**ROBERTS ARTICLES**  
 Robert E. Beach of 143 Boston St., was president of the United Aircraft Corporation, has brought to the attention of industry the growing problem of government control in a recent article entitled "Management Worried." Government Control Oppressive, published in the November issue of Aerospace Management.

The exclusive feature of the publication has Beach's picture on the cover with a backdrop of the Capital Building in Washington.

Beach states in the article that "the Armed Services Procurement Regulation (ASPR) started out as an act of compromise of principles, and it has now become a straitjacket."

"Like under the ASPR and its satellites has become so complex and so obscure that it has become necessary to establish a Board of Contract Appeals to hear and dispose of the thousands upon thousands of disputes arising under military contracts today," he says in the publication.

"The government contract now controls all money that is available for procurement," he notes, and "the profit motive is being destroyed. It is headed for nationalization," Beach says, and "it is reeling under the pressure of the threshold of another era of military procurement—the armament era."

"We are being led blindly and trustfully through the portals of this new era, and when the time has come there will be no returning," the article notes.

A study of the present situation is being made by Beach, and in the article, he has suggested an agenda for such a study.

**FICK SAFE SUIT TO RUFF IN DUMMEY**

When you ruffing in dummy, you must be certain another for this purpose.

South should start the diamonds instead of the clubs. He has only five diamonds in the combined hands but clubs there. There is therefore less chance that East will be able to over-ruff dummy on the third round of diamonds than on the third round of clubs.

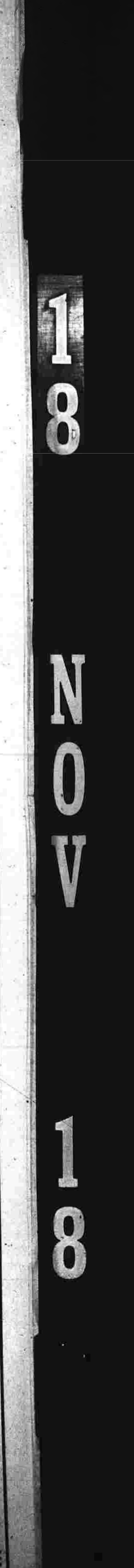

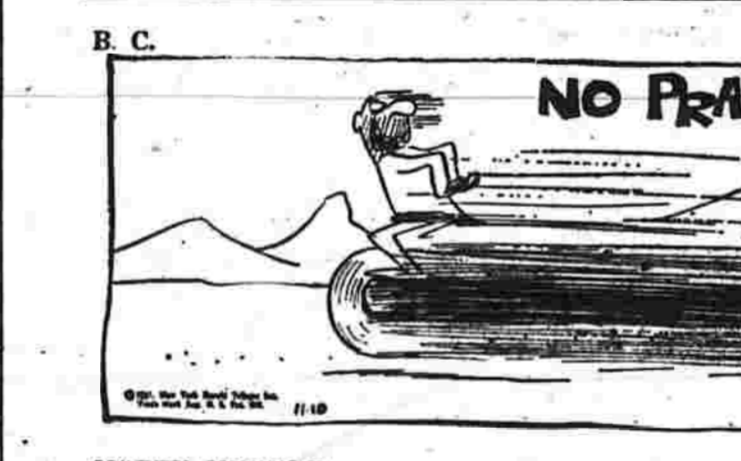
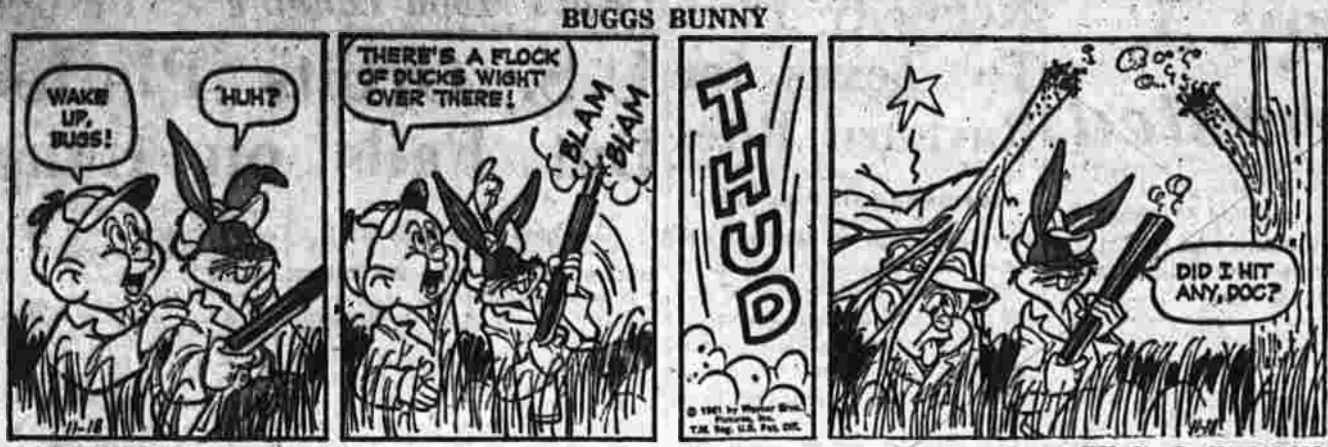

# Dr. Kildare Story Makes It on TV

By PAUL GERARD

It took a second try and some major revamping for the famous "Dr. Kildare" story to break into television. Now that the popular motion picture series has made it on television as an hour-long drama each week (Thursdays, 8:30-9:30 p.m. EST) it appears it may very well be as successful as the motion picture series. The TV series has gotten good reviews and its ratings have been good.

When MGM first attempted to cash in on the story, they made a half-hour pilot with Lew Ayers (the original movie Kildare) playing Kildare, 20 years later and a younger actor as an intern. However, it found no buyers.

The new "Dr. Kildare" series brings to television veteran actor, Raymond Massey in the role of Dr. Gillespie, the gruff but understanding man of medicine—the role Lionel Barrymore made so memorable two decades ago. This is the first time that Massey has appeared in a regular TV series. He found the part so attractive that he broke his precedent.

In the title role is tall, blond and handsome Richard Chamberlain. Although a comparative newcomer, Chamberlain in the first few episodes has proved an exceptional choice for the role.

Prior to the filming of the pilot, Chamberlain, in the true tradition of the greater artists, attempted to make his portrayal most believable by actually living the life of a doctor for a day. He freely admits that he never had been in a hospital as a patient and only once as a visitor. He also states the extent of his knowledge of the sciences was the physiology he took in high school and the geology in college.

So dressed in the green gown that doctors wear, he worked with a Dr. Andros who was an intern at Los Angeles County Hospital.

"The nurses called me 'Doc,'" the actor recalled, "and so did the kids, in fact, the youngsters probably thought I was a very important doctor because I did no work,

just stood aside, and looked wise. "One little guy named Danny—he has a club foot—is the sweetest little fellow I ever met. Danny doesn't like just anybody, I was told, but he liked Dr. Andros and he liked me. I felt complimented."

"Most children are much more forward than Danny. When the doctor walks into the children's ward, there is tremendous competition for his attention by the kids, at least by all those who are feeling good."

"Time passed so quickly that, before I knew it, I was following Dr. Andros into the hospital commissary for lunch. The place was full of doctors, all young, all casually talking with words 4,000 miles long—and joking too—but with the focus almost always on things medical."

"There was much talk by the doctors about being drafted into

the service and about residencies—who got one and who didn't, who's packing, who's leaving and which hospitals are best residency-wise. I was listening so hard I almost forgot to eat."

Having visited the prison ward, Chamberlain said, "It's ridiculous, to see a big husky man with his arms slashed from a knife fight. These fellows, who probably look pretty tough out on the street, look helpless as babies in a hospital."

Chamberlain's rounds ended with visits, more or less uneventful, to the orthopedic and neurosurgery wards. So a second tour had to be scheduled for the piece de resistance—a visit to surgery. For a starter, it was suggested that he watch a baby being born, but this has to be cleared by 20 million people, so we settled for an appendectomy, an appendectomy and a stitch job on a knife wound.

"They put me back into the greens again for my visit to surgery and even put canvas covers on my shoes. They didn't want me to strike any sparks; they explained, because the anesthetist was working with some very explosive gases."

"Surgery on the stomach ulcer al-

ready was in progress when I got there. I was allowed to stand just beyond the patient's head. Much ado was being made about sterilizing, and the nurse in charge of this seems to have an extreme amount of authority."

"During an operation the surgeon and his staff keep up a running line of chatter—it seems to keep them relaxed—about similar operations and the surgeons who performed them, until they run into a problem. Then they're all business."

"Thanks to these hospital tours, I now feel much more like the doctor I want to portray. Because of them, I feel so much more experienced on our own hospital set—in dealing with patients, in putting on the garments, in handling the instruments and even in making that-to-do about sterilization."

With the excessive amount of violence on TV today, "Dr. Kildare" is a welcomed and perhaps a salutary contrast.

## TV Notebook

New York (NEA)—Dore Schary says he learned a lot when he produced "Sounds of the '60s," the first Westinghouse Presents show of the season.

"I learned," he says, with a touch of irony in his voice, "that if you want to do something really important on television—to say something—it has to be in the field of public affairs."

"That's what TV does best. Nothing can touch TV when something like Kennedy's appearance at the U.N. is being covered. When you get to fiction and entertainment programs, TV is not so great."

And so Schary has a new dream. He wants to do a program in the public affairs field some day. Nothing definite or specific, just a chance to venture into the area where he can say something.

## He's Successful Behind Camera

His classmates in college dramatics were Charlton Heston, Carol Lawrence, Jeffrey Hunter and Jean Hagen. Like them, he spent every waking moment studying, reading, rehearsing and working with one goal in mind: Success in show business.

Today, at 34, he's already attained that goal ten years ahead of schedule. In any given year, his name is seen on TV screens more times than those of all of his classmates—and yet he's a relative unknown to the mass of viewers.

The reason? He's behind the camera instead of in front of it.

As director of Allen Funt's top-rated "Candid Camera," Julio Di Benedetto has come a long way from those lean, striving years at Northwestern University. He credits his success to "one of the toughest decisions any actor has to face."

It happened eight years ago, he recalls. "I sat down one day to take stock of where I was at the age of 26 and suddenly realized that I just didn't want to live the potential life of a performer. I knew that there was no such word as 'security' in the lexicon of show business. So I decided that, even if I knew I could become a star, TV production work was just as exciting and rewarding."

'Blood All Over'

Girl, 11, Bares Murders at Sea

By BEN FUNK Miami, Fla., Nov. 20 (AP)—A terror-filled story indicating that Capt. Julian Harvey slaughtered the passengers of the ketch Bluebelle has been told to the Coast Guard by the lone survivor, Terry Jo Duperrault. Well before the Bluebelle went down in Bahamas waters Nov. 12 with the loss of five lives, 11-year-old Terry Jo said she saw the bodies of her mother and brother on the floor of the main cabin and saw "blood all over" the cabin and the main deck. Harvey, who killed himself after learning that Terry Jo had survived, took the ship's dinghy and main life raft and jumped overboard, leaving her stranded on the deck, she said. Terry's story was disclosed by the Coast Guard at a news conference today. The girl was interviewed yesterday by FBI agents and Coast Guard investigators in a hospital room where she is recovering from an ordeal of 3 1/2 days on a jiffy raft bouncing through troubled seas. Capt. R. F. Barber, district officer in charge of marine investigations, said the standard procedure would be to refer the case to the Justice Department but since "the criminal negligence lies with a deceased person," it is not now known what will be done. Asked if the Coast Guard had drawn a definite conclusion that

Harvey killed the passengers and sank the ship, Barber said such an announcement would have to wait until the investigation is completed. Terry Jo's parents, Dr. and Mrs. Arthur Duperrault of Green Bay, Wis., her brother, Brian, 14, and the captain's wife, Mary Harvey, apparently went down with the ship. The body of Terry Jo's sister, Renee, 7, was found in the dinghy in which Harvey escaped. The tall, powerfully-built skipper, 45-year-old former Air Force officer, told the Coast Guard after a passing freighter picked him up and brought him to Miami that the ship's mast broke and tore a hole in the bottom. The child denied that the yacht's mast broke or that there was fire aboard the vessel, as Harvey reported before he committed suicide. During Harvey's interrogation Thursday, Barber said the word came that Terry Jo had been saved and Harvey expressed surprise and left hurriedly. Helsinki, Finland, Nov. 20 (AP)—The Finns today pinned their hopes of averting a crisis in Soviet-Finnish relations on a meeting between Premier Khrushchev and Finnish President Urho Kekkonen. The Soviet premier agreed to Kekkonen's proposal for an informal meeting to discuss Russian demands that the Soviet Union and her little Scandinavian neighbor plan joint defenses against Russian-charged threats of aggression from West Germany.
