


This was the scene at dawn today where a non-scheduled Constellation airliner crashed claiming the lives of 77 persons.




Cross locates area near Richmond, Va., where a non-scheduled Constellation airliner crashed last night and burst into flames.

### Stench Hits University

Orono, Maine, Nov. 9 (AP) — The president and trustees of the University of Maine are pondering the answer to a question posed by 300 faculty and staff members: "What do we do about this stench?"

The odor comes from the Penobscot Chemical Fiber Co. plant in nearby Old Town. It's the result of a kraft process of paper production in use since August.

The question came in a petition circulated by some of the professors. "About a dozen signs say they will leave the school if something isn't done to limit the stench."

University president Lloyd Elliott and the trustees plan to meet with paper mill officials to discuss the problem.

The manager of the paper mill, Frank Harlow, said the odor is not toxic, but he added he doesn't like the smell either.

**Falm Beach, Fla.** — Harold D. Wood, 89, inventor of the first auto fire chain in 1908, died Wednesday. He was the founder of the Wood Fire Chain Co., Bridgeport, Conn. He was born in Forestport, N.Y., and lived in Southport, Conn., many years.



### Science At Work

**By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS**

The remarkable odyssey of a tuna fish, the almost human behavior of the whale and a new estimate of the distance from Earth to the sun are subjects for science at work:

**How Fast the Tuna**

The tuna fish ranges far and wide—and apparently wastes little time en route.

A giant bluefin tuna was tagged by scientists off Cape Cod in the Bahamas on June 10 this year. It was caught off Bergen, Norway just 122 days later—some 5,900 direct miles away.

That means it covered some 48 miles a day. If it started the day it was tagged, swam the distance in a straight line without any stops, it would have caught the day it arrived.

The bluefin tuna, which is supposed to cruise at about three miles an hour, may have had some help from the Gulf Stream current part of the trip, say researchers at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution.

**How Human the Whale**

Many whales and dolphins, besides being mammals like man, are also unusually intelligent animals—and scientists have long wanted to study them in their natural roaming areas.

Although the size of the ocean and the uncooperative nature of the animals make this difficult, scientists have been able to get some strange, honey-vision views of the Pacific pilot whale.

These small whales travel in hunting formations, feeding schools and even leaping groups. They have been seen to assist, defend and schoolmates. Mother whales even try to support the bodies of their dead young. And like the human, the pilot whale tries to protect its young from capture.

**How High the Sun?**

Giant radar sets that keep on the lookout for ballistic missile attacks have been used to get a new idea of how far the Earth is from the sun. That critical distance is the one that astronomers use to judge the size and distance of the solar system, but an accurate figure is hard to come by, and new measurements are constantly being made.

This time Radio Corporation of America scientists used the ballistic warning radar to measure the distance to the planet Venus and translated this distance into the distance to the sun. Their figure: 63,497,000 miles, give or take perhaps 200 miles.

It agrees closely with other recent measurements, but it is some 40,000 miles greater than a 1959 figure generally considered most authoritative until now.

**How Bright, How Right**

Psychologists are now trying to measure creative ability as well as intelligence quotients or IQs. And they are finding that the high IQ and the high creative ability don't always go hand in hand.

Tests are now being made of fluency or flexibility of thinking. In this kind of test, psychologists say there is no one right answer, but a large number of acceptable answers.

Earlier tests on adults showed this. And now a study of 8th and 9th graders seems to show the same thing: People seem to differ in the kinds of ability they have.

**How Long to Fallout**

Scientists now have a better idea of how long fallout takes to fall out. Thanks to measurements of radioactive carbon during the nuclear testing of the 1950s.

From 1955 to 1959, for instance, there was a 30 per cent rise in the amount of carbon 14 in the lower atmosphere (the 10 miles closest to Earth) of the northern half of the world. Then in 1960 the carbon 14 level declined, indicating it was falling to the ocean faster than it was entering the lower atmosphere from the higher altitude stratosphere.

The southern half of the world showed less carbon 14 than the northern half during the 1950-59 period. But in 1960 it caught up—and scientists estimate the mixing rate for dust caught in the winds of the two halves of the world is fairly rapid.

**900 Pound Man Dies**

Prattville, Ala., Nov. 9 (AP) — Martin Levy, a former carnival performer weighing about 900 pounds, died yesterday at his trailer-park home. He was 66.

Levy's agent, Walter L. Wagoner of nearby Montgomery, said Levy was born in Boston, Mass., and had been in show business most of his life.

He last worked regularly with the Gooding Amusement Shows before moving to Prattville last spring.

D. Eisenhower had agreed to serve as board chairman of a new "People's People" organization designed to promote contacts with citizens of other nations. The original program was established under Eisenhower in 1946.

South Yon Nyan — Kennedy barred inquiries on what he felt the United States plans to extend to the beleaguered Southeast Asian country until both governments can reach a settlement on the issue, the President said. What really counts, he added, are threats posed to the free world.

Fallout — Nuclear testing must be approached with the greatest caution and hesitancy, because of the potential hazard of fallout, Kennedy said, but the United States must balance this with its responsibility to the free world.

### Automation Puts Turkey on Table

By DEL MILLER

Turkey, Calif.—The turkey on your Thanksgiving dinner, has changed a lot since the first Pilgrims' children roasted for dinner.

Then a wily fly got on the wing, it is now a compact hunk of meat, grown in a laboratory and processed on the assembly line.

Consider the turkey of Jurassic Valley in California's San Joaquin Valley which carries the name of turkey capital. The area raised nearly five million turkeys last year, with a market value of more than \$100 million.

Local turkey ranches vary greatly. The commonest destroyed are the use of college-trained manpower cost accounting and a great deal of automation.

Some commercial growers buy turkey eggs from breeders, and then to custom hatcheries (Walace Lindberg's two custom hatcheries last year produced 1.5 million turkey poulters a year from eggs supplied by the customer) and buy ready-mixed formula feeds.

Others, probably the most numerous, raise turkeys on a major farm or processing company contract. The grower supplies the food and takes the turkey to market at maturity. The grower is paid from 25 cents to 40 cents a bird, depending on the age of the poulter when he got to the hatchery.

Still others, like Howard Swanson, do their own breeding, run their own hatcheries and brooder houses.

Swanson's Westlock Farms raises 140,000 to 200,000 turkeys a year. Swanson operates his own 16-formula feed mill, an automated one-man operation. And in the brooder house, one man cares for 20,000 poulters, averaging a half hour to an hour a day at such chores as operating the litter-turning apparatus and injecting chemicals in the automatic water fountains.

Another independent grower, Melvin Soderstrom of Soderstrom Brothers, says, "The turkey will survive any heat wave (recently in San Joaquin Valley) if it has shade." Soderstrom Brothers, which raises turkeys to average a half hour to an hour a day at such chores as operating the litter-turning apparatus and injecting chemicals in the automatic water fountains.

The Soderstroms have been raising turkeys more than 25 years and have helped start many of their neighbors, including Swanson, in the business. Both operations last year averaged approximately \$1 gross profit per turkey.

Nearly 80 million turkeys were marketed in the United States in 1960 and though there is a growing year-round market, Thanksgiving and Christmas are still the big seasons prepared for at Turkey's two processing plants. One plant is operated by Armour, the other by the Moore Farms Association of Niles, Pa.

At the latter, live birds are loaded directly from trucks on an overhead line traveling about five miles an hour. Just before the line enters the processing plant, the dangling birds, head down, pass through an electrocution chamber where they are put to death by brushing against electrified rods. They are then hung by the line passes through showers of scalding water which strips off the feathers.

For the next 20 minutes each bird is inspected for disease by a U.S. veterinarian and disemboweled. The giblets are bagged for future inspection. The hot water it absorbed is pumped out by vacuum and the feet and heads are removed.

Then each bird is taken off the moving line, its drumsticks bent back and inserted under its wings. Next it is placed in a cooling tank for five hours.

A federal inspector makes sure the bird's internal temperature is down to 40 degrees, that it contains not more than 7 per cent water and that it is in good grade. If not, it goes to a cannery for 20th or other manufacture.

If it is up to grade, the fowl in rapid succession is weighed, giblets inserted, its carcass treated with chemical which prevents its tissues from crystallizing on freezing temperatures and is vacuum bagged in plastic.

Then comes the great cold shock. The turkey, moistly gathering a freezing crust, is placed in a chamber where the temperature is 12 degrees below zero.

In 40 minutes the birds emerge, are placed in cartons and trucked into another cold room where they are finished off at 10 degrees below zero for 24 hours. Finally they are placed in holding rooms at zero temperatures to await movement to distributors.

Dale Andrews, the man who runs the fork lift in and out of the cold rooms, sometimes mixes on all this turkey-centered automation as he arrives for work and bundles up in arctic gloves, ear muffs and sheepskin hat. Says Andrews, "I just wish I had a plug-in for an electric suit."

### Idle Claims Load Rises for Week

Jobsites claiming filed in Manchester for the week ended Nov. 4 numbered 1,496, a 0.4 per cent increase over the previous week's total of 1,480. Initial claims increased statewide by 589 from 5,607 to 6,196, according to the State Department of Labor.

Manchester, ranking seventh in the state, had 814 claims from workers, 80 more than the previous week and 54.8 per cent of the total claims load here.




