Kennedy Talks Of Negotiation

Seattle, Nov. 17 (AP)—President Kennedy says the United States must be willing to negotiate Cold War issues from a position of strength. To preach either war or surrender, he says, does a disservice to the nation. As the Western Allies, including the newly-organized West German Government, renew efforts to unify their stand toward Russia, Kennedy yesterday made clear these views.

2—Talking out East-West disputes will succeed only if each side can find success in the result. In effect, neither side can expect total victory. 4—Although the French and others may see weakness in taking the initiative in bargaining with Russia, "This nation cannot abdicate to its adversaries the setting and conditions of negotiations. Suppressing Agent Liver May Produce Immunity to Cancer

By ROBERT GOLDENSTEIN Associated Press Science Writer Chicago, Nov. 17 (AP)—An immunity shield protecting normal persons from developing cancer is present in a high degree in the blood serum of guinea pigs. They have detected its presence to a lesser degree in the serum of humans. The activity of the suppressing agent was demonstrated when cancers were transplanted into mice and serum was administered. The tumors regressed swiftly in relation to similar tumors transplanted into other mice that received no serum.

U.S. Speeding New Arms Aid To Vietnamese

This has been done under existing programs, he said, and discussions are under way on possible additional aid to the South Vietnamese, hard pressed by what he termed Communist infiltration from the north.

U.N. Troops Rushing to Net Congo Slayers of Italians

United Nations, N. Y., Nov. 17 (AP)—Acting Secretary-General U. Thant summoned his top Congo advisers into private session today to hear recommendations from the U.N. military commander in the Congo that his forces be strengthened to cope with mounting violence. U. Thant conferred with his Congo Advisory Committee amid anger at U.N. headquarters over the brutal slaying of 13 Italian airmen of the U.N. Command by mutinous Congolese soldiers in Kivu Province. The U.N. Congo force once numbered more than 22,000 men but is down to 15,490 since the withdrawal of contingents from Ghana, Guinea, Mali, Morocco, Tunisia and the United Arab Republic. It is expected to lose the Nigerian contingent of 1,711 within a few weeks.

Panama Seeks Deadline For Taking Over Canal

Panama, Nov. 17 (AP)—The National Assembly last night unanimously demanded a new treaty with the United States fixing a date for the United States to turn over the waterway to Panama. No date was specified. The assembly resolution was adopted within 24 hours of the publication of correspondence between Presidents Kennedy and Roberto Chiari on negotiations for a new treaty. Chiari on Sept. 8 had written Kennedy that their governments should try again to resolve long-standing differences over the Canal Zone, starting this time from scratch. Kennedy in a letter Nov. 2 agreed the differences must be discussed thoroughly and frankly and indicated his government would be ready for talks in 1962 after it re-studied current and future needs from the canal. The assembly resolution said Kennedy's letter "evidences the good will of his government to arrive at satisfactory agreements

CONSIDER OPPONENTS WHEN CHOOSING SITTING

By Albert Sheinwold

When you're choosing a sitting, think of how many tricks you need and consider what the opponents may be doing in the meantime.

Do your planning before you play the first trick. You can take away tricks whenever you please. Two hearts, two diamonds and three clubs. You must develop two additional tricks.

It's easy to rule out the spades. You can develop only one additional trick in spades. While you're doing so, the opponents can set up and run the hearts. They will take two spades and three hearts before you are ready to take your own tricks.

Work to be needed on the clubs. If each opponent has three clubs, you can take two additional tricks with your low clubs. There is no harm in leading out the top club, but also no advantage. If the clubs break 4-2, you will have to abandon the suit, since one additional club trick is not enough.

We come, by elimination, to the diamonds. How you can set up two additional tricks if the suit breaks 3-3 or if either opponent has a doubleton heart. The ace of hearts must be left in dummy as a final entry to the diamonds.

Now you have your plan. Win the first trick with the king of hearts, and cash the top diamonds. When the jack drops, lead the ten of diamonds to set up the rest of dummy's suit.

What if the diamonds failed to break so conveniently? You would know it by the time you had tried a third round of diamonds. Win the heart return and play for a 3-3 break in clubs. You hold the clubs in reserve, in case the diamonds fail to help you.

Partner opens with one notrump (18 to 19 points), and the next playing passes. You hold: Spades—K 7 4 Hearts—A 7 3 Diamonds—K 10 9 5 Clubs—8 5. What do you say?

Answer: Pass. Your seven points will not produce a good play for game even if partner has 18 points. You are interested in game only if partner can show that his hand is stronger than a notrump opening bid.

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Murphy Gives Own Ideas on Shelter Taxes

Assessor J. Joseph Murphy said the town's grand list will not be affected this year by the state tax commissioner's ruling Wednesday that fallout shelters should not be assessed unless they are "luxurious."

None of the fallout shelters which are being built was completed by Oct. 1, he said, which is the deadline for the current year's grand list.

Wednesday, State Tax Commissioner John L. Sullivan said that any town assessor who didn't want to levy an assessment on a fallout shelter didn't have to, despite the legislature's ruling that everything in a dwelling except the furniture and fixtures is assessable and taxable.

The only exception, suggested Sullivan, would be fallout shelters which are usable as recreation rooms, or have "luxurious" appointments.

Murphy, however, goes along only part way with the state commissioner's ruling.

Murphy said that when a fallout shelter does not increase the value of a house, it should not be taxed. Where it increases the value of a house, it should be taxed.

Each believes that any departure from its own course inevitably leads to the other—one group believes that any peaceful solution means appeasement; the other believes that any arms build-up means war.

"One group regards everyone else as warmongers; the other regards everyone else as appeasers. Neither side admits its path will lead to disaster, but neither can tell us how or where to draw the line once we descend the slippery slopes of either appeasement or intervention.

"In short, while both extremes profess to be the true realists, neither could be more unrealistic."

"The essential fact that that of these groups fail to grasp is that diplomacy and defense are not substitutes for one another. Either, alone, would fail. A willingness to resist force, unaccompanied by a willingness to talk, would prevent intelligence, while a willingness to talk, unaccompanied by a willingness to resist force, could invite disaster."

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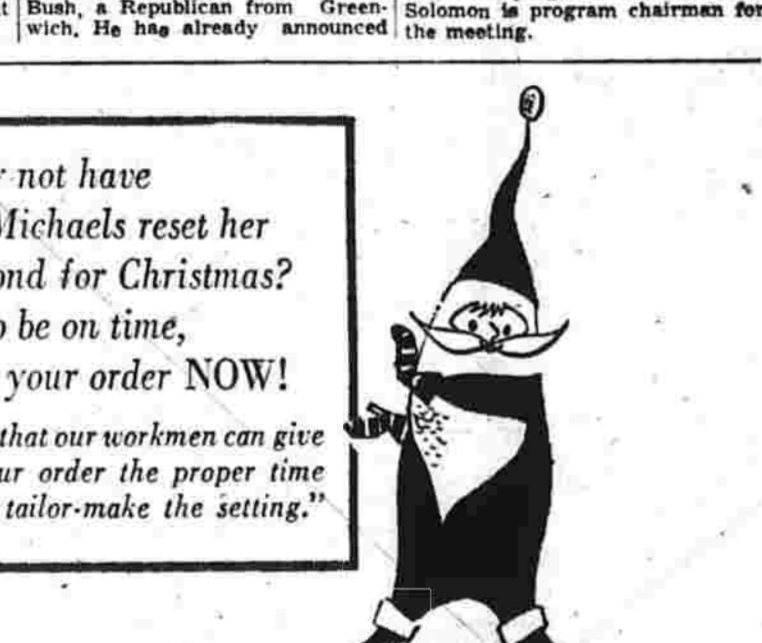

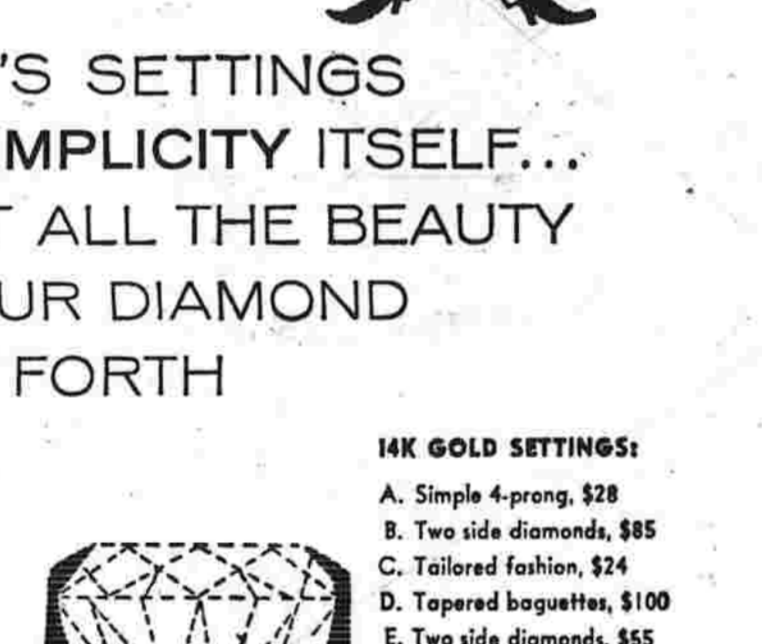

The West German chancellor is due to arrive Sunday for talks with the President on policies the western powers should follow in any negotiations with the Soviet Union for settlement of the Berlin crisis.

Meanwhile, some further statement of the U.S. position on this and other Berlin policy questions may be forthcoming from Secretary of State Dean Rusk who scheduled a news conference for this afternoon.

Rusk also had opportunity at the news conference to spell out again the U.S. policy on assistance to the hard pressed government of South Viet Nam. There have been reports that American military assistance is being substantially increased.

The problem of what the West should do about the wall dividing Berlin was sharply defined by Adenauer in Bonn yesterday when he spoke with a group of American newsmen about his meeting with Kennedy.

Asked by newsmen to list points considered non-negotiable in any discussions with the Russians on the status of the city, Adenauer said: "First of all, the wall must go. The non-negotiable elements are: The freedom of Berlin must be preserved, the wall must go and the communications with Berlin and West Germany must remain secure because without them Berlin cannot live."

The official East German news agency ADN promptly charged that Kroll "extremism" were attempting to wreck prospects for constructive talks between the East and West.

It said Adenauer had demanded "opening the door again to West German espionage organizations and traders in human beings."

Adenauer also gave West Germany's ambassador to Moscow, Hans Kroll, a public vote of confidence and said Kroll would return to his post.

The ambassador had been summoned back to Bonn to report on allegations that Kroll had made proposals contrary to West German foreign policy to Khrushchev.

"I want to state that Herr Kroll committed no indiscretions," Adenauer said. Kroll, he said, had been asked by Khrushchev to state his views on how the East and West could resolve the Berlin issue and "it is obvious that he would first have to contact his foreign office for instructions."

Government Press Chief Felix von Eckardt today denied ever made remarks about Kroll which would square with Kroll's statements by Adenauer.

Von Eckardt last Monday threw doubt on Kroll's future as ambassador in Moscow by saying he made proposals on the Berlin crisis contrary to his government's policy.

His basic position was that Kroll made unauthorized proposals but without knowing they conflicted in part with Allied policy as being worked out by a study group in Washington.

Von Eckardt said the leak on the Kroll meeting with Khrushchev did not come from Kroll himself. He said the leak followed Kroll's report to the ambassadors of the Big Three Allied countries in Moscow, but the responsible person was not known.

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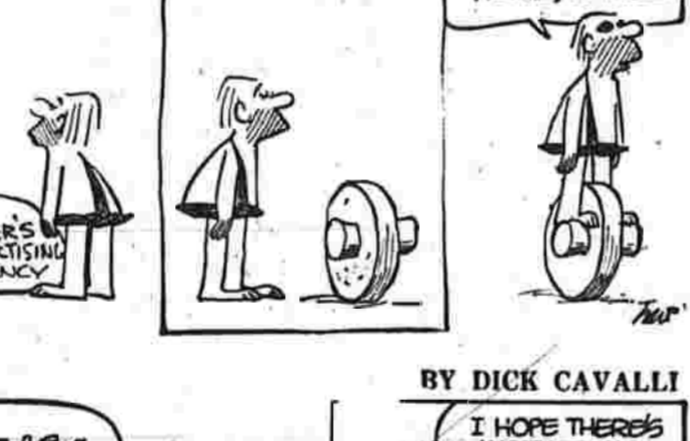
