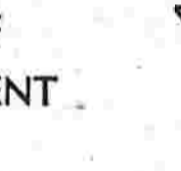

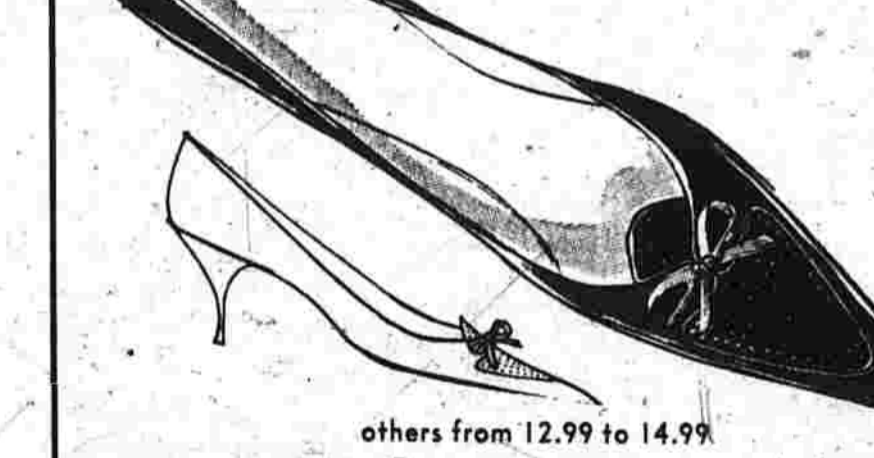

Directors to Make Many Appointments

A host of appointments to various town boards make up the bulk of the agenda for the board of directors meeting Tuesday night at 8 o'clock in the hearing room of the Municipal Building.

The Republican-dominated board of directors has the following appointments to fill: The advisory board of health, the advisory recreation and park commission, board of tax review, the development commission, two members of the library board, a member of the pension board, the pension trust fund and the town planning commission.

Also, a member of the zoning board of appeals, three members of the building commission, a member of the capital region planning authority, a member to the board of governors of the Manchester Country Club, and a confirmation of the appointment made by the acting general manager of a member of the redevelopment agency.

Town Officials Divided On Next Dump Action

What's the next step? Vernon selectmen were divided on that question today following last night's bumping rejection of a proposal to establish a dump off Rt. 83.

All agreed, however, they must continue to seek an answer to the town's trash disposal problem which has been making their life in fits and starts for more than a year since the closing of the former city dump in July, 1960.

First Selectman George E. Riley said he felt the voters want an incinerator, then he said that Selectman Herman G. Olson favored reliance on a regional solution, saying voters last night apparently favored it themselves.

Selectman Francis J. Pritchard selected selectmen to study incineration on a limited regional basis, possibly with Vernon setting up an incinerator which would serve three immediately adjacent towns could transfer their trash to a fee.

The selectmen also said they may have to arrange temporary dumping while a permanent solution is developed.

His comments came in answer to questions following the rejection of last night's jam-packed meeting at which a huge majority believed disapproval of the \$1.5 million proposal.

An estimated 800 residents filled the Sylvan School auditorium to stand-up-only.

Despite indications of long and heated argument, the dump question occupied only 45 minutes of the meeting which lasted in all, one hour and 15 minutes.

Atty. Francis C. Shea of Vernon, representing more than 200 residents from housing areas near the proposed dump site, apparently stillled any further argument by reading a summary of objections from the homeowners.

Shea represented had signed a petition opposing the dump purchase, he said. The petition was filed yesterday.

The gist of the petition was that the proposed \$1.5 million site was too close to the proposed Skinner Rd. Elementary School and the Rockville High School, that property values would drop, and that a general health menace would develop.

Shea went on to say the petitioners realized that they were faced with a tough problem and they wanted to offer constructive criticism.

They favored more thorough study of the problem, particularly consideration of a regional solution, he said.

His reference was to the current Northeast Region Study being conducted by the Capital Region Planning Agency and conducted by eight area towns which have volunteered to join in a survey of trash problems.

Shea's statement of objections was apparently composed of a number of points by opponents. They made no comment on the matter.

Afterward, as the Kennedys and the Truman family left the Blue Room to greet the dinner guests, the U.S. Marine band played ball to the chief of Kennedy and the Missouri Waltz for Truman.

The dinner menu, listed in French, featured goose.

In the exchange of toasts, Kennedy found his approval of his appointees began his career in the Truman administration. Truman warmly proclaimed his cooperation in the Kennedy administration.

The Kennedys had gone to some special effort to make the visit historic and nostalgic for the Truman. They assigned the famous Lincoln Room to Truman and gave Mrs. Truman the Rose Room, because several visiting guests, including Elizabeth of England, have slept there.
