Sheinwold on Bridge

Don't TACKLE DOUBTFUL SUIT
By Alvin Sheinwold
The best way to play certain combinations of cards is not to play them at all. Let an opponent do the job for you.

The diamonds are a good example of a suit you want to play to. Whoever starts to play such a suit, loses a trick by it.

For example, suppose you lead the first diamond from the South hand. West plays low, and East captures dummy's queen with the king of diamonds. Now West still has the ace of diamonds behind your jack and will take two more diamond tricks.

You're no better off if you lead the diamonds first from the North hand. Then East will play low and West will capture your jack with the ace of diamonds. East can sit back and wait for two more diamond tricks.

You can't get the opponents to lead the diamonds for you unless you do your share of the work first. Your job is to eliminate black cards from dummy and your own hand.

With the first trick in dummy with the king of spades, and lead the jack of hearts. If east is a confirmed heart player, you are willing to give him his chance to overtake the jack. When East wisely plays low, you put up the ace of trumps.

Each time you leads lead a club to the ace, ruff a spade, cash the king of clubs and ruff a club. Now the black suits have been eliminated, and the scene is set. Give up the trump trick and let an opponent find a good return either in the contest sponsored by the student council.

Road Block

Their quarrel is over the purported desire for independence of a group of Pathan tribesmen who live in the mountainous regions of the northwestern part of Pakistan. It is a free choice, it might be to join Afghanistan. It is, of course, resented. Afghanistan's agitation of the issue, a few weeks ago, ordered Afghanistan to close its consulates in the mountainous regions of Pakistan. In retaliation, they broke diplomatic relations with Pakistan.
 This involves us because we are interested in giving some economic help to Afghanistan. The only way for this to be done is to get the issue resolved. It is for it to pass through Pakistan. When that route is closed, our capacity to aid Afghanistan is reduced.

Kekkonen's Trial
 The fact that Russian pressure has turned on Finland, with all the risks that entail in the realm of world diplomacy and prestige, leads most commentators to suppose that purely military considerations have not begun to exercise a dominance in Russian affairs, and that, with regard to Finland, these were once before, when Russia outraged the world by attacking Finland on the eve of World War II.
 Then, as apparently now, Russia's feverish military concern was with the possible presence of a friendly force on its flank as Russia prepared to deal with, or face, the rising threat of Nazi Germany. Then, in contrast with now, there seemed some slight reason for Russia's concern, in that the atmosphere of the time did suggest some possible understanding between Germany and Finland. As of today, Finland's neutrality would be above suspicion. Finland's geographical position is still strategically the same, however, and the assumption is that, once more, Russia's generals want to be able to look down Finland's throat, and that Russian diplomacy may have to pay the price for their anxiety, and abuse Finland once again.
 This time, Russia is probably in no mood to resort to actual force, and Finland, for its part, probably hopes for some evasive solution which will not call the Russian arms and sacrifices in the field which gave the Russian armies of another time such a harrowing retreat for World War II. In any case, President Kekkonen of Finland is pursuing a delicate role, and as he himself says, his real friends might do well to refrain from adding additional weight to his burden. In his view, the visit of West Germany's minister of defense to Norway, at a time when Moscow is already making great propaganda noise about German plotting in Scandinavia, was not helpfully timely. Nor do we imagine that he was overjoyed, at a time when Russia is talking of a resurgent German menace, to have Chancellor Adenauer preface his visit to Washington with an open demand for similar aid.
 Finland, back in 1939, may not have been entirely innocent. And

the jackhammers rattling, the trucks chugging, and the neighbors quarrelling, and their sleep has been restored.
