst in East Berlin protesting the "illegal measures" taken by the East German regime against travel in Berlin.

A joint Allied announcement said the western commanders complained that East German military and semi-military organizations formed violation of 4-power agreements and whose very presence in Berlin violated the 1945 agreement that barred the Soviet sector from an armed camp.

With tempers flaring on both sides of the new Iron Curtain, Mayor Willy Brandt called West Berliners to a mass protest demonstration outside City Hall tomorrow.

He issued the call after the Communists turned off roofs and tanks to enforce a new barrier across Berlin.

Possible plans to apply the pressure of trade embargoes against East Germany or the whole Communist bloc were reported from Bonn, Washington and London.

"The military commanders' letter called the East German action 'the most flagrant violation' of the city's status since the Soviet blockade 11 years ago."

The western military commanders acted against a background of German demands for more than 100 permits, West Germany said, that hit by bit are closing West Berlin off from travel in and out by German.

The latest order by the East German Interior Ministry barred West Berlin motorists from entering East Berlin unless they get special permits. West Germany already had been barred except by a contained political phraseology or not.

A Brazilian delegate said that agreed to a water-downed version of the order to keep from antagonizing Cuba — "to show a bit of good will."

He added that Cuba would surely refuse to sign the summary in any event.

As the conference neared its close, the feeling grew that Cuban Economic Boss Ernesto (Che) Guevara would refuse to sign the full charter as well as the shorter version should the latter be approved. But other delegates felt Guevara would sign the charter to help Cuba in the American family of nations, at least officially.

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Aged Sikh Begins Fast In Bid for Independence

Amritsar, India, Aug. 15 (AP)—Master Tara Singh, aged leader of India's Sikh religious community, today began a fast to demand for a state of their own in India.

Singh began his fast inside the Sikh's golden temple in Amritsar as India was celebrating the 14th anniversary of her independence from the British.

"I will endure longer than most people think," said the 76-year-old firebrand who pledged to take nothing but salted water.

Singh's death could touch off a wave of violence that would send the unity of India. He has been an extremist faction that has seized leadership of India's Sikh community since May 1960 against Prime Minister Nehru's repeated refusals to grant Sikh demands for a state in northeast India in which the Punjabi language would predominate.

The prime minister, speaking at the historic Jod Fort in Old Delhi, called on his people to build a nation in which differences of caste, province and language would have no part.

India, he said, is doing whatever it can to influence the world's powerful nations to disarm, "but if we fight one another in our own country on the grounds of religion, language and province, what influence can we bring to bear on the nations of the world? What respect will they have for our cause?"

About 30,000 Sikhs were expected to observe the fast.

Home Gardener's Notebook

Weeds Steal Your Garden's Beauty

By ALLAN SWENSON

Summer weeds are the most common problem for the majority of home gardeners. Dandelions, plantain and chickweed usually are the worst offenders and do more harm. Crab grass is probably the most notorious pest.

First step in weed eradication is good turf management. A well-fed lawn grows thick and blocks out weeds. Early fertilizing feeds grass before weed seeds begin growing. Close and frequent mowing stops weeds from forming seeds.

Chemicals take the ache out of lawn weeding. You may purchase herbicides in powder, liquid or granular form.

Sprays of 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T are excellent. Dandelion and chickweed, buckhorn, clover and other broad-leaved weeds. These materials also eliminate pigweed, poison oak and larger weed growth on fences and sprays. Use caution with spray. Drift from broad-leaved plants can kill them too. Spray only on calm days.

Granular forms of 2, 4-D and Silvex are given over 50 per cent crab grass control. In heavy infested lawns, you may be able to apply them in two directions carefully.

Crab grass control has been difficult because it resists broad-leaved herbicides. For summer-time control, disodium methyl acetate, DMA; ammonium methyl acetate, AMA; potassium methyl acetate, PCA; and phenyl methyl acetate, PMA, are the most effective. Results vary with timing, temperature and accuracy of the spray.

Several treatments are usually required.

For flower beds, shrub borders and vegetable gardens, keep weeds down with mulches. Black plastic mulch gives positive control. Simply roll the film out in sheets, cover with soil, and cut out a slit where you want plants. It can be used on soil or mulch in the fall. Black polyfilm also conserves moisture and keeps plants cleaner. Disease is reduced.

Organic mulches of sawdust, straw, hay, corn cobs, sugar cane and peat moss have an extra advantage. They can be turned under to improve soil structure and add fertility.

For random weeds, rely on your well-sharpened hoe.
