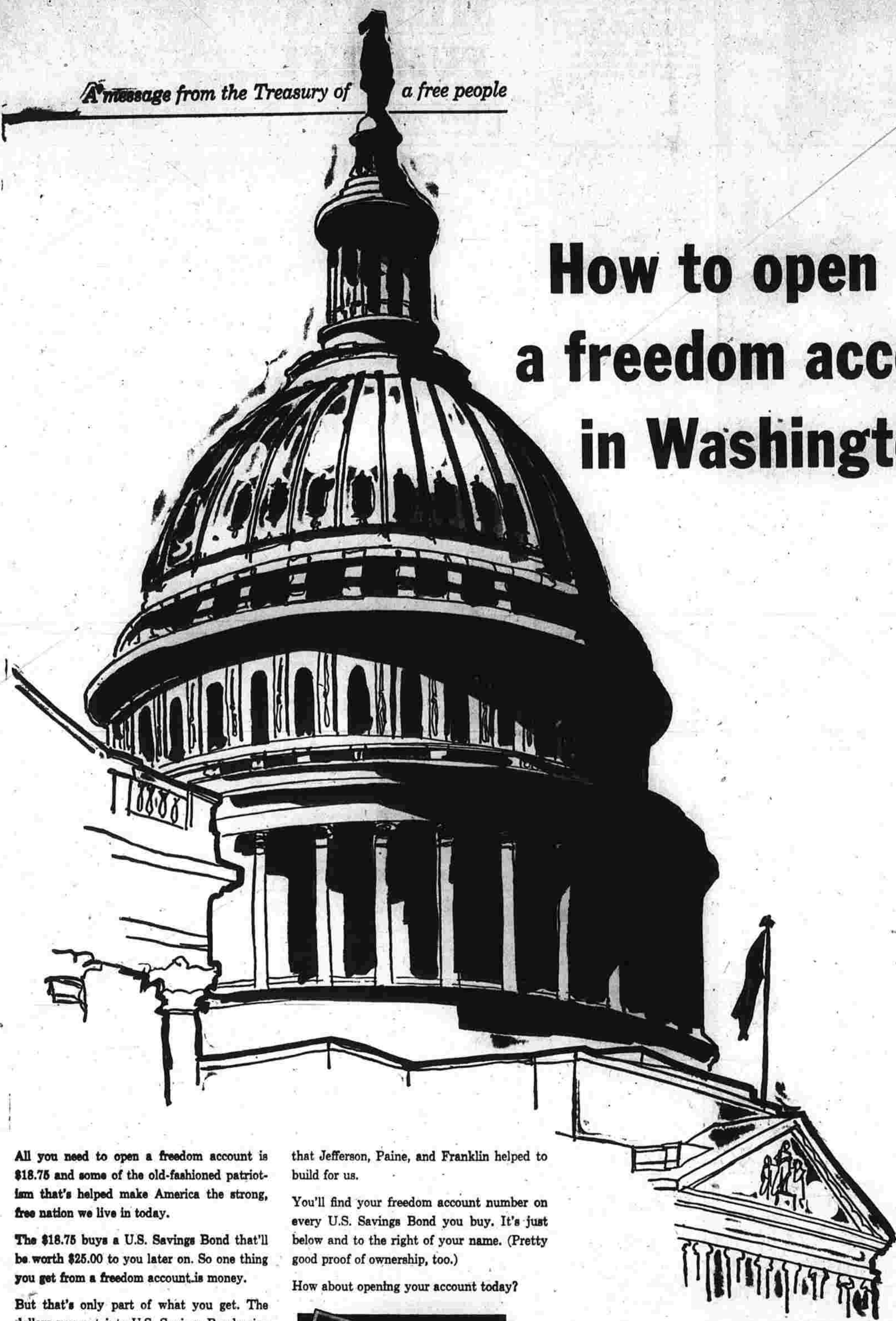

## Army Finally Wins Over Old Malaria Foe

Washington (NEA) — The Army's 64-year war with a mosquito named "Nofy" is almost over.  
Nofy, short for Anopheles, is the mosquito which transmits malaria. His undeclared war on the U.S. started in 1898. Dye-imbibing troops during the Spanish-American War, Nofy killed more than eight times as many American soldiers as were killed by the enemy.  
Nofy hasn't held down his weapon since that day. In fact, he hasn't changed at all. That's where he made his mistake.  
After Nofy's attacks in 1898, the Army struck back with quinine. This drug, taken daily, was a pretty good defense. But it caused nausea, dizziness, and a ringing in the ears for many soldiers, leaving them malaria free, but generally helpless in World War II, the Army moved statorine into its front trenches of defense against Nofy. Statorine didn't cause dizziness and a ringing in the ears. Instead, it caused diarrhea, headaches, cramps in the abdomen and a yellowish hue to the skin. As medical science leaped forward after the war, doctors came up with chloroquine, a pill which not only suppressed Nofy, but also

### Age of the Computer

New York (NEA) — It is less than 15 years since a sergeant at the U.S. Army Ordnance proving grounds in Maryland signed a receipt for the delivery of a very large package marked ENIAC — and brought an end to a thousand years of Western culture.  
ENIAC (Electronic Numerical Integrator and Calculator) was the world's first electronic computer. It was capable of handling 4,000 calculations per second, a century's work in two weeks.  
By that measure, 15 years is a long time. Pieces of ENIAC are in museums while electronic computers have grown up to a sophistication of 200,000 calculations per second. They are still growing. Today, electronic data-processing in U.S. business alone has:  
1. Passed the billion-dollar mark as an industry.  
2. Upset both pessimists and optimists as a labor-saving device.  
3. Opened a glimpse of another future capable of staggering even the smallest mind.  
Hardly any industry, service or consumer lives independently of electronic computation.  
With magnetic cores able to remember and compare, computers measure our atmosphere, guard our borders, make plane reservations, predict elections.  
With computers for hire by the hour today, cattle feed can be mixed at optimum quality and lowest price. So can sausage stuffing and construction bids.  
Despite a decade of hope and fear, the computer has not replaced clerical hands by doing their work. Since 1950 the office

to 1 over factory personnel. Computers have created 60,000 jobs for programmers to speak computation language — at \$11,000 and more annually. In addition, hundreds of thousands of new jobs have opened for key-punchers at \$500 or so per month.  
But if computers have done all this by processing data from the past to chart a course for the future, consider what it can do with the present.  
By 1970, telephone planners estimate long lines will be carrying more minute-by-minute data to computers than conversations by human voice.  
From tele-communicating equipment in warehouse, desk, salesman's car and home, computers will be able to calculate the status of inventories and patterns of consumption in one twinkling — and in the next, redirect production, reorder supplies, and with a transistorized eye on the market, even send out requests for bids.  
It's not magic, of course. It's simply fast addition. But it comes out looking for all the world like decision-making. In the kind middle management has been making but at a lot slower speed.  
Feed that into your computer, and the Western ideal of creativity — sometimes known as "top management" — doesn't come out looking any too secure, either.

### Emphasis On Health

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS  
Surprise findings that conflict with popular conceptions about aging and religion, adoption and motherhood and complications of childbirth figure in the medical news.

#### Aging and Religion

There is a popular impression that the older persons grow the more religious they become. To test the validity of this belief, Dr. H. I. Orbach studied the religion and church activity in a cross-section of 6,911 adults in the Detroit metropolitan area between the ages of 21 and 84.

#### Fertility and Sterility

Another popular assumption is that if a childless woman adopts a baby, she vastly improves her chances of giving birth later. To test this possibility, Drs. A. L. Banks, R. N. Rutherford and W. A. Cahoon of Seattle, Wash., made follow-up studies of 31 infertile couples who were treated at a fertility clinic and later adopted one or more babies.

#### Birth Complications

Another general medical belief has been that a mother who has had many babies must expect complications in the birth of another child.

Two obstetricians from Israel, Drs. K. Furth and J. Peretz, poured over the records of 23,228 deliveries between 1949 and 1954 at the Rambam Government Hospital, Haifa. Of these, 10,000 deliveries were to mothers known medically as grand multiparas—those who had babies seven or more times in the past.

#### The Wonderful Human Body

The New Physician, a publication for young doctors and medical students, advises this group not to be over-awed by the gigantic strides in space science. It points out that the human body is wonderful too. For example: Human lungs contain 200 million little balloons that remove carbon dioxide and add oxygen to your blood.

Pressure from a slackened jaw—which indicates snoring or, at least, improper breathing—sets off a battery-powered vibrator and buzzer, awakening the culprit.

### Youths Charge University Bias

requires a building because it is threatened with deterioration—the primary reason for such acquisition—it does not make adequate provision for the maintenance of a socially practicable rate of integration in essential to the prevention of further deterioration.

The Detroit Board of Education is under federal court order to show cause why the transfer of 300 elementary school pupils should not be halted.

A committee representing the pupils has filed suit alleging that the proposed transfer is part of discriminatory practices practiced by the board. The suit declares that the board has set policies to create a system under which Negro children are confined to public schools located in all-Negro areas.

The New Orleans Parish School Board backed down on its earlier decision to make an all-Negro school of Dr. Benjamin M. Child, one of the schools involved in racial strife in previous years. The board acted shortly after a federal judge had issued a temporary order restraining the board from segregating the school.

McDonough No. 1 was one of two schools integrated by federal court order in 1960. Hundreds of white parents withdrew their children and the 100-capacity school was attended by five Negro and 15 white pupils.

Lunch counters at several chain stores in Columbus, Ga., were desegregated without incident by about 25 Negroes. In a statement issued through the Citizens for Commerce, a biracial committee said last month that desegregation of lunch counters had been agreed on and would occur early this year.

In Manhattan, Ga., representatives of the Albany movement met with Mayor Ben Kelly and the city commission to present a 3-point request. Such a meeting was one of the points of the agreement which ended demonstrations by Negroes last month.

The Negroes asked that bus companies be allowed to operate segregated facilities without interference from police; that cash bonds posted by demonstrators be returned; and that a biracial planning committee be organized. The commission promised a reply within 10 days.

Three Negroes played in a basketball game last week at the Loyola of Chicago, defeated Loyola of New Orleans, 96-73. One of the Negroes, Vic House, was given an ovation by approximately 1,000 fans as he left the game.

In Washington, the Civil Rights Commission apologized to Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., for saying in its annual report that signs were displayed in Arizona saying "No Indians or Dogs Allowed."

The commission said the statement was not adequately verified and that after a careful check the commission found no evidence that such signs exist today.

**The Doctor Says**  
By HAROLD T. HYMAN, M.D.

Not many of us realize that "years of discretion" without suffering the aches and pains of back troubles caused by faulty body mechanics and even faulty shoeing.

Since for the most part, our troubles arise from years of strain back to infancy and childhood, we have an obligation to protect the rising generation from repeating too many of our mistakes.

Here are some suggestions that may keep your youngsters from the later development of foot ailments and back strains:

Don't urge the infant to stand or walk until he is ready. He should be ready to walk when he is ready to walk. Don't start with a mechanical machine. Start with plain weight-bearing on the floor part of the foot when it should be on the outside.

Don't encourage bare-foot walking. Especially after you have a house pet. Sooner or later you will be going to the store in your shoes. And there's no sense exposing him to contaminated floors and floor coverings in the meantime.

Buy stockings one-half inch longer than the length of the foot. Make your measurement with the younger standing.

Observe these specifications for shoes: 1/4 inch wider and 1/2 to 3/4 inch longer than the measurements of the foot in the standing position, broad toe, straight inner margin. Slip on easily at all of foot, flexible but firm sole that is not slippery.

Make frequent examinations of the shoes. If they are worn unevenly, especially along the heels, have a lift added and correct the walking stance. Teach the youngster to point his toes in the direction for which he's headed, to keep his feet parallel to the direction of his travel, to wear shoes with his toes pointed east and west while he's traveling north or south.

Bathe his feet morning and night with soap and water. Dry carefully, particularly between the toes to prevent the growth of fungus. As soon as the toenails extend beyond the fleshy portion of the toes, cut them straight across. Don't round the corners. Be sure to avoid trimming them too severely.

As soon as the old pair of shoes shows signs of unusual wear or the growing foot appears to be getting crowded, provide a new pair. Don't let him wear a pair of shoes "didn't just come out of this air."

McIntyre said that the \$20 million a year could be effected by eliminating duplicating flights and other services and by better utilization of equipment and facilities. Details have not been worked out.

Charles W. Tilligast, president of Trans World Airlines, commented that merging of the biggest trunk carriers (American and Eastern) was the biggest North-South carrier in the world. He said that the merger would eliminate many of the problems of the remainder of the industry.

Before Eastern chose American as a partner, there had been talks of merging with American, but those talks and there has been talk of possible TWA merger with Northeast Airlines, which is struggling to stay ahead of its creditors.

Howard Hughes, who owns 78 per cent of TWA's stock, has indicated that if he is successful in obtaining control of Northeast, he will endeavor to effect consolidation of the two airlines. Hughes' stock is listed in a voting trust.
