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State News Roundup

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"We have received reports," a formal U.S. statement said, "that a new government—apparently a predominantly military junta—has assumed power in the Dominican Republic."

This development would appear to be a step backward in the transition toward stable democracy contemplated by the earlier announcement that President (Joaquin) Balaguer would shortly turn over the powers of government to the 7-man council of state headed by Senor (Rafael) Bonnelly as president.

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School Editor Questions U.S. Loyalty Basis

Hartford, Jan. 17 (AP)—A student editorial in a high school newspaper questioning American patriotism was provided sharp criticism from local groups.

The editorial, written by a student representing the Eastern American Legion Post, the Eastern American Town Committee, the Exchange Club and the 800th Bombardment Group, was published in the school paper.

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
