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Tax Provisions Boost Museum Acquisitions

New York (AP) — Uncle Sam has given some good breaks to the taxpayer for the sake of sweet charity. Here are two interesting by-products of this situation:

(1) Some of the paintings you see in museums belong partly to the museum and partly to the private collectors who have donated them.

For example, Vuillard's "The Park," which is in the Museum of Modern Art here, five-ninths of it belongs to the museum, and the rest to Mr. and Mrs. William B. Jaffe. The Metropolitan Museum owns 11 1/2ths of "Officer Buying Straw" by the Frenchman.

(2) Some of the fine paintings that hang in private homes don't belong to the master of the house any more. They belong to museums.

For example, Goya's famous painting of the little boy in the red suit, with a birdcage, titled "Portrait of Don Osorio." Most any time you go into the Metropolitan Museum you'll see it there. But if Mrs. Gilbert Miller, daughter of financier Jules Bache, wanted to hang it in her house for several months, she could do so. She gave it to the museum, but retained a life interest.

Anyone who ever has filled out the long income tax form knows that you can give up to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income to charity, tax free. These gifts may be made to hospitals, colleges, a long list of organizations, or to museums. This provision has made it easier for collectors to donate their art objects to museums of their choice.

To cite a smallish example, take the case of a man whose adjusted gross income is \$20,000 for the year, which means the government takes 50 per cent. But he could give more than \$6,000 to charity without paying tax on it, meaning that he would keep more than \$2,000 that otherwise would have gone to the government.

Suppose he has a painting he bought years ago for \$1,000. It has increased in value, and now is appraised at \$6,000. He can give it outright to a museum. Having paid \$1,000 originally and having pocketed \$5,000 he would have paid in taxes, he is ahead \$2,000.


Things get more interesting when you get into higher brackets. A man whose income is \$400,000 a year is paying 90 per cent in taxes and above that 91 per cent.

The booklet "Taxes and Art," prepared by the New York art dealer French & Co. and published by Frontline-Hall, tells what can happen in a hypothetical case for a man in the 90 per cent bracket.

He owns a painting whose present value is \$70,000. He got it years ago for \$30,000 but in the present value that counts, it sells for \$70,000 he has made a capital gain of \$40,000 and has

Diploma Exams Offered by State

Examinations for those wishing to earn a high school diploma will be offered on Thursday, Dec. 28, at the United States Army Reserve Training Center in West Hartford. Applications are available from the State Department of Education in Hartford and must be submitted one week in advance of the examination.

To qualify for the tests, applicants must be at least 16 years old, must have been out of high school at least one year, a Connecticut resident for at least six months preceding the date of application, and the class with which the applicant entered high school must have graduated.

There is a \$2 fee for first applicants. The fee for retake tests is \$2. No fee is required of veterans or members of the armed forces or their auxiliaries.

Naturally enough, Nehru has been subject to continual criticism, among his own people, for his lack of resolution and toughness.

Well, that is the price any peacemaker always has to pay among his own people. There are always those who want the old, tried, familiar solutions, which have advanced civilization to where it is today.

But now the Chinese Communists have added the final ironic touch to the earthly realm of the peacemaker. The latest Chinese Communist note to Nehru accuses him of being the aggressor along India's northern borders.

What has gone before almost guarantees that it has to be there, and that it will, sooner or later, make its bid for power.

When at home, the peacemaker is being called a coward, and abroad, being called a bully, he has come pretty close to deserving whatever blessedness may be in store for him.

Then a student was some kind of a little mystery you read about in your high school physics or chemistry textbook. Now it is a giant that terrifies the whole human race.

Then everybody knew and loved the poems of Henry Wadsworth in a single generation — and probably will do so again in the coming generation. We are drifting on a raft on a sea of endless change.

Then a father was a symbol of family authority and the recognized head of the house. Now he's the money fellow who comes home once a week with his paycheck in his mouth but isn't supposed to open his yap about how the place is run.

Then a husband felt a great at dinner had insulted her cooking habits and values that are supposed to be enduring and guiding all through life. But as you grow older you find that many things you were taught as facts when you were young are now regarded as errors—or superstitions.

Then a man drank in public and was regarded as a victim of vice. Now doctors tell you a couple of cocktails before dinner are good for what ails you.

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The Newest Enterprise

Next spring when the Enterprise, the first nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, goes on sea duty, the U.S. Navy will be testing whether almost a half-billion dollars put in a floating airfield is worth its extra cost.

Navy men estimate the price of the Enterprise — with its eight nuclear power plants — at almost \$170,000,000 more than that of a conventionally-powered carrier of the same size.

The Enterprise, the largest U.S. carrier, is a few feet longer than the Constellation. She also will be the fastest. Her speed is greater than 40 miles an hour.

Her nuclear engines will multiply by 20 times the distance the Enterprise can travel at full speed without refueling as compared with conventional oil-fired carriers. That is, the Enterprise will be able to go over 140,000 miles at high speed and over 400,000 miles at fast cruising speed.

The Enterprise will have the best ability of the large carriers to maneuver. Her planes will be capable of delivering in one strike nuclear punch greater than all the bombs delivered by all the planes in all the strikes of World War II.

Her operations can be continued about twice as long by the Enterprise as by a conventional carrier, because more aviation fuel can be stored on board. No space is needed to store fuel oil for ship propulsion.

The figures on the ability of the Enterprise to cruise for long distances are theoretical. Nuclear power replaces only oil. Food for the crew and bombs, missiles, ammunition and aviation gasoline for the planes must be supplied at regular intervals in war. To be protected, the Enterprise normally will have to travel with a screening force of destroyers and other ships. Their range depends on oil refueling.

The Enterprise has fantastic electronic computer systems aboard which show on scopes the position and identity, where known, of all friendly and enemy planes, ships and submarines in a battle action. The computers also evaluate and recommend counter moves to meet the battle situation as it develops. The first action flashed is the one the computer recommends most highly. Other solutions follow.

The hope is to have this tactical data system on all ships in any Enterprise task force to make possible the operation of all of the ships in the group "almost as one ship."

Since this computer system will be able to incorporate information

and commands from most parts of the globe, it will be able to coordinate commands for any of the task forces operating in the Atlantic within seconds.

Unclassified information coming in from any source goes into the system. The computers, as far as they can, work out from these fragmentary bits and pieces the identity, size, location and speed of friendly and enemy ships, submarines and planes. The results and suggestions on what to do about the situation are displayed automatically on scopes installed in the Combat Information Center on the Enterprise.

The big carrier is especially braced and designed for a nuclear attack. The configuration of the decks and their thickness are intended to minimize missile and nuclear attacks. There is an all-ship wash-down system to quickly wash off radioactive particles and chemical and biological substances.

The Enterprise with all its size and modern equipment is a ship of surprises and incongruities.

There are 70 telephones on the giant ship. Signs posted in the passageways read "In case of fire of general emergency, dial extension 211."

Despite the latest in radar, six crewmen will sit continually on the Enterprise task force to see through sights, watching for planes, ships and submarines.

The Enterprise, with its 90 warplanes, is probably capable of doing anything that any ship in the Navy, but without its planes and escorting

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The Doctor Says

Q — Do you still favor flu shots?

A — More than ever. But you must be sure that you get influenza virus vaccine. Not influenza bacillus vaccine. Not a mixture of "respiratory" vaccine that contains influenza bacilli as one of its many ingredients.

Because of an unusually high death rate in high-risk groups last winter, many health groups advocate inoculations before Nov. 1 of the pregnant, persons 65 years old and above, diabetics, cardiacs, hypertensives, asthmatics and all others who suffer from any chronic and debilitating disorder.

Those who were immunized last year need only a single shot; others require two shots. The second shot to be given about two months after the first.

Q — If food is left in cans and kept in the refrigerator, can it cause poisoning?

A — No. So long as it is not contaminated in any way, especially by fingers, after the can has been opened.

Q — Is face-peeling safe? Does it remove wrinkles and creases?

A — To answer the second part first, face-peeling will not permanently remove wrinkles or creases. As to its safety, that depends on several factors. If the peeling is done by the application of chemicals, such as powerful acids, it is risky whether done by a beauty parlor operator or by a doctor. Naturally the risk is less if it is done by an experienced physician. Again, if the peeling is done surgically, whether with a scalpel or sandpaper, the factor of scarring is so difficult to gauge that most operators carry very heavy insurance against claims of disfigurement.

Finally, if your vanity so far exceeds your common sense that you must trifle with your appearance, go get yourself a sunburn. You'll feel almost as well and the cost of your folly will be considerably reduced.

Q — I met a diabetic recently who wears a locket that gives her name and address and the name, address and phone number of her doctor. Can you tell me where such a locket can be obtained? I am an epileptic and I think I should be provided with something like that.

A — Write for an application blank to Medic-Alert Foundation, a nonprofit organization at Turlock, California. Or, in Canada, at 176 St. George St., Toronto 5, Ont.

Q — Some time ago you recommended the Papanielsen test for the early detection of cancer. You said it was painless. I cannot let that statement pass unchallenged, as I took the test with my mother and two sisters and she was utterly shocked at the pain. Why do you mislead your readers that way?

A — I cannot imagine what could have been done to you, your mother and your sisters. But I can promise you that there need be no pain and the collection of material for the Pap test.

And, even if there were, universal application of the test could save the lives of 95 per cent of the 17,000 women who die each year as the result of cancers situated at the mouth of the womb.

I quote it here, because there aren't too many women today speaking out against the kind of "togetherness" that ends up in a wife's waiting hand and a husband's wearing an apron—the kind of complete and total togetherness that results in a man's being less masculine and a woman's being less feminine.

Perhaps, American women wouldn't have fallen so hard for "togetherness" if the first place they had stopped to think that a woman can't overcome a man without losing some of her femininity in the process.

In the first place—the wife's the real boss in any "togetherness" setup. For she is on her own home ground. If pop is going to do the dishes—he's going to have to do them mamma's way. If he is going to bathe the children and put them to bed—it is going to be at her direction. If he is going to paint the walls of the house, it is the woman of the house who is going to choose the colors and supervise the job.

So, too much togetherness makes women bossy.

In the second place, the man who falls into the togetherness trap loses some of his masculinity. And if a woman goes too far, she completely and happily feminine unless her own personality is so strong in contrast to a man's dominant masculinity.

Women short-sightedly thought they had everything to gain and nothing to lose when they passed the ideal of togetherness. They didn't see that they could lose their most valuable possession—femininity.

Watershed Council Official Tells Kivans of Its Work

Pollution difficulties throughout the state are pretty well the same, said Paul Hayden, vice president of the Connecticut River Valley Watershed Council, told Manchester Kivans yesterday.

Speaking at the Manchester Country Club on the council's aims and functions, Hayden also said trends toward continuing population explosion and the resulting land areas may mean water from the Connecticut River will have to be used.

If we are forced to that, eventually we should make sure the water is cleaned, Hayden said. Hayden said the council recently has decided to expand its budget.

"The council can't stand still. It has got to move ahead or it will fall back," Hayden declared.

Expansion of the council will mean the hiring of an added man and funds to make more use of the state's water resources.

Support will be asked from the states up and down the valley on basis of raising \$100,000 for the next three years.

The council, which began in 1952, with one person and a covered area of \$20,000 a year, now covers 11,000 square miles and about 1.5 million people.

Hayden said adding that they don't have the responsibility that is handled by Washington.

In discussing industry use of water resources, Hayden stated that industry does have the right to use water and turn it back in a polluted condition.

Connecticut has never insisted on immediate correction of pollution problems, but has always given industry ample time to undertake correction, Hayden said. This was an especially important consideration during the depression era, he added.

Other States Show

States such as Massachusetts and Vermont are much slower in cleaning up pollution, and many in Connecticut are asking those states to correct them if it is to be done.

Hayden said that the state is doing a lot of work in cleaning up pollution, and that this may be the best thing you get started," he added. He said there has been a great deal of interest shown by these states in the last 10 years, he noted.

Rockville Vernon Lockers Dealers Postpone Appeal

The Tolland County Package Store Association last night deferred until next week action on a possible appeal of a new liquor store permit in Vernon.

Acting Chairman Douglas M. Baskin said the question is "up in the air" at the moment, but that members expect to bring it to a vote at the next meeting.

The association was formed last month to look into possible adoption of ordinances or regulations to limit the number of liquor outlets in areas known as "hot spots."

Members say population densities, particularly in Vernon, are not great enough to provide adequate trade to more than the present number of stores.

Opening of additional outlets would create hardships for many independent liquor store owners, they say.

Last night's meeting was prompted by last week's approval by the Vernon Fire District Board of Appeals of an application for a liquor store on Rt. 63 near the Gilbert Professional Building.

Auto Industry Joins War on Air Pollution

Detroit, Dec. 5 (AP)—The auto industry agreed today to equip all new cars and trucks with anti-air pollution devices starting with the 1962 model year.

The action came less than four months after Abraham Ribicoff, secretary of health, education and welfare, told the industry to come up with a voluntary solution in time for 1964 models or face congressional action.

The board of directors of the Automobile Manufacturers Association today recommended positive cranking ventilation systems, often called blowby devices.

Such devices have been installed on all new cars offered for sale in California since the start of the 1961 model year.

Blowby fumes are gases that slip by the pistons during the combustion process. Normally they are drawn into the air by the movement of the car.

The positive ventilation system recirculates these vapors from the cranking space into the engine.

The AMA board has no authority other than to recommend to health manufacturers. However, all such manufacturers are members and normally conform with any such recommendation.

The system used on new cars is manufactured by the AC Spark Plug Division of General Motors.

That he would continue at the United Nations and play an expanding role in the making and execution of our foreign policy.

"I believe that his work is vital to the cause of peace and of top importance to the country."

Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press chief, declined to clarify the President's reference to Stevenson's "expanding" foreign policy role.

"I'm going to let the statement speak for itself," Salinger said.

Mayor Daley said that "naturally" the President's desire for Stevenson's continued leadership in the United Nations must be respected.

Informed sources said that Stevenson's resignation in Chicago — had put pressure on both Stevenson and Kennedy for the UN envoy to make the race against Dirksen, but some other Illinois party leaders were reported cool to the idea.

Dirksen was noncommittal on Stevenson's decision. "I have no position on it. Running for office is a personal decision and every man has to make up his own mind," Dirksen said.

Stevenson was elected governor of Illinois in 1948, defeating the Republican incumbent, Dwight D. Green, by 575,000 votes. He lost the state to Dwight D. Eisenhower in both the 1952 and 1956 campaigns, while Kennedy took a close decision there last year from Republican Richard M. Nixon.

Boston Betrayed, Cardinal Claims

Boston, Dec. 6 (AP) - Richard Cardinal Cushing said last night that Boston was "betrayed" by a recent television program that showed policemen visiting a Back Bay key shop which was raided as a hoodlum joint. Addressing a crowd at the Policemen's Ball in Boston Garden, the prelate - Archbishop of the Boston archdiocese - said: "Gambling exists everywhere. He told the cheering group gambling in itself is not a sin - only the abuse of it. The Cardinal said whoever was behind the TV presentation "oves an apology to the city of Boston." And he added: "Boston is as clean as any comparable city in the nation. It is better today than it has been in my memory and we all owe a great tribute of affection and praise to the Boston Police Department, which has been black-mailed across the country." Boston Police Commissioner Leo J. Sullivan told the gathering the widespread criticism of his force had disturbed him and said critics "have a fight on their hands" if they intend to "cast reflections and malign the police department with their false accusations, insinuations and distorted truths."

Kennedy Urges Lower Tariffs To Fight Red Economic Push

(Continued from Page One) already studying the reciprocal trade program, differed on the question of whether to give the kind of program Kennedy outlined.

"I doubt very much that the Congress can act this session, except to consider a simple extension of the reciprocal trade program," Bush said in an interview. "He said he thinks Congress still has to be shown that there is a need for what he called the 'most unlimited' tariff-cutting program."

However, Boggs, chairman of the subcommittee, commented, "There will be just as much opposition to a simple extension of the Reciprocity Trade Act as there would be to the kind of meaningful trade program the President is proposing."

Boggs said he thinks Congress should tackle the issue directly. If the West is to take the economic initiative, and if the United States is to keep up with revolutionary changes in world commerce and if U.S. exports are to expand—"Then we need a new and bold instrument of American trade policy," Kennedy said.

The President did not give any particulars on the authority he wants, but he did draw out a picture to certain areas of the debate in Congress between protectionists and free trade forces next year.

He left no doubt that he would launch at once his own campaign for a greater flow of international trade. "The hour of decision has arrived," he said. "We cannot afford to wait and see what happens while the tide of events sweeps over and beyond us."

In direct reply to such critics as Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., Kennedy emphasized that he was not advocating that the United States join the common market with France, Italy, West Germany, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

Neither, Kennedy said, does he propose "that in adding to our policies on imports we do away altogether with our traditional safeguards and institutions." He said that tariffs can be used to cushion the effects on competitive U.S. industries in order to shut out competition from abroad.

Moreover, he said, the federal government can help affected companies, workers and communities. He told the industrialists he would have more to say on that subject tomorrow when he addresses the AFL-CIO in Miami Beach.

Kennedy lifted off organized labor that he also would stress in his AFL-CIO speech. He said he would support a bill to establish a price stability fund to enable the United States to compete on world markets.

Not only cooperation among all the action by Congress and U.S. business leadership is required for a healthy economy, he said, but the government itself must exercise self-discipline.

In this connection, Kennedy repeated his intention to submit a balanced budget next year. Kennedy said free world strength would be splintered by a network of tariff walls, exchange controls, and other trade barriers.

Town Leases Land to WINF For AM Tower

About five acres of sewer department land on Love Lane will be leased to radio station WINF for an AM broadcasting tower and a small, bomb-proof equipment building, by vote of the board of directors last night.

The terms of the lease require the radio station to pay \$30 a month for the first five months, occupancy of the swampy land, and \$35 a month for the following nine years and seven months.

The radio station will also have an option to continue leasing the land for an additional five years, at \$40 a month, and still another five years for \$45 a month.

The equipment building, to be constructed for about \$1,500, will become the property of the town when the lease expires, on at the end of 20 years, said John Demie, owner of the station.

If the station should decide not to renew the lease with the town, the broadcasting tower would be removed within six months of the expiration of the lease, at the expense of the station, said Demie.

He estimated earlier that moving the station from its present location near the studios in the Manchester Parade will cost about \$10,000. The studios will remain at the Parade.

Demie spoke in his station's behalf last night, reminding the directors that his station is one of two in the area that is a Concordia station, that is, it will continue broadcasting in the event of an atomic attack. WTC is the other Concordia station.

He said that the one change to be made on the site would be the removal of any tree higher than 60 feet.

Gordon Objects

All of the directors except Republican Robert Gordon approved the lease.

Gordon said the 10-year lease was too long. He said a clause should be included in the contract which would permit the town to take over the land if any "imperative use for the land" came up.

Democrat Francis Mahoney said there could be no better than that defense, and added that the major roads had been mapped in town and do not interfere with the site.

Director Gordon agreed, but said a broadcasting tower could be located in a number of places in town, whereas a situation might occur during the next 10 years in which the Love Lane site would be the only possible one for some town project. The directors would be greatly embarrassed, he said, if they didn't make allowance for such a chance.

The rest of the directors, however, went along with Republican Thomas Bailey, who said there should be "no question" about leasing the land to WINF. The town can be proud of the quality of the station, he said. It does a great public service.

He added that he wanted the station to carry a special liability insurance policy to cover any liability on the town's part for the property during the period of the lease.

The directors asked Gordon, who is the secretary of the board, to draft a motion of commendation to the radio station for its public service and quality programs.

UN Jets Strike Katangan Base

Elizabethville, Katanga, Dec. 7 (AP)—U.N. jet fighters today struck at Katangan ammunition dumps six miles outside Elizabethville and explosions rocked the heart of the capital.

Katanga launched another attack against the U.N. headquarters just outside of the city at daybreak after a tropical thunderstorm brought firing to a halt during the night.

(The U.S. embassy in Leopoldville said an American Air Force Globemaster was fired on over Elizabethville, and the U.S. airlift was suspended while commanders in Leopoldville and Washington consulted on security arrangements for the American planes.)

(The embassy denied making any official statement that the airlift of equipment to U.N. forces in Elizabethville had been grounded, but it was understood high level consultations were going on as to whether it should continue.)

(American sources said the small arms firing came from the official residence of Katanga President Moise Tshombe while the Globemaster was coming in to land at Elizabethville Airport.)

U.S. Battle Unit Rides Autobahn

Berlin, Dec. 7 (AP)—First units of an American battle group rolled safely into West Berlin today after the Communists voiced a new threat against use of the highway lifeline from West Germany.

The 110-mile ride down the Autobahn came after Communist East Germany declared free movements of U.S. NATO troops along the highway had never been guaranteed by the East Germans or the Russians.

U.S. officials in Paris commented that the troops moving to Berlin are definitely under U.S.—and not NATO—control.

The Russians have called recent U.S. tests of Allied access rights to Communist-encircled West Berlin provocations "fraught with dangerous consequences."

Company E, 1st Battle Group, 19th Infantry—about 200 men and 25 Jeeps and trucks—began the ride from East Germany at a point Bravo after an uneventful trip through East Germany.

Reduced Tax Seen For East Hartford

East Hartford, Dec. 7 (AP)—East Hartford's present tax rate of 29.9 mills stands a chance of being reduced to 25 or 26 mills as a result of revaluation. Town Council president John W. Torpey disclosed today.

Torpey said that the projection at this time is "educated speculation" based on statistics they now have at hand.

According to Torpey, it is estimated the budget will be increased by \$300,000 bringing East Hartford's budget to \$5.5 million. Estimated receipts, he said, are expected to increase by \$310,000.

This means East Hartford will have an estimated tax revenue of \$5,355,000 to meet anticipated budget expenditures.

No Dereliction of Duty Pentagon Concludes Pearl Harbor Probe

Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—The Pentagon considers a closed matter the question of why the United States was caught off guard at Pearl Harbor.

The word today—the 20th anniversary of the surprise Japanese attack—is that no more official investigations are planned.

Authors continue to write books debating the issues of that day when the high command at Hawaii was surprised by the strike of 300 planes from six Japanese carriers and midjet submarine attacks.

But the Defense Department foresees no more official probes into the long and hotly debated subject of who, if anyone, was to blame for the tragic moment of unreadiness.

There have been eight official inquiries. The first, ordered by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, was opened only 12 days after the attack and was conducted by a commission headed by Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts. When that inquiry was concluded the following Jan. 23 the record and transcripts covered 2,173 pages.

Between then and the end of World War II, the Navy and Army conducted six more inquiries into the overall subject or phases of it. Allegations and testimony at those hearings served to foster more public debate.

In November 1945, with the war end more than three months passed and with testimony and evidence from former enemy commanders becoming available, Congress opened a full-scale inquiry. A 10-member joint committee of the Senate and House, with a battery of special counsel and experts, conducted that inquiry, compiling mountains of testimony and a 492-page report.

That final inquiry had the advantage both of material from the previous seven investigations and its own questioning of most of the top men in Washington and Pearl Harbor on the day of the attack. The evidence taken by the Joint Committee came not only from military leaders but from diplomatic officials and records showing the diplomatic background leading up to the Japanese decision to attack the United States.

The committee's report said that "The figures and witnesses in the drama of Pearl Harbor ran the gamut of officials in the executive branch of the government," including Roosevelt, Secretary of State Cordell Hull, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox, Gen. George C. Marshall, Army chief of staff, Adm. Harold R. Stark, chief of naval operations, Rear Adm. Husband E. Kimmel, commander of the Pacific Fleet, and Lt. Gen. Walter C. Short, commanding general of the Hawaiian Department.

Chaplain at Yale Answers Critics Of Freedom Ride

New Haven, Dec. 7 (AP)—Yale's chaplain, who was arrested several months ago in Montgomery, Ala., for taking part in a "Freedom Ride," says there is sound historical precedent for preachers disturbing the peace on occasion.

"Jesus was the chief disturber of the peace," the Rev. William S. Coffin Jr. said last night in an address on the campus.

He challenged the unjust people who were governing society—that's why he was crucified."

Although students, faculty, and alumni of Yale have in the main commended the university chaplain for his "Freedom Ride" experience, there has been some criticism from these same groups.

Some of his critics say Coffin would accomplish more by tending to his duties at home and leaving the question of civil rights in the South to others. His speech last night was considered an answer to these criticisms.

Christian ministers have always had to decide whether their role was to be a "priestly" one or a "prophetic" one, he said.

The "priestly" functions, he said, include such normal activities such as calling on those who are ill, leading worship services, and in other ways tending strictly to the operation of the church.

A minister who chooses the prophetic role, he said, points out the faults of society and sets a positive example in an attempt to correct them. Jesus chose this type of ministry, Coffin said.

"If Jesus hadn't bothered people in high places," he said, "they would have left him alone. As it was, he was so disturbing to those governing society he was crucified."

Coffin said the reaction that can be expected when direct action is taken to help Negroes in their civil rights should not deter those who make such attempts.

"If you try to prevent segregation," he said, "you are inevitably going to invite...I don't say incite—some people to violence."

Police Ready Crackdown on Yield Violators

Hartford, Dec. 7 (AP)—State Police Comdr. Leo J. Mulcahy directed his commanding officers today to take all possible steps to acquaint the motoring public with the "yield sign" law in preparation for a forthcoming crackdown on violators of the statute.

This action was taken, he said, after a survey conducted under the direction of Capt. William A. Gruber, head of the Traffic Division, showed that only 52 out of 341 drivers checked obeyed the law.

"When only 15 per cent of the drivers obey the law," said Captain Gruber, "it is indicative that the law is unknown or misunderstood as well as disregarded deliberately."

Before a stringent program of enforcement begins, we feel that the motoring public should at least have its memory refreshed that it is a violation of law to disregard a yield sign.

The law states that the driver of a vehicle approaching a yield sign shall slow to the speed of not more than 10 miles per hour, or stop if necessary, before entering the intersection, and shall yield the right-of-way to pedestrians and to such other traffic as may be necessary to avoid collision.

"If a driver fails to heed a yield sign and is involved in a collision with a pedestrian or another vehicle, such collision shall be deemed prima facie evidence, unless the law of the driver's failure to yield the right of way."

"The law is clear and simple. It establishes a definite responsibility which cannot legally or safely be disregarded. It is much more specific in fixing responsibility for collision than almost any other law."

"The aggressive attitude of many drivers in bullying their way into a swift traffic flow in complete disregard of the mere rules of courtesy—let alone the law, will shortly be made the target of special traffic squads assigned for their specific benefit."

Captain Gruber said that the yield sign law, which went into effect in 1955, "reflects the reluctance of most drivers to bring

Pact Indicates Balaguer Out Before Dec. 31

Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, Dec. 7 (AP)—Informed sources said today a settlement has been reached in the Dominican political crisis.

It is understood the agreement calls for the resignation of President Joaquin Balaguer before Dec. 31 and installation of a provisional council of state to govern this island nation seeking a new way of life after 31 years of rule by the Trujillo dynasty.

An announcement of the settlement is expected today. Informants said an accord was reached on main points and only some minor details are being worked over.

Dense crowds packed Santo Domingo's main streets as word spread that an agreement was at hand. Many shops reopened in some business areas, but the downtown stores remained closed on the 10th day of a general strike that was a key factor in the negotiations.

The volume of street traffic increased appreciably.

In the streets chants of "Balaguer Out" were mixed with others of "Liberty by Christmas."

Balaguer's health reportedly figured in developments of the last 48 hours. He was reported exhausted and suffering from a mild kidney infection. Persons close to him said he was on the verge of collapse after the Nov. 20 coup which followed an attempt by two brothers of the late Gen. Rafael Trujillo to seize power.

Highly placed sources said the new government formula would vest executive and legislative powers in a 7-man council of state with a term of 18 months.

The council would elect its presiding officer, and election of a constituent assembly would follow on Aug. 16. General elections would be held Dec. 1, with a new government to be installed Jan. 26, 1962.

The formula is said to exclude all leaders of the government party and of the opposition factions from membership in the state council. This project follows the general lines of that submitted last week by the National Civic Union, the foremost opposition group.

Calls for More New Jobs

Meany for Growth In Economic Rate

Bal Harbour, Fla., Dec. 7 (AP)—AFL-CIO President George Meany, saying American workers want jobs rather than handouts, called today for a big increase in the nation's economic growth rate.

Meany said in a keynote address to the opening session of the AFL-CIO's biennial convention that "We can't preserve our American system unless we can step up our economic growth."

He said the stark fact is that 1,500,000 new jobs must be created each year during the decade of the 60's in order to assimilate the expanding work force.

Meany also said that in the present Cold War controversy with Russia American union members must "think of themselves first as citizens and secondly as trade unionists."

"We have a greater obligation than any other segment of American society," Meany said, "to see that America is strong—strong economically and strong militarily."

Meany said organized labor is dedicated to preserving human values whereas most other U.S. groups are dedicated to promoting material things.

The AFL-CIO chief said that recent improvement in the employment situation is only temporary. He predicted the worsening job picture next winter.

Meany urged labor unions to step up efforts to end racial discrimination. He said that as believers in democracy it was their duty.

Meany, referring to policy AFL-CIO differences, said "Frankly the appetite of some of our people for combat never ceases to amaze me."

He acknowledged that AFL-CIO internal differences must be dealt with and "can't be swept under the rug." But he issued an appeal that AFL-CIO problems not be exaggerated or permitted to prevent the federation from carrying on its main objectives.

Gov. Farris Bryant told the AFL-CIO convention in a welcoming speech that Organized Labor was an important force against communism.

Bryant said Florida is going through an industrial revolution, marked by rapid economic growth and a move of the state's citizens "from the farm to the suburbs."

Meany, at another point in his keynote address, said the merged AFL-CIO, although six years old,

Face Loss of Jobs Or Increase Exports

Miami Beach, Fla., Dec. 7 (AP)—President Kennedy told Organized Labor today it must back the effort to build up America's foreign trade or face the loss of jobs.

In an address prepared for a convention of the AFL-CIO—many of whose members have been less than enthusiastic about some phases of his proposals for freer world trade—Kennedy stated his view bluntly:

"In short, we are confronted with a very basic decision: Are we going to export our goods and crops—or are we going to export our capital and our job opportunities? Are we going to be the free world's greatest merchant trader—or merely its temporary wealthiest banker?"

Labor elements directly affected by rising imports have been presenting arguments in congressional hearings for even stiffer barriers against the incoming flow, in contrast to the administration plan for wider discretion to negotiate reciprocal concessions.

In almost direct response Kennedy took the stand that buying must rise along with sales and asserted that "as our exports increase along with our imports, many more jobs will be created than lost."

At another point he stated his case this way:

"We cannot obtain new bargaining power to open overseas markets, our export industries will wither—and American labor will lose jobs. If American business men cannot compete from here for the growing purchasing power of the European Common Market, many more will build their plants over there—and American labor will lose jobs."

Industry and management, he said, have a responsibility to increase efficiency and thus stabilize or reduce costs and prices. But Labor also must help keep America competitive.

To that end, he said, "Labor must demonstrate its responsibility in helping to keep over-all wage movements in line with increases in productivity."

Kennedy conceded there will be individual cases where workers, industries or communities cannot keep their footing against increased competition.

But he promised: "I do not intend to see them made victims of the national welfare. I do not intend to give them a medal and an empty grocery bag."

As insurance against that Kennedy said he will push for measures aimed at better job opportunities for young people, retraining for workers displaced by competition or otherwise, special job efforts in behalf of minorities, tax incentives to encourage industrial expansion, and stand-by authority for public works projects to put men to work in case of a recession.

In his trade law proposals themselves, Kennedy said, there will be provision for adjustment assistance for affected areas, businesses and workers, and even for "temporary tariff relief."

Senator Raps Phone Co. for Rates Formula

Waterbury Dec. 7 (AP)—State Sen. William J. Verrier, D-Waterbury, charged today that the Southern New England Telephone Company is seeking the right to raise rates in the future "without even the formality of applying to the Public Utilities Commission."

"The telephone company said Verrier's charge was, in effect, 'distortion of a procedure that we are proposing.'"

Verrier, in a letter he sent to all mayors, first selectmen, and state senators and representatives, said this fact "has received little notice."

He called on these officials to "join in the fight for the forgotten customer" when the PUC resumes the public hearing on the rate increase application of the telephone company Monday in Hartford.

Verrier explained his claim about future rate increases without PUC approval by saying it would be done by securing authorization to raise rates for all subscribers in an area under a re-grouping formula when the number of phones in that area reaches a pre-determined figure.

"This proposal for automatic increases, virtually at the company's pleasure would strike at the very heart of our state's system."

The Federal Defense Ministry said the planes would stay in Ndola "until the situation in Katanga is clarified."

MAN KILLS 2, SELF
Belton, Tex., Dec. 7 (AP)—A woman and her daughter were shot to death on the campus of Mary Hardin-Baylor College today by a man who then killed himself. Ralph Jeffers, Bell County sheriff, said the victims were identified as Mrs. Weldon Dunlap; her 20-year-old daughter, Miss Marjorie Dunlap; and Leroy Cockrell. All lived at nearby Salado, Tex.

GUARD TO GET HERCULES
Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—Army National Guard units manning air defense batteries around the country will be armed with the Nike-Hercules missile starting late next year, it was announced today. A total of 76 Army guard units now share with regular outfits the job of defending major population and industrial centers from air attack. The guard units have been armed since 1957 with the less powerful Nike-Ajax missile which has a conventional warhead. The Army claims the Ajax can destroy any known type of bomber now in use.

ATTLEE GRAVELY ILL
London, Dec. 7 (AP)—Lord Attlee, former Laborite prime minister of Britain, has suffered a heart attack and is in grave condition. Attlee, who will be 79 on Jan. 3, was taken to Amersham Hospital near London Tuesday with a stomach ailment. His doctor said yesterday his condition was serious. This morning's bulletin from the hospital said "Lord Attlee has suffered a heart attack as a complication of his gastric disorder. His condition remains grave."

'Tony Ducks' Also Indicted Bankruptcy Fix Tied To N. Y. State Justice

New York, Dec. 7 (AP)—A federal grand jury today indicted State Supreme Court Justice James Vincent Keogh of Brooklyn on a charge of conspiring to "fix" a fraudulent bankruptcy case.

Also indicted were Elliott Keenan, 36, a former assistant United States attorney in Brooklyn, now in private practice, and three other men.

They are Sanford J. Moore, 44, of 1 East Voss Ave., East Rockaway, N.Y., a juke box company operator and former New York City policeman.

Antonio Corallo, 47, of Flushing, Queens, a former Teamsters Union official.

Dr. Robert Erdman, 43, of 600 W. 248th St., Riverdale, The Bronx.

Keogh, 56, is a brother of Rep. Eugene J. Keogh, D-N.Y., Congressman Keogh was not involved in the case.

The defendants were accused of trying to fix a case in Federal District Court in Brooklyn for \$35,000. The indictment climaxed a months-long grand jury investigation ordered by Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy when reports of a "fix" plot reached him last April.

Kennedy assigned William G. Hundley, a special assistant, to conduct the probe and gave orders to "let the chips fall where they may."

The Corallo named in the indictment was identified as "Tony Ducks" Corallo, who has been the subject of numerous criminal investigations in recent years.

A bench warrant was issued for his arrest on the indictment.

The other four defendants were scheduled to appear for arraignment next Thursday.

The charge is that the object of the reporting conspiracy was to obtain suspended sentences for three defendants in return for their cooperation.

Hartford, Dec. 7 (AP)—Gov. John N. Dempsey is planning a 4-state meeting in New Haven to deal with the problems of the New Haven railroad.

The trustees of the bankrupt carrier will be invited, Dempsey said in his announcement yesterday.

Invitations also will go to the governors of New York, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, the mayor of New York City and officials of Westchester County, N. Y.

No date has been set for the meeting.

Dempsey said the agenda would include a discussion of possible legislation by the four states to help restore the line to financial stability and insure continued service. Each year, the four states each voted tax relief for the railroad, but this action failed to prevent the railroad from going into receivership under the Federal Bankruptcy Act during the summer.

Sneak Attack Still Possible, Admiral Says

Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, Dec. 7 (AP)—"In this missile and thermonuclear age, it would be foolhardy indeed to assume that surprise attacks will never be a possibility."

This warning was in a speech prepared for delivery today by Adm. John H. Sides, commander of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, at ceremonies marking the 20th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Ceremonies were held on a platform above the waters along non-restored "Battleship Row." Activities throughout the naval base halted momentarily in memory of that Black Sunday—Dec. 7, 1941.

The ceremony was timed to coincide with the exact moment—7:55 a.m.—when the first Japanese planes swooped low over the battleships lining the northeast shores of Ford Island.

Below the memorial platform for the U.S. Arizona, center of today's ceremonies, was the rusting hull of the warship and the remains of 1,102 crewmen who went down with her. The Arizona and her crew are symbols of those hours when war came to the United States.

South of the Arizona the old battleship row was vacant. But between the flag flying above the Arizona and one beside Ford Island's administration building—

Ribicoff Denies Senate Race in Present Plans

Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—Secretary of Welfare Abraham Ribicoff says he is not planning to run for the U.S. Senate in Connecticut, but he adds that "in politics...the future is always hard to predict."

Ribicoff, former Democratic governor of Connecticut, was asked yesterday to comment on widespread speculation that he might seek a Senate seat next year.

"You ask me the question today and the answer is 'no,'" Ribicoff said. "What the future holds I just don't know, and after many years in politics, I know that the future is always hard to predict. But asked today the answer has to be 'No.'"

When asked to comment further on a possible change in his present attitude, Ribicoff replied that he would not attempt to forecast what his feelings or the situation might be in the future. He said he did not believe there was any pressure of time involved in reaching a decision.

"I have spoken to no one in Connecticut about it, or asked them to do for me. I have a job to do here and I intend to give it all I can, like I always have done."
