# Franco Says Spain Tied Solidly to West

Burgos, Spain, Oct. 2 (AP)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco today pledged Spain's steady alignment with the western powers and urged them to adopt a "just political program" to beat communism in the worldwide struggle.

El Caudillo (the leader) addressed thousands of his supporters here on the last day of the 3-day observance of the 25th anniversary of his accession as Spain's chief of state.

In a speech yesterday he called for renovation of the U.S.-Spanish military pact, raising speculation that he wants his forces to be equipped with nuclear weapons.

Franco spoke for 40 minutes today to the National Council in the ancient monastery of las Huelgas, established in this provincial capital in 1187.

He urged the West to remember that "Wars are not won by arms alone and against the Marxist doctrine we must oppose a sound progressive political program."

He reiterated Spain's close relationships with the West and its determined opposition to communism in all forms.

The Franco address to the National Council was his final speech of the day's program. He spoke earlier at the inauguration of a seminary, and at a meeting of the Spanish Youth Front.

The National Council session was held in the ancient chamber of the monastery where it, formally declared Franco the chief of state on Oct. 1, 1939.

The address yesterday urging that the U.S. Spanish pact of 1953 be brought up to date was before his cabinet and top military commanders.

## Verwoerd Attacker Hangs Self in Cell

Bloemfontein, South Africa, Oct. 2 (AP)—David Beresford Pratt, wealthy white farmer who shot and wounded Prime Minister Hendrik F. Verwoerd, was found dead in his cell room in a mental clinic here last night, the South African Press Association reported.

Pratt was found with a bed sheet tied around his neck, authorities at the mental clinic where he was confined said.

The attempt on Verwoerd's life was made April 6, 1960. Pratt went on trial a year ago but his trial was halted when the Supreme Court committed him to a mental asylum.

South African newspapers said Pratt's daughter Susan, 23, visited him only last week before she flew to London where she plans to marry Bob Hoffman, 23, Rochester, N. Y.

# Nixon Backer Offered Job Choice to Knight

Sacramento, Calif., Oct. 2 (AP)—Paul Mason, close friend and political associate of former Gov. Goodwin J. Knight, says he overheard a telephone conversation in which a backer offered the state job to Knight if he would bow out of the race for the 1962 gubernatorial nomination.

Knight had declared Thursday that a Nixon representative had made the offer. His charge brought an angry denial from the former Vice President who said "no person representing or authorized by me has made such a promise."

Mason said Knight's account of the conversation was true and promised to appear with the former governor at a press conference in Los Angeles this week to answer questions.

Mason, now a Sacramento attorney, said he was visiting Knight in a Sacramento hotel room Sept. 7 when the phone rang. Another man was in the room at the time. Knight motioned Mason and the other man to come over to the telephone and listen in on the conversation.

Mason, motor vehicles director in the Knight administration, said he heard the caller offer the ex-governor "any job in the state, chief justice or anything you want if you won't run against Dick" in the primary.

Mason said he did not recognize the voice on the phone but said Knight told him the man's name

### 124 Places Hold Elections Today

Municipal elections in some 124 communities around Connecticut drew voters to the polls today.

Torrington, Bristol and Middletown, with their mayoralty elections, held the main spotlight. In the rest of the communities, selectmen and other officials are to be named.

In the town-city of Winchester-Winsted, a nonpartisan council will be chosen. In the other elections, voters will be choosing between Democrats and Republicans.

South Windsor voters will elect a 9-man council under its new charter.

The GOP controls 83 of the towns involved, and the Democrats reign in 40.

The number of voters eligible in the towns involved total some 470,000.

In Torrington's mayoralty race, Anthony C. Gelormino, the Democratic incumbent, is being challenged by J. Eric Chadwick, former city councilman.

Walter J. Murphy, who in the last election turned out Democrat James P. Casey, finds the tables turned in Bristol, Casey is out for a fifth term in his eighth campaign.

Harry T. Clew, Middletown's mayor for seven years, is up against Republican John S. Roth. Most of the state's larger cities will pick their officials Nov. 7.

## Men at UConn Protest Again On New Rules

Storrs, Oct. 2 (AP)—A protest demonstration, the second in four days, has been staged at the University of Connecticut by male students angered over new social and activities rules.

A swarm of students formed about 11 last night and toured the campus, making stops at the home of University President Albert N. Jorgensen and Assistant Dean of Men John Dunlop.

Student observers set the number between 500-750. University sources said there were only 150.

The disturbance was similar to one which broke out last Thursday night. The youths paraded, shouted, and sang songs. No damage was reported in either incident.

Neither Jorgensen nor Dunlop came to the door when the crowd appeared before their homes. The demonstration broke up after an hour and a half.

University officials say the students are upset over a crackdown on drinking in the campus. Some student spokesmen claim the protest also is against a series of new rules governing many phases of student affairs.

The administration said it has had to take harsher steps to check drinking after several house meetings were protested.

Among the new rules which the students criticize is one giving the university control over the spending by any organization with a budget exceeding \$100 a year.

The student senate recently voted to hire a lawyer to fight a regulation giving the administration control over the allocation of student fees. Heretofore this had been a function of the senate. The

## Two Sikhs End Hunger Strikes On 48th Day

New Delhi, India, Oct. 2 (AP)—The end of two hunger strikes today eased the threat of rioting and bloodshed in India.

Sikh leader Master Tara Singh yesterday broke his 48-day fast staged to dramatize his demand for a separate Sikh state in the Punjab.

As the 70-year-old religious leader sipped fruit juice, Hindu ascetic Higuraj Suryadey said he would end the hunger strike he began at the same time in protest against giving the Sikhs their own state.

Prime Minister Nehru sent both religious leaders telegrams expressing "much pleasure and satisfaction" that they had given up their demonstrations. He had made repeated appeals to the two men before in fear the death of Singh would set his followers off in a round of rioting.

The prime minister has stood firm against creating a Sikh state but he promised to name a commission to look into Sikh complaints of discrimination.

The end of the hunger strikes came as prayer meetings were held throughout the nation to mark the 92nd anniversary of the birth of the man who made such strikes an effective political weapon—Mohandas K. Gandhi, leader of the Indian independence movement.

## Frances Heads To Open Water

San Juan, P. R., Oct. 2 (AP)—Heading into open waters of the Caribbean, tropical storm Frances was expected to regain today strength lost in crossing mountains of the northern Antilles.

A hurricane watch continued in effect for Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic, while warnings were discontinued for the Antilles from St. Kitts southward to Martinique.

The season's sixth tropical storm popped up in the Atlantic southeast of Puerto Rico Saturday and was just shy of hurricane strength when first readings were taken by hurricane hunter aircraft.

The storm's westward passage across high mountains of Guadeloupe and Dominica weakened her. Highest winds were estimated today at 50 miles per hour. Weather forecasters said Frances would intensify and possibly reach hurricane force in the next day or two.

## U.S., Russia Inch To Berlin Parleys

Washington, Oct. 2 (AP)—The United States and Russia are reported inching toward agreement on negotiations that could lead to a compromise settlement of the Berlin crisis.

Prospects seemed brighter than 10 days ago, when Secretary of State Dean Rusk began a series of talks with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko, that there will be an early high-level meeting to settle the dispute over the divided German city.

Its probable form would be an East-West foreign ministers conference.

The next order of business is a continuation in Washington of the Rusk-Gromyko talks. The two held three meetings in New York during the last 10 days.

After the third meeting Saturday, Gromyko said, "We both probably have a deeper understanding of our position." U.S. officials privately agreed with Gromyko's estimates and said the talks had been "useful."

Gromyko probably will come here Tuesday or Wednesday to see Rusk and to call on President Kennedy at the White House.

Presumably, by then Gromyko will have further instructions from Moscow. He might bring to Rusk a list of proposals, including from Soviet Premier Khrushchev, although high administration informants say privately that Kennedy has no plan to send a permanent U.S. representative to Berlin.

At the moment, Kennedy and Rusk are faced with the urgent task of persuading the United States' allies to go along with whatever formula can be evolved to settle the Berlin crisis.

Britain presents no problem. The British have been pressing for negotiations.

Lord Home, Britain's foreign secretary, met in New York with Anthony C. Gelormino and all three agreed the series of talks was useful. On flying home to London last night Home said in a cheerful and cautiously optimistic mood:

## Three Deputies, No Veto Reds for One Man As UN Secretary

United Nations, N. Y., Oct. 2 (AP)—The Soviet Union has brought forward a plan to name a temporary chief of the U.N. secretary-general until April 1962, but he would have to work in cooperation with three deputies. None would have a veto. The assembly would make its selection on the recommendation of the Security Council.

The Russians have a veto in the Security Council and could reject any candidate they disliked.

The Russian statement said U.S. press reports had distorted the Soviet position by saying that it aimed at using the veto in the everyday work of the guiding body of the secretariat.

In Washington, State Department officials said today they were impressed by the Soviet proposal.

They described it as but another version of the 4-horse troika, suggested by the Soviets last week. As such, they indicated, it does not appeal to this country and apparently not to the majority of U.N. members.

The U.S. position is that there can be no give on this issue still stands, informants said, but they added the Soviet proposal will be studied in detail.

## Veto Versus Veto UN Council Considers Mauritania, Mongolia

United Nations, N. Y., Oct. 2 (AP)—The applications of Mauritania and Outer Mongolia for U.N. membership were up for consideration at an afternoon meeting of the Security Council today.

Nobody expected either country to be admitted very soon. The council must recommend new members before the General Assembly votes them in.

Delegates generally predicted that the Soviet Union would veto Mauritania and that the Nationalist China would veto Outer Mongolia.

The assembly has put the question of seating Communist China on its agenda for the first time since the Communists came to power in 1949. But the United States hopes to stall off a decision by getting the assembly to set up a committee to study the question and report back next year.

That could be done with a simple majority vote. But the United States is understood to fear that if the Brazzaville group votes against any resolution to establish a study committee, that might be enough to defeat it.

If that happens the United States then would seek to have the assembly declare a change in Chinese representation an important question requiring a two-thirds vote for a decision.

Such a declaration itself could be adopted by a simple majority vote. But opposition from the Brazzaville group would make that majority harder to get.

## Strongman Arrested in Damascus

Washington, Oct. 2 (AP)—The provisional government of Syria has asked the United States for diplomatic recognition, the State Department reported today. The department spokesman said the request is "under study."

United Nations, N. Y., Oct. 2 (AP)—The new Syrian government took today what U.N. officials regarded as a first step toward application for membership in the United Nations.

A U.N. spokesman said Premier Mamoun Kuzbari, head of the new Syrian regime, addressed a communication to Mongi Slim, of Tunisia, president of the U.N. Assembly, saying his government intends to adhere to the principles of the U.N. charter.

"The Syrian people who struggled against all forms of imperialism will never give the exploiters a chance to rule."

But Nasser conceded a setback in Syria that might set off a chain of "treason throughout the Arab nations." He blamed mistakes, conceit and trickery for the success of the revolt.

"It might turn into a catastrophe."

"Can you bring in Bobby, Ted and Joe"—referring to President Kennedy's brothers, Robert and Ted and their father Joseph—Nixon said he was in all their money and all their relatives and would like to see them.

### A Medal For Somebody

In Biarez, two rival national interests, two rival prizes, two rival cities, two rival religions, two rival convictions had each other in a situation of physical deadlock. It was a miniature demonstration of the game being played, in the field of international relations, by rival blocs of nations, rival ideologies, rival ways of life, rival civilizations.

In Biarez, rather than persist in this mutual deadlock blindly and obstinately and instinctively until the splitting of the atom had made it worse and still more difficult of solution, somebody made the first gesture of willingness to retreat out of the deadlock.

We don't really know, from what has reached the news of the diplomatic involved, which party it was which made this first gesture.

Perhaps it was President Bourguiba, who had always seemed a relatively mild and conciliatory character until he himself seemed to trigger the Biarez crisis a few weeks ago. Perhaps it was the France of de Gaulle, which has been magnanimous as well as its proud moments, which made the crucial first gesture.

All we do know is that this first gesture, whichever side made it, made possible a corresponding gesture of retreat from deadlock by the other side.

If we knew exactly which side it was which first developed this willingness to retreat from deadlock, we could, of course, ascribe some evaluation of its action. We could, we suppose, say that it had turned weak and irresolute. We could say it had appeased. We could say it had accepted defeat. We could say it had surrendered.

But because we do not, at this writing at least, know exactly which side it was which first showed willingness to retreat out of deadlock, we find ourselves forced into another kind of comment. We have to say that whichever side it was that made the first gesture, it was deserving a medal for the courage and resolution it takes to be the first to risk the risk of weakness, for the fortitude it takes to take a chip off one's own shoulder, for the common sense, realistic awareness that for resolving any deadlock, there has to come the subtle, critical, telling moment when one side has to make the first little move, that side which proved its great courage and strength and gained a great victory.

### The Glass Walls

The fads of architecture come and go cyclically. During its peak, each pretends, of course, that it is no such thing, but rather the ultimate development of the architect's art, shaping the materials of his time to the spirit and utilitarian requirements of his age. And the fad of the moment is always of course, the most economical style of building.

It has been this nation's misfortune to have the greatest school building boom in its history at the precise time when the modern architectural fad of glass buildings, trimmed and edged and studded with brick, v.a. reaching its crest. Already, we are thankful to say, there are signs that the type of construction, 10 per cent brick and 90 per cent glass, may be on its way out, and there may come a day when schools which look like fine community buildings will be replaced by schools which look like modern schools.

Meanwhile, however, the fad has had its sting almost everywhere, and left teachers and pupils to live in these monuments for many years to come.

Great Neck, a community down on Long Island, has just spent \$18,000 for a survey of experts to tell it what it ought to do if it wants to live with two of its monuments in what might be considered conditions of tolerable comfort.

Great Neck has two handsome new schools, a junior high school, and a senior high school, built in 1948, for a combined cost of \$9,200,000.

What Great Neck has found is exactly what ordinary people used to think, when the modern glass walls first came into fashion, and what the architects need to deny would have to be the case. Great Neck found that its walls which were all windows made its schools unbearably hot. Other communities have found that, in winter, on the north side, the new architecture has made rooms consistently chill. But down in Great Neck the chief problem has been to relieve the classrooms of excessive heat, and the answer the school board got from the consulting engineers it called in was that it ought to spend another \$1,720,000 installing air-conditioning systems in its new schools. We suspect that it may be many a hot day before the taxpayers approve such an additional expenditure. But we would also like to say that, in theory at least, such an expenditure, if required to make the comfortable school buildings reasonably new-school, ought to be added to the original cost of the buildings in any discussion of the so-called economy of the glass building style.

When the fad first appeared, there were old-fashioned knitters who said that glass walls would make rooms hotter in summer and make it too hard to heat them in winter. That old-fashioned idea still seems to have a certain amount of truth in it, and it is much it was scoffed at by the architectural soothsayers of the time.

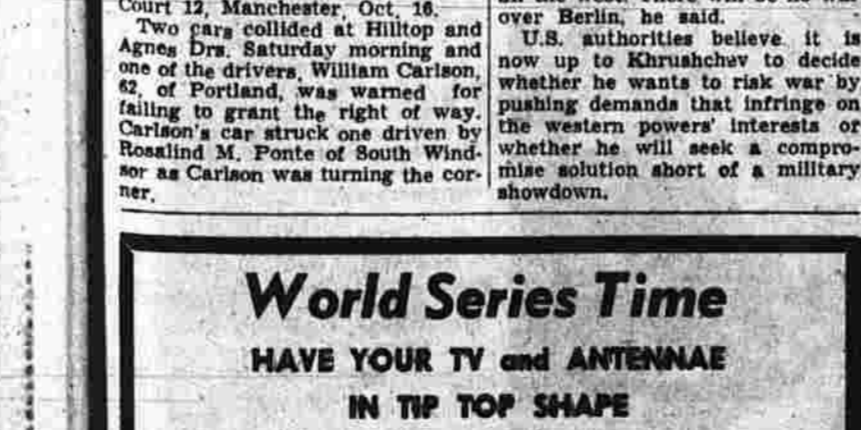
Nor will the Allies yield their right of access to Berlin across East German territory. However, they probably would be prepared to consider some practical recognition of East German authority over operation of the supply lines.

In a speech yesterday, Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin said the West is not prepared to abandon its rights in the city. He added that part of these rights is uncontrolled access to Berlin for Allied soldiers stationed there and for civilians as well.

Brandt said the Russians realize that any act of force directed at West Berlin would be answered with force as aggression against all the West. This will be no war over Berlin, he said.

U.S. authorities believe it is now up to Khrushchev to decide whether he wants to risk war by pushing demands that interfere with the western powers' interests or whether he will seek a compromise solution short of a military showdown.
