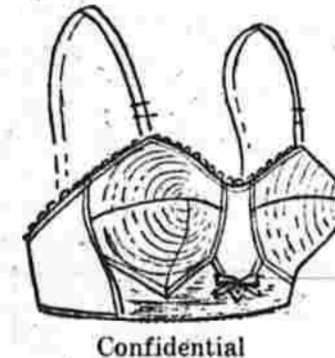

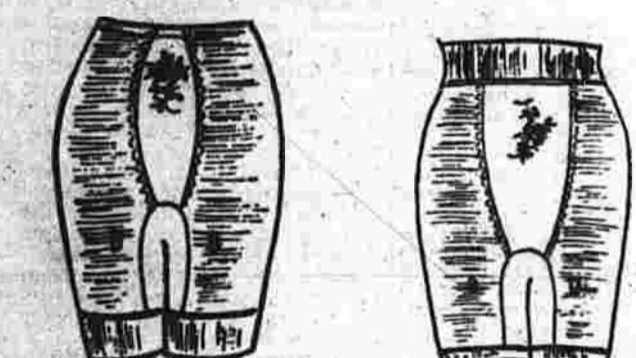

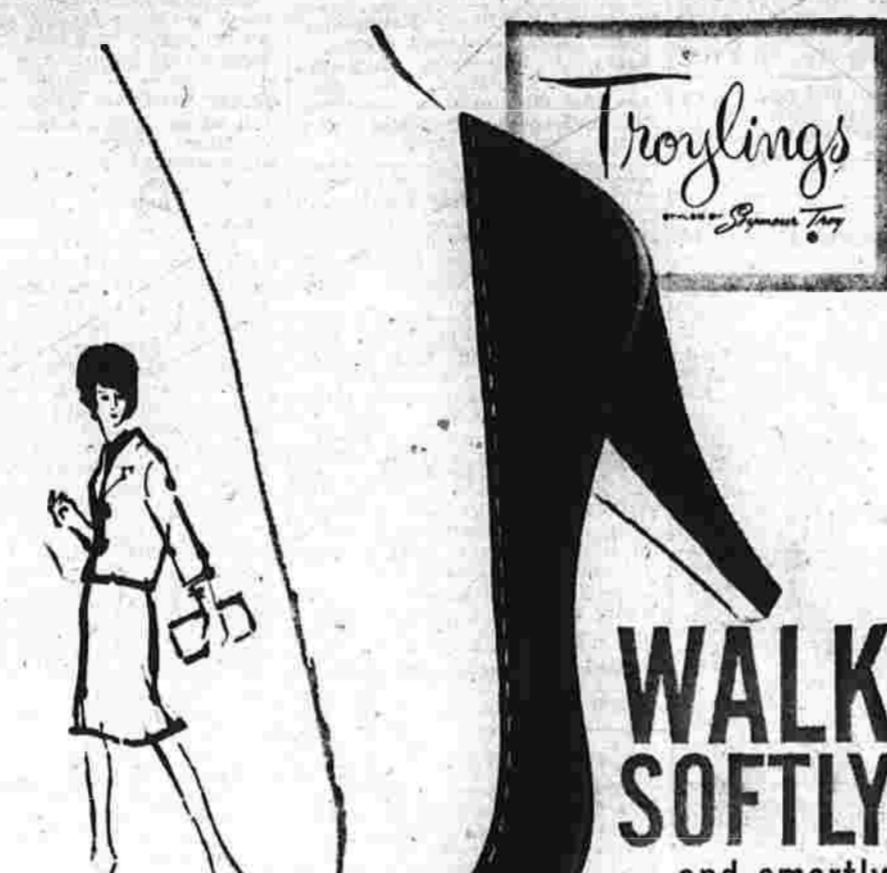

Pension Fund Investments Improved in Market Value

The investments of the town pension fund have improved in market value, income and diversification since the fund was turned over to the Hartford National Bank and Trust Co. July 1, 1960.

That was the essence of a report delivered last night to the pension board.

William Wilcox, vice president and trust officer of the bank, and Henry White, assistant cashier, explained that nearly the entire fund had been liquidated and reinvested, with the exception of some Treasury bonds amounting to \$26,499, since July 1960.

The book value of the investment allowance fund is \$500,057.84, they said, and the approximate market value is \$500,123.

The stock section of the securities increased in value by \$27,000 in market appreciation. While some bonds lost value somewhat, this was compensated by a net gain of \$17,000, they said.

The income of the fund was increased by selling some government bonds and reinvesting the proceeds in corporate bonds, thereby increasing the income of that block of money from 2 and 5/8 percent to 4 1/2 percent.

Permission to invest up to 25 percent of the fund in stocks, under the same restrictions that had savings banks, was granted by the board of directors last year.

\$115 Million Payroll

Hartford, Sept. 28 (AP)—The state's payroll for its 24,000 full-time employees totaled nearly \$115 million, a record high, during the fiscal year, the State Personnel Department says.

The department also reported to Gov. John N. Dempsey yesterday that the average annual salary of full-time employees during the year ended June 30 was \$4,700 for 261 working days.

The report does not include legislative employees or part-time employees of the state.

South ruffled the second grade, drew two rounds of trumps and cashed the ace of diamonds and led a low diamond toward dummy.

When West produced the ten of diamonds, South had to guess. He finally guessed with dummy's jack, losing to the queen. East promptly drew trumps and cashed the rest of the spades. Down four for a penalty of 1100 points.

Finishing the jack of diamonds was a horrible guess. If it went sour, as we have seen, South would be slaughtered. Playing the king of diamonds would be the wrong guess if East started with only one diamond, but South would then be down only one or two tricks.

If you have no real choice between one guess and another it's best to limit your loss to 500 points.

No Reason to Guess

In this case, however, South has no reason to guess. He can find out how to play the diamonds.

After drawing two rounds of trumps, South should lead a club hand with the ace of diamonds to lead out the king and queen of clubs.

East's bid and the opening lead show that East started with five or six diamonds. If East can lead with four known to have started with three clubs, it will be clear that he had only one diamond.

If it happens, East would follow to only two clubs. This would locate a good second diamond in the East hand. No need for guess work.

Daily Questions

Partner opens with one heart, and the next player passes. You hold: Spades—K 3 2; Hearts—Diamonds—10 4; Clubs—8 7 5 4 3 2. What do you say?

Answer: Pass. This shows your weakness unmistakably. You can run to clubs if your partner is doubled but don't scream before you're hurt.

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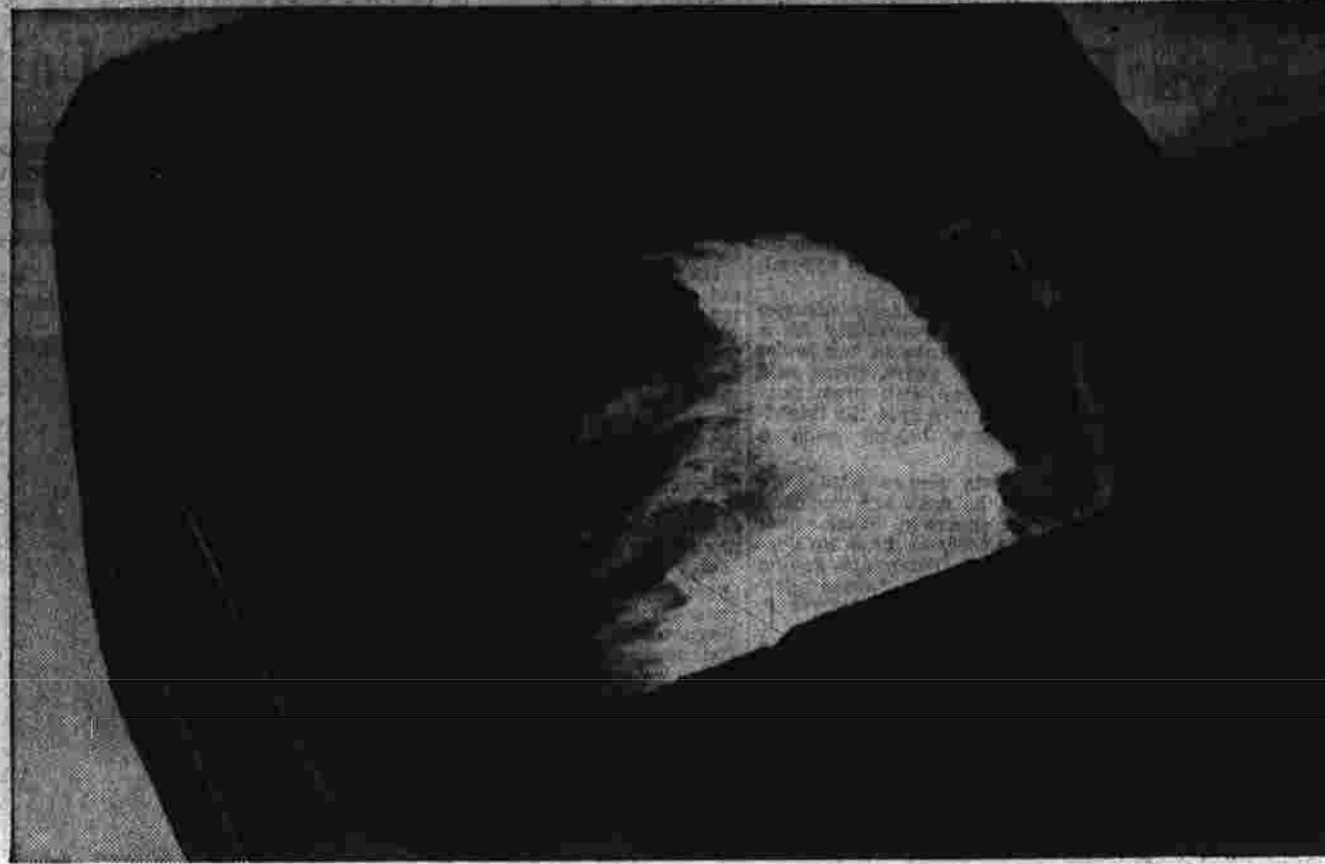

On Dec. 1, 1927, I was 19, and a part-time valet. In the five years since I had fled my grandparents' Alabama roof to mope the theater, that thankless trip had given me but forty weeks work. Less than a month had elapsed since I was ambushed in "The Exciters," my fifth flop.

Beast by nose and hunger I gave autograph Evangelina Adams my last \$50 to probe my future and speculate on my prospects. She said my fortune lay overseas. "When summoned go, even if you have to swim," she said.

A week later I received this cable from London producer Charles R. Cochran: "Possibility engagement with Gerald Du Maurier in eight weeks. Writing fully cable if free." Within an hour I was boasting to anyone who would listen on my imminent invasion of England. A week later a second cable from Cochran floored me: "Terribly sorry. Du Maurier's plans changed."

Though crushed by this reversal, I called Cochran. I was coming anyway. He pleaded with me not to.

I said, "Well, here I am."

"Didn't you get my cable telling you not to come because I'd engaged another girl?" he asked. "What cable," I replied. Du Maurier may have been fascinated by my monumental nerve, or he may have wanted to do a favor for his friend Cochran. In any event I got the role in "The Danvers," and played it for his 45-week run at Wynham's Theater. That engagement started me on an eight-year reign in London during which I became the toast of the critics and the talk of the Thames. Thus my

darkest moment predated my most shining hour. When I left New York in '28 I was just a jump ahead of the sheriff. When I returned in '31 I was a star, lured home by a \$5,000 a week contract from Paramount. The moral to this tale: Nothing risked, nothing gained.

Your Pocketbook

Lenders seldom quote The True Interest Rates. Wake up! Credit like all good things can be had in being asked. The attraction of it is that with so much temptation so relatively few of us go overboard when it comes to using consumer credit.

If you are a wise user of credit, you will shop around until you find a lender that offers the lowest true interest rate.

Unfortunately few lenders today quote true interest rates. Instead, there are three other methods generally used by lenders to calculate what they will charge when you borrow. These are:

The add-on method in which the lender adds the finance charge to the amount borrowed. If you borrow \$100 for a 12-month period at 8 per cent, you receive only \$94 and repay \$108 monthly. This is fractionally cheaper than the add-on method but still not true 8 per cent rate since you do not have the full use of the \$100 for the full 12-month period.

Finally, you can be charged interest on the unpaid balance. Here the interest charge is calculated each month on the amount you still owe. Providing the rate of interest charged is the same as that of an add-on or discounted loan, the true cost is lower because you pay interest on progressively smaller amounts.

How much interest you wind up paying on any loan depends on several factors. How good a credit risk you are, how long you choose to use the money you borrow. It is less expensive if you borrow for 12 months than for 36. It also depends on from whom you borrow.

In the wonderland of credit, the consumer is almost never told the cost of debt in terms of true annual interest," writes Hill Black in his recently published book "Buy Now, Pay Later."

There is much that you can learn about the use, abuse and history of credit from this reporter's expose of the world of lenders. Black's big point is that selling money has become an industry in itself. The sellers of credit are discovering that more profit can be derived from debt itself and therefore the sale of the merchandise is becoming secondary.

Watch this carefully if you are about to go on a summer spending spree. It could apply to almost anything you might finance, from automobiles to suitcases.

If the housewife takes her community responsibilities seriously, she finds that her time is consumed by meetings that last twice as long as need last, by all sorts of busy work that has no real purpose. More than likely she will have to take her turn providing "refreshments" since when women meet they expect to eat.

Repairmen have no respect for a housewife's time, either. The man who promises to come Monday morning to fix the washer, likely as not will show up Wednesday afternoon. Meanwhile, the housewife's time is not her own, for if she leaves the house to do an errand, that is the time the repairman is sure to show up and she will have to start the waiting routine all over again.

But, while nobody respects the time of the housewife, it's really nobody's fault but her own. Instead of making others respect her working hours, she lets them be wailed and then complains that her greatest problem is lack of time.

The Doctor Says

From a number of scattered sources we have been informed of dangers to the well child that may surprise you as much as they surprised me.

The X-ray department of the Children's Hospital in Southern California reports the finding of serious bone damage in films taken of the extremities of youngsters who were not known to have been exposed to any injury.

In some of these instances, later investigation led to the suspicion that the injury had been inflicted by cruel or ignorant parents.

But it seems it may have been that the damage was caused by playfully tossing the child in the air and catching it as it descended. Or by lifting the child by the arms. Or dragging it by the legs. Or yanking the youngster along while hurrying to the car.

Since the child could give no account of these incidents and might only react by crying or restlessness, the site and extent of the injury may not be detected. And, since injury to growing bones may lead to later shortening and deformity, unless corrected immediately, these seemingly trivial incidents have far-reaching results later in life.

From the New York Upstate Medical Center we learn that there is more of the problem of poisoning in children than the mere factor of accident.

The child who suffers a poisoning is apt to suffer a repetition of the experience. And the "poison-prone" child is apt to be the particularly active and mischievous youngster of working parents.

Even more surprising to me is a study from Boston indicating that the child who suffers a burn is one who may likely have had an emotional problem before the accident took place.

Since burns are now the second most frequent cause for accidental death in children, succeeding all the contagious diseases put together, this observation commands the attention of conscientious parents.

To illustrate the emotional problem, the Boston observers report that eight of the 19 burned children whom they studied came from families whose backgrounds that were "grossly disturbed." This observation is of vast importance, not only in providing a clue to accident prevention, but also in caring for the burned child.

For, unless the emotional problem is attacked at its roots, it may be impossible to get the child to co-operate in the long, drawn-out and often painful program that is essential to recovery.

Swedish king. This was a tribute by the royal family to the victims of the Ndola crash, which killed eight other Swedes besides Hammarström and the other victims. A state funeral for Hammarström will be held tomorrow at the ancient university town of Uppsala. The ritual follows that reserved for Swedish royalty and never accorded to a commoner in this century.

From Stockholm, Hammarström's coffin will be taken by car under police escort to Uppsala, 40 miles north of the capital. The coffin of the other three Swedish victims will be taken to their home towns. The other coffin will rest in a specially decorated hearse with a guard of U.S. soldiers until they are flown to their homes in four different countries.

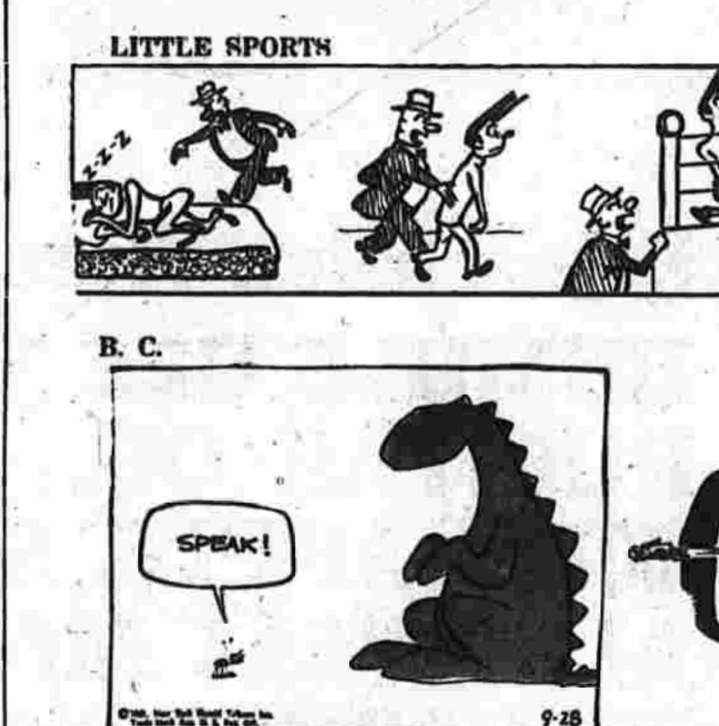

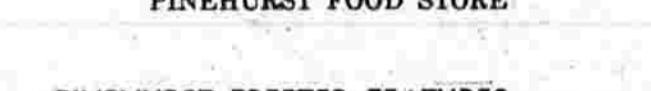

Syria Cuts Links with UAR; Nasser Calls Off Invasion

Beirut, Lebanon, Sept. 23 (AP)—Syria reasserted its independence today after less than four years as a region of the United Arab Republic and set up a new civilian government supported by rebel army officers. President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the UAR bowed to the revolutionary command which led the pre-dawn uprising yesterday. He announced that he had recalled troops, planes and warships sent to crush the revolt, and indicated he would leave to the Syrians the task of working out their future. "The regime of tyranny has gone forever," said Damascus broadcastists proclaiming independence from Cairo, accusing Nasser of turning Syria into a prison and disputing his claim to Arab leadership. Speaking to a crowd of 100,000 in Cairo, Nasser said the entire Egyptian Navy, Air Force and two Army regiments were sent to Syria yesterday, but were recalled to avoid bloodshed when the rebels took over Latakia, Syria's chief port. He announced that he had recalled troops, planes and warships sent to crush the revolt, and indicated he would leave to the Syrians the task of working out their future.
