While Manchester youngsters are entering the primary grades to learn their ABC's, 1,000 British five and six-year-olds will be learning a new alphabet.

Twenty-four London schools will offer a 45-letter alphabet, devised by Sir James Pitman, a member of the British Parliament and grandson of the shorthand pioneer.

According to the Associated Press, the new alphabet contains 26 old-fashioned letters and 19 new ones, resembling in some form the letters people are accustomed to see in print.

The old letters left out of the

represents one sound only. There are no capitals to confuse a child. Here are some examples: There are two forms of "th"—a soft sound as in "think" and a hard one as in "the." The soft one has the tail of the "h" extended below the line. In the hard "th" the "h" has its tail turned to the left, opposite to normal writing. Some of the new letters look like Greek characters. "Dat stiat for sus alfabet" means "data fixed for new alphabet."

Or, as many a fairy tale starts: "Once upon a time, there was a king. Exponents of the new alphabet have printed 200 different books in

the new system. Some 80 teachers are in training courses to learn the "A B" method. They expect it will be three years before any practical results can be had from the experiment. Sir James thinks children will learn to read in half the time needed at present. John Downing of London University, who is in charge of research, says the new system has scrapped almost completely letters having more than one sound. The variety of sounds in the new Letters has been cut from 200 to 40, he says. The plan is not designed to reform spelling. Says Sir James: to learn to read is "the most fantastic achievement of the human brain."

is this is printed in an augmented roman alphabet, the purpos of which is not, as might be supposed, to reform our spelling, but to improve the learning of reading. It is intended that when the beginner has achieved the initial success of fluency in this specially easy form, his further progress should be confined to reading in the present alphabets and spellings of them only.

If you had read as far as this, the new medium will have proved to you several points, the most important of which is that you, at any rate, have easily made the jump from the ordinary roman alphabet with conventional spellings to augmented roman with systematic spelling.

New York, Sept. 6 (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who entered a hospital yesterday for a "general checkup," was reported "feeling very well and cheerful" today.

Mrs. Roosevelt is expected to be in Columbia Presbyterian Hospital for a few days, but intends to keep in close touch with returns from New York City's primary election tomorrow. She presumably will tune in television or radio summaries.

Mrs. Roosevelt is a leader of a Democratic insurgent group that is backing Mayor Robert F. Wagner for re-election. Wagner has split with the regular Democratic organization, which is backing State Comptroller Arthur Levitt for the mayoral nomination.

The former First Lady was at her Hyde Park, N. Y., estate when a doctor who was visiting there socially during the weekend suggested she have a checkup before beginning her autumn schedule of activities. He was not identified.

Washington, Sept. 6 (AP) - President Kennedy has signed into law a bill making aircraft hijacking an act of piracy with penalties up to death.

The measure - which included lesser penalties of 20 years to life in prison - was enacted by Congress in reaction to gun-point seizures of commercial airliners.

The law also carries penalties of up to five years and a \$5,000 fine for giving false information about plane hijacking, and up to a year in jail and \$1,000 fine for illegally carrying concealed weapons aboard an aircraft.

Juries are given the sole authority to decide the death penalty for aircraft piracy under the statute, except in cases where the defendant has pleaded guilty or waived a jury trial. In those cases the judge may impose the death sentence.

Traffic Deaths Below Estimate For Labor Day

Chicago, Sept. 6 (AP) - Traffic accidents during the long Labor Day weekend killed 886 persons, 24 below pre-holiday estimates, and the death rate was a record low for the holiday period.

The National Safety Council, which had estimated the death toll of 910, said 28,000 persons suffered injuries during the 72-hour holiday period from 5 p.m. Friday to midnight Monday.

The traffic death toll compared 415 for the Labor Day holiday last year and the record of 461 in 1949.

Based on deaths per 100 million miles of travel, it was the safest Labor Day holiday on record with 8.8 deaths in traffic. The old record was 11.1 in 1949.

In addition to traffic fatalities, there were 24 deaths in boating accidents, 26 from drownings not involving boats and 77 in miscellaneous accidents for an overall total of 641.




