HALF A LOAF IS NOT ENOUGH

You can afford to play a game contract when you are even. Odds of 3 to 1 in your favor are even better. But don't be satisfied with favorable odds when you get a sure thing.

South led the king of spades and continued with the ace and then led a third spade, forcing South to ruff.

Declarer cashed the ace of hearts and then hopefully tried the king of hearts. There was an even chance that the queen would drop, he told himself, and another even chance that the diamond finessée would work. The combination gave him a 5-0 chance.

South gave a heart, ruffed another spade and has three clubs to discard a diamond. Then he tried the diamond finesse.

Down one.

The contract was a sure thing after the second trick. South ruffed the third spade, cashed only one high trump and clears the king and jack of clubs out of the way. Then South leads a low trump.

Dummy has a sure entry and South can discard two diamonds on dummy's good club. This costs an unimportant overtrick if the trump happens to break 2-2, but the contract is safe.

Incidentally, West could have done better at the second trick. When East naturally signaled with the ten of spades at the first trick, West could have led a low spade instead of the ace. East would have with the queen of spades and taken a diamond. Contract for South.

# Slayer of Father Said Mentally Ill

Bridgewater, Dec. 8 (AP)—A state psychiatrist has testified in the murder trial of Richard Green of Wilton that the defendant was mentally ill at the time of the fatal shooting of his father.

"I believe that he was mentally ill and that his reason was severely affected by this illness," Dr. Stan U. Friedman, assistant superintendent of the Fairfield State Hospital, said yesterday.

Dr. Friedman was one of the first defense witnesses in the first-degree murder trial which entered its second day today in Superior Court. The state finished its presentation yesterday.

Green, 30, is accused of murdering his father, Wellington Green, 74, who was shot June 28 and died two days later in Norwalk Hospital.

### Town's Well Water Enough in Emergency

Manchester's supply of water from wells would probably be sufficient to provide the town with drinking water in the event that the reservoir should be polluted by atomic fallout, said Fred Thrall, superintendent of the water and sewer department.

Thrall, who attended a conference of the Connecticut Waterworks Association yesterday on the effects of fallout, said that the safety of the well water would depend on many factors, such as how near the blast was, and whether the pipes remained intact. The well water is protected to a great extent, he said, since it is underground.

Even if the pipes leading from the wells to the water system were broken, he said, residents could still get water by taking water from the lower pipes, which would be above the ground level. He said the filter plants in Manchester and in other towns are not equipped to filter fallout. These and other problems will be studied by the water department in the months ahead, he said.

At this point the judge said he would continue the case indefinitely until he files a memorandum on denunciations which challenge the constitutionality of the law.

Rusk said the report shows that the Communist effort has been stepped up sharply in recent months and that South Viet Nam needs additional help in defending itself.

He expressed hope that a 3-nation international control commission, headed by India, would shortly begin looking into the violations of the 1954 Geneva Peace Agreement for Indochina—the agreement that created South Viet Nam and other political units in the area.

Rusk said there had been some indications that the Indian-Pakistani body would finally come to grips with charges of terror, assassination, torture, kidnapping, infiltration and open military aid to South Viet Nam which he made against the Reds.

Discussing the white paper, Rusk said the published documents "show clearly that the North Vietnamese have repeatedly violated the Geneva accord."

"I believe that this report makes it clear that South Viet Nam needs additional help in defending itself," he continued. "The government of South Viet Nam realizes this and has welcomed support from the non-Communist world."

The United States is now taking steps to help South Viet Nam develop the military, economic and social strength needed to serve its national integrity. It is our hope that other nations will join us in providing assistance to South Viet Nam until such time as the Communists have halted their acts of violence and terror."

The white paper charged that the Communists had begun "inter-continental" for the control commission some weeks ago when they kidnapped, tortured and killed Col. Hoang Thuy Nam, chief of the South Vietnamese liaison mission with the control commission. The State Department white paper said:

"Appeals for his release went unheeded. The ICC refused to raise its voice in protest."

The report put the number of Viet Cong (Communist) forces seeking the overthrow of the South Vietnamese government at 8,000 to 9,000 elite fighting units, based in local areas of South Viet Nam. Furthermore, the report said, the Viet Cong is assisted by "many thousands of village militia personnel cadres, special agents, spies and the like."

"North Viet Nam, in guiding and supporting the Viet Cong effort, has had the full backing of Moscow, Peking, and the rest of the Communist world," the paper said.

South Viet Nam has received extensive aid from the United States and other friendly countries, but "in the face of heightened efforts by the Viet Cong, more assistance may be needed," the report said.

"The problem here is to work out cooperatively the kind of assistance program that is likely to prove most effective in meeting the present danger."

In the last two days Assistant Secretary of State W. Averell Harriman officially handed copies of the booklet and its annex of documents to ambassadors of Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, Thailand, Pakistan, and the Philippines—allies in the Southeast Asian region.

### Kennedy Plans Caracas Visit Despite Protest

White House officials have been in touch with the U.S. embassy in Caracas, Hatcher said, and the State Department will make a report on the situation. Kennedy will determine what a reciprocal visit to Venezuela and make arrangements for the Kennedy visit.

The President will return to Washington Saturday afternoon and confer with Secretary of State Dean Rusk upon arrival.

The Chief Executive relaxed in Florida with a growing number of admirers, arriving at this point on the coast resort where he has been spending long ago vacation days.

He put aside reports and papers for two excursions into town—attended Peas of the Immaculate Conception services at St. Edward's Church, and to look over the grounds where he and his family will spend the Christmas holidays.

Hatcher said Kennedy had no scheduled public appearances in the area, but he is expected to appear at a political rally in Miami on Monday.

The State Department also asserted that South Viet Nam is not a political problem, "arguing that the tactics used by the Communists there have been used before and will be employed again, particularly if they prove successful."

The paper said "Free men could, if they would, force a halt to such things as infiltration through Laos and the use of neighboring territories as safe bases for Viet Cong operations."

Secretary of State Dean Rusk urged support today for the United Nations Congo operation and declared the Congo faces anarchy and Communist penetration. He said that the Congo is not peacefully integrated.

At the same time, Rusk denied that the U.N. is trying to "control" the Congo. He said a blue print for a government that would be established in the Congo would be based on the U.N. policy, which the United States has a blue print for a stable situation under which the Congo state leaders themselves can work out a political solution of their own.

Rusk spoke at a news conference at which the troubled Congo was a major topic.

"If Katanga is not peacefully integrated, the Congo will face a civil war in anarchy and be open to Communist penetration," he said.

"We hope that the leaders of Katanga will recognize that their present path leads nowhere."

As for neighboring Cuba, Rusk said Prime Minister Fidel Castro has saved the United States some trouble by his public admission that he is a Communist.

Rusk said Castro's announcement came as no surprise to the United States, which has known this for some time, from the statements from Castro's own lips save Washington for the lack of proving it conclusively to others.

Meanwhile, Castro has created a problem for the Communists, as shown by their quiet response to his statement that he would meet with the U.S. foreign affairs leader in New Orleans for a half hour tomorrow night for a meeting.

North Atlantic Treaty Organization ministers.

Rusk listed the German question as obviously the main problem to be tackled by the Allied diplomats at the Paris gathering.

While there are some differences among the Allies on how to proceed toward a Berlin settlement, Rusk said, the difference which really counts is that between Moscow and the Western powers. The real key to a settlement is whether the Soviets will respect Western rights in Germany, he said.

### Kramer Sees Little Rise In School Enrollment

Only slight increase in enrollment are expected on the primary grade level and an overall leveling off of secondary enrollment are expected in Manchester by 1965, according to planning consultant Harold S. Kramer.

Kramer, a staff planner for the Board of Education, said that the upsurge of enrollment in his latest public school facilities report.

He said East Catholic High School and Agassiz School are expected to absorb a large number of students who would ordinarily be housed in public school facilities.

The new regional technical school will also have a notable effect on enrollment, he added.

"Comparing enrollments to available capacities in the public school system it was found that improvements and additions should be made in the primary, secondary and high schools, and that the existing secondary schools are in adequate condition. Enrollment changes projected for 1965," he says in the report.

Slight increases in the primary school age population within the central areas of town are also expected after 1965, he said, although the enrollment of outlying areas will result in high grade level primary enrollments in the next few years.

Kramer's latest report outlines a small increase in total enrollment, a decline in high enrollments and positive increases in senior high enrollments.

Total enrollments, including private schools, compare as follows to this year's enrollment in 1960-61: 1960-61, 2,459 this year, a difference of 152.

Grades 10 through 12, 2,164 in 1960-61, 1,989 this year, an increase of 175.

**May Says State Needs Leadership**  
Hartford, Dec. 8 (AP)—A call for a change in leadership in the state's political arena was made today by Edwin H. May Jr., a candidate for Republican gubernatorial nomination next year.

### Retraining Benefits Jobless Coal Miners

(Note: Huntington, W. Va., has been placed by the government for the first retraining period under the new retraining bill. Unemployment is high in West Virginia, especially among coal miners. Can these men be retrained for other jobs? The retraining program is being tested in West Virginia. This story takes a look at these and other important questions.)

Huntington, W. Va., Dec. 8 (AP)—Can the jobless West Virginia coal miner be retrained for a new occupation? "Yes, it's been our experience that those who are interested and have the aptitude can be retrained," says S. D. McMillen, director of vocational education. "We have a large number of coal miners and others out of work who are going back to school to learn new trades under the federal government's retraining program."

The U. S. government is putting up \$135,000 to provide for the retraining of 300 jobless persons who have shown aptitude for such fields as small appliance repair, automatic transmission repair, auto mechanics, waiters and waitresses, nursing, route salesmen, stenography and typing. "We happen to have a pattern for similar retraining courses under the federal area retraining act."

The actual retraining will be handled by state and local officials who are old hands at this sort of thing. West Virginia, plagued with unemployment, has had its own retraining program since 1959. "I believe West Virginia and Pennsylvania are the only states operating their own retraining programs on a widespread scale," McMillen said. "The two states have similar problems—high unemployment in the mine fields and in industrial areas."

The West Virginia department of employment security now lists 63,000, or 10.2 per cent of its labor force, as out of work. While there is no breakdown of the jobless by occupation, state officials say a large majority are coal miners. They point to figures which show the mine employment in the state has dwindled from a peak of 140,000 in 1949 to 45,300 this year. Some early critics maintained that even if the coal miners could be retrained, they still wouldn't leave their homes up the creeks and hollows to find work.

McMillen says he has preliminary figures to prove otherwise. Sixty-nine of the first 100 men retrained found jobs in their newly acquired skills within three months after completion of the course. The state's first retraining course was held at Welch, in the heart of the state's southern mine fields.

### UConn Eliminates Mandatory ROTC

Storrs, Dec. 8 (AP)—The University of Connecticut Board of Trustees announced yesterday that Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) training will be on a voluntary basis at the university after the fall of 1962.

At present, all eligible male students are required to take ROTC training in their freshman and sophomore years. The university offers army and air force programs.

The trustees based their decision on a report by the University Senate, the faculty governing body, that recommended that undergraduate students be given the option of taking ROTC. The recommendation was made after the Department of Defense indicated that compulsory ROTC in colleges was not required to meet its military needs.

"We believe the substance pay will eliminate the problem of dropouts," McMillen explained. "We had many who had no source of income drop out of our state program. The only thing the state pays is transportation costs."

At present, West Virginia has an estimated 100,000 jobless persons. The state program conducted in 27 different counties. The West Virginia legislature appropriated \$500,000 to finance the program during the year ending next June 30.

Both the federal and state retraining programs use public school classrooms for the most part. The instructors are either vocational school teachers or those skilled in certain occupations. The federal program which got underway this year had been given approval by the federal government. "We have had a good record of contribution to the nation's armed forces," McMillen said.

### More Christmas Music Predicted This Season

New York, Dec. 8 (AP)—"It is my prediction that there will be more Christmas music in the churches, on the radio and on the TV this Christmas than ever before," says Dr. Jesse M. Bader, general secretary of the World Council of Churches of Christ (Disciples).

"Why? Because our world needs the Christ of Christmas more than ever. Today America is called upon to make him central and not marginal."

Dr. Bader, who was executive director of the Department of Evangelism of the National Council of Churches before taking his present post, predicted further: "There will be more window displays with Christmas scenes and more carol singing in communities across our land. There will be a more general exchange of appropriate religious Christmas cards."

On the latter point, the greeting card association is already able to say that Dr. Bader is correct. This year three billion Christmas cards will go through the mail.

### Court Postpones Trial of Lefko

New London, Dec. 8 (AP)—The murder trial of George J. Lefko, 36, today was postponed until Jan. 2 in Superior Court at Norwich. Judge Frank Corvelli, state's Attorney Allyn L. Brown, Jr., and Public Defender George Gilman agreed there is not enough time remaining in the fall term to conclude the case.

Lefko, accused of killing Mrs. Gladys Chouinard in her Fogou-neck, Bridge Home Dept. 14, was present in court but did not speak. Rather than risk a mistrial, the postponement was sought by Brown.

"Anywhere from 25 to 30 members of the YAF are expected to be on hand at 8B when the YAF marchers arrive. A spokesman for the pacifists, Robert Swann, said the group had made plans to demonstrate at 8B more than three weeks ago. He added the demonstration in Britain tomorrow by the British committee of 100.

Speakers from the group, which divided into six population classes, will be judged on the basis of content, candor, stability, utility and attractiveness. Entries must be submitted by Jan. 2.

Local Woman, 60, Among 15 Dead as Fire Sweeps Ninth Floor of Hartford Hospital

Trapped with Three Others Calm Visitor Saves Patients from Blaze

By ALEX GIRELLI (Herald Assistant City Editor) In the confusion of the holocaust at Hartford Hospital yesterday, some remained calm. One person who kept her wits about her was Mrs. John Mukizek, 238 Charter Oak St., who was visiting her father, a patient on the ninth floor, when the fire broke out. She helped protect him and two other patients in the same room from smoke and then assisted in evacuating others from the floor. "I got frightened when I found out that they lost people," Mrs. Mukizek said. Before that, everyone remained calm, she said. Mrs. Mukizek was visiting her father, Joseph Ramonka, who was recovering from a stroke. Ramonka, originally scheduled for discharge Wednesday, is one of the many patients sent home last night. He lives at 128 Birch St. When she first saw smoke coming from the ninth floor kitchen, Mrs. Mukizek closed the door to the room. She stuffed a blanket along the bottom of it. Later, as the smoke got heavier she opened windows and then put a wet face cloth over her father's face. "I began to get a little concerned when smoke came in around the radiator," she said. She pulled down one drap and wet it so that she could use it to smother out a flame if it burst through. She didn't get a chance to use it, however. A few minutes later interns, orderlies and doctors rushed onto the floor and gave instructions to get all patients out. They used wheel chairs, straight chairs, stretchers and any furniture they could grab. Mrs. Mukizek helped one of the other patients in the room down to the floor below where her daughter, Gloria Trakas, helped Ramonka. Then they assisted other patients being brought down from another floor. "When people got to the stairwell it was clear," she said. Putting the anxious moments when they were confined to the ninth floor, she asked rhetorically, "What are you going to do with these patients?" "You can't start pushing them around."

Trash Chute Blaze Sets Off Explosion

By PATRICIA PLATT (Herald Staff Writer) A Manchester woman who was a supervisor in the Hartford Hospital housekeeping department died yesterday in the ninth floor fire which killed 15. She was Miss Grace O. Hatch, 60, of 31 Green Rd., an employee of the hospital for 15 years. Miss Hatch was among three hospital personnel and a private duty nurse who perished with six patients and five visitors in flames and smoke on the hospital's ninth floor center. Hartford Fire Chief Thomas Lee said that the only thing that had been established was that the fire started in the trash chute between the first and third floors. The chute fire touched off an explosion of undetermined source which rocked the floor, blasting billows of thick black smoke through the eighth and ninth floors. More than 100 persons were trapped in hospital rooms as the fire transformed one cleaning corridor into a mass of charred debris. Patients broke windows in their rooms, jumping for breath and screaming to gathering crowds of police and ambulance men and fire engines which roared to the three-story blaze. It was a time of horror and heroism. Firefighters fought through smoke and fire as they carried helpless patients to safety down stairs or by a few elevators still working. Nurses remained with their patients to prevent panic, some choking smoke and approaching flames. They ran through corridors, opening doors shut as they forced by fire to seek refuge in rooms. Rescuers evacuated all patients from the eighth floor in the 8:10 million 15-story hospital. But most of the patients who were trapped on the ninth floor were carried to safety while plasma bottles still were attached to their arms. The cause of the explosion, which may have been an explosion of gas which accumulated at that hour all over the building. 16 Years Ago, Hospital Fire Left 17 Dead

By RORY O'CONNOR (Herald Staff Writer) "It wasn't like this one. The fire was like this." The Hartford Assistant Fire Chief Thomas J. Shortell compared yesterday's Hartford hospital fire with the one which took 17 lives in the small Niles St. convalescent hospital 16 years ago. "I remember a man who speaks so quietly you have to bend down to hear all his words, fought both ways," he said. "He was a doctor, his words are crisp and clear. He was one of the first to come to reach the ninth floor of Hartford Hospital yesterday. He was carried to safety on the White House. Both fires were quick and intense, he said. "They were similar because patients died in their beds" in both. Shortell has been with the Hartford Fire Department 25 years. He took part in fighting the holocaust at the Ringling Brook, Racum and Bailey Circus tent on Barbour St. in 1914, considered the worst in Hartford's history. He shunned its comparison with the hospital fire. The Niles St. and Hartford Hospital fires are shockingly similar. Fifteen people died yesterday; six patients, five visitors and four employees. Seventeen people died at Niles St., 15 patients and two employees. Both fires came in December. The Niles St. blaze on Christmas eve. Some bodies were burned beyond recognition. Yesterday, State Police Commissioner Leo J. Maloney began an investigation of the blaze while firemen still sought to bring it under control. In 1945, State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey began an investigation while firemen battled the flames. Smoke rolled into the bedrooms and corridors of both hospitals on the hospital's ground floor. The fire burst into flames and spread in seconds to the woodwork of the old three-story building. A probe of the city building code was begun after the Niles St. hospital was gutted. Officials proposed a tightening of building regulations. The new section of Hartford, which yesterday's fire occurred, was dedicated and opened for use three years later. Report on Kennedy
