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### You Should Know ...

#### Renato N. Nicola

Renato N. Nicola, the 35-year-old president of the Newton Co. took his seat for the first time last week on the Manchester Development Commission.

Nicola is not only one of the youngest men in Connecticut to hold a responsible job, but his first job in electronics—bringing him in contact with the type of industry the town is trying to attract.

Nicola has been president of the company since last year. He joined the company in 1954 as a development engineer and was promoted to his present position in 1959.

Nicola married the former Miss Joyce Skates of Manchester in 1958. They live at 166 Lyman St. with their four sons, James, Timothy, Richard and Robert.

Nicola is the son of Frank and Margaret Nicola, 30 Edridge St. He was born July 8, 1926, attended Manchester schools, and was graduated from Manchester High School in 1941.

During World War II he was trained by the Army for ten months as a pre-medical student at the University of Oregon.

The change from pre-med to the 19th Armored Division in Europe was "a rude process" involving six weeks of basic in Texas for boys by mail only.

He served in France, Belgium and Germany, took part in the Battle of the Bulge, and was discharged as a private in 1946.

In 1946 he received his bachelor of science degree from the University of Connecticut, and in 1951 received his master of science from Rutgers University where he also had taught electrical engineering to undergraduates.

State Will Pave 23 Town Streets

Paving of 23 town streets with No. 138 bituminous concrete will begin "probably within a couple of days, or the beginning of next week," said Chester Langtry, deputy director of public works, today. The state will select a contractor to do the work.

The state is also footing the \$35,000 bill to do the job. The material to be laid is a semi-permanent paving, the same type which the town is using in its program to provide longer lasting streets.

Town to Try New Mixture On Snow, Ice

The town is planning to buy 25 tons of calcium chloride, some of which will be mixed with salt this winter as an experiment in melting snow and ice.

Chester Langtry, deputy director of public works, said the state has been experimenting with the mixture for some time. A stretch of the northbound lane of Rt. 15 was a testing area last year, he said, and other areas will be tested by the state this year.

However, the results of the test last year were favorable enough to warrant Manchester's highway division making its own tests this year on town roads, he said.

Usually the town uses sand

alone, salt alone, or limited quantities of calcium chloride, he said. Calcium chloride melts at a lower temperature than salt, and starts the chain reaction by which the salt melts snow and ice. Bids on the calcium chloride will be opened Monday at 11 a.m. The chemical will be in flake form. The town is asking that bids remain firm until April 1. Bid specifications call for delivery either in bulk or in 100-pound bags. One hundred and fifty tons of salt have already been delivered.

# CD Drops Plan To Quit Cities In N-Attack

Washington, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Federal Government has abandoned, for all practical purposes, the idea of evacuating city dwellers ahead of any oncoming nuclear bombs and missiles.

The Pentagon will not discourage local and state Civil Defense authorities from continuing evacuation plans if they choose, said a spokesman for the office of Civil Defense. But he added:

"Evacuation certainly takes second place to fallout shelters in Washington's planning."

The fact now recognized, but never clearly acknowledged previously, is that fleeing into open countryside even if that was ample warning time—would not protect city populations from the major nuclear hazard, radioactive fallout.

One member of Congress, Rep. Robert W. Kastenmeier, D-Wis., has demanded the removal of the blue "Civil Defense route" signs that mark the highways of his state and others.

The signs are dangerous and misleading, Kastenmeier said in a letter to OGD Director Stewart L. Pittman, because they breed false hopes of escape by flight and "deceive people as to the real danger they would face in nuclear war."

While Kastenmeier waited for a reply, an OGD spokesman called attention to a little-noticed Pittman at a conference of local civil defense officials on Oct. 19.

It amounted to a repudiation of evacuation as a basis for national protective planning.

"For many years reliance has been placed on evacuation as a cornerstone of Civil Defense planning," Pittman said.

"As applied to the problems of surprise attack a new emphasis is clearly necessary."

# Fallout: Fears and Facts

## How Great Is the Danger?

(Note—Russian weapons testing has set off a worldwide wave of concern over radioactive fallout. Can the hazards, to you and your family, be accurately assessed? What's the best way to protect yourself? This is the first of three articles on the subject.)

By ALTON BLAKESLEE Associated Press Science Writer New York, Nov. 1 (AP)—The scarfiest word of the day is fallout. But experts say no one can point to any human being and declare: "He's been hurt by distant fallout from bomb tests."

"That woman's baby will be born defective because of fallout, or her children will."

The odds are practically nil that present amounts of fallout will hurt you as an individual. Yet it is equally true that some people somewhere will be damaged or will die too soon—possibly ultimately thousands of people—

from fallout already looted by bomb tests. The Soviet 50-megaton bomb test could perhaps add hundreds or even thousands of potential victims to the list.

But one fact must be made clear. All such estimates mean thousands out of hundreds of millions or ten billions of persons who would be born in the next 30, 50 to 100 years or more.

# Belize Evacuates 30,000

## Aid Rushed to Area Smashed by Hattie

Miami, Fla., Nov. 1 (AP)—Boats and planes pushed aid today toward Belize, a British Honduras city devastated by Hurricane Hattie's fierce winds, high tides and torrential rains.

Hai Holler, operator of Radio Station HR3HH for the Standard Fruit Co. at LaCieba, Honduras, said only two known casualties had been reported but that the city of Belize, with 31,000 population, was virtually destroyed.

The government radio station and the tower at the air field were smashed, Holler reported, but a police emergency radio was in operation.

"The damage is appalling," said a radio message from the governor of the crown colony.

"Hurricane Hattie struck Belize with great severity. Damage to property is devastating. The sea invaded the town to depths of 9 to 10 feet," he said in an appeal for help intercepted by a ham radio operator.

It was reported that 30,000 Belize residents had been evacuated. The Mexican consul in Belize sent a plea for aid in a message relayed by Compania Mexicana de Aviacion radio facilities in Merida, Yucatan. Mexico's minister of health and welfare put his staff on an emergency basis and or-

dered supplies and medical personnel sent into the ravaged area. A TAN airlines plane loaded with food, clothing and medicine left Miami today for the stricken city. Miami Mayor Robert King High had broadcast an appeal for the supplies and transportation was arranged by the British consulate in Miami.

TACA airlines, which was four-engine planes on its Central American runs out of New Orleans, planned to stop at Belize with a supply of badly-needed chlorine to purify water.

The British Frigate, Trowbridge, carrying medical teams and supplies, left Kingston, Jamaica, yesterday on the 300-mile run across the Caribbean to the British Honduras port.

The Aircraft Carrier Antietam, which participated in a mercy mission off the Texas coast after hurricane Carla struck, cut short a New Orleans visit and headed for Pensacola, Fla., to pick up helicopters and supplies to take to Honduras. Two Navy destroyers off the Honduras coast were ordered to move in and give aid.

Frank Smithman, British Consul at Miami, said an unsigned radio message relayed to him from

## Police Capture Three Fugitives After Chase

Enfield, Nov. 1 (AP)—Three escaped convicts broke out of hiding in Enfield today, took a hostage, and made a desperate dash for freedom in a stolen car. They were captured by state and local police in Farmington.

Taken into custody were Charles Timms, 29, of Waterbury; John Fisk, 29, of Hartford; and Nicholas Moccio, 26, of Brooklyn, N.Y.

A fourth convict who got away from the Osborn Division of Connecticut State Prison, Enfield, Monday night was captured yesterday afternoon as he napped in a wooded area of Longmeadow, Mass.

He was Howard A. Hough, 51, of Hartford, serving a life term for second degree murder.

A concentration of some 400 state troopers, auxiliaries, local policemen and correctional officers kept the quartet pinned down to an area close to the prison.

The action today began at 8:30 a.m. when Ludwig J. Carstens, 73, former proprietor of the Enfield Inn, went out to the garage at his residence, 1405 Enfield St., Enfield.

Timms, Fisk and Moccio jumped on him, struck him over the right eye with some unidentified weapon and tossed him into the rear seat of his 1957 motor two-door, blue-colored Mercury sedan.

The trio piled into the car and headed south. They admitted their identity and wanted to know if their pictures had been published in the newspapers. They took about \$35 from Carstens' wallet but returned the wallet to him.

They pushed Carstens out of his car near the intersection of Garden and Cogswell Sts., Hartford, and sped away. Carstens located Policeman Wayne Spielman nearby and two minutes later an alarm flashed over the police radio.

The getaway car careened west out of Hartford on Farmington Ave., dashed at high speed through West Hartford and into Farmington.

West Hartford State Troopers and Farmington Police took up the chase in their cars. There were at least six West Hartford officers pursuing the fleeing convicts.

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# Fifty Moslems Killed In Algerian Rioting

# Heed Plea By Chiefs From Tunis

Algiers, Nov. 1 (AP)—Moslems demonstrated wildly throughout Algeria today, seventh anniversary of the Algerian rebellion, and clashed with French troops and police at several points. At least 50 Moslems died and more than 70 were wounded, by official count.

Fights with riot squads and soldiers cost 40 dead—including 10 in one incident during the afternoon at Ras El Aouin, in Eastern Algeria. Ten others perished, the Army reported, when a light army observation plane crashed into a crowd of demonstrators at El-Amaud, also in Eastern Algeria.

Moslems throughout the North African territory heeded a call from the rebel government in Tunis and took to the streets demanding independence on the seventh anniversary of the start of the bloody Algerian rebellion. The Moslems ignored orders from the French government to stay at home.

The government spokesman gave no report of any European casualties.

A band of Moslems attacked a French Army Post at M'Sila, near the Bougie terminus of the Saharan Oil pipelines. French fire cut them down, killing 11 Moslems and wounding 15.

Police said two Moslem demonstrators were killed in Bougie and about 100 wounded.

The Moslems were killed in the Dar-el-Kel district of Algiers. Troops said snipers fired from windows and they moved into the quarter shooting. The troops, one wounded, three French troops, one soldier reported.

A gang of warring Moslems hit the countryside near Tiarat, south of Oran, and set 12 European farms on fire, officials reported. There was no immediate report on European deaths or injuries.

Troops and police dispersed one gang in the Algiers Moslem sector of Slember with blows from rifle bullets and truncheons. They ringed Moslem quarters of Algiers and other cities and tried to keep

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# Chrysler, UAW Resume Talks Under Strain

Detroit, Nov. 1 (AP)—Under pressure of a strike deadline, Chrysler Corp. resumed top-level negotiations with the United Auto Workers today on a new three-year labor contract.

Neither side gave any indication a settlement could be reached before the Thursday midnight deadline.

Chrysler's Vice President for Personnel, John D. Leary, said company negotiators had been "discussing a lot of different phases" of a counter proposal on wages and benefits submitted by the union on Monday.

"It isn't a situation where you can give a direct answer of yes or no," Leary said when asked whether the company had a reply ready for the union.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther, who said he would not be newsmen he wanted them to note he had showed up 20 minutes ahead of time for the session scheduled to start at 9 a.m. Leary and his team arrived 30 minutes later.

Reuther, who served formal notice on the company last night, said he had slept on a couch at his office in union headquarters working this far under a 1968-81 contract that required 48 hours notice after its normal expiration date of last Aug. 31.

They were angry words exchanged as the two broke off negotiations shortly after midnight today. The only negotiator to leave the bargaining room with a smile was Walter P. Reuther, after questioning by reporters.

The company, he said, needs a greater sense of urgency if a strike is to be averted.

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# U.S. Under Pressure To Stop N-Testing

United Nations, N.Y., Nov. 1 (AP)—The United States was under mounting pressure in the United Nations today to call off plans for any new nuclear weapon tests as support grew for an appeal to the big powers to agree to a voluntary test moratorium.

The appeal appeared certain of General Assembly approval. But the United States has served notice it may resume test explosions in the atmosphere to counter the Soviet tests. And yesterday the U.S. delegation announced it would vote against the moratorium appeal since it makes no provision for effective controls.

A number of pro-western states from Latin America and Scandinavia declared their support yesterday for the moratorium call sponsored by India and other non-aligned nations. They declared it was up to both sides to stop testing.

Japan aimed a direct appeal at the Americans to call off any test plans. Chief Daisuke Katoko Okazaki denounced Russia for triggering its 50-megaton bomb but declared, "Another show of high statesmanship is now demanded of the United States."

"We are aware of another danger, an endless chain of nuclear tests," Okazaki said. "Such a competition... would also accelerate the armaments race and threaten the future of mankind."

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# USSR's Tough Line Hurts Berlin Talks

Washington, Nov. 1 (AP)—U.S. officials said today the present tough line of Soviet Policy makes it extremely difficult to work toward constructive negotiations on Berlin and German problems.

While some sudden switch to more peaceful Soviet tactics is not ruled out, the United States and its Western Allies are now discussing more urgently possible countermeasures and sanctions which may be applied if there is no improvement in the situation.

Russia's demand on Finland for consultations on defense measures and its related propaganda attacks on other Scandinavian countries are viewed here as evidences of increasing belligerency on the part of Soviet leaders.

The State Department last night denounced the Soviet demand on Finland as a "repugnant" act, designed to cover Russia's "own aggressive policies" and to obscure the fact that "the Soviet Union is the source of present world tension."

Moscow's call for consultation with Finland under a 1948 treaty was made in a note published Monday by the Soviet News Agency Tass.

U. S. officials see the move as one which puts pressure not only on Russia's small northern neighbors with its long-standing policy of cold war neutrality but also on the other Scandinavian countries—neutral Sweden and the NATO allies, Norway and Denmark.
