Mark Richman

Football and Pharmacy
Preceded Acting Roles

Jack O'Brien, one of the most discerning television columnists and critics said of Mark Richman after his performance in a U.S. Steel Hour drama, "Richman steals Steel Hour... was the real star, a young leading man to remember; solid, straight-forward, most effective."

Now as star and only continuing performer in NBC's "Cain's Hundred" (Tuesdays, 10-11 p.m. EST), Mark Richman has proved himself more than worthy of praise. As an ex-gangland attorney, Richman as Nicholas Cain spearheads a federal drive to bring to justice the nation's top hundred underworld figures.

Richman's acting ability was noticed earlier by another most astute person, William Wyler. While on a lengthy road tour in "The Rainmaker" with Eva Marie Saint, Wyler saw him perform and invited him from Massachusetts to New York, on a specially chartered plane, for a screen test. "The whole ball of wax almost melted when the plane blew a tire on takeoff," Mark told us. "However, another plane was substituted, and I made it to New York for the test and back again in time to perform that night."

The test was successful, and Richman's movie career was begun as he was cast in an important role in "Friendly Persuasion." Since then, his credits piled higher and higher. He appeared on Broadway in "Hatful of Rain" and "Masquerade." His latest movie credit is "Black Orchid" with Anthony Quinn and Sophia Loren.

His success in the role of Nicholas Cain is very understandable for other reasons. Considering one of his former occupations, professional football, chasing criminals and fighting hoodlums should be a snap. He captained one of Philadelphia's entries in the Eastern Professional Football League for

two years before his knee was seriously injured in the last game of the 1946 season.

"It was a pretty rough way to make a living," Richman remarked. "But I loved it and would do it over again."

Naturally, as a former professional football player, Mark is a big man. Not only is his size impressive but we were made starkly aware of it when we shook his hand. Since we meet many well-known personalities, we take pride in a good solid handshake. However, every once in a while we are introduced to someone like Robert Taylor and Mark Richman and

find to our surprise that our "good solid handshake is all but buried in the grip of the other."

Surprisingly enough, Mark's delicate hands were used for a number of years to prepare doctor's prescriptions. In 1951, Mark was graduated with a bachelor of science degree from Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and practiced the profession in Rosemont, Pa.

"I'm probably the only actor licensed to practice pharmacy in two states, New York and Pennsylvania," he commented.

Fortunately, his real love was acting, so after a year, he quit pharmacy to enter summer stock, the success that has brought him to star in "Cain's Hundred."

In addition to Richman's fine acting ability, "Cain's Hundred" scores with documentary undertones the urgent problem of organized crime in the United States. It takes the viewer behind the scenes for realistic close-ups of numerous unlawful activities that tax the public billions of dollars each year and shows how federal

law enforcement agencies under Attorney General Robert Kennedy are becoming increasingly effective in thwarting underworld operations.

In conjunction with federal, state and local law enforcement agencies, Cain operates much like a commando, setting up widely scattered bases of operations. From these, he conducts a guerrilla war fought in the streets and penthouses of the "big shots" against an enemy as vicious as any our country knows.

As a result, the picture of big time crime — its dollars and cents operation, the civic corruption and moral degradation — is revealed. Incidents portrayed in "Cain's Hundred" not only have happened or can happen, but actually are happening.

Talking to Mary Tyler Moore, who plays Dick's wife, you realize that this is deliberate naturalness. For example, Miss Moore has received many letters from viewers, she says, complimenting her on the fact that her wardrobe is realistic.

"I wear slacks a good deal," says the beautiful young actress. "I want to appear normal. I wear slacks when I'm working around the house and so do most young housewives. It's ridiculous for a housewife to get dolled up in high heels to vacuum the rug, as you see on so many of the situation comedies."

There is also the question of food. Miss Moore says that they make a point of using the real thing on the set. If the script calls for her to scramble eggs, she scrambles eggs.

"In one show," Miss Moore says, "the script called for Morey Amsterdam making eggs Benedict. So he tried to make eggs Benedict. They wound up all over the floor and the ceiling, but it looked like he was really cooking."

Mary Tyler Moore — she uses a family name as a middle name "because I felt Mary Moore just sounded too plain" — started out as a dancer. But she realized (after she had danced on the Eddie Fisher and George Gobel shows) that there was no future in dancing. So she tried acting.

"I got lucky," she says. And, even before she was signed for The Dick Van Dyke Show, she had 60 shows under her belt.

She never told the Van Dyke staff that she could sing and dance, feeling that it was wise to hold something in reserve. When Carl Reiner discovered that she was a triple-threat, he immediately wrote a script for her, the one in which she met Dick while dancing in a USO show.

Now that she has something of a name, she's thinking of resuming her previous ambition—dancing the lead in a musical comedy on Broadway. She would seem to be a natural.
